I took three type-written pages! Three, three single spaced pages of type to tell them about all the routines. I doubt that a zoo has much more to do.

There was the corn and bread for the ducks, amounts and when.

There was the canned food with vitamins for the two big dogs, and their dry food.

There was the bag of dry food for the outside cats, then the inside cats got that and canned food. We took the bottle kitten to other friends to take care of.

The hummingbird food had to be mixed and labeled, and instructions written up on keeping two feeders going.

There were pages of instructions about watering outside porch plants, watering inside-plants, and watering the flower beds.

There were instructions about taking care of the puppy.

There had to be instructions about the wall plugs on the east side of the kitchen, and a half page of notes about keeping the chlorine level correct in the above-ground swimming pool we picked up at a garage sale last year.

In other words, there is absolutely nothing simple about our life. The possibility of simply locking up a door and going doesn't exist.

By the time we were through with giving all the notes and instructions we were exhausted, tense and more than a little startled to realise just how complicated things really are!

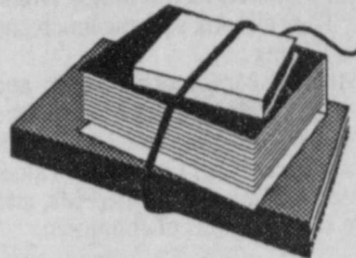
At intervals throughout my life I've had the desire to simplify things...and this is definitely one of those times.

## Back To School Needs For Talco!

There are several things that the school must have before a child can be left on the first day of school as a kindergarten student.

These are: 1. Entry forms (4) Language survey, attendance sheet, top sheet, handbook sheet.

2. Birth certificate.  
3. Immunization record the child must have the following immunizations before he/she enters school: DPT at least 3 doses; Polio, at least 3 doses; Measles vaccine, rubella vaccine, mumps vaccine. A history of measles or mumps may be accepted in lieu of the vaccine if it has been validated in writing by a licensed physician.  
4. Social security card.

Kindergarten school supplies needed are: 1 pkg. of manilla paper, 2 big pencils, 2 guideline writing paper (Aladdin 2112) 1 pair scissors, 1 glue, 1 box (8 basic primary) crayons, 1 school box, 1 box kleenex, 1 mat, 1 pkg. construction paper, 1 change of clothes labeled with child's name, 1 pair gym shoes labelled with child's name. All materials need to be labeled.

Supply box, scissors, glue, crayons, box of 8 only, Kleenex, Manilla paper, construction paper, Aladdin 2112 writing tablet, Tennis shoes (for P.E.) A change of clothes with your child's name on each piece. Please do not forget these, accidents do happen.

## Locals Attend National Softball Tournament

After being presented the Texas flag by state Senator Bill Ratliff in Suphur Springs on Wednesday, Aug. 2 the Dixie Debs Texas State Championship softball team left for Salem, Virginia, where they represented Texas and competed in the World Series National Finals of girls fast pitch softball.

Local girls and their families making the trip were Tonya Hawkins and parents Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Hawkins and Jerilyn Russell and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Russell. A cavalcade of seven cars and vans carrying twelve players, coaches and family members spent nights on the road in West Memphis, Arkansas and Blountville, Tennessee before reaching their destination in Virginia on Friday afternoon.

Upon arrival the girls and coaches attended a pre-tournament banquet at Salem's Civic Center and then the group toured Dixie Caverns where a constant temperature of 54 degrees is maintained.

Opening ceremonies were held at Salem's Civic Center West Field on Aug. 5 at 10 a.m. At 6 p.m. the Texas Dixie Debs met the host team, Salem, Virginia, which resulted in a 3-2 loss. The next afternoon the Texas ladies faced South Carolina's Strong team for their second loss 6-3 in the double elimination tourney.

On Monday the team's caravan drove on through Shenadoah National Forest up Skyline Drive into Washington, D.C. where they spent the next day sightseeing. Some highlights of the tour included the White House, Capitol, Supreme Court, Smithsonian, Lincoln Memorial, Vietnam Memorial, Arlington Cemetery where they walked to Kennedy's gravestone and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers where they witnessed the changing of the guards, Embassy Row, Watergate/Kennedy Center and Iwo Jima Memorial.

As the team returned to Texas they stopped by Opry land for an afternoon to culminate a memorable experience in the lives of them all.

## Ratliff To Host County Officials Meeting

State Senator Bill Ratliff, Mt. Pleasant, announced that he is hosting an informative meeting for all County Judges, County Commissioners, and County Sheriffs on Friday, Aug. 25, in Mt. Pleasant at the Titus Co. Civic Center. "I am pleased to be able to bring these county leaders together to discuss recently passed legislation which directly affects the counties they represent", Ratliff said.

Mr. Horace Groff and Mr. Jim Allison of the Texas Association of Counties will be here to discuss the previous legislative session and the bill which are of importance to the counties of the First Senatorial district. "Over the past seven months my office has had numerous calls concerning county jail over-flow and the jail standards being required by the state. As a result, Carl Jeffries, Assistant Director of the Texas Department of Corrections and Jack Crump, Executive Director of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards will be here to discuss local problems and the effect of the previous session on local county government," Ratliff said.

## Talco-Bogata School Pre-Registration Information Given

Students living more than two miles from their assigned campus and who are new to the district may contact the office at Rivercrest High School 1 (632-5204) for information regarding bus routes.

New student pre-registration for Rivercrest High School students will be held on Monday, August 21, 1989 at the high school principal's office from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m.

Rivercrest high school students may request schedule changes, if needed, on August 22 and 23 from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. at the Rivercrest High School principal's office. Schedules were planned and issued before dismissal of school in May of 1989.

If another copy of a student's schedule is needed, it will need to be requested on the dates previously mentioned. The student must list the reason for a schedule change in writing and see the principal and counselor

for change approval. All changes will be made on August 22 and 23. It would be advantageous to the student to complete the scheduling process prior to the first day of classes.

Elementary and junior high students who have not been previously enrolled in Talco or Bogata school campuses should also pre-register for classes on August 22 and 23 at their prospective campuses where they will attend. Principals Billy Joe Vickers at Talco and Jerry Teel at Bogata want to remind parents that all students entering kindergarten must be five years of age on or before September 1st of the current year. Students entering the 1st grade must be six years of age on or before September 1st of the current year. Kindergarten students must furnish a birth certificate before being enrolled. First grade students who did not attend kindergarten the previous year or who are enrolling in the first grade for the first time in the district must furnish a birth certificate.

The Board appointed school committees as recommended.

The resignation of Charles Cole as counselor on the Talco campus was accepted.

Board members worked on the budget workshop and set the date for the budget hearing and adoption for August 21, at 7:30 p.m. and set the date for adopting tax rate for 1989 taxes and date to adopt amend budget for 1988-89 for August 31.

A workshop for the Board members was hired as teacher on the Bogata Campus.

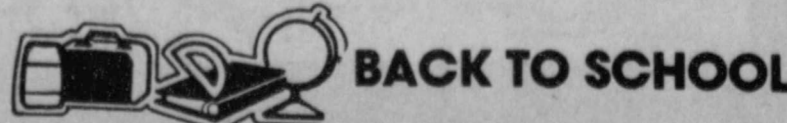

## I.L. (Bob) Read Dies At Age 87

Isaac Louis (Bob) Read died August 14, 1989 at McCuiston Regional Medical Center.

He was born April 2, 1902 in Deport, a son of Isaac Lee Read and Margaret Francis Woodard Read.

Services were held Thursday, August 17, at 11 a.m. at the First Presbyterian Church of Deport with the Rev. Sam Rice officiating.

Burial was in Highland Cemetery with Masonic Service at the cemetery.

He married Dorcas Miriam Cameron on May 7, 1926, at the Central Presbyterian Church in Paris.

Read served as mayor of the city of Deport from 1960 until 1966, and served as a member of the city council for many years. He was always extremely active in community affairs.

In recognition of this the Deport city Council passed a resolution designating a street as "Read Street" in his honor. This occurred, co-incidentally, only hours before his death.

He was a member of the well known pioneer Read family who helped settle the area, and a long time area farmer.

He was a mason for 50 years, and a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Deport all his life. He served in the church as a deacon since 1939, and an elder since 1956, and as Sunday School Superintendent.

He is survived by his wife, two grandsons and four great-grandsons. A daughter, Olga Bob Pearson, preceded him in death.

Bearers were grandsons Eric and Read Pearson, Kyle Read, Lawrence Wood, Gary Nixon and Bill Read. Members of the Masonic Lodge served in the graveside service.

### Drug Enforcement Funds Awarded To First District

State Senator Bill Ratliff, Mount Pleasant, has notified by Governor Bill Clements' office that monies have been awarded to fund enhanced drug law enforcement programs in the First Senatorial District.

"The creation of the Texas Narcotics Control Program has generated tremendous response and support since its inception three years ago. It is the goal of all governmental bodies to create and preserve a drug-free state, and these projects will help insure that goal," said Ratliff. Three grants were funded in the Northeast Texas area. They included \$137,270 Regional Controlled Substance Apprehension to the City of Paris.

### PJC Registration Scheduled For Aug. 22-25

Registration for the fall semester at Paris Junior College has been scheduled for Aug. 22 through 25 on the PJC campus, according to Brad Bankhead, director of admissions.

Registration will be by selected alphabetical order in the Learning Center.

All new students are required by the state to be tested in reading, writing and math for placement purposes. Students who enter without official Texas Academic Skills Program (TASP) test scores must complete local placement test prior to registration. The TASP test is not required prior to admission.

The local placement test take two hours to complete and are given at 1p.m. each Monday and Wednesday at the student development center in the learning center. Students who must take the local tests should schedule time before registration to take the tests. The local tests will also be given from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. during registration week.

Students will be required to provide proof of residency during registration to determine whether in-district, out-of-district, or out-of-state tuition should be charged. Examples are a drivers license with a current address (if it is more than a year old), a utility bill, personal mail, apartment lease, or anything that shows the address the student has had for one full year.

Sophomores are scheduled to register from noon to 4 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 22, land from 8 a.m. to noon Wednesday, Aug. 23. Freshmen are scheduled to register from 8 a.m. to noon Friday, Aug. 25.

Night student may register during the scheduled night registration times or during the appropriate alphabetical time during the day. Night registration period are scheduled from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 22, and from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 24.

An open registration period has been scheduled from noon to 3 p.m. Friday, Aug. 25 for all students.

Fall semester classes begin Monday, Aug. 28, and the last day to add classes is Tuesday, Sept. 5.

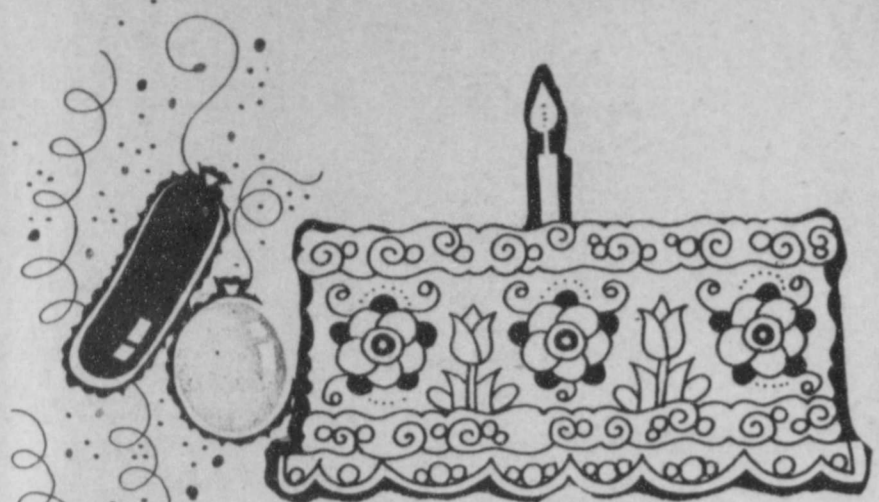

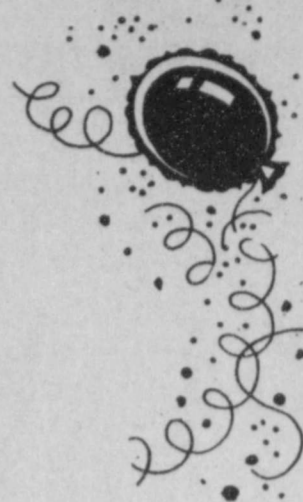

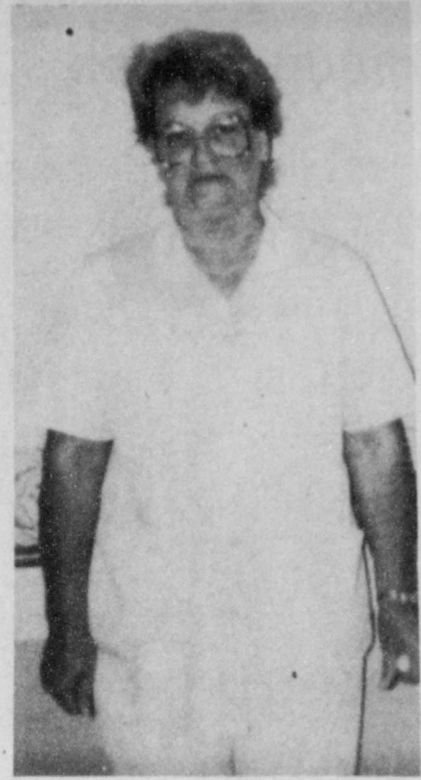

## Getting A New Perspective On Old Places..Or "How I Spent My Summer Vacation"

Our vacation accounts have become an annual thing in the papers, although I still haven't figured out why. Some people aren't interested, I'm sure, but a lot of people have asked for it, so here goes!

The state of our pocketbook decreed that no exotic places would be on the agenda this year for our yearly, 10 day holiday. What to do when Iceland is out, when New Zealand is zapped? Well, we decided to revisit an old favorite place, but take a look at it from a different perspective.

We headed out for Colorado, a state we have paid visits to six or seven times previously, but this time, instead of merely taking a few hiking trails, driving around through the roads and staying in motels we decided to start at the bottom (literally) and work upward (literally).

During the course of our visit we went whitewater rafting, ascended in a hot air balloon, and took one of the most harrowing full-day jeep trips imaginable. We also met a number of interesting people and one very nice dog.

With the car packed (what a luxury, no flight schedules to meet and anything we could cram in the trunk we could take) we headed out through the west Texas countryside. I confess, I don't care for that portion of our state, no trees, no rivers. We spent the night with relatives in Amarillo and headed out for worse country...the barren desert-like area of New Mexico. Finally though we made it into the pleasant mountains around Taos.

At Taos we wandered around the historic old plaza, looting at some really lovely art work, but not even considering buying...Taos prices are just too high. We explored the ancient Taos Pueblo, the oldest continually inhabited dwellings in the Northern Americas. About two hundred Tiwa Indians live within the adobe structures, which are four to five stories high.

They have no running water, although there is a lovely, clear stream chuckling through the center of the village. They have no electricity, although it is available, they just don't want it. The pueblos are virtually unchanged from 900 years ago when they were built. They do, however, have doors now. In the old days, they had holes in the roof. That way, when enemies approached, they just climbed up their ladders, skinned down into the homes, and pulled the ladders in after them! A beautiful Indian girl took us around, telling us the history of the structures, pointing out the curious mixture of Catholic religion (brought by the Spanish) and traditional Indian beliefs that they have.

We admired the beautiful beadwork, stone carving, wood carving and pottery the people had for sale, and enjoyed the scent of hot fry bread cooking in oil. The cultural achievements and skills of these so-called "primitive" people were impressive. Then we proceeded to load up and head on towards the tiny town of Natrop, Colorado.

At Natrop that evening we were intrigued with the Mt. Princeton Hot Springs. Two huge pools contain the hot mineral waters, which don't even smell bad the way most mineral waters do.

If man made pools weren't appealing, there was always the river itself. There folks would build little rock ponds channelling icy cold water into the hot spring water until they managed to regulate the temperature to suit their personal taste. Then they would stretch out, relaxing under the influence to warm water and muscle soothing minerals.

We stashed our bags with a Texas-born hotel manager at the hotel, then went to check in for our raft trip at Four Corner's Expeditions, just down the road. That was where the real fun began.

We had scheduled a two day trip down the Arkansas River right through the Royal Gorge.

The first hint that everything was really going to be a blast was when this 5 foot high bright red headed little gal came bouncing up, hair escaping from a baseball cap and in one long breath exclaimed "Hi, I'm Esther..we're going on the raft trip with you, I know I look about 14, but I'm a senior in high school and we're going to have fun!" She was right, we did!

Our guide, Mike Brady, turned out to be a personable young man attending Colorado State and working his third summer on the river. His contributions to the fun proved considerable too.

Esther's parents, Dr. and Mrs. John Wright (John and Gynell) proved to be assets also. John teaches English at a Christian College in Illinois. After raising four daughters, Gynell has recently gone back to college and is going to teach high school Spanish this fall.

Never having rafted before, they were excited and a little apprehensive too. On the Brown's Canyon portion of our trip wet suits aren't needed, and we simply stripped down to the bare essentials. No, we didn't skinny dip, but jewelry, makeup, excess clothing, billfolds and baggage just don't have a place on the river. That is one of the fabulous things about rafting, the world narrows down to the water and it's channel and you...nothing else. Anyone who could talk business or fail to appreciate the simplicity of it would have to be one devoted workaholic!

A short bus ride, a simple explanation by Mike "look folks, the river's down there and we're up here, who's gonna help tote the boat" and we were in the water. Of course, poor "Mom" (Gynell swiftly came to be called Mom) was a little paler after hearing the safety talk of "wraps" "flips" "swims" and waves.

But we were on the water, drifting along happily, and learning about

one another quickly. For now, that's all the room I have to recite, so, to those who are interested, tune in for the REAL excitement next week...there's waves coming up!

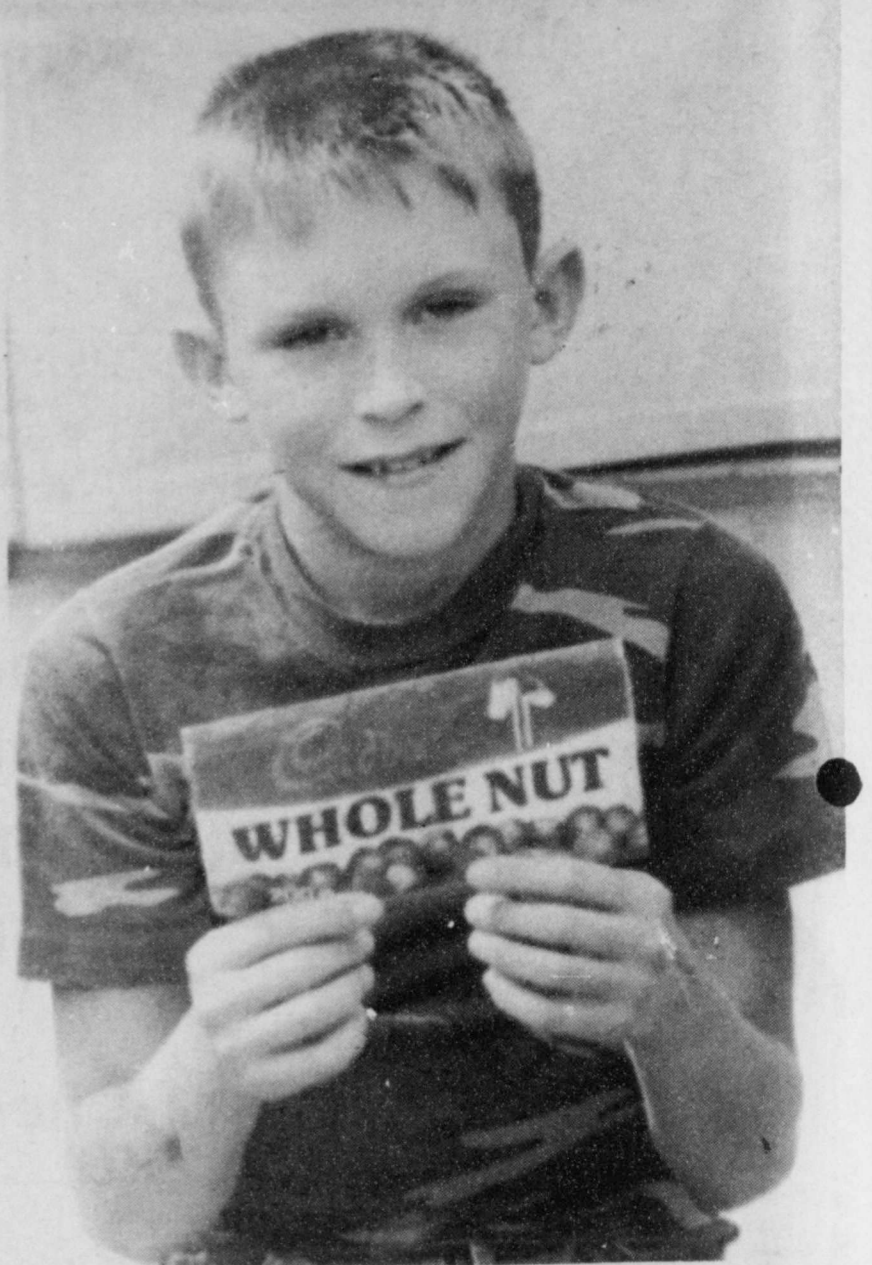
#### Obesity: Treatment and Prevention

Obesity is the most important nutritional disorder in the United States today. Children as well as adults are afflicted, and the percentage of obese individuals ranges from 10-30 percent.

According to the Academy's nutrition handbook, the tendency for childhood obesity to persist into the adult years is well-known. Recent evidence also suggests that overweight infants are more likely to become fat adults. Thus, it is possible to identify children at risk early on: those born to obese parents, those who gain weight rapidly during infancy and those whose mothers use food to control behavior.

Reasonable, though as yet unproven, preventive measures include:

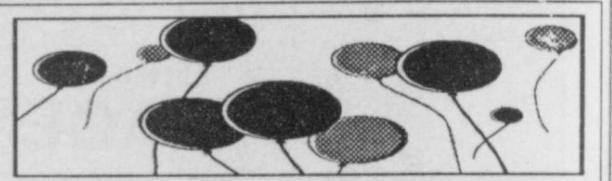
- breast feeding;
- delay in introduction of solid foods and counseling of mothers to give foods only in response to hunger, not as a pacifier;
- a reorientation of family life toward low calorie foods and the ritualization of total mealtime behavior;
- promotion of physical exercise.

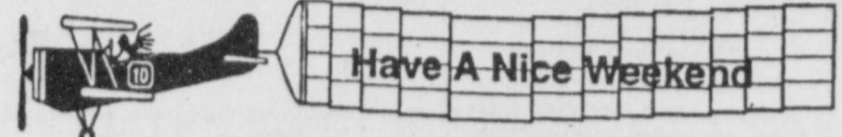

## Heart Failure Claims Patient After 'Last Chance' Transplant

Taken From The Dallas Times Herald, Friday, July 7.

Herman "Sonny" Moody, a leukemia patient whose June 21 bone marrow transplant was called "one last chance", died Wednesday of apparent heart failure. He was 47. Moody's doctors had been searching worldwide for a donor when they discovered the rare match in a 27-year old Belgian, Eric Smekens. Smekens, whose 15-year old cousin had died of leukemia, agreed to come to Dallas to donate marrow to Moody, whom he had never met.

"The marrow transplant went well," said Dr. Joseph Fay, who performed the operation at Baylor University Medical Center. "He went into complete remission. We surmise that his previous chemotherapy on top of getting additional chemotherapy just injured his heart and he essentially died of congestive heart failure."

The exact cause of death will be known after an autopsy, Fay said. Tests before the operation revealed

no heart damage, Fay said. Moody had been diagnosed with leukemia during a routine physical examination six years ago. Janet Moody, his wife, had called the marrow transplant her husband's "one last chance" for life.

Moody's longtime friend, Roy Orr, said he believed Moody would urge people with leukemia to seek donor sarily in the disease and encourage healthy people to consider becoming donors. "We feel very much if he could have found that match two years ago when he was in better physical condition that his chances would have been better," Orr said. "He always knew the odds were against him. He always knew he was fighting."

Moody was a self-employed importer and exporter in DeSoto. Besides his wife and mother, survivors include one son, Bart; grandmother, D.L. Cowan and brother, Jerry Moody. Memorial contributions may be made to the bone marrow transplant unit at Sammons Cancer Center, Baylor University Medical Center, attention Dr. Joseph Fay, Suite 410, 3500 Gaston Avenue, Dallas, TX 75246.
