## Talco Area Roads To Be Resurfaced

About 281 miles of Northeast Texas highways will receive new surfaces during 1992 with a contract awarded this month by the Texas Department of Transportation.

The Texas Transportation Commission approved a bid of \$3.9 million from Clark Construction Company, Inc. of San Antonio to seal coat highways in nine counties located within the Atlanta District.

"Seal coating a highway involves placing a layer of hot asphalt over the old pavement and then covering it with crushed stone," said Lawrence Jester, District Engineer in Atlanta. "This process makes the roadway surface watertight and improves its appearance."

The following highways in Titus County are scheduled to be resurfaced during the summer of 1992:

Spur 185, from US 67 in Winfield to I-30; Loop 96, from FM 71 in Talco to US 271 in Talco; Texas 49, from US 271 in Mt. Pleasant to Morris County Line; US 271, from 1.8 miles south of Texas 49 to Texas 49 in Mt. Pleasant; FM 71, from FM 1402 in Wilkerson to Morris County Line; I-30 from US 271 to FM 1402; FM 21, from Camp County Line to Franklin County Line; FM 1000, from US 67 to Texas 49; FM 1734, from 3.2 miles northeast of US 67 to 0.3 miles west of Tankersley Creek; and FM 2882, from FM 21 to FM 127.

Jo Coil, president, called the meeting to order with several prayer requests being made. Mary Welch voiced the prayer. Minutes were read and approved.

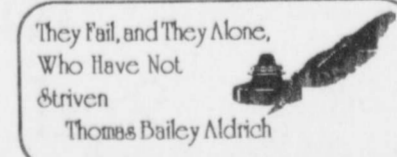
During the business session, the WMA decided to participate in the Angel Christmas Tree at the Bogata Nursing Home, also to give gifts to

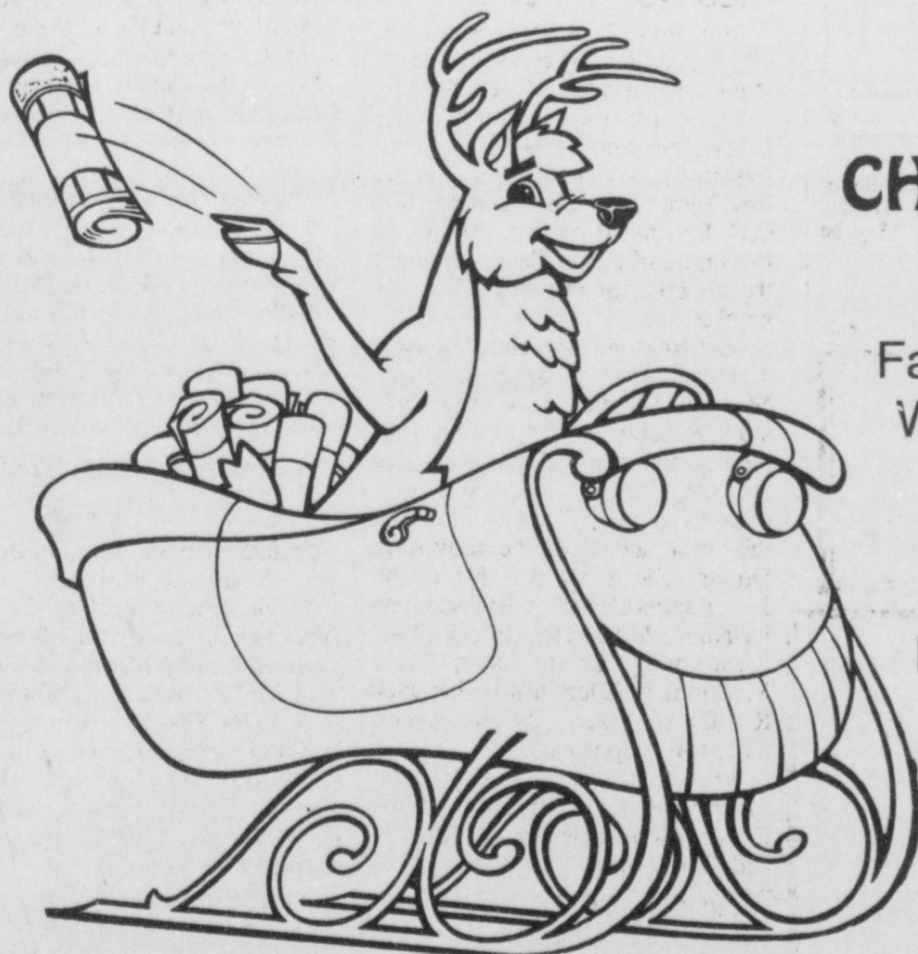

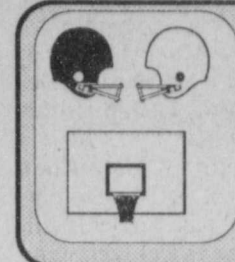

# Rebel Sports Report



## Rebs Take 3, Pats Win 3; Rebs Win 2, Devils Take 2

The Rivercrest Rebels traveled to Prairiland on Friday, November 29 to be hosted by Patriot rivals once more. The conclusion was 3 wins and 3 losses by the six participating Rebel and Lady Rebel teams.

What started out as a discouraging night for the Rebs soon changed with a JV boys victory. Freshman teams from RHS were defeated although great potential is being sculpted by eager coaches. Ninth grade girls lost 24-19, as did the ninth grade boys with a score 51-45.

Junior Varsity teams were one and for the night. JV Lady Rebels co not seem to their game together as they were defeated 38-10. However, the JV Rebels brought the first victory of the night with a 45-29 win. Unstoppable players Trae Beverlin and Shawn Barker scored 16 and 17 points, respectively. Other point contributions were made by Brandon Williams and Jeremy Belyeu each with five, and Geno Sartor with two.

Both Varsity teams were victorious against the Patriots once more. Although the Lady Pats had another week to prepare for their Lady Reb match, the Lady Rebs also worked harder to improve their skills. Having been neck and neck throughout the first three periods of the game, the Lady Rebs pulled ahead in the last 3:00 minutes of the game. The Lady Rebs benefitted from every mistake

made on Lady Pats play. Great rebounding and stealing by Krista Weatherall, as well as B.J. Thompson's last period shooting put the game away with a 63-56 score. Scorers for the night were: Weatherall 17; Patches Raines 12; Thompson 10; Lana Pirtle 9; Tiffany Parish 8; and Laquitta Norman 7.

Immediately thereafter, the Varsity boys hit the court with unbelievable tactics. Defense by both teams was so tight, there was no score until Corey Gable made a free shot with 5:48 on the clock during the first period. Then everything seemed to fall in place for the Rebels. Passing between the Rebs acquired several shots during the second half. Three point shots flew from all angles of the 3-point line for a total of 8 for the night. A great display of teamwork occurred during the last play of the night. After a fast break by the Rebs, smooth, quick passing by Eric Curties to Gable to Reggie Alford resulted in a two point shot for Alford. This ended the game with the score 67-49 in favor of the Rebels. Scorers for the night were: Alford 15; Curties 13; Jerry Francis 12; Gable 11; Dean Tiffie 8; Eddie Williams 5 and Clay Pirtle 2.

Rivercrest Rebels and Lady Rebels were hosts to the visiting Celeste Devils on Saturday, November 30. The win-loss record was again dis-

tributed evenly between home and visitors, two Rebel wins and two Lady Rebel losses.

The ninth grade Rebel boys fared Celeste's junior varsity team in an exciting battle for the win. Although a close game, the Rebels proved themselves strong with a 61-60 win. High scorer was Kyle Kennedy with 21 points. Junior varsity girls also fought a tough fight, but were 2 points within reach of the win. The loss was with a 33-31 score. Michelle Giles was high scorer with 12 points.

Even though the varsity Lady Rebels seemed to have their technique together, the shots seemed to be off by a hair each time. Rebounds and steals were numerous by the Lady Rebels, but it just wasn't a Lady Rebel night. Krista Weatherall made 14 points for the highest scoring position. Celeste Lady Devils won 75-47.

A 20 point win for the Varsity Rebels seemed to somewhat remedy the two previous losses of the night. The Celeste Devils, appearing a bit intimidated due to the height of this year's Rebs, contributed many mistakes which caused their loss. The final score was 87-67 in favor of the Rebs. 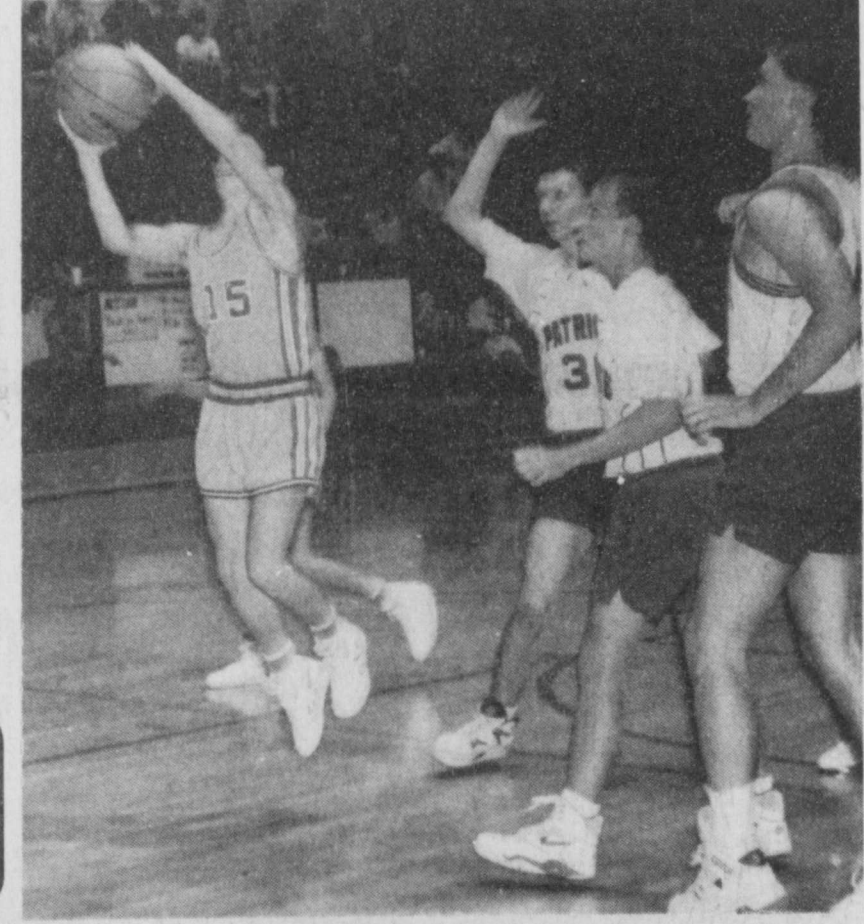

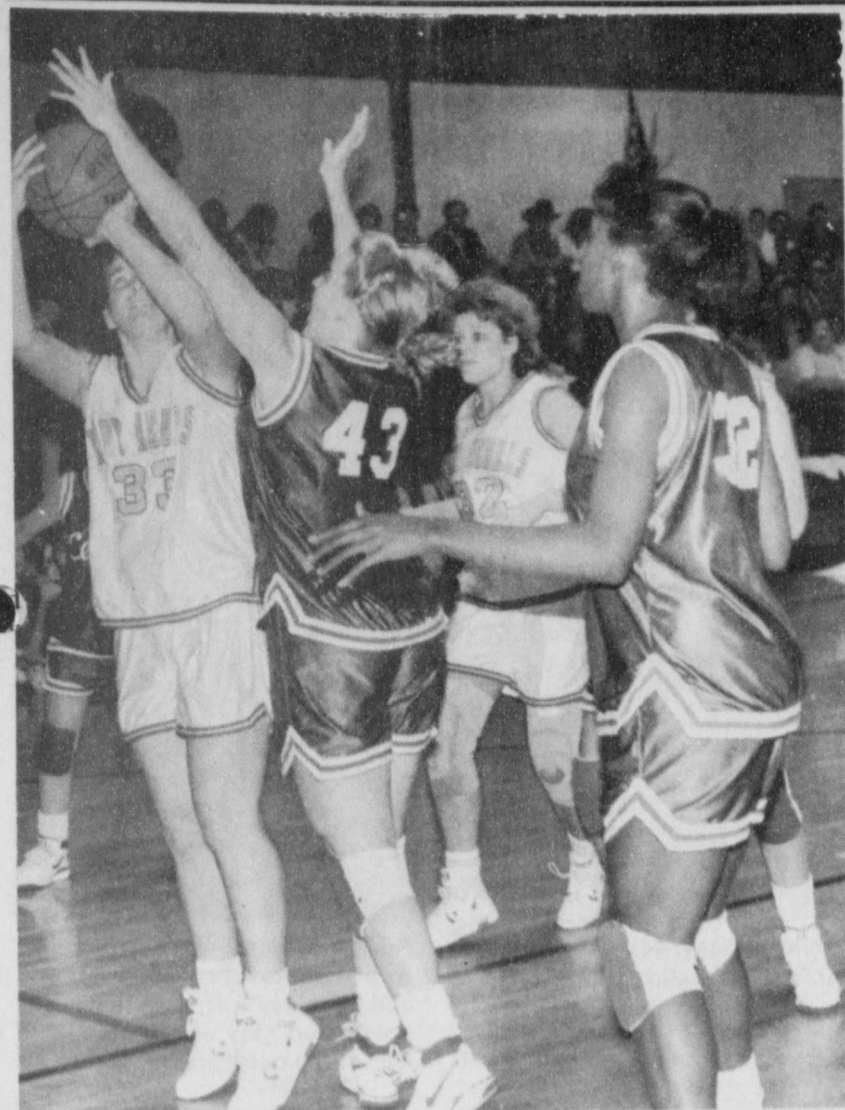

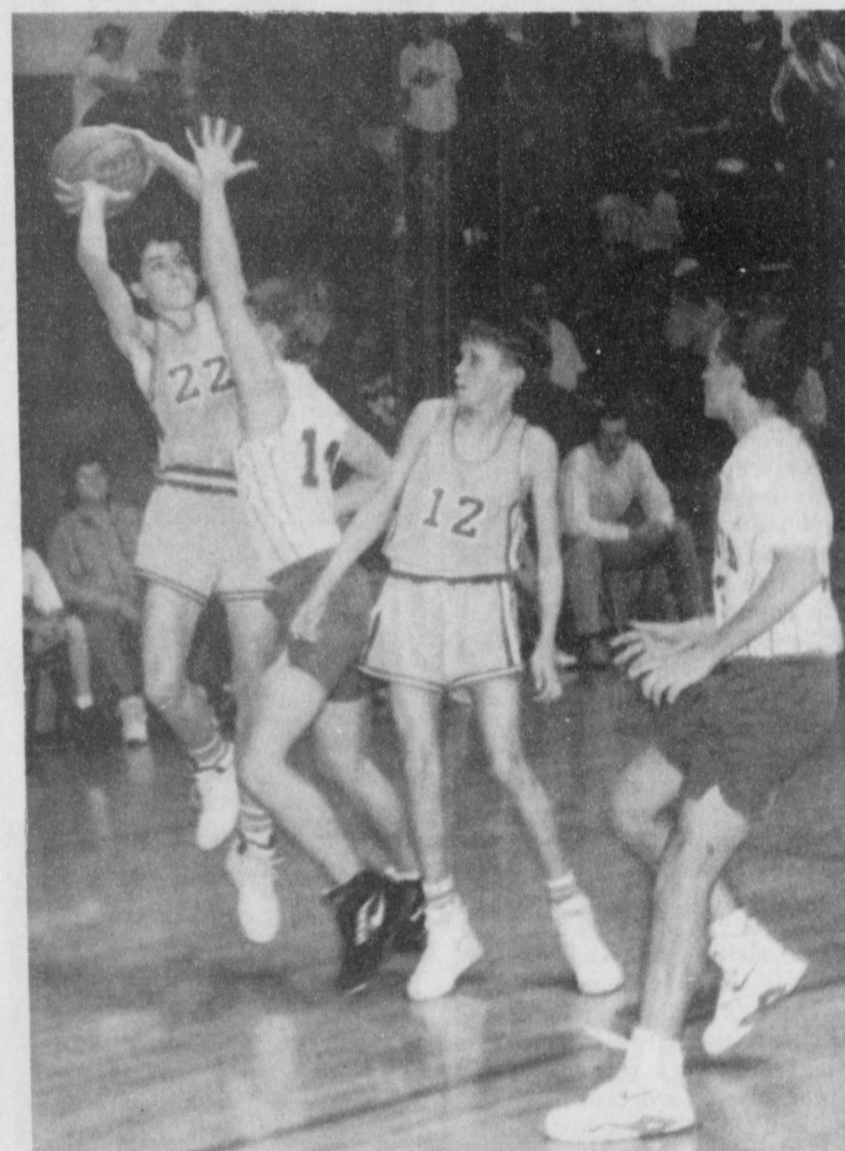

**Signal Contracts Awarded**

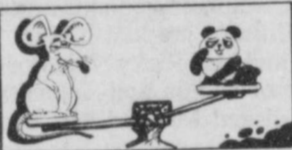
The Paris District of the Texas Department of Transportation has awarded three maintenance contracts which will improve traffic signal operations with the district's jurisdiction.

Various intersections in Red River, Lamar, Fannin, Hopkins, Hunt and Grayson counties will be getting a facelift. Under a \$64,000 contract, Durable Specialties of Duncanville will be relamping all the traffic signal intersections within those counties. Other traffic signal intersections throughout the areas will be cleaned, aligned and repaired as needed. Most of the work will be completed by late December, weather permitting.

D.W. Construction, Inc. of Tyler has been awarded a \$27,500 contract

to perform routine and emergency highway safety lighting repair in Lamar, Franklin, Hopkins, Hunt and Grayson counties. Contract work will be completed as needed in those counties.

An Oklahoma firm, Sig-Op Systems in Edmond, will replace and install pavement traffic detector loops at various locations through the district in Delta, Fannin, Franklin, Grayson, Hopkins, Hunt, Lamar, Rains and Red River counties. Detector loops adjust signal operations based on traffic patterns. There is no specific time frame for the maintenance work to be completed, but detector loops will be replaced as needed.

**Extra Vitamins**

Many people know that their diet is reasonably well balanced, but turn to supplementary vitamins as a safeguard, on the theory that you can't get too much of a good thing. Generally speaking, it is true that supplementary vitamins are harmless though unnecessary. In most cases, the body absorbs only the amount of vitamins it needs. There is, however, definite evidence of harmful effects from excess dosages of Vitamins A, K, and D, so they should not be used in large doses.

There is another danger in relying on supplementary vitamins. Many people believe these vitamins meet all their nutritional needs. People who are careless about their intake of food feel that they can set everything right with a couple of capsules from a bottle. This could not be more wrong. For example, if you consumed a diet without enough protein and relied on supplementary vitamins to keep you healthy, you would soon develop serious problems.

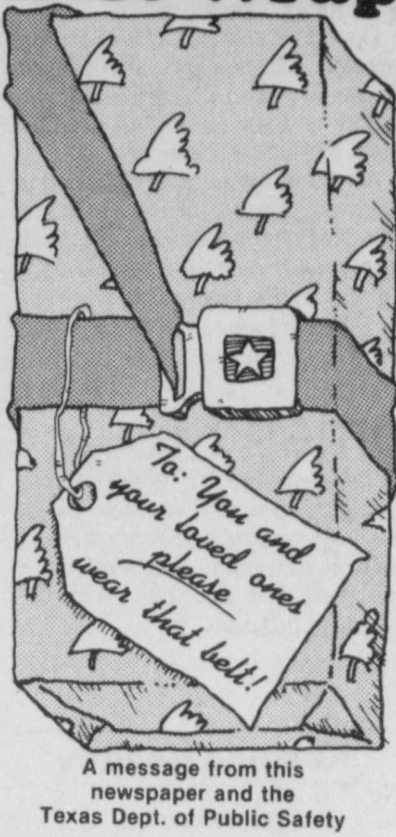

Discussions were presented on the Harvest Festival, donations, and the concession stand. It was voted to buy





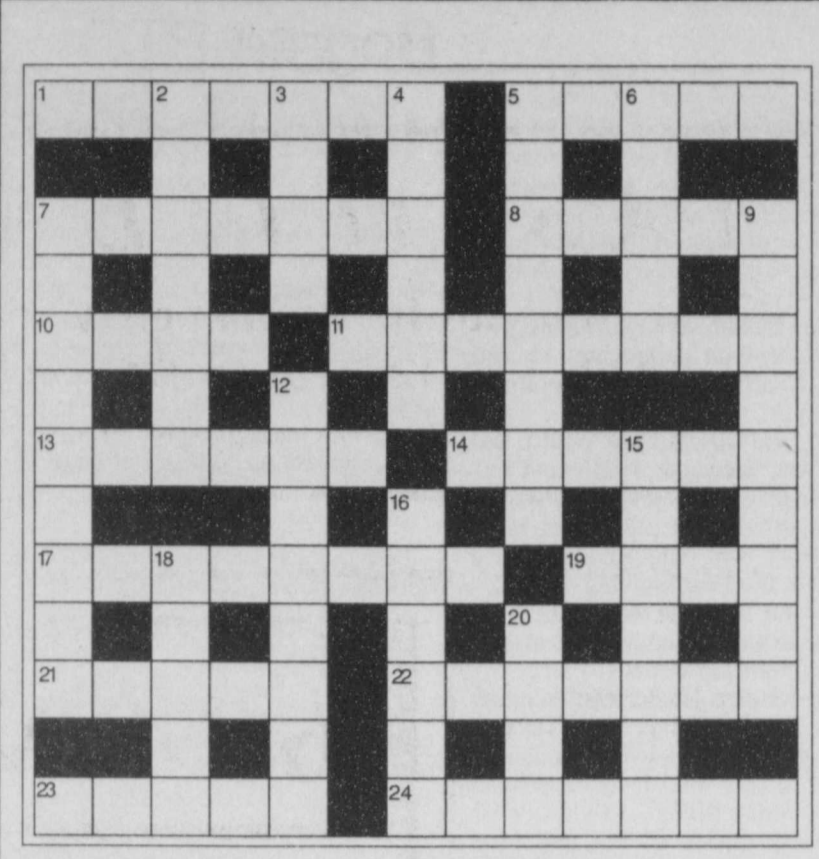

**Winter Warnings**

If you must go outside with shovel in hand, dress warmly and plan on staying outside for only short periods at a time. Take a break often and go inside to warm up.

You can avoid some muscle and back strain by lifting the shovel properly. Keep the weight of the snow close to your body, keep your back straight, and lift with your legs.

Anyone who experiences a tight, squeezing pain in the chest which moves to the arms and neck, shortness of breath, sweating, dizziness, faintness or nausea, should immediately stop what they are doing and seek medical help.
