The skill of doing things using visual and motor skills is one of the most amazing things.

Some people possess more natural ability at this than others, but we all have it.

Next time you go to open a lock or adjust the dial on a radio...think about it.

It's a wonderful thing...one we are blessed with, and seldom are we ever think about.

## Attendance Accounting Changes To Full Year In 90-91

Rules which require average daily attendance (ADA) to be determined on a full school year basis were approved for first reading and emergency adoption by the State Board of Education in July.

The amendments implement a provision of Senate Bill 1, the school finance bill, which reinstated year-round attendance for funding purposes. Previously, a school district's ADA was counted during two four week periods in the fall and spring semesters. As a result of this change, school districts will report their attendance figures to the state twice annually--once at the end of the fall semester and again at the end of the spring semester.

The legislation guarantees that for the 1990-91 school year only, school districts' ADA under the new reporting system will not be less than 98% of the student counts which would have been reported under the previous attendance reporting system. To implement this provision, attendance for the fall 1990 semester will be counted for four weeks beginning with the first Monday in October, while spring semester attendance will be counted for the four weeks beginning with the third Monday in February.

Under the rule amendment, the commissioner of education is responsible for providing guidelines for providing all necessary records and

procedures districts must use when preparing daily attendance registers. School districts must maintain records, make student attendance reports and participate in special programs as required by the commissioner. If a school district chooses to use a locally developed record or automated system, it must contain the minimum information required by the commissioner. The rule also requires the commissioner to provide for special circumstances which may arise regarding attendance accounting in accordance with law.

The amendments are scheduled for second reading in September and third reading and final adoption in October.

## Bulldog, Trojan, Named To PJC Hall Of Fame

A Talco Trojan and a Bogata Bulldog will be among the first 13 athletes to be inducted into the Paris Junior College Dragon Hall of Fame.

1990 is the Hall's inaugural year and PJC's Director of Athletics, Don C. Wilhelm, says, "The Hall of Fame has been a long time in coming; but it is now a reality and I hope the recipients will enjoy the induction ceremonies and receive the appropriate accolades, which are certainly long overdue." PJC's athletic program dates back to 1926.

Talco's Cecil "Papa" Johnson and

Bogata's John Tate Davis are this area's former athletes being honored. Johnson was a 1941 graduate of Talco High School. He was a backfield standout for the Dragon's 1942 Conference Champions. He later became Rookie of the Year in pro football. Johnson was football coach at South

Oak Cliff High School in Dallas at the time of his death, at age 39, in 1961. His wife, Irene McClung Johnson, formerly of Talco, resides in Dallas.

Davis, formerly of Talco, was a 1949 graduate of Bogata High School.

He became an All American end at PJC while setting conference records in receiving, total yards gained and touchdowns scored. He played for the University of Tennessee's 1951 National Championship Team. He led SEC receivers in scoring and played in the Sugar Bowl and Cotton Bowl. He lives in New Market, Tennessee and is the son of Jessie Davis of Bogata, and the late Pat Davis of Talco.

The Hall's induction ceremonies are scheduled as part of PJC's Homecoming festivities on November 10.

### No Cook Banana Pudding

1 Box Instant Banana Cream Pudding Pie Filling  
Mix it like directions on the box, put in refrigerator and let chill a while. Mix it with 8 oz. Cool Whip. Pour over sliced banana on Vanilla Wafers.

### Corn Pudding

2 Cans Cream Style Corn  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1 Tablespoon flour  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1/4 cup fried meat grease  
Pepper and salt to taste  
Bake 35 or 40 minutes until it is golden brown at 350.

### Caramel Pie

3 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
1 heaping tablespoon flour  
1 1/4 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Mix together egg yolks, 1 cup sugar, flour and milk. Cook until it comes to a boil. Take off heat, but have this hot when you mix with other mixture. Put 1/2 cup sugar in a skillet and let brown. Pour 1/2 cup boiling water over the brown sugar. When it is dissolved, pour over the other ingredients. Cook until thick, add 1/2 stick butter and 1 teaspoon Vanilla. Mix well, pour in 1 baked pie shell, topped with meringue. (3 egg whites beaten well, add 1 teaspoon sugar and 1 teaspoon vanilla flavoring.) Bake until golden brown.

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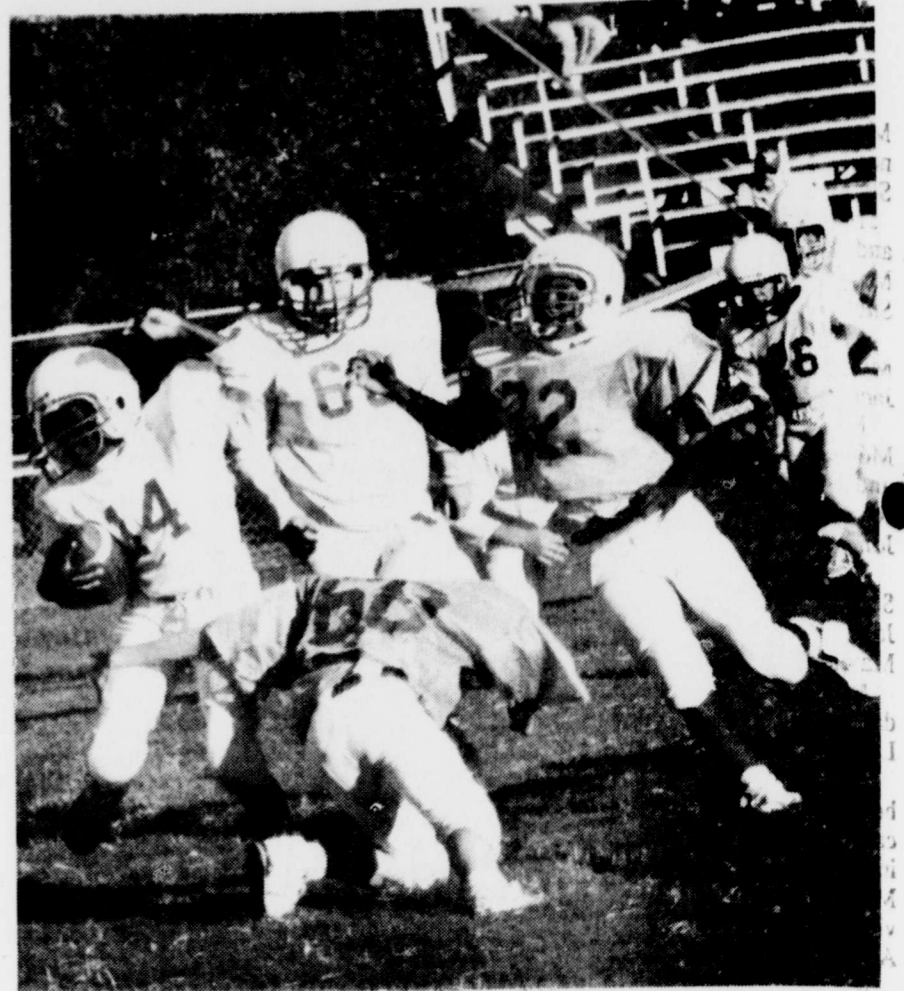

## Armyworms Pose Threat To Winter Pastures

By Paul D. Payne  
Armyworms have been reported present in parts of Lamar County and in heavier numbers in the Sulphur Springs area to the south and in the Boswell, OK area. Therefore, it becomes critically important that farmers and ranchers survey their fields and pastures daily for signs of armyworms.

Although they can eat stands of grass in pastures, meadows and yards, they can be most damaging to newly emerging winter pastures. In fact, the worms can just about destroy a stand before one realizes they are in a winter pasture.

Sevin remains one of the more effective insecticides for the control of the worms. There is no waiting period after the use of Sevin before grazing. Ethyl and Methyl Parathion will do an effective job of control, but there is a 15 days waiting period and there is more hazard when applying with a ground rig. Lannate and Nudrin have a 10 day waiting.

Checking fields of winter pasture

on a daily basis for the next week could return big dividends to the farmer and rancher.

Bluebonnet lovers should be planting them now for spring bulbs. Both easily grown seed and bedding plants, now in red, white and blue are available in most nurseries.

Bluebonnets planted in the fall will produce plants approximately twice as large with twice as many blooms as those established in the spring. To ensure success with bluebonnets, plant in soil with a neutral or high pH; plant in full sun in well drained soil; plant in early fall, seed no later than September and transplants no later than Halloween; buy transplants or chemically scarified seed; barely cover seeds with soil; don't overwater; protect against pillbugs; use large drifts of a single color for maximum impact; cover with a loose blanket of mulch during extremely cold weather; and uncover plants promptly when temperatures moderate.

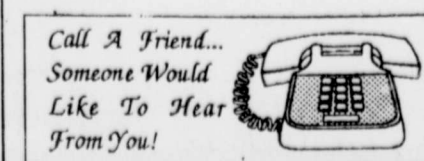

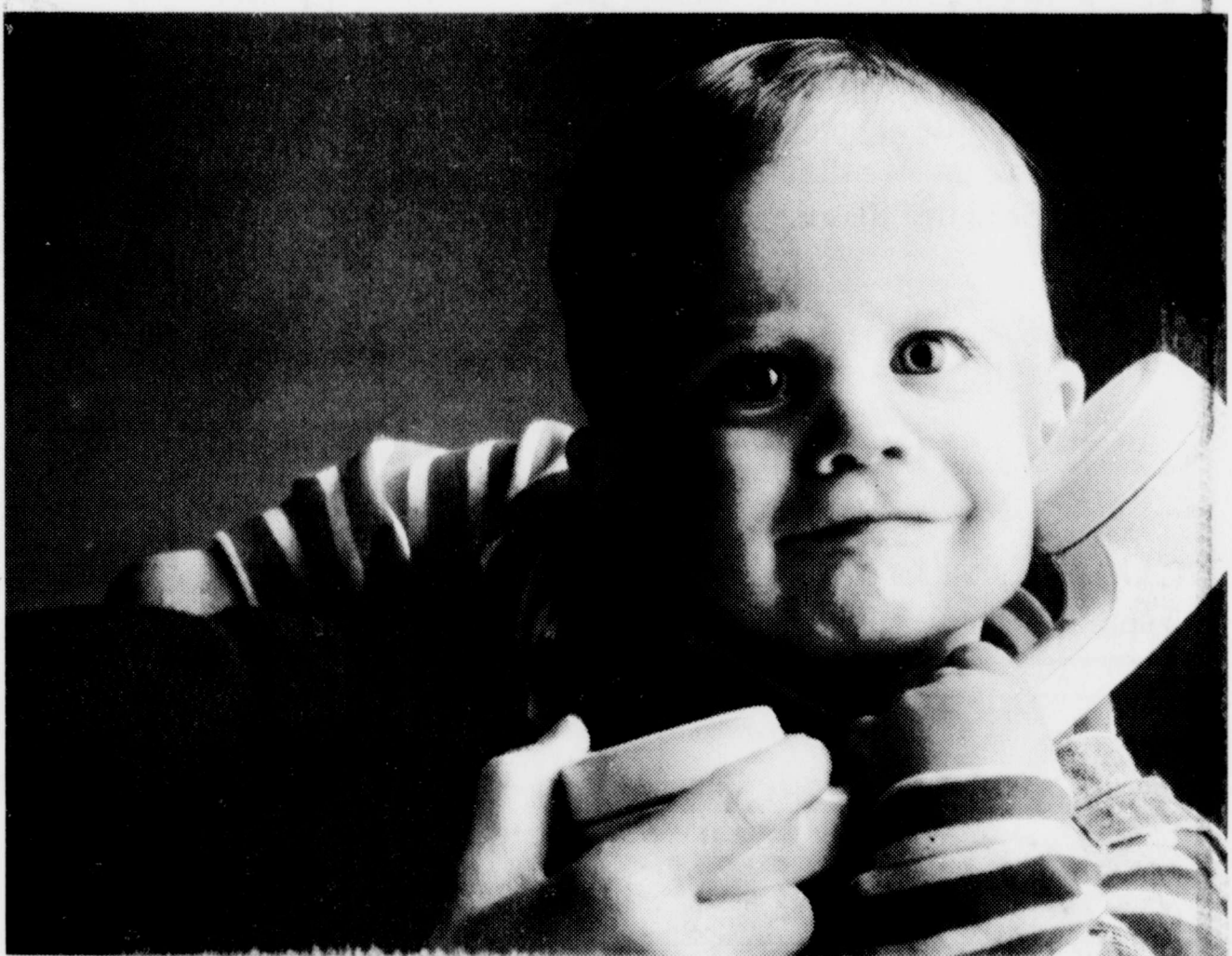

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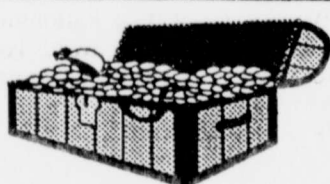

## Clover Could Offset Nitrogen

If oil and gas prices continue to increase or even remain at current levels, agricultural producers could be facing higher nitrogen fertilizer prices next spring, says an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"This year may be a good year to plant clover and try to get as much nitrogen as possible into the soil through the clover plant," said Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., extension agronomist. "Clover has the capability of adding 50 to 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre when properly managed."

Reeves encourages producers to walk through their pastures and look for reseeding ryegrass and clover plants. Check the height of the bermudagrass and determine if it is thin or short enough for the ryegrass and clover to continue growing. If the bermudagrass is too tall, it should be shredded.

"If volunteer stands are insufficient, now is the time to plant both ryegrass and clover," Reeves said. "The key to planting is to have the sod short."

### FACTS FROM THE AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF PHYSICS

#### Lightning: Illuminating Information

Here are some facts that may give you more than a flash of insight about lightning. They come from renowned physicist Bernard Vonnegut, a member of the Meteorological Society of America:

The flash of lightning you see starts from the ground and travels up into the clouds. Each lightning stroke contains some 20,000 amperes of electrical current, about what 100 modern households would consume with every possible electrical appliance turned on.

Lightning begins when the electrical attraction between cloud and ground reaches ten to 50 million volts. At this point, a thin filament of a charge flicks toward earth, scouting out an electrical pathway through the atmosphere. When this powerful charge nears the ground, an opposite charge darts up to meet it. When the two make contact, cloud and earth are electrically connected by a thin channel of ionized air.

At that moment, a huge gush of electrical current explodes from ground to cloud in a bright column of raw electricity. This massive flow of current is termed a return stroke.

The entire process takes only about 1/20th of a second. It may seem longer, but that's because

where there's one stroke of lightning there are often others right behind, giving the impression of one, long-lasting flash.

Lightning is very dangerous and kills more people each year than tornadoes and hurricanes combined. If you're caught in an electrical storm, avoid trees, towers or high spots—those are the places closest to the cloud. If you're in the open, squat with feet together and never lie down—these measures reduce chances of an electrical charge passing through your body. The old rumor that a car is the safest place to be during an electrical storm is absolutely true.

## Customer Service/Crime Prevention Courses To Be At PJC

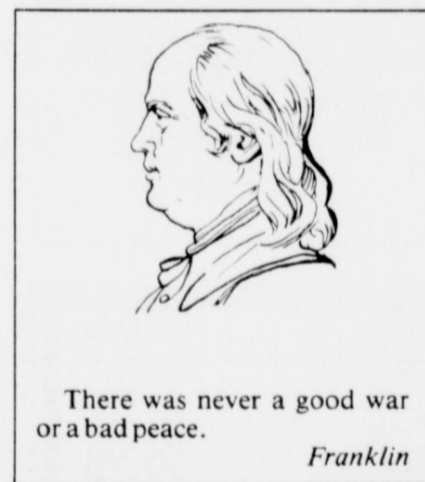

# Fireplace Time Doesn't Have To Be Fire Time

It's that time of year again. With the first cool mornings of fall, most of us begin to think of electric blankets and firewood. Before you enjoy that first evening sitting in front of the fireplace, take a few minutes to be sure your chimney is ready for the cool weather.

In one year more than 60,000 chimneys burned in the United States. Human deaths from these fires increased 69%. That means we're having more chimney fires, of a more serious nature, than ever before.

How do you know whether or not your chimney needs cleaning? You may be able to tell by using a powerful light and a mirror to look up the flue from the bottom. If the bricks look pink, you're okay; but if they're black or furry looking, it's time for a sweeping. Be sure to check each point in the chimney's performance.

Check for: 1) loose or missing bricks, 2) damaged crown, 3) loose or decaying mortar, 4) obstructions in the flue like bird nests, leaves or limbs, 5) damper function or damage.

If you're still not sure, call a professional chimney sweep. He or she will inspect the chimney, usually free of charge and tell you what your chimney needs to receive a clean bill of health. The sweep will also tell you if there is nothing wrong with your

chimney or flue. The National Fire Protection Association recommends that chimneys be inspected and cleaned once a year. When a wood burning stove is used, they recommend checking the flue in the fall and mid-winter.

Years ago the Irish used live geese to clean their chimneys. They simply tied a rope around the bird's neck and threw him down the flue. The frightened goose flapped his strong wings and cleaned out the chimney in his efforts to get out. The blacker the goose, the cleaner the chimney. The goose would come out of the chimney covered with black, dust-like carbon deposits called creosote.

Wood stove manufacturers estimate that as little as one millimeter of creosote lining the chimney can reduce a stove's efficiency by up to

15%. Wet creosote contains acids that can eat through stove pipe connections in a season or less. Some creosote has an unpleasant acrid odor that no room deodorizer can get rid of. Creosote stains roofs, wall, fabric and floors, so be very careful in cleaning out your flue.

Creosote is extremely flammable and burns with an intense flame that can even melt mortar. A chimney fire can be a very frightening thing. It sounds for all the world like a freight train steaming through your living room or a rocket taking off from your roof! Flaming balls of debris may be lifted out of your chimney in the

tremendous updraft of flames and shoot out onto your roof, your lawn, or your next door neighbor's house. Smoke may back up into your home, causing considerable smoke damage. If conditions are favorable, your whole house may catch fire. Even if the damage is minimal, the chimney is usually so badly damaged that it isn't safe to use anymore without relining. Be safe rather than sorry. It only takes a few minutes to check.

And while you're at it, be sure to clean your chimney cap. If you don't have one, seriously consider placing one on your flue. A little expense now can save you a big expense later

from wet creosote and a rusted out damper. Be sure to purchase a cap with a 3/4 inch mesh surround screen. This serves to keep birds and other animals like squirrels out of the flue as well as a spark arrester.

Take a few minutes in these early fall days to check out your chimney or wood stove flue. Or better yet, call a professional chimney sweep who might own a goose. Then you can lean back in your easy chair, prop your feet up and enjoy that beautiful warm fire knowing you have minimized any potential fire hazard by keeping a clean flue or chimney.

## Postal Pointers

Facts From The U.S. Postal Service  
 How To Protect Your Mail

**Never send cash or coins through the mail—stick to checks and money orders.**

Experts at the post office deliver this advice: look out for your letters.

While incidents of mail theft are rare, thieves know that items of value travel through the mails and they are ready and waiting to steal mail when the time is right. Occasionally, they break into residential and apartment mailboxes, collection boxes and postal vehicles.

The Postal Service works hard to make sure your daily mail gets to you, but needs your help to keep it safe. By following the few tips listed below, you can make life more difficult for mail thieves:

- Never send cash or coins through the mail. Always send checks or money orders.
- Make sure your mailbox is in good condition. Mailboxes in poor condition often expose mail to theft and bad weather.
- Collect mail from your mailbox promptly, especially checks and food coupons. If you cannot be home when checks or food coupons are expected, ask a trusted friend or neighbor to pick up your mail.
- Always contact the local post office to have your mail held for you during vacations or other long absences from home.
- Contact the issuing agency right away if you do not receive an expected check, food coupons, or other valuable mail.

- Notify the post office and mailers immediately if you change your address. The post office has Change of Address Cards for this purpose.
- Deposit your mail in an authorized mail collection box or give it to your letter carrier. Never place mail for your carrier to pick up in an unprotected area where it can be easily stolen.
- Address your mail properly. Always include your complete return address, street/apartment number and ZIP code.
- Post your name on the inside of your mailbox if you live in an apartment building. This will assist your carrier in getting your mail to you if residents with similar names reside in your apartment complex.
- Advise the postmaster or Postal Inspector if your mail is stolen.

By following the above tips, you will help the Postal Service reduce mail theft and get your mail to you safely.
