Principal Ray Miller opened the meeting with appreciation expressed to those who have helped get the program underway in the schools.

Drug testing will possibly begin on Wednesday. Applications for membership are available at each school office and must be signed by the child and parents or guardian.

Mr. Miller introduced D-FY-IT chairperson, Rue Anna Bell; incentive chairman, Donnie Hayes and guest speaker, Reggie Day of Mine-

Mr. Hayes reported on the many businesses offering discounts to D-FY-IT members. Mt. Pleasant, Talco, Bogata, Clarksville and Paris businesses have committed to discounts for these student members. He also reported several businesses gave cash

donations to the program. Mr. Miller then introduced guest speaker, Reggie Day of Mineola. He began by telling students that in his 23 years coaching and working with students, he has seen many drug programs come andgo, but the D-FY-IT program is the only one he has seen that works, because it involves the community, students, parents and teachers. He explained that these business people give these discounts freely to help students, but if they see Friday and Saturday night drunks and students high on dope, they can and will pull out their support. Students must honor their end of theprogram and help others honor it, also.

Mr. Day stated that "Didn't want to put the kids to sleep by being too serious," but requested they listen seriously for a few minutes.

He named four things as the most important to a successful life. 1. Courage to say no. Don't be a wimp, make your own decisions. It may not always be the "in" thing, but students know right from wrong. 2. Strive for excellence. Be the best you can be. Don't settlefor second. This can be as

Begin with respect for your own body. Kissing a smoker is like licking an ashtray. 4. Spiritual soundness. Don't be too cool, or too laid back to pray. Churches are not for sissies or wimps. Trust in God. You won't be young forever, so do something with your life, other than ruin what hasn't begun for you with drug and alcohol.

Mr. Day asked the students how many had seen an alcoholic and many hands raised. He stated "Do you want to be seen looking like that?" Texas is the #1 beer selling state. In America today, student deaths are: accidents, 60%; alcohol related homicides, %70; alcohol related and suicides, 4/% alcohol related. The state has more deaths due to alcohol than any other.

He told the students of one TV commercial that shows people playing ball and then having a beer. He asked the student body again, "Have you ever seen or heard of a coach that would tell his team "Win this one and we'll go have a case of beer.'

What do you think a drunk pole vaulter, gymnist or boxer would look like? Mr. Day made his point clear when he told the group that alcohol and drug abuse is an illness." How do you think it would look to see a Monday night football game on TV brought to you by measles? Can you see the Monday night movie sponsored by whooping cough?" Smoking marijuana can lead to birth defects in girls, cocaine speeds the heart up and actually makes it explode, crack addicts the person to the point that there is nothing they won't do to get the drug.

Day finished with "Students, place yourselves in your parents' place. Would you want the keys to your car in the hands of a drunk or dope head? Tell your parents you love them. Their ideas are not as bad as they seem when you put yourself in their

Mr. Miller dismissed the group reminding them that the D-FY-IT applications may be picked up in each school office.

Asthma and Allergies: New Hope and Help

An estimated 50 million Americans—some 20 percent of the population-suffer from some type of allergic disease, including asthma, studies show. 





Article Recalls Dr. A.G. Elder

Mrs.Mary Stone of Clardy graciously brought by an article she had kept from the Dallas Times Herald Magazine, printed in June 25, 1967.

The article, written by Bill Thompson, was about Dr. A.G. Elder of Deport, his practice and his fox hunt-

At that time, Dr. Elder was 87 years old, and still practising medine, although a heart attack had cut down on his fox hunting.

The article mentioned that he was one of the oldest active physicians in the Southwest. Since he actually continued to practise medicine one into his nineties, he may well have died THE oldest.

Dr. Elder's story points out some of the differences between practising medicine then and now.

For instance, Arthur Gilbert Elder got the notion early that he wanted to be a doctor. He set out to studey at the University of Texas Medical School. Family problems caused him to drop out, but he continued to studey at the University of Nashville and received his medical degree in 1907.

Fourteen years he practiced at Fulbright. That fourteen years he rode horseback. His territory ran from south of Detroit to north of Bogata, eight miles from Clarksville, and included the old Lone Star and Dark Corner settlements. He told the reporter good corn crop that first year. I accunestled inthe deep woods near mulated a corn crib full of corn in

He served as the Deport Health Officer for many years, and headed the school board for 10 years.

No one knows just how many babies he delivered, but he was tending the grandchildren of kids he had delivered years earlier!

But Dr. Elder had another love.. fox hunting.

He learned, the article said, the joys of fox hunting with hounds as a child "I hunted with the slaves on my dad's place. They had brought some hounds with them from Virginia".

It tok him practicing medicine for ten years before he could afford to keep hounds and fox hunt. After than, he became something of a legend among southwest hunters and dog owners.

When the article appeared Dr. Elder hadn't missed an annual hunt of the Texas Fox and Wolf Hunter's Association since 1918..that was 49

His hounds won prizes over all the Southwest. After his heart attack in 1955 he sold them, and finally, in Times were hard, but they made a 1957, sold his camp which was



The enjoyable weather and entertaiment, food and a good driver and tour guide, everyone wanted to make another trip.



CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 6, 1990**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."
