Over Eight Inches Of Rain Inundates Area

After nearly two months of drought and one of the driest Octobers on record this area has been hit by massive rainfall.

Beginning last Friday, October 25th, rain fell Friday and Saturday, relieving drought and making most people happy.

Showers continued through the weekend.

On Monday, however, the showers changed to deluge as over six

inches fell within a 24 hours period.

This rain was accompanied by massive lightning storms, some high winds and generally raw, hazardous weather. One storm seemed to follow on the heels of another, leaving no gaps between storms.

By Tuesday evening the total precipitation had accumulated to over eight inches.

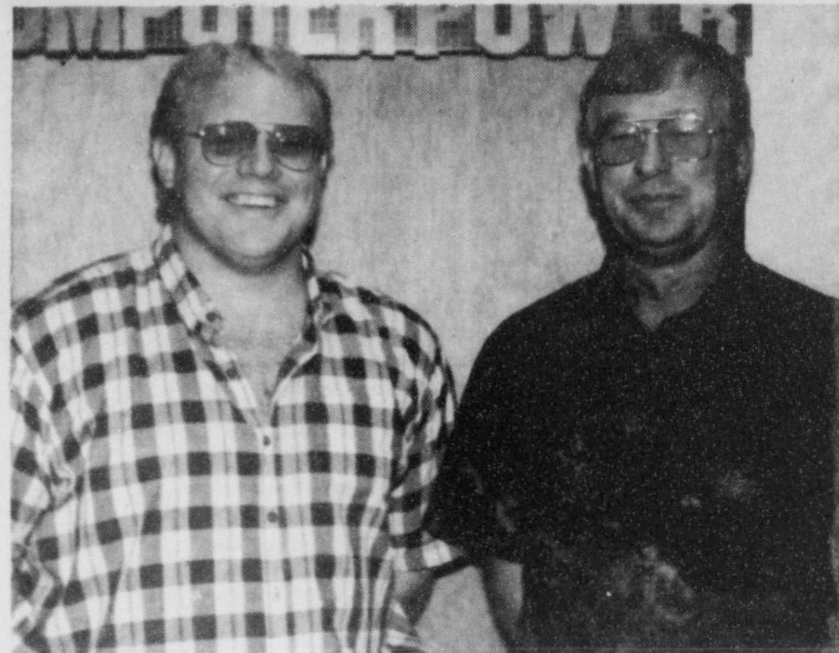
Creeks were swollen beyond their banks, and some low-lying roads were closed, either for a short time, or in some cases, several hours.

Reports of cattle trapped in low pasture areas, lightning striking houses and trees, and flooding of some homes were reported.

Roofs that have not leaked in prior rains suddenly were unable to handle the load, and water dripping through ceilings and down walls became common.

In addition a cold front is moving into the area, and could even bring the chance of freezing rain!

All in all, it was a wet, loud introduction to November!

Talco Backward Glances

From October 28, 1938 edition of the Talco Times.

Talco's new Methodist Church had been dedicated by Bishop Holt.

Calvary Baptist Church members had announced that they were planning to build a new church building on no. 4 in Block 24 on McLean and First Streets.

Progress was being made on Talco's new school building. It was expected that school would open after the Christmas Holidays in the new facility.

Comparative net enrollment figures were released with a total of 756 pupils, 202 in high school, 526 in grade school, 28 in the colored school.

In 1936 those figures read 489 total, and in 1937, 806.

It was being made official that pedestrians along streets and highways with no sidewalks should walk on the left hand side of the road, facing traffic. More than 6,000 signs were being made to instruct pedestrians in this throughout the state.

The Talco Trojans won over Lin-

den, by a score of 13-12.

The Talco luncheon fire department was planning at Fish Fry. They were inviting anyone who might want to attend meetings to do so.

The Panhandle Cafe and dining room was advertising to "combat Cold Weather with a Hot Sizzling Steak".

Mrs. W.B. Kirkham had entertained the Coffee Club in her home.

The Wilkinson 4-H Club had been re-organized.

Humble Oil and Refining were advertising to "follow the Humble Route to football games this fall".

This meant to stop by for Humble gas and oil at Humble Service Stations.

Shakespeare's Comedy To Be Presented In Clarksville

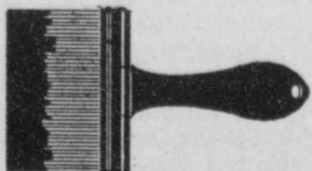
Paris Junior College Fine Arts Division will bring Shakespeare to Clarksville.

This year's Walk-A-Thon will be held at the Rivercrest Track from 9:30 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. on Saturday, November 9.

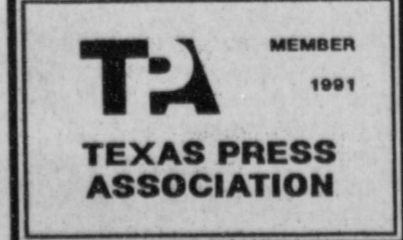

Halloween Costume Day Is Thursday At Talco School

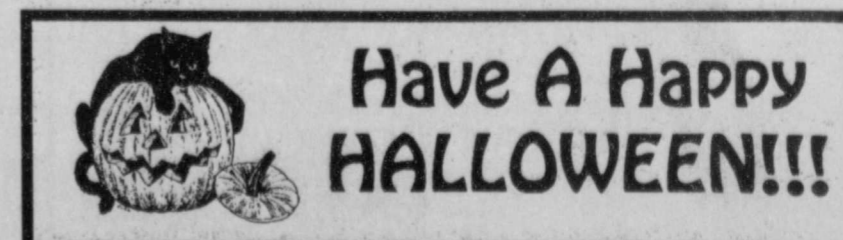
Talco School students will be allowed to wear costumes on Thursday, October 31. This should be a fun activity.

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Old Fashion Tea Cakes
By Mrs. Ruth Cheatham

3 eggs
2 cups crisco (substitute for butter)
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 tsp vanilla
1 tsp soda
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup sweet milk
1 tsp baking powder

Add enough flour to be able to roll dough thin enough to cut cookies.

Wonder Vegetable Salad

1 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/8 red cider vinegar
1/2 tsp salt
dash of alum
3 medium onions, sliced
1 can French Style green beans
1/2 cup celery
1 can Chinese Vegetables without meat
1 can English peas
1 cup water chestnuts
1 small jar pimentoes

Bring to a boil sugar, vinegar, salt, pepper and alum and pour over vegetables. Cover tightly and cool. Refrigerate and will keep several weeks.

Festival Stew

3 large potatoes
1 large onion
1 can tomatoes
1 can corn
3 cups chicken broth plus enough water to cover vegetables
2 cups chopped chicken
1 tsp cumin
1 tsp oregano
1 tsp chili powder
dash of cayen pepper
salt and pepper to taste

Cook at medium heat until potatoes are tender. Lower heat and simmer for 1 hour. Add liquid or water until it is the thickness you desire.

Lemon Cream Pie With Corn Flakes

1 1/4 cups sugar
6 tablespoons corn starch
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups milk
1/2 cup lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
2 TS butter
1 9" cornflake crust

Add all ingredients and stir constantly, except egg yolks. Cook about 6 minutes then add egg yolks and cook 6 minutes

more. Remove from heat and add lemon juice.

To make crust:
Mix 1 1/4 cups finely crushed cornflakes, 2 TS sugar, 1/3 cup melted butter. Press evenly on bottom and sides of 9" pie pan.

Extra Special Jam Cake

Cream together: 1 cup butter, 2 cups sugar, 2 cups jam. Add 4 unbeaten eggs. Sift 3 1/2 cups flour, 1 tsp. each of all spice, cinnamon and nutmeg, 1 sp. soda. Add to creamed mixture alternately with 1 cup buttermilk. Add 2 cups raisins, 2 cups coconut, 2 cups chopped apples. Bake in 4 layers or 2 large loaf pans for 45 minutes at 350.

Cream filling: 2 cups sugar, 1 cup milk, cook to a firm ball. Add 1 small package dates, cook 2 minutes. Then add 8 marshmallows, 1 cup coconut, 1 cup nuts, 1 small can crushed, drained pineapple. Spread on top and between layers. For decoration, sprinkle 1 small bottle of chopped maraschino cherries on top.

White Layer Fruit Cake

1 cup butter
1 cup sour milk
2 cups sugar
3 unbeatn eggs
3 cups sugar
1 tsp. soda
1 cup pear or peach preserves diced
1 cup broken pecans
1 cup coconut
1 cup cherries, drained
1 cup white raisins

Cream butter, sugar. Add eggs, salt, soda and milk, then add remaining ingredients. Divide into 3-9" cake pans. Bake at 350 until done.

icing:
2 cups sugar
4 tsp. flour
1 cup s milk
1 cup nuts
1 cup oleo
1 cup raisins, white
1 cup preserves
1 cup coconut
1 cup cherries, diced

Mix sugar, flour, milk and butter. Cook slowly until thick. Add remaining ingredients. Spread between cake and on top. This cake can be made early and frozen. The longer it sets, the better.

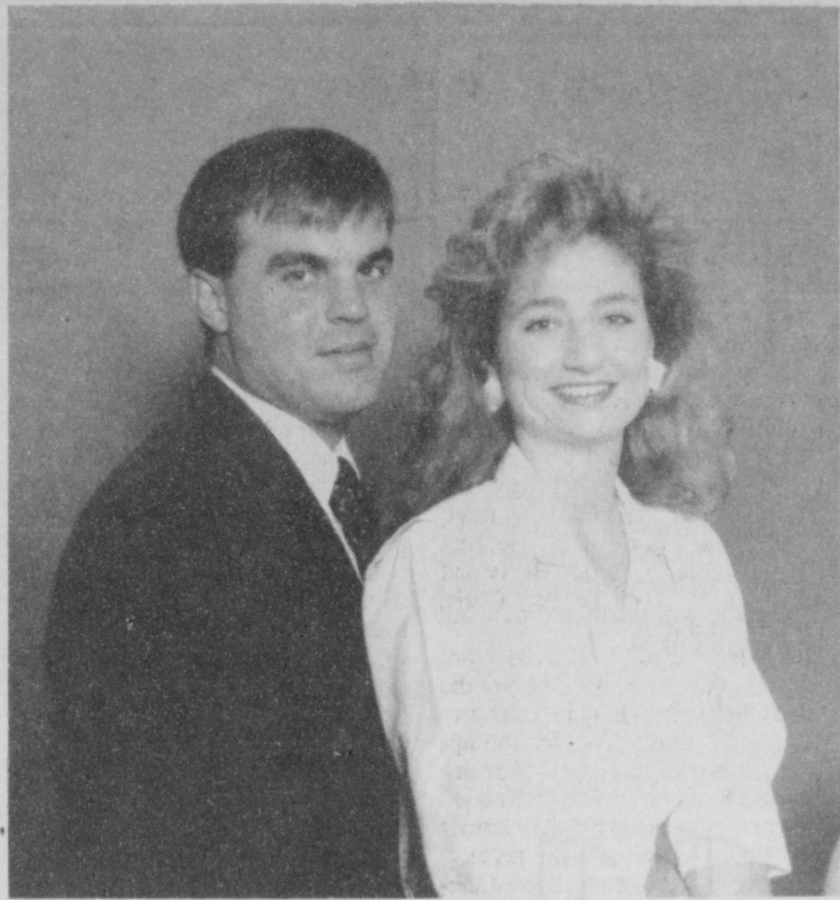

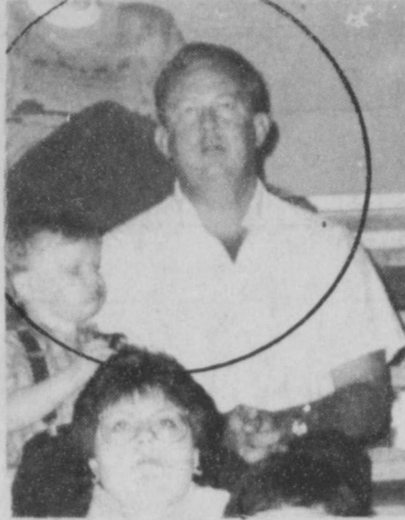

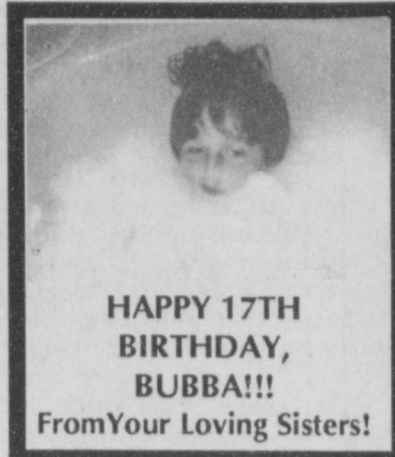

To the editor:
On November 5, Texas voters will decide the future tax status of nonprofit water suppliers when they vote on Proposition 10, a constitutional amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to give property tax breaks to nonprofit water supply corporations. Of all the entities that deliver water to Texans, water supply corporations are the only nonprofit organizations that must pay property taxes.

This inequality hits rural Texans hardest since they are the people most likely to be served by one of these systems. Because rates reflect all the costs of providing water, the cost of property taxes is passed on to the consumer. Meanwhile, water users relying on city utilities, municipal utility districts, and water conservation and improvement districts do not have to shoulder the cost of property taxes when they pay their monthly water bill.

Proposition 10 will correct this inequality by extending property tax exemptions to nonprofit water and sewer corporations. Systems that paid property taxes in 1991 would be required to lower their water rates in 1992 to reflect the savings from the new exemption. They would also be required to comply with the state's Open Meetings and Open Records Act. Many taxing districts in Texas already acknowledge the service-oriented nature of nonprofit water suppliers and do not make them pay property taxes. Over the past decade, the Texas Legislature has also acknowledged that these systems deserve a tax break.

The only way nonprofit water systems can receive equal treatment and a guarantee of property tax exemptions is if Texans vote for Proposition 10.

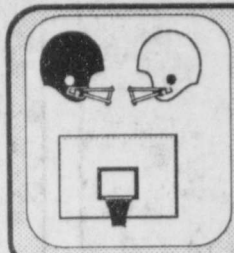

After major adjustments after halftime, Leonard was only able to

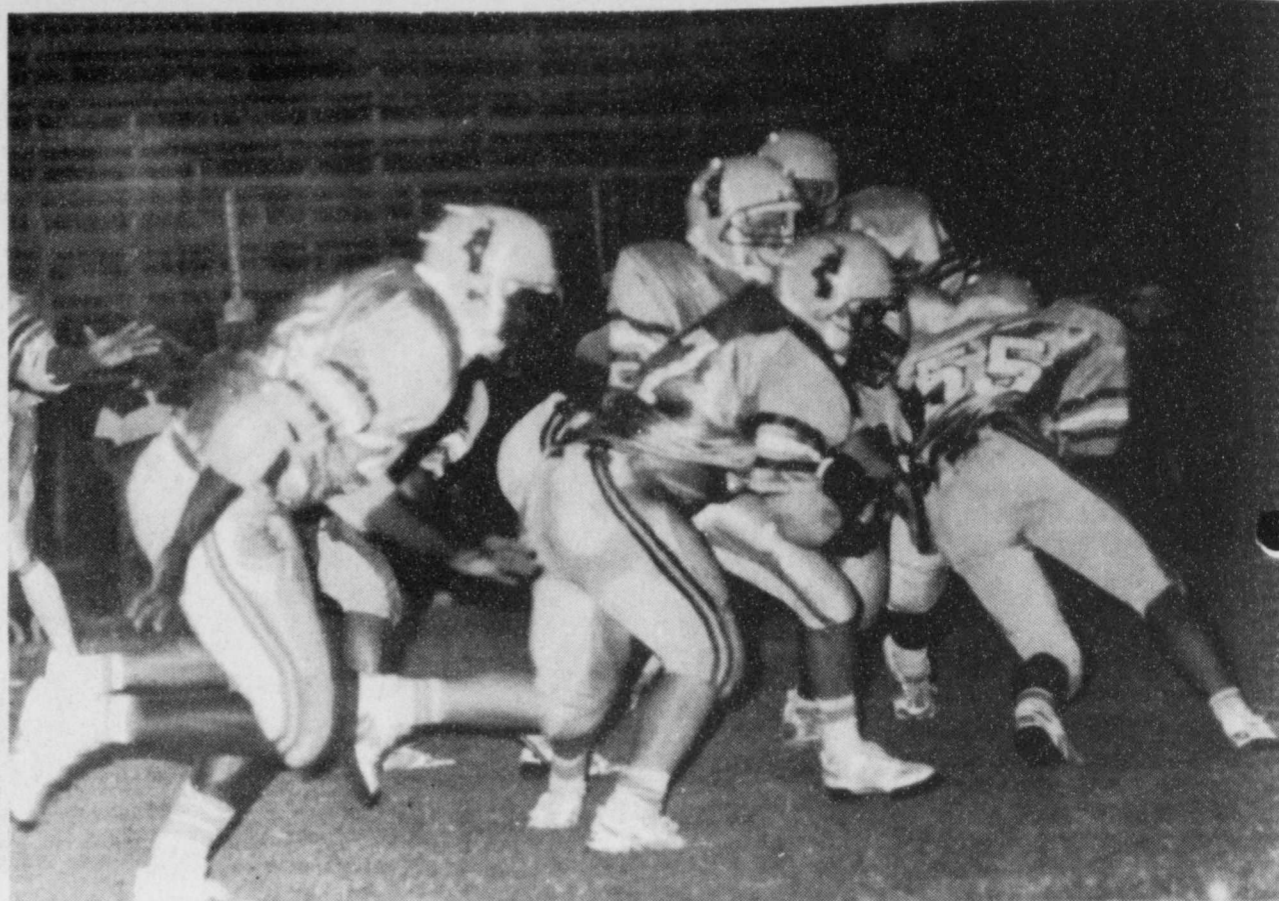
score off a punt return and a 42-yard quarterback keep off an option.

Cow Condition Critical For Rebreeding

Cow condition at calving time is the single most important factor in determining how soon that cow will cycle and rebreed after calving.

"For this reason, it is important that calves be weaned early enough in the fall for the cows to regain body condition and flesh before winter," said Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Cows that are thin at calving have slower and lower reproductive rates."

The cow's body flesh should be such that the cows are not overly fat or excessively thin.

Grooms says that body condition of cows is scored on a range of 1 to 9. One represents extremely thin cows and 9 represents extremely fat cows. Each body condition score represents

approximately 85 pounds of body weight.

Body fat on cows serves two purposes. It is insulation against cold during the winter and it is a reserve energy source that can be depleted to various extents once the cow calves ahead of lush forage.

Cows in normal body condition, 5 or 6, can be maintained on a 7% protein ration. Cows that are in condition scores 1 to 4 require 8 or 9% protein ration. They also need additional energy to gain body weight and raise the body condition to the desired score of 5 or 6.

Grooms says that producers who manage cow herds for maximum efficiency with short breeding seasons watch body condition scores very closely.
