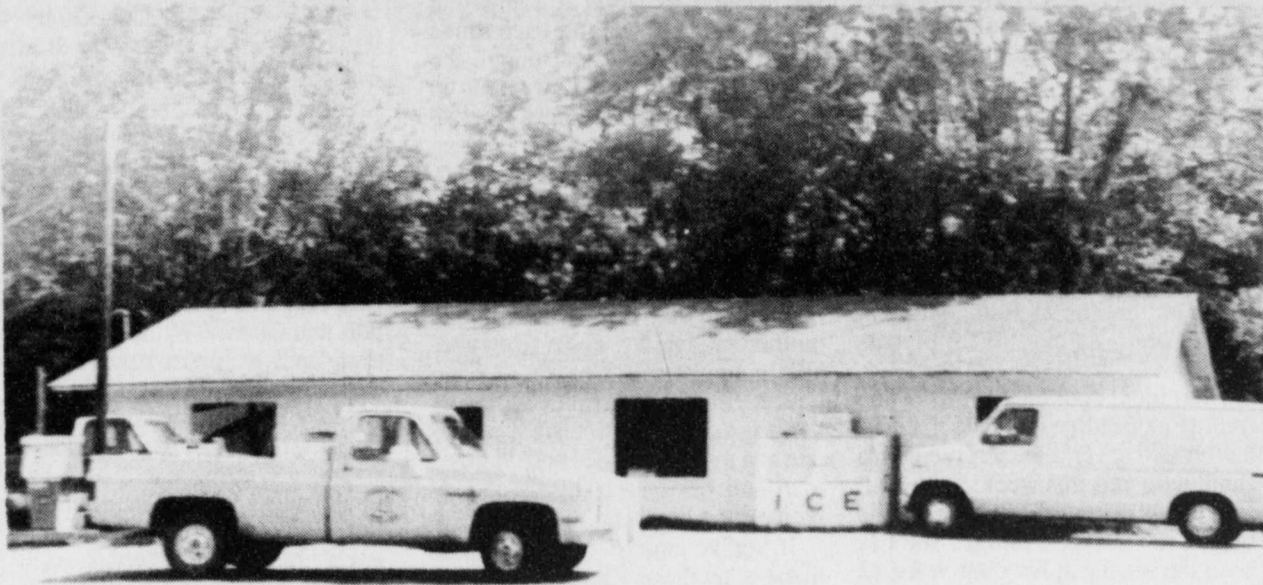
Later that day I headed down the dusty dirt road to the hay meadow to take a cold drink to my husband.

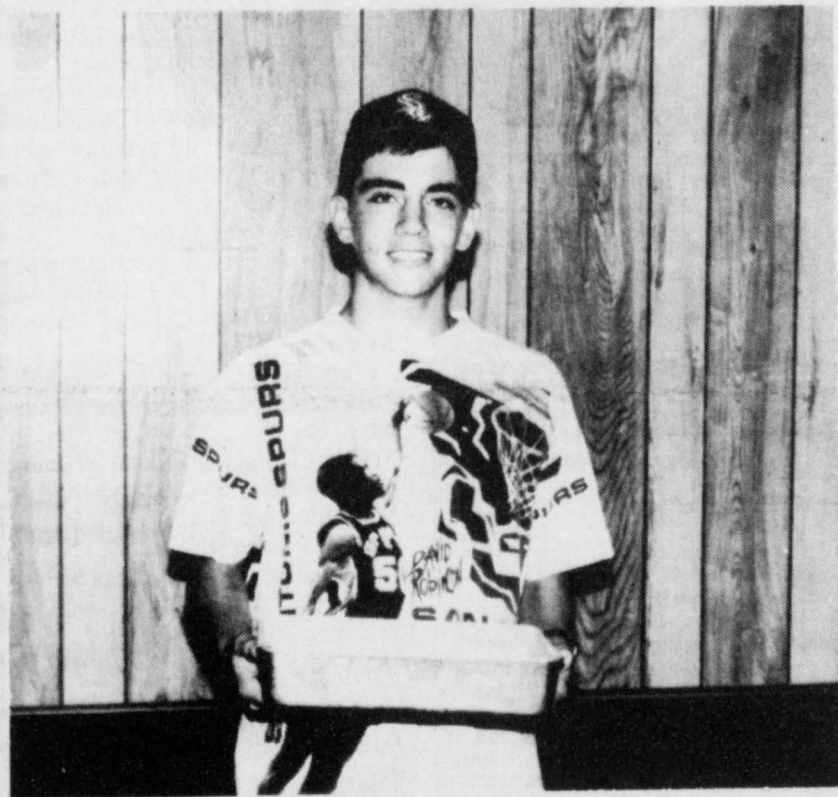

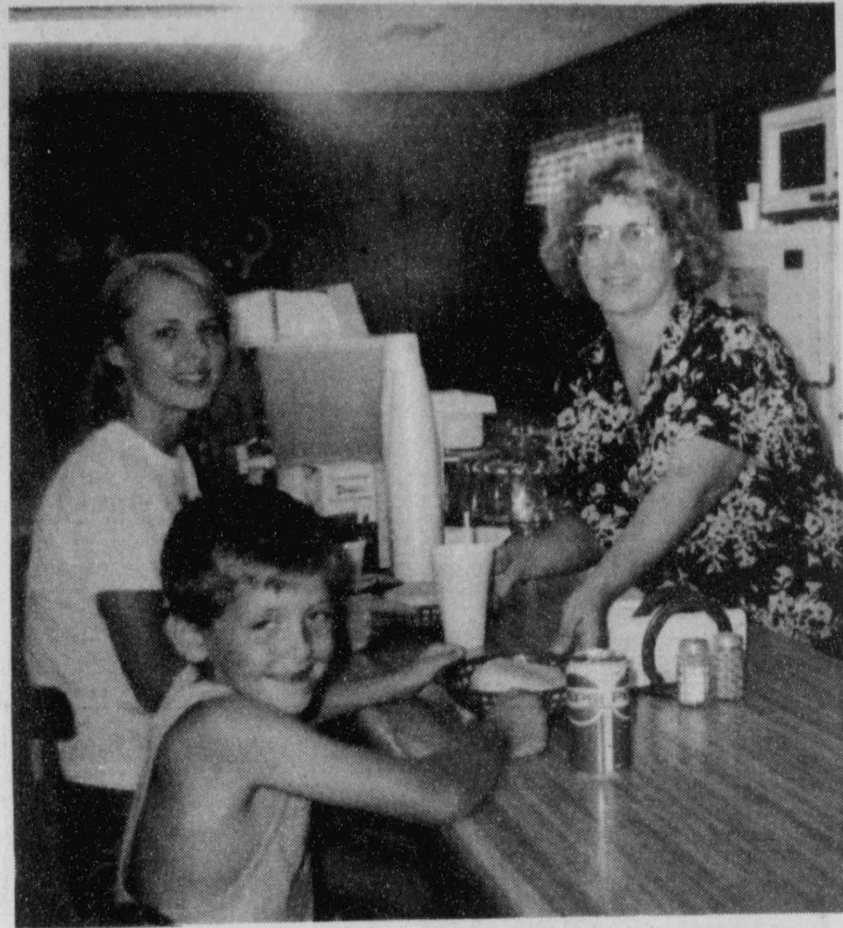

Coconut Pie

1 cup sugar
1 cup coconut
3 T. corn starch
1 1/3 cup milk
2/3 cup canned milk
3 egg yolks (save egg whites for meringue)
1 tsp. vanilla
3 T. margarine
pinch of salt

Mix sugar, corn starch and salt in pan. Add milk. When mixture is warm, add beaten egg yolks. Stir until thick. Remove from heat and add margarine, coconut and vanilla.

Chocolate Pie

1 cup sugar
3 T. corn starch
1 heaping T. cocoa
1 1/3 cup milk
2/3 cup canned milk
3 egg yolks (save egg whites for meringue)
pinch of salt
1 tsp. vanilla
3 T. margarine

Mix sugar and corn starch, salt and cocoa. Put in saucepan on stove. Add milk. When mixture is warm, pour in beaten egg yolks. Stir until thick. Remove from heat and add margarine and vanilla. Pour all this mixture into baked pie crust.

Pie Crust (Make 1)

1 heaping T. Crisco
1 cup flour
1 pinch salt
enough water to make a thick dough (approx. 6 T water)

Mix Crisco, flour and salt together with a fork until mealy. Add water and roll into ball. On a floured board, roll dough out to desired size and place in piepan. For chocolate or coconut, punch holes in crust before baking and before pie mixture is added.

Chess Pie (Makes 2)

1 stick butter (margarine)
4 or 5 eggs
2 cups sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
pinch of salt

Melt butter; beat eggs with a fork and add melted butter, sugar, salt and vanilla. Pour into unbaked pie crust and bake until lightly brown on top and appears firm at 350.

Meringue

3 egg whites
1 level tsp. cream of tartar
1/4 cup sugar, added 1 T at a time

Beat egg whites until foamy. Add cream of tartar and beat a little. Then add sugar 1 T at a time until egg whites are stiff. Add 1/2 t. vanilla. Put on pie and place in oven at 350 until brown. For coconut pie, sprinkle coconut on meringue before placing in oven.

Breakfast Taquita

1 flour tortilla
1 slice bacon or sausage
1 egg
1 T. Picante Sauce
2 tsp. margarine
Cheese (optional)

Fry bacon or sausage first. Scramble egg in 1 tsp. margarine. Soften tortilla by melting 1 tsp. of margarine in hot skillet (cast iron preferably) and turning tortilla over until soft. Fill tortilla with egg and bacon or sausage and 1 tablespoon of Picante, if desired. Roll up like a burrito.



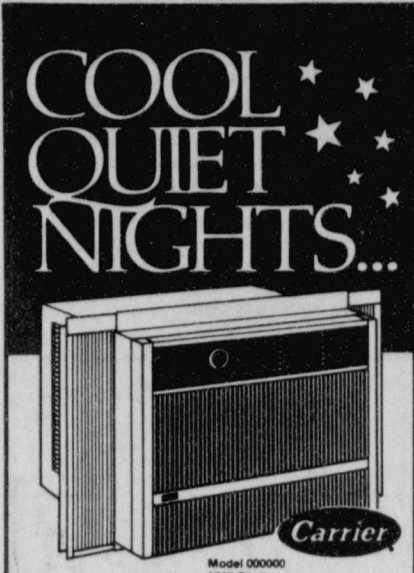
