Good News For Highway 271 Travelers

There's good news for people who've been shaking their cars to pieces on Highway 271 between Bogata and Paris. A contract will be let around the first of the year to resurface the seven miles between Bogata and Deport.

According to information obtained through Phyllis Chandler, public information officer for the Paris office, the project will cost about \$3 million, about one-third of the Paris District's entire budget for Fiscal Year 1992.

Work the project is expected to begin shortly after the contract is let, according to Ms. Chandler. For readers who use the badly deteriorated road, this will be none too soon. Although routine maintenance has been plugging the worst potholes--in October the paper's reporter measured one 11-foot long just north of Bogata! The road remains the worst in the area.

We are doubtless fortunate that the Bogata-Deport project has been completed before the Paris office of the Highway Department is closed. Under the new Texas Department of Transportation that legislators approved in an effort to save money, highway construction and maintenance will be administered from Tyler.

The newspaper editors hope that the local legislators who voted for the measure will be alert to see that the savings are not always made at the expense of the area.

Lady Rebel Basketball Begins

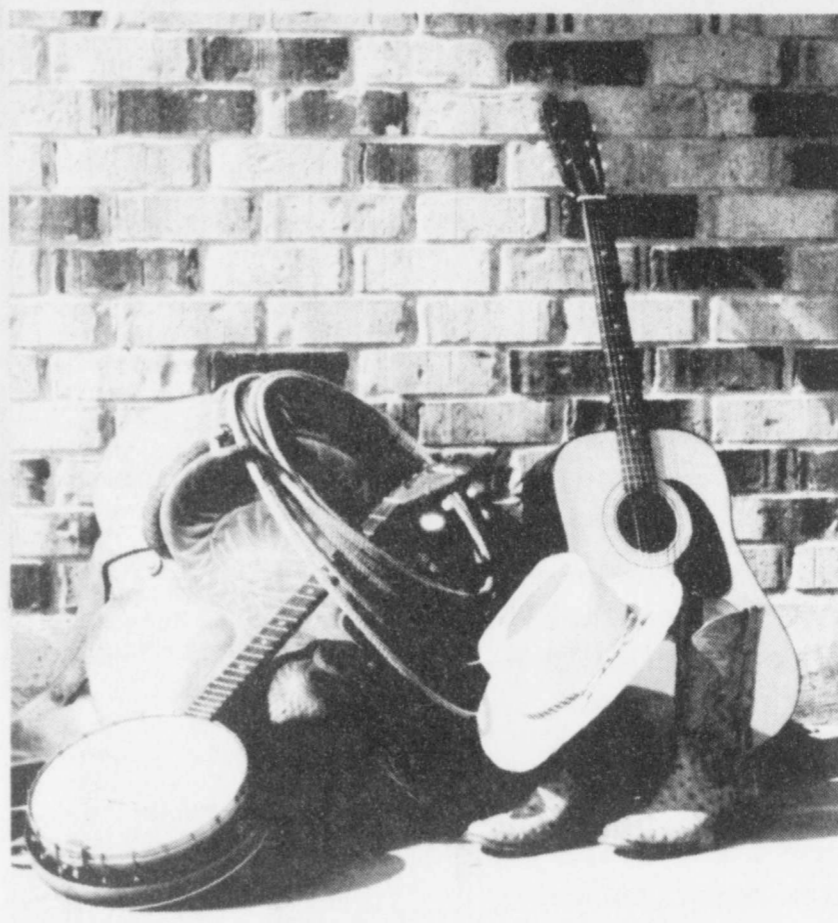

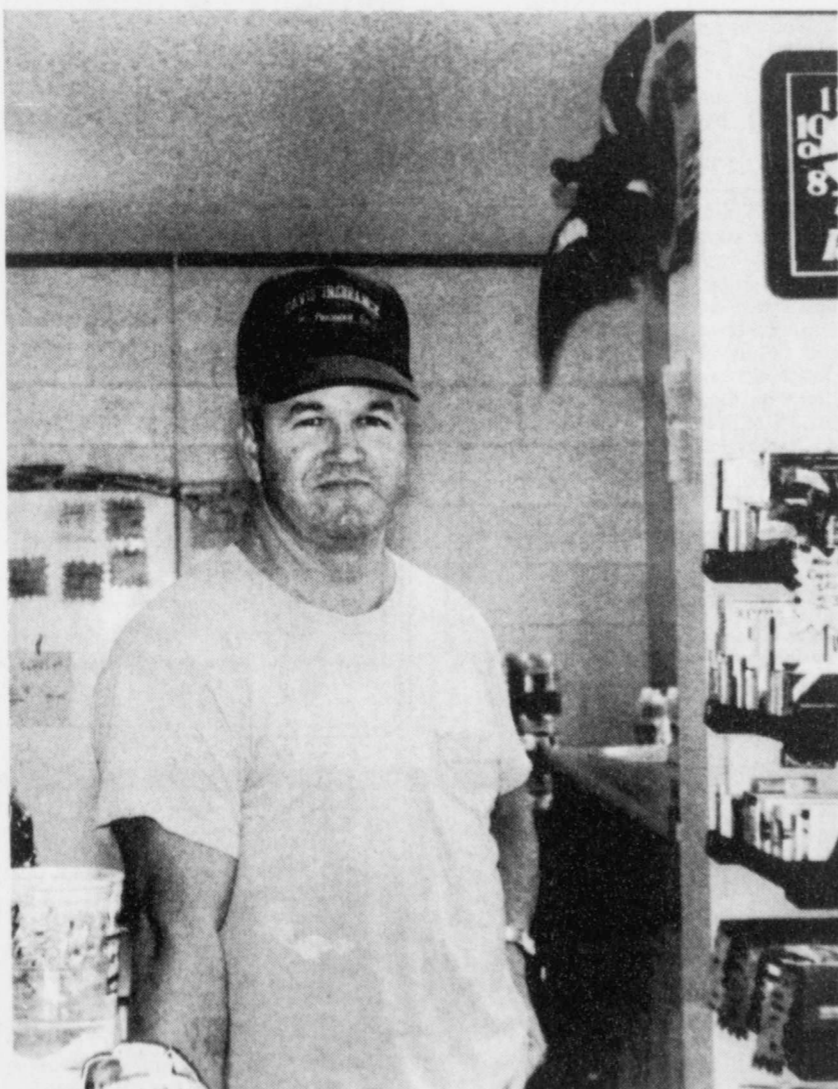

In the reading area, she collects Danielle Steele novels and enjoys reading Russian spy novels. She says that just anything to read, she likes.

Desserts are among Delaina's favorite things to cook. A couple of summers ago she began canning vegetables and has continued this ever since. Daisy Biscuits

- 1-3 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 1/2 cups self rising flour
- 3/4 cup milk
- jam, any flavor

Cut cream cheese and butter into flour. Add milk and stir until moistened. Knead on floured surface 3 or 4 times. Roll dough to 1/2" thick. Cut with a 2" biscuit cutter. Place on ungreased cookie sheets. Make 6 slits through dough around edges of each biscuit to 1/4" from center. Press thumb in center to make indentation. Spoon 1/2 tsp. jam in each biscuit. Bake at 450 for 10-12 minutes.

Fruit Salad

Cook in double boiler until thick:

- 2 eggs
- 5 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 5 Tbsp. sugar
- 2 Tbsp. butter

Let cool and add 1/2 lb. small marshmallows, let cool completely. Drain well and Add:

- 1 can royal anne white pitted cherries
- 1 can chunk pineapple
- 1 can mandarin oranges
- 3 bananas, sliced
- 1 large carton cool whip
- Chill overnight.

RFoyal Chicken Breasts

- 1 pkg. boneless chicken breasts
- 1 can chopped green chilies
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp cumin
- 1/2 tsp chili powder
- 1 1/2 cups Monterey Jack cheese, shredded

Brown chicken breasts and place in oblong baking dish. Spoon green chilies on top. Whisk together whipping cream and spices. Pour over breasts and top with cheese. Bake at 325 for 45 minutes. Spoon sauce over breasts 3 or 4 times during baking.

Broccoli Chicken Enchiladas

- 1 whole chicken
- 1 stalk celery
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 Tbsp. oil
- 1-10 oz. pkg. chopped broccoli
- 1-8 oz. sour cream
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 dozen corn tortillas
- paprika
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Boil chicken and celery until tender, about 1 hr. Bone chicken and cut up and reserve 1/4 cup broth. Sauté onion in 1 Tbsp. oil until tender; set aside. Cook broccoli by directions. Combine chicken, onion, broccoli, sour cream, soup and 2 Tbsp. broth in large saucepan. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and simmer 5 minutes, stirring often. Stir in salt and pepper. Remove from heat. Place 2 Tbsp. broth in 13x9 pan. Fry tortillas in hot oil for 5 seconds to soften. Drain on paper towels. Place 1/4 cup chicken mixture on each tortilla and roll tightly. Place in pan, seam side down. Spoon remaining chicken mixture over top. Bake, uncovered at 350 for 15 minutes. Sprinkle with cheese and paprika and cook until melted.

PUBLIC NOTICE

On April 16, 1991, GTE Corporation ("GTE") and Contel Corporation ("Contel") filed a joint petition for declaratory relief with respect to the obligations or requirements of GTE or Contel and/or any of its subsidiaries relating to the merger of GTE and Contel. GTE and Contel have requested a ruling from the Public Utility Commission of Texas that neither GTE nor Contel is required to register for the merger of GTE and Contel pursuant to Section 63 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act ("PURA"), TEX. REV. CIV. STAT. ANN. art. 1446c (Vernon Supp. 1991), that no investigation of the merger by the Commission is required. In the alternative, GTE and Contel seek a determination that the merger is consistent with the public interest.

The Commission is investigating the merger between GTE and Contel Corporations to determine whether the merger is consistent with the public interest. In reaching its determination, the Commission shall take into consideration the reasonable value of the property, facilities or securities to be acquired, disposed of, merged or consolidated. If the Commission finds that the merger is not in the public interest, the Commission shall take the effect of the transaction into consideration in GTE Southwest Incorporated's and Contel of Texas, Inc.'s next rate-making proceeding and disallow the effect of such transaction if it will unreasonably affect rates or services.

This filing has been assigned Docket No. 10212. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. 0 and Cooper defeated 28-12.

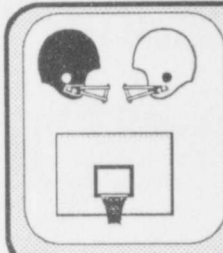
The Young Rebels averaged 30.5 points per game while their opponents averaged only 5.5!

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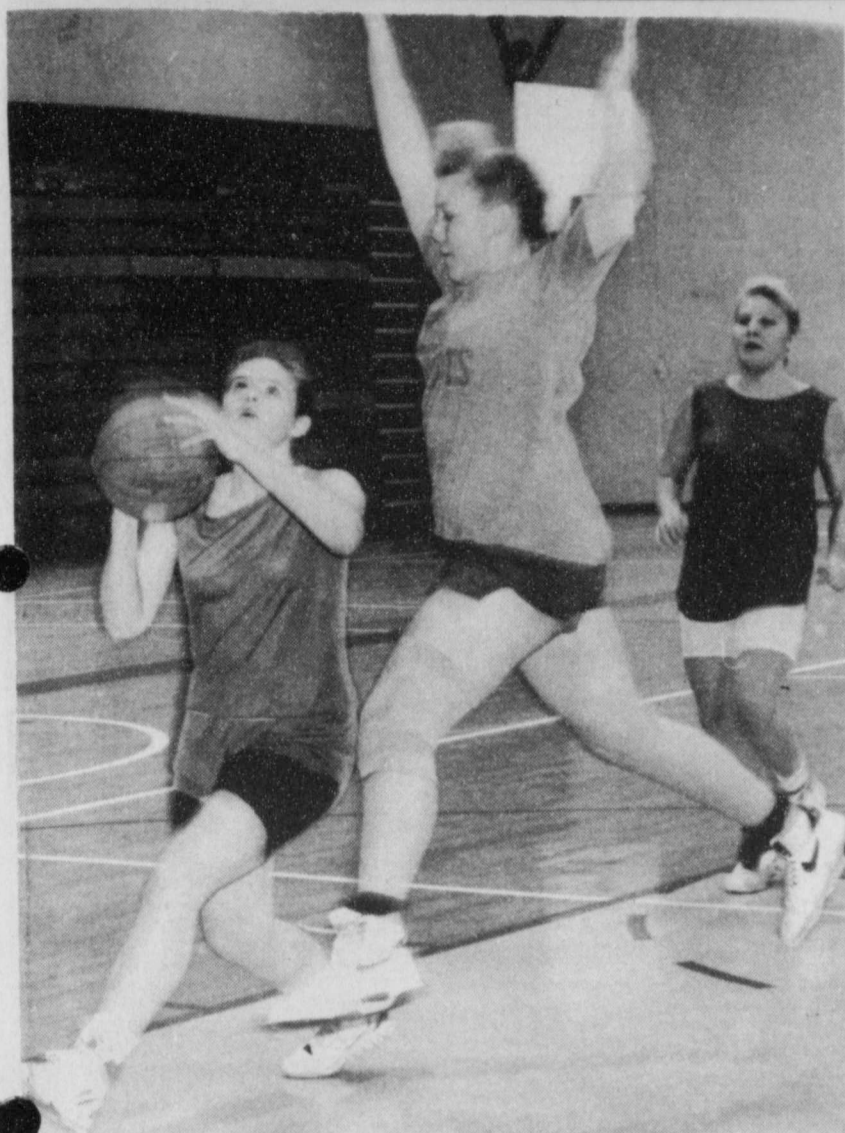

Keeping Healthy

Second Opinion

As a general rule, patients should seek a second opinion whenever they are uncomfortable with the explanations given by their doctor, are unhappy with their progress toward recovery, or simply feel the need for verification of their doctor's diagnosis and/or treatment.

There is no benefit to be gained, however, from questioning every decision your doctor makes. There are times when it would be dangerous to waste time getting a second opinion. A dire emergency is no time for second-guessing.

That leaves a wide range of conditions that are neither trivial nor life-threatening; such as elective surgery, recurring pain, disabling illness, or any other problem important to the patient. In many such instances asking for a second opinion is very appropriate, and peace of mind is a good reason for seeking it.

Fluoride Toothpaste

Numerous studies involving children and young adults have established that frequent brushing with a fluoride toothpaste helps prevent tooth decay. Now a study by researchers at the University of Iowa College of Dentistry suggest that the same holds true for older adults.

The one-year study, the first of its kind, found that older adults who used a sodium fluoride toothpaste had significantly fewer cavities than those who used a non-fluoridated toothpaste.

"These results indicate that all adult patients with natural teeth should be encouraged to brush frequently with a fluoridated toothpaste," said Dr. Mark Jensen, director of the dentistry college's Center for Clinical Studies.

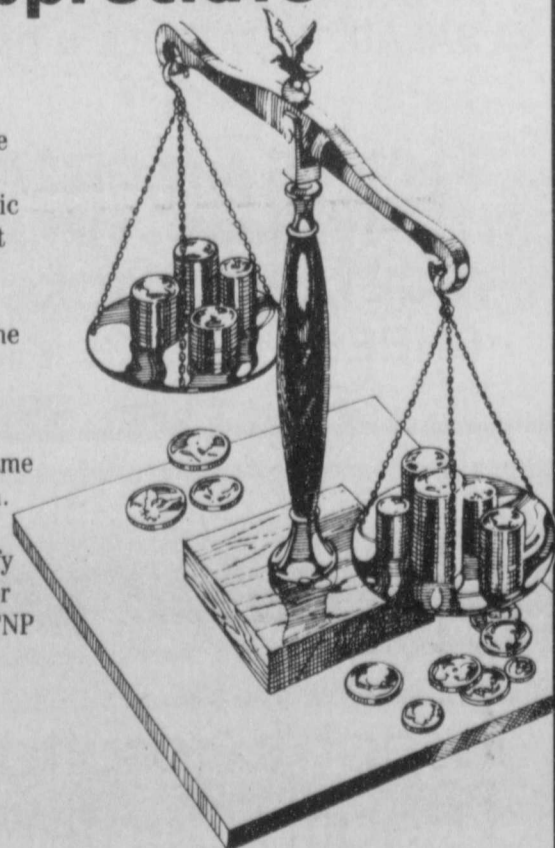

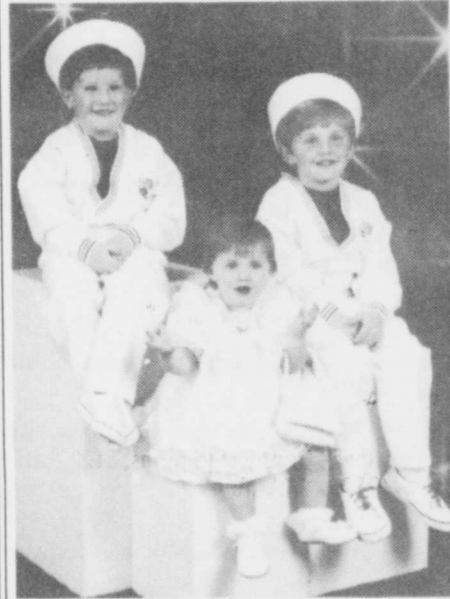

Prussic Acid Poisoning Possibility

By Paul D. Payne

Cattle should not have access to frost bitten Johnson grass, Sudan type plants and milo stubble until the plants are completely cured. Just how long this period is varies and one is always in doubt as to when the safe period has been reached.

A University of Kentucky Beef Cattle Specialist in a bulletin, "Forage Related Cattle Disorders", suggests that the toxin causing the disorder is dissipated usually within 48 hours after receipt of a falling frost.

Well, we have had three mornings of freezing weather plus a sure enough killing frost. This should lead to a rapidly curing plant that would be safe for cattle to eat in short order. When the plants are ready to bale for hay, they should be safe for animals to consume.

THOUGHT FOR FOOD by GOULD CROOK

Whole Wheat Hotcakes

- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. sugar
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 cups buttermilk
- 2 lg. egg whites
- 1 tbsp. melted margarine

Heat large nonstick griddle or skillet which has been sprayed with nonstick cooking spray over low heat.

In medium-size bowl stir together flours, baking powder, baking soda, sugar and salt. In another bowl whisk together buttermilk, egg whites and margarine; pour into dry ingredients and stir just until blended. Batter will be thick. Pour 3 tbsp. batter for each hotcake onto prepared skillet. Cook 3-4 minutes or until bottom is golden; flip and cook 1-2 minutes or until cooked through. Makes 12 hotcakes.

Turtle Cake

- 1 can evaporated milk
- 1 German chocolate cake mix
- 1 pkg. Kraft caramels
- 6 oz. chocolate chips
- 6 oz. chopped nuts

Combine half can of evaporated milk with prepared cake mix. Pour half of this mixture into 9x13 pan and bake at 350° for 10-15 minutes. Melt (or microwave) caramels and remaining evaporated milk in small dish. Pour over warm cake. Sprinkle with chocolate chips and nuts. Pour remaining batter over and bake 10-15 minutes more. No icing needed.

Granny's Goulash

- 1 lb. hamburger
- Minced onions
- 1 cup spaghetti
- 1 can tomato puree
- Salt and pepper
- Parmesan cheese

Brown hamburger and onions. Cook spaghetti separately. Drain grease from meat; add tomato puree to drained meat, then add drained spaghetti. Allow to simmer 10-15 minutes. Sprinkle with cheese and serve.



PJC & ETSU Team Up In Transfer Program

Officials with Paris Junior College and East Texas State University have signed an agreement to assist students who plan to transfer from PJC to ETSU.

Bobby R. Walters, president of PJC, and Dr. Jerry Morris, president of ETSU, signed the agreement at a luncheon meeting on Thursday, Oct. 31, in Commerce. With the agreement, the two institutions will establish a closer working relationship to assist Paris Junior College students planning to transfer to ETSU in their junior year, Walters said.

"The faculty and staff at Paris Junior College are doing good work in student transfer preparation," said Walters. "We are pleased to join ETSU in developing this agreement, which will benefit our students." Each year ETSU receives approximately 700 transfer students from junior and community colleges in Texas, according to Dr. Morris. This semester 100 new students from PJC transferred to ETSU, with a total of 453 former PJC students currently enrolled.

The agreement between PJC and ETSU includes the development of common degree plans, a dual admissions program, and common course numbers designated in the ETSU catalog. These provisions will help students in their selection of courses so they can know in advance which courses will transfer for credit for a bachelor's degree.

The common degree plans will specify courses to be taken at Paris Junior College and those to be completed at East Texas State University. Beginning with the 1992-93 issue of the ETSU catalog, courses will be listed with ESTU numbers and PJC numbers in parentheses.

Cottonseed In Cattle Diets Gaining Popularity

Whole cottonseed are gaining in popularity as a livestock cattle feed. Dairymen have been feeding cottonseed for several years and have found them to be a good source of protein and energy. Cottonseed help dairymen maintain their butterfat percentage of their milk.

Beef producers may also want to consider including cottonseed in the diets of the beef herd this winter. Beef producers should be aware of the proper amount of cottonseed products that can be fed safely depending on the type of animal.

Concern about cottonseed stems from its level of gossypol, a naturally occurring substance that can be toxic to some animals.

"Ruminant animals can tolerate much greater quantities of free gossypol than can monogastric animals. Pre-ruminant calves, under 8

weeks of age, should not be fed gossypol-containing products," says a report just released at Texas A&M University.

The source of gossypol and type of diet also affects the levels of gossypol tolerated by cattle. It has been widely studied for its toxicity to some animals. But gossypol may also affect reproductive capabilities in cattle.

These are recommendations for feeding cattle: Beef cows and range bulls: 2 pounds per head per day of direct solvent extracted; 4 pounds/head/day of expander processed; 4 pounds/head/day of screw-press processed meal; or 4-6 pounds/head/day of whole cottonseed.

Young bulls being grown or developed for breeding: whole cottonseed should be limited to 15% for 20% of total diet for most cattle and 10% or less for young developing bulls.
