Moving letters from Italians, battlefield notebooks, even ads for "Keep the money but please return pictures and cards in leather wallet lost between Cassone and Riva" bring World War Two into prespective.

Purple hearts, victory ribbons, Distinguished Flying Crosses, Bronze and Silver Stars, the awards that chronicle valor through World Wars I and II, Korea, Vietnam and yes, even through the current Middle Eastern Crisis make a lengthy list.

Cherished Discharge papers or commendations were submitted.

Elderly men and widowed women smiled at the youthful faces that looked back at them from photos taken in a different era and sometimes those smiles came through tears.

Youngsters proudly brought Dad's photo in as Vietnam veterans try to explain a puzzling, frustrating period in this Nation's history.

Mothers sent us pictures of their children currently serving in the Middle East, their worries for the safety of these children apparent on their faces or in their letters to us.

World War I veterans still alive were few and far between, naturally. One man, C.G. "Bud" Nobles served in WWII, Korea and Vietnam. There were those who wouldn't

# **New SSI Rules** For Disabled Children

There have been a couple of recent changes in the Supplemental Security Income law that affect SSI payments paid to disabled children.

One of the changes allows for the continued payment of a \$30 personal needs allowance to disabled children who leave a medical institution to receive care at home. The children will then also keep their Medicaid eligibility.

Under the old law, children often became ineligible for SSI and Medicaid when they went home from an institution because of their parents'

income and resources. Another change continues eligibility for disabled children of Armed Forces personnel who live with their parents while on permanent duty assignments outside the United States. The children must be U.S. citizens and must have been eligible for SSI in the month before their parents

reported for overseas duty.

This change will help Armed Forces personnel keep their families together. Prior to this, their disabled children had to remain in the U.S. or give up SSI benefits.

The SSI program pays monthly checks to people with little income and few resources who are 65 and older and to people of any age who are blind or disabled. And most people who get SSI are also eligible for Medicaid which helps pay health care expenses.

For SSI purposes, a child is under 18 and neither married or head of a household, or under 22 and a student regularly pursuing a course of study in an educational or vocational training institution expected to result in gainful employment.

If you know a blind or disabled child who may qualify for SSI, refer the child, parents or guardian to any Social Security office.



Robinson says to repair or replace worn parts on quipment before the equipment is stored for the winter. If the equipment is subject to caustic materials such as fertilizer, it should be cleaned and oiled to prevent rusting and deterioration.

City of Blossom Fair Housing Policy


