Social Security Notes

Not all farm work is covered by Social Security. Farmers and farm workers need to know when farm work is covered by Social Security. Farmers must pay Social Security taxes for any worker who is paid at least \$150 in cash during the year. If the farmer's total expense for agricultural labor is \$2,500 or more, all workers are covered by Social Security, even if they earn less than \$150. An exception is made for some piece-work laborers.

The exception applies to laborers

who live at home and commute to work daily during harvest season to pick fruit or vegetables by hand. If the work is paid on a piece-rate basis, it is only covered by Social Security if the worker is paid at least \$150 in cash.

More information for farmers and farm workers is available from your nearest Social Security office. You may call or ask for Factsheet 6, Crew Leaders and Farmers or Factsheet 8, Agricultural Workers.

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There's A New Symbol Of Power In The Country

Everyone feels the squeeze when bill paying time rolls around, and Lamar Electric Cooperative is no exception.

But through the efforts of Lamar Electric Cooperative and its generation and transmission cooperative, Rayburn Electric, efforts are being put forth to hold electric bills down. And when the cooperative is able to trim its wholesale power bill, those savings are passed along to its members.

"Because of concern for our members, six area cooperatives have joined hands through the leadership of Rayburn Electric Cooperative to help reduce those power costs," says Charles Christian, member services manager of Lamar Electric.

The six electric cooperatives that form Rayburn Electric are Fannin Electric in Bonham, Kaufman Electric in Kaufman, FEC Electric in Greenville, Grayson-Collin Electric in Van Alstyne, New Era Electric in Athens and Lamar Electric in Paris.

The electric utility business is a very complex business, especially in the area of power supply. That is the reason for the creation and existence

of Rayburn Electric, a generation and transmission cooperative headquartered in Rockwall.

Rayburn Electric currently makes bulk power purchases for the member cooperatives from TU Electric and other power suppliers. It has also begun long-term planning to explore alternate electric power sources which are more reliable and cost-conscious.

Rayburn Electric has been involved as an intervenor in TU Electric's filing before the Texas Public Utilities Commission for a \$442 million rate increase.

"As a result of this new thrust, which was brought about as a matter of survival due to spiraling wholesale electric rates, we wanted something to commonly identify us," according to Harold Faulkner, general manager of Lamar Electric.

"We hope our members will become familiar with this logo and its six lightning bolts, as being representatives of the six Northeast and North Central Texas electric cooperatives providing reliable, affordable power to approximately 200,000 people in the 16-county area."

Managing Beef Herds With Limited Forage

Who would believe that there would be a grass shortage in the area after the flooding problem in May? But that is exactly the situation now on area farms and ranches.

Hay yields have been running from 30 to 50 percent of normal this summer with the prospects of another cutting not too promising at the present time. However, the picture could change dramatically with additional rainfall this week or next. There is plenty of time remaining to get an additional one or two cuttings, but having adequate rainfall is the limiting factor.

Grass meadows will need additional fertilizer if they are to produce a quantity of quality hay. Being smart or lucky enough to apply the fertilizer to the grass just prior to a rain is the key since a considerable quantity of the nitrogen can be lost where rainfall does not move the fertilizer into the soil. This is particularly true of urea fertilizers as they volatilize much more quickly.

Milk supplies less than half of the nutrients needed by a calf to gain rapidly after it is three to four months of age according to Dr. Randall Grooms, Livestock Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. If the pasture that is available to the calves is not adequate, then one can expect to take lighter calves to the market.

Creep feeds to supplement pasture

to meet these additional requirements are not economical under all conditions, but producers with a grass shortage this summer should take a close look at creep feeding. Kansas State University reported in a review of 31 university trials that calves gained 0.38 pound faster daily an required an average of 9 pounds of creep feed for an extra pound of gain.

The inefficient feed conversions for creep rations is due to calves substituting g creep feed for forage when pastures are good and because calves often fatten when creeps are full fed. So it would seem that creep feeding would be more economical at this time of year.

An approach to improve the efficiency and profitability of creep feeding is to limit feed creep rations. A high protein creep (34 to 44%) has been used in many studies and limited to about 1.0 pound per pound of extra gain.

So, if you are getting short on grass, you might want to take a second look at creep feeding your calves.

Many spring flowering shrubs will be forming flower buds in late July and August. Drought conditions can reduce the quality and the quantity of

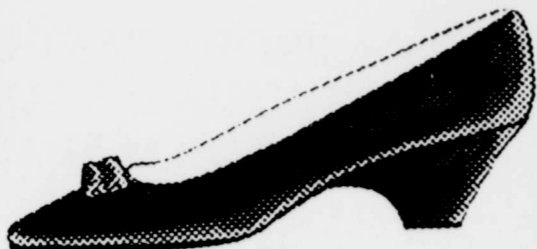

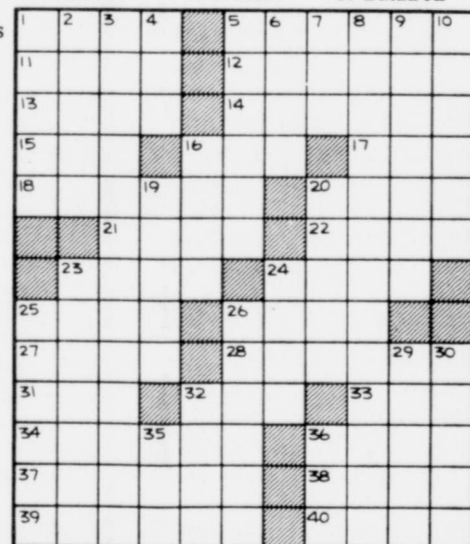
During 1989 many opportunities have come for Joy and Stella to assist established mission groups in Zaire, South Africa, London and Central America.

So you leave the store and head home because your mother is tired of kids and her nerves are shot. So she leaves the school shopping to be done another day.

Future Hay Production Depends Upon Fertility Program

Most producers still do not have enough hay to winter their livestock, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., extension agronomist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

"Due to the winter freeze, the first cutting of hay in East Texas was about one-third to one-half less than it should have been," said Dr. Reeves. "If a second or third cutting is needed, fertilizer should be applied now to take advantage of the next rainfall."

Reeves said that fertilizer requires a rain to be activated. Therefore, if fertilizer is applied after a rain, it will still be on top of the ground waiting for the next rain.

"The greatest loss of nitrogen to the air occurs when nitrogen is applied as the soil is drying," Reeves

said. "Fertilizer put out on dry soil remains intact until it receives moisture. Phosphorus and potassium are not lost to the atmosphere."

Reeves suggests storing hay inside a barn or shed if possible. Hay will maintain its quality for several years if protected from the weather. If round bales are stored outside, be sure the storage area is well drained.

"Loose wrapped round bales stored outside may lose one-third to one-half their quality and weight the first year," Reeves said. "The outer six inches of a six-foot diameter bale contains about one-third of the total quantity of the bale. If you examine hay left over from last year and stored outside, this will give an indication of the amount of hay lost."

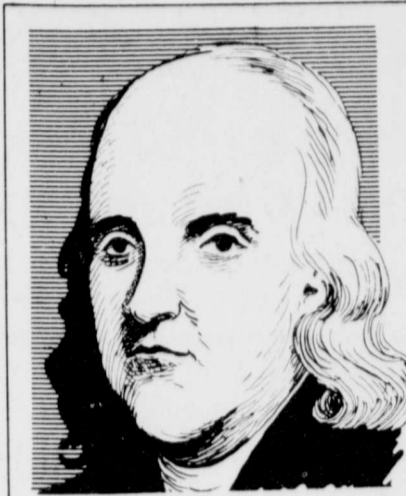



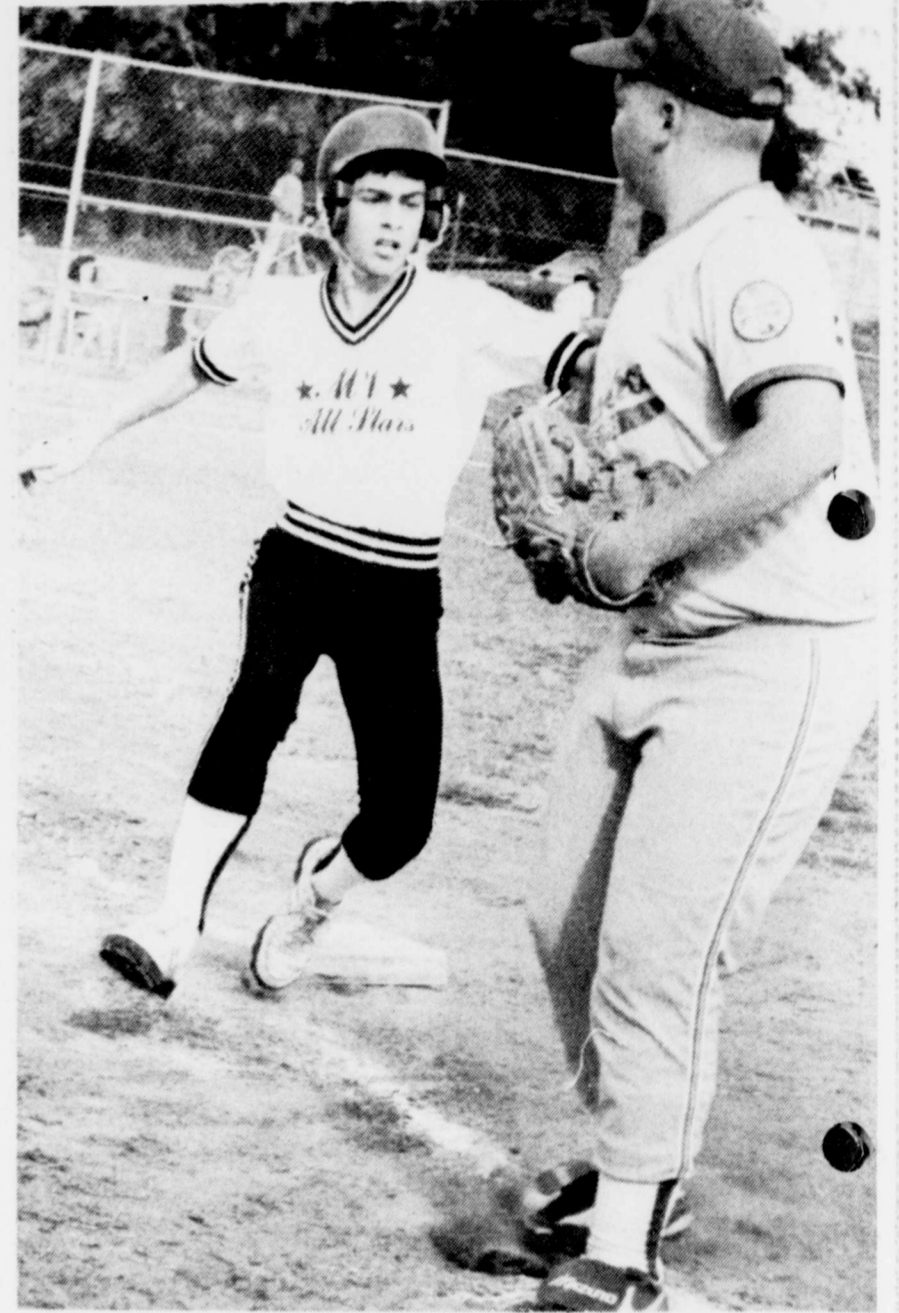

Winnsboro in the All Star Tournament last week. The MV's won 14-4. (Staff Photo by Keye Lee)

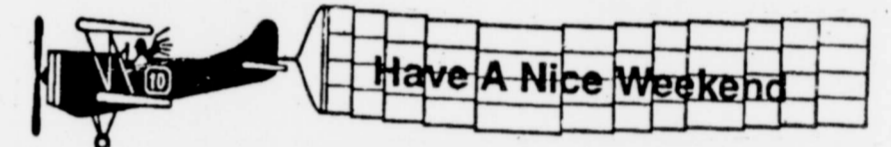
Ladies Auxiliary Meets
