Fires Sweep Through Area High Winds, Dry Grass Speed Spread

The entire area has been plagued were called to Cunningham, where by gras fires that engulfed hay and some barns over the past week, and arson figuered in at lleast one of them.

Beginning with a huge grass fire Tuesday, of last week at Johntown, numerous smaller fires occured. On Wednesday a grass fire just south of Red Oak Cemetery required units from all over to keep from destroying three residences and several barns. It did burn over 125 larage round bales of hay. In the early hours of Thursday, November 9 the Deport Fire Department was called to a fire in which three separate stacks of large round hay bales, on opposite sides of the road and widely separated, were on fire. Evidence there points to a deliberate ignition.

Later that same morning fire units

the Musgrove Flying Mranch grassland was burning.

Right after noon a big fire at Clardy called out units from all over. Before volunteer firemen could even return where a huge grass fire required units from Bogata, Deport, Reno, Blossom, Detroit Cunningham, Talco, Faught, Paris, Pine Creek and virtually every other fire department in the area. Again before units could return home the call came in to go to a fire at Four Duce Ranch between Detroit and Woodland. This fire burned down barns full of hay and possible before being brought under thing.

During that time fires at Rock Ford and other areas of the countries of a smaller nature were also called in, often with almost no fire units to

On Saturday a recurring fire on home calls came in to go to Detroit, Flying M was extinguished. More grass fires at Deport, Blossom, Bogata and Talco were reported, with the calls actually being too numerous to keep an accurate report on.

At the current time winds are still brisk, and the extremely dry conditions that have contributed to the fire danger have not bee alleviated.

Rebels Glow Despite 68-21 Loss

By Gary House Cooper: Every cloud has a silver lining. So the Rivercrest Rebels can look on the bright side in the face of a 68-21 season ending loss to the powerful Cooper Bulldogs, who proved they are worthy of their fourth place ranking in Class 2A gridiron competition. Consider these rays of hope for the Rebels, 1) the Rebels will never have to face the state's premier running back Bam Morris again. Morris scored six first half touchdowns and rushed for 218 yards as he put a lock on the state's rushing title, with almost 2,400 yards, 2) the Rebels did something against Cooper that few other opponents have accomplished; they scored three touchdowns and rushed for nearly 300 yards, 3) for the first time in at least fiv eyears, the Rebels can boast of a 1,000 yard club member. Senior tailback Jeremy Abshier surpassed the coveted mark on his final offensive play as a Rebel, as he ran for 20 yards and a touchdown with only 1:23 to play. That run gave Abshier a

122 carries. The outstanding breakaway runner, who emerged into full bloom midway in the season, also led the Rebels scoring with eight touchdowns, 4) the Rebels provided plenty of excitement for the fans during the season. One-half of the Rebel touchdowns came on plays of 50 yards or more. The offense averaged 321 yards per game, with 243 of that coming on the ground. Senior fullback Marcus Savage led in average yards per carry, with 800 yards on 148 attempts, for a 5.4 average. Savage would no doubt have joined the millenial club had it not been for mid-season injuries which hampered him, 5) the Rebel seniors left a legacy of leadership and 100% effort for underclassmen to emulate. Seven Rebels closed their schoolboy careers in the game. Most of them played both ways, and all made a significant contribution to the Rebel season. Seniors Joey Webb and Clint Tidwell were sidelined by injuries; the work of Abshier and

The entire Rebel unit can hold their heads high because of their dedication an determination in the face of adversity. Football is a team sport, and every player is part of that team, whether they make the headline sor

Finally, we must remember that this is high school football, not college or professional play. It is designed to be a learning experience for the participants, a time of character development, and a training field for life. Winning should not be the primary factor, for often more is learned in a loss than in a victory.

The Rebel coaching staff is to be commended for their example, and their hard work in teaching these principles of life to the Rebel squad.







"District 17AA basketball is reputed to be the strongest Class 2A league in the state," commented Wood in a recent interview. "For example, every girls' team has played at either the regional or state competition in the past." The Rebelettes have won two state championships and seven regional trophies. A very positive minded Wood gave the following evaluation of this year's basketball

The Rebelettes: "The team should be very competitive, opening on November 14 against Class 4A Paris High School, a team that lost to eventual state champ Levelland by one point last year.

The squad returns ten lettermen from last year, and is expected to be two deep in each position. Although Wood expects to platoon a great deal, possible starters include three seniors. 5'7" Tonya Hawkins will move from point guard to forward, but her hustle will mark her as the floor leader. Tonya has a super attitude and will be recruited to play guard in college. The post positions will be handled by 5'8" Kristie Stansell and 6'0" Amy Gladden, both three year starters. "Stansell is very quick around the

Starting at point guard will be junior-Jerilyn Russell, who will be backed up by senior D'Ann Stephenson. The other forward slot will be manned by sophomore Krista Weatherall, who has a highly accurate outside shot. Back-up forwards will be senior Kristie Brooks, an excellent defender, and junior Kristie Eudy. Rounding out the varsity unit, and expected to see a lot of action are senior Shane Webb and junior Melanie White at forward and Junior Katy Ross and sophomore Tiffany Parish

"All 12 can play varsity basketball and do a good job," commented Wood of the consistency of his Lady Rebels. "Seven or eight of the girls are capable of scoring, we have several good perimeter shooters, and our post players have proven they are not afraid to shoot the ball.

"The girls have worked exceptionally hard on defense; we have spent more time in practice on that phase of the game, since we plan to employ a pressing defense all the time, whether ahead or behind. I believe this is the most improved area of the game," said Wood when asked about strengths and weaknesses.

"I believe the Rebelettes will become a real fine basketball squad; they are a hard-working group of girls, who are learning to discipline themselves to the program, feel that tey beat the majority of the teams in Texas.

The Rebelettes open at home on November 24 against arch rival Prairiland, although they travel to Paris, Winnsboro and their 271 neighbors


