## October Rebate Figures Released

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that October's sales tax rebates to cities and counties continue to tell the story of an economy that's steadily growing.

Bullock said that October's city rebates statewide are up almost 11% from October 1988, and year to date payments to cities are up an average of 9.5%.

"Consumers have more money to spend and they're doing just that," Bullock said. "That means another month of increased sales tax rebates for local areas."

October also marks the first month the Metropolitan Transit Authorities

will start receiving their rebates quarterly rather than monthly. The change is the result of legislation passed during the last session, Bullock said.

The six MTAs in Texas will receive their next payment in December.

Houston received the largest payment in the state at \$11.7 million and Dallas' check of \$8.2 million was the second largest.

Locally, Blossom received \$751.59 for a 20.24% increase over 1988 payments to date. Deport received \$606.64 for a 14.64% increase over the 1988 payments.

Paris received \$156,701.05 for a

5.77% increase.

Bogata received \$1,499.73 for a 10.93% increase over the 1988 payment for the same period while Clarksville received \$13,774.35 for a 2.88% decrease.

Detroit received no payment for this period.

Mt. Pleasant received \$88,890.98 for a 11.28% increase.

Talco received \$1,112.99 for a 9.46% decrease.

October's checks represent taxes collected by businesses in August and reported to the Comptroller's office in September.

## Pigeons Released In Talco Saturday

There were some unusual birds flying around in Talco last Saturday...but they weren't around for long!

Keith LaJack, from Opelousas, LA, released about 500 pigeons in Talco. The swift birds would be back in south Louisiana, Jack said, about 1 p.m. that same day. They were released about 8 a.m.

Some birds, the trainer said, can travel 55 to 60 miles per hour. These birds on this run were released from

about 40 different locations, and all will return to the same location. The carrier pigeons will not go down for food or water while they are returning home. A short race is about 100 miles, but the birds will go up to 600 miles and still get home on the same day they are released.

LaJack says that pigeons were used in World War I and II to carry messages into war zones.

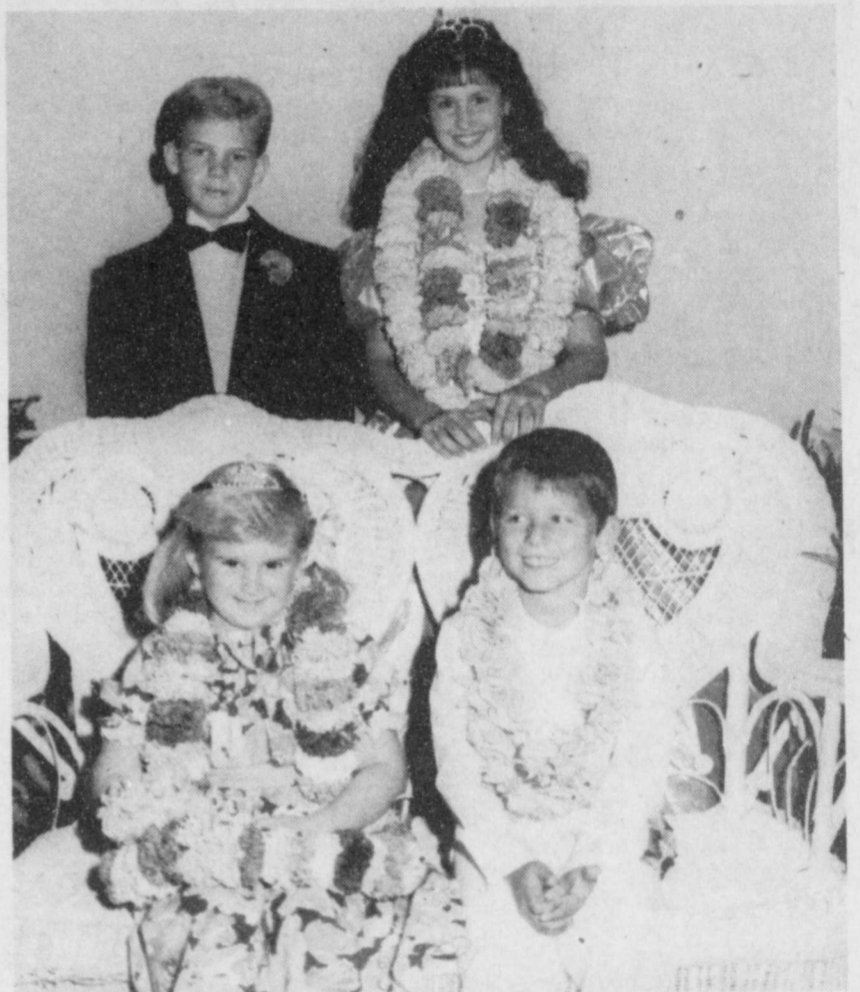
From that it ballooned into a hobby. In the past, the birds sold for about

\$10 to \$20, but no more. A "decent" one now brings about \$100. They are carefully bred for speed and homing ability.

A pigeon in Belgium once sold for \$130,000!

Each bird has identification on a band that is placed on one leg the first week after they are hatched. After about 10 days, the band won't come off.

LaJack headed on back to Louisiana to welcome his birds...those that weren't there before him!

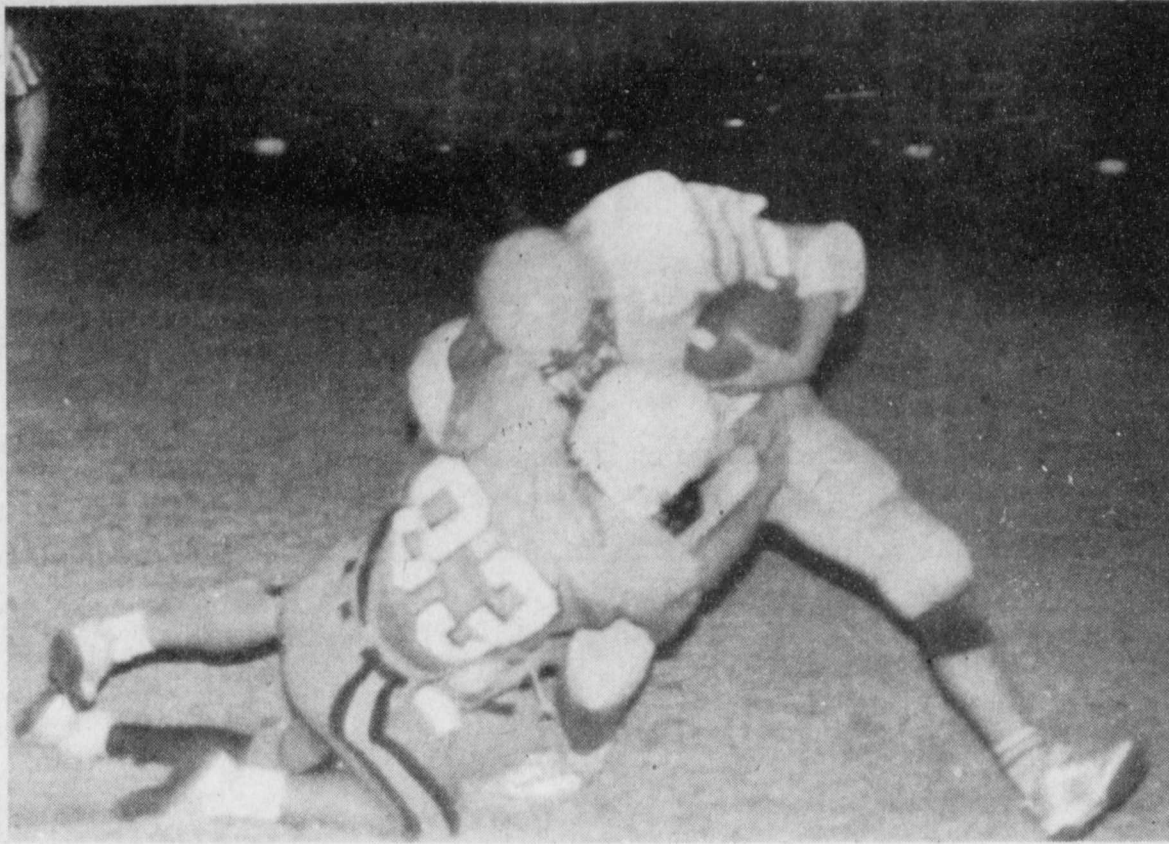

**An Editorial.....**

Special legislation passed by the 71st Legislature will give Texas voters the opportunity to have direct input into life safety and property protection for years to come. The special law creates an emergency fund for the fire service of Texas and does so without an increase in taxes or fees. Texas voters will decide the issue on November 7, in the general election.

The proposed constitutional amendment, Proposition No. 17 on the ballot authorizes the creation of the fund which can be used by all fire departments in the state, paid or volunteer, large or small. The fund may be used only for training and equipment and will be distributed on a priority basis with the most urgent needs being served first.

The fund will be administered by a board under the direction of the State Fire Marshal's Office. The seven member board, appointed by the governor, will include fire members representing the fire service and two members representing the general public and will serve without pay.

If approved by a majority of Texas voters, the fund will address the serious problem of funding for the almost 2,000 fire departments in the state. Fire departments across the state will be eligible to apply for low interest loans or grants in an effort to address unnecessary deaths and injuries as well as the needless loss of property due to fire which could be prevented with better training and equipment. During 1987, 322 Texans died in fires which caused \$486,000.00 in damages.

State Representative Rick Perry, (R), Haskell, author of the bill, said "Voting against this proposition is the same as putting a \$99 price tag on a human life."

### Rebels Use Big Play To Beat Eagles

At the beginning of the '89 football campaign, Rebel head coach Terry Giddens promised an exciting and explosive offense, capable of scoring quickly. Against the Como-Pickton Eagles last week, the prophecy came to fruition, as the Rebels scored three times in the first half on plays of 65, 59 and 53 yards.

The Rebel defense then made equally important plays to prevent the Eagles from overtaking them, resulting in a 21-14 Rebel victory.

The win was the third of the year against five losses; but, more importantly, the Rebels now own a 2-1 District 17AA mark, but face an uphill battle into the play-offs as they meet Leonard at home Friday night and then close against the fifth ranked Cooper Bulldogs a week later on their turf.

The sparkplug in Friday's exciting offensive explosion was senior tailback Jeremy Abshier, who continued the torrid pace begun against Honey Grove, by scoring all three of the Rebel markers. Abshier rushed for a season high of 213 yards on 16 carries, an average of 13.3 per carry. IN the last two games, the single-minded Rebel has accounted for 1/2 of his season total of 592 rushing yards, and

has scored the last five Rebel touchdowns. The sure-handed receiver also caught two passes for 75 yards to account for 288 of the Rebels total offensive production of 313 yards.

To be sure, it required a total team effort to secure the victory. The Rebel defense repeatedly made the big play to thwart the Eagle advance. For example, the Eagles took the opening kick-off and were moving downfield, when junior guard Jesse Woods pounced on an Eagle fumble. With 8:07 to go in the quarter, the Rebel offense came onto the field, and on the first play Jeremy Abshier ran off tackle, following the block of Joey Webb and Kevin Binion, and escaped from four tackles for a 65 yard run to glory. Joshua Abshier added the point after.

After the Eagles rebounded with a ball-controlling drive of 68 yards, culminating in a tying touchdown, both defenses forced punts. Near the midway point of the second stanza, Abshier again broke into a secondary and galloped to victory lane to make the score 14-7, Rebels. This run was created by the excellent blocking of the Rebel offensive line, led by seniors Chad Ingram and Binion and junior Russell Ward.

The final Rebel score of the game was set up by the Rebel defensive line, as senior Joey Webb sacked quarterback Chris Self for an eight yard loss, forcing a punt.

From the Eagle 47-yard line, Rebel signal caller Shane Beers found, guess who, on a 53-yard pass and run for the margin of victory. The Eagle offense threatened to score just before halftime, but Ward killed the threat as he sacked Self for another 10 yard loss as the halftime gun sounded.

The only second half scoring came on the opening drive of the third quarter as Self capped a 60-yard drive with a three yard run. The Eagles managed 281 total yards, evenly balanced with 136 yards rushing and 145 yards passing. A key defensive play was made later in the period by Beers, who recovered the third Eagle fumble of the contest at the Rebel 10-yard line.

The Rebel defense stood the test in the fourth quarter as they repeatedly made big plays to curtail the Eagle rally. Kevin Binion batted down a key third down pass, and cornerback David Davidson made a crucial pass interception.

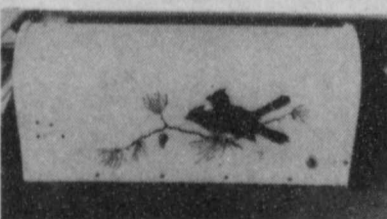

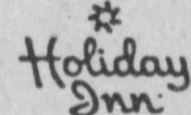

## Social Security Notes

By Ray Hudson, District Manager  
 Paris Social Security Office

Social Security Services Are Free Of Charge.....As a Social Security manager, it bothers me to know that people pay for services they can receive free from Social Security. It happens every day. Companies send out letters offering to sell Social Security information or services--information and services that are available FREE by simply calling Social Security and asking for them.

Recent legislation puts some restrictions on these firms; for example, they must now make it clear they are not affiliated with the government. But many of them continue to be in business and continue to take advantage of a public unaware of their rights under Social Security.

Exactly what do these companies ask people to buy? One firm sells memberships for \$7. In return for your \$7, the firm sends you a plastic Social Security card, a form to request a statement of your Social Security earnings and a guide to Social Security.

The form that lets you check your Social Security earnings is available free from any Social Security office. It is called a "Request for Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement". It provides a listing of your yearly earnings and estimates of what your benefits will be when you retire

or if you become disabled or die. You wouldn't need their guide to Social Security since you can get various free publications about Social Security at any Social Security office. And who needs a plastic Social Security card? The card issued by Social Security is the only official one. If it wears out or you lose it, Social Security will replace it, free of charge.

Other firms offer to assist people with filing for retirement benefits or filing for a Social Security number for their baby. And some firms offer newly married women help in getting their names changed in Social Security's records.

In many cases, the assistance provided is simply a blank form that must be completed and sent back to Social Security. Or sometimes the company takes the information and transfers it to a Social Security form.

Of course, there's no reason to pay anyone to do this. Social Security provides forms and assistance to anyone who needs them at no charge.

If you ever receive mail offering Social Security information or services for a fee, call Social Security first. The number is in the telephone directory. Chances are we can give you the same thing, free.

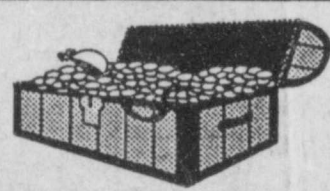
