Talco PTO Working To Improve Education

The Talco P.T.O. has made two major purchases for the students attending Talco Elementary/Junior High.

The Accelerated Reader is a reading management program that motivates students in grades two through eight to read more and better books. The students accumulate points for passing computerized tests on the books that they have read. Points may be sent for a variety of purchases including pens, pencils, T-shirts, sweatshirts, candy, movie rentals, book bags and other items.

The second purchase was supplemental reading passages for grades one through six. The reading passages will supplement the Windows on Science Program adopted this year. Through videodisc the students have

an opportunity to see, hear and discuss science. Hands-on activities permit students to consolidate the new information. The supplemental reading passages support the learning that has taken place on the videodisc.

The Talco PTO was also able to purchase a brain for the P.A. system, a hot water heater and a sink. Money was also given to the seventh and eighth grades for their annual banquet and for a teacher's dinner.

The above things were made possible with money raised from the Fall Festival, concession stand and other school fundraisers.

The PTO, working with many generous people in the community, organized the Fall Festival and Christmas Parade.

Green Bean & Tomato Casserole

By Ann Dodd
2 stalks celery, finely chopped
1 medium green pepper, finely chopped
1 medium onion
4 strips bacon, fried crisp & drained (reserve grease for later use)
1 can stewed tomatoes, 14 1/2 oz., drained
3 cans cut green beans, 16 oz., drained
1 T Worcestershire sauce
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1/2 tsp salt
dash of cayenne pepper & seasoned salt
1 jar sliced mushrooms, drained, 4.5 oz.
1 c buttered bread crumbs (melt 3-4 T margarine and stir in crumbs)
Fry bacon and drain. Sauté green pepper, onion and celery. Add drained tomatoes and cut up with spoon. Simmer 8 minutes. Remove from heat. Add mayonnaise and rest of seasonings. Mix well. Add drained green beans, mushrooms and crumbled bacon.
Melt 1/3 cup margarine. Add enough bread crumbs to absorb, about 1 cup. Sprinkle across top of casserole. Bake, uncovered, in preheated 350 degree oven for 25-30 minutes until bubbly and brown. Serves 10.

Peppermint Candy

Crush a large peppermint stick to measure 1/2 cup, set aside. Tear a long sheet of wax paper and place on the counter.
Melt 1-1# bag white chocolate (not almond base) in microwave, after 45 seconds, stir. Continue cooking and stirring every 15 seconds until melted. Add 1/2 cup crushed peppermint and mix. Pour out on wax paper. Using the back of the spoon, spread out very thin. When cool, break into small pieces. This freezes well.

Ritzy Dessert

Butter generously a 11 3/4x7 1/2" pyrex, set aside.
Crust:
Crush 24 Ritz crackers in plastic bag with a rolling pin. Set aside.
Separate 3 eggs. Set yolks aside for filling. Beat egg whites til frothy. Add dash of salt and 1 cup sugar, gradually. Add 1 tsp. vanilla. Beat until stiff. Remove from mixer.
Using spoon to mix, add 1 cup crushed Ritz crackers and 1 cup chopped pecans. Mix until well blended. Using the back of the large spoon, spread mixture evenly over prepared pyrex. Bake in preheated 300 degree oven for 30 minutes. Cool.
Chocolate filling:
In medium saucepan, mix together
1 cup sugar
1/4 +1 T cornstarch
1/4 cup Hershey's cocoa
1/8 tsp. salt
3 egg yolks
2 cups whole milk
Add to dry ingredients in saucepan slowly until blended. Cook over medium heat til thick.

Raspberry Punch

1 1/2 gallon Raspberry sherbet
2-5ths champagne
Scoop sherbet into glass punch bowl. Pour chilled champagne over sherbet.
Beautiful Angel Food Cake
Bake Duncan Hines angel food cake by directions. Place on serving plate upside down when cool. Place in freezer. When frozen, tunnel out center carefully.
Drizzle 1/3 cup Creme de Menthe inside tunnel. Thaw 1/2 gallon Raspberry sherbet about 8 minutes. Pack tunnel with sherbet and refreeze. When frozen, turn cake upright. Frost with can of white frosting. For a fall dessert, use orange sherbet and a can of chocolate frosting.

Vegetable Casserole

1/4 cup butter
3 medium 115 onions, chopped
2 cups Swiss cheese, grated, divided use
1 cup crushed saltine crackers, divided use
2 eggs
3/4 cup Half & Half or light cream
1 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
2 T melted margarine
Melt 1/4 cup butter in large skillet and saute onions until tender. Place half the onions in a 1 1/2 qt. deep dish pie pan. Sprinkle 1 cup Swiss cheese and 1/2 cup cracker crumbs over onions. Repeat layers of onions and cheese mixture. Melt 2 T butter in skillet and stir in remaining 1/2 cup cracker crumbs. Lightly brown, then sprinkle over casserole. Bake at 350 for 25 minutes. Excellent accompaniment to ham or roast beef.

Cheese Ring

1 cup grated cheddar cheese, fine grate
1 small yellow onion, fine grate
1 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup Hellman's mayonnaise
Mix all ingredients together in small mixing bowl. Place in refrigerator for an hour or two. Shape in a ring on serving plate.
Spoon either plum or strawberry jam inside th ring. Serve with fancy crackers. Good with Triscuits. Better if made a day before serving.

The final two free throws by Weatherall with :39 remaining, secured the win for the Lady Rebel

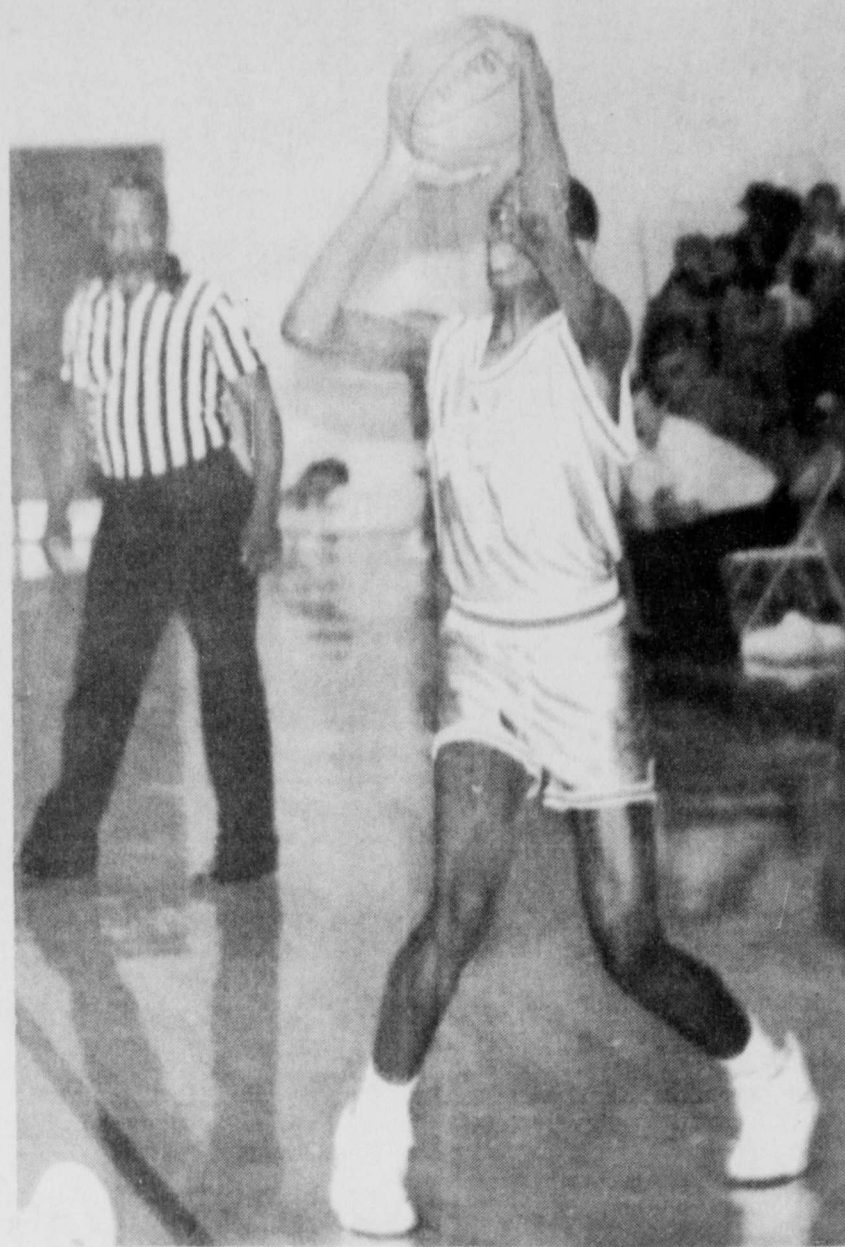
squad. Taking a more relaxing toll on the night, the Rebs hit the court with an experienced ease.

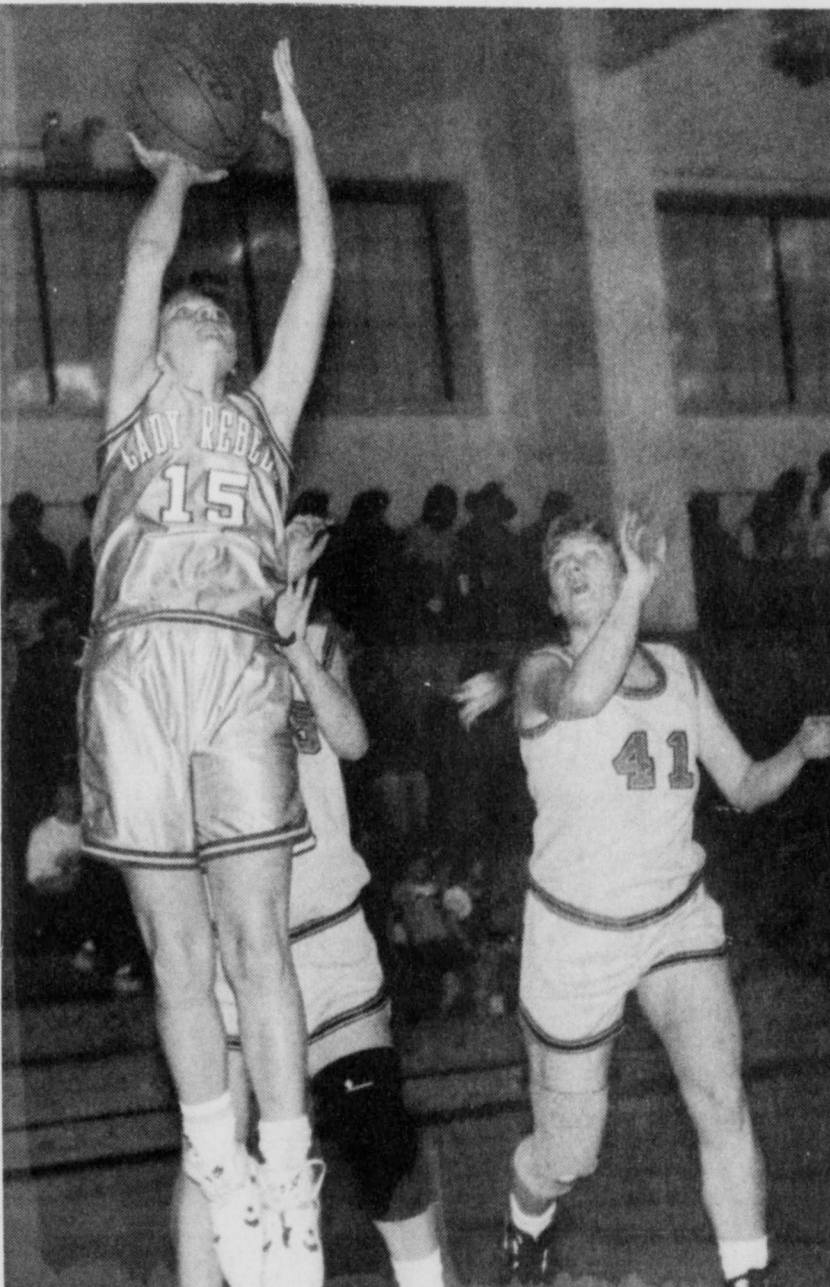
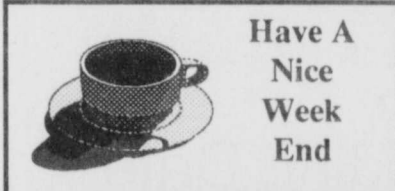
difference as did all the rebounds and hustle.

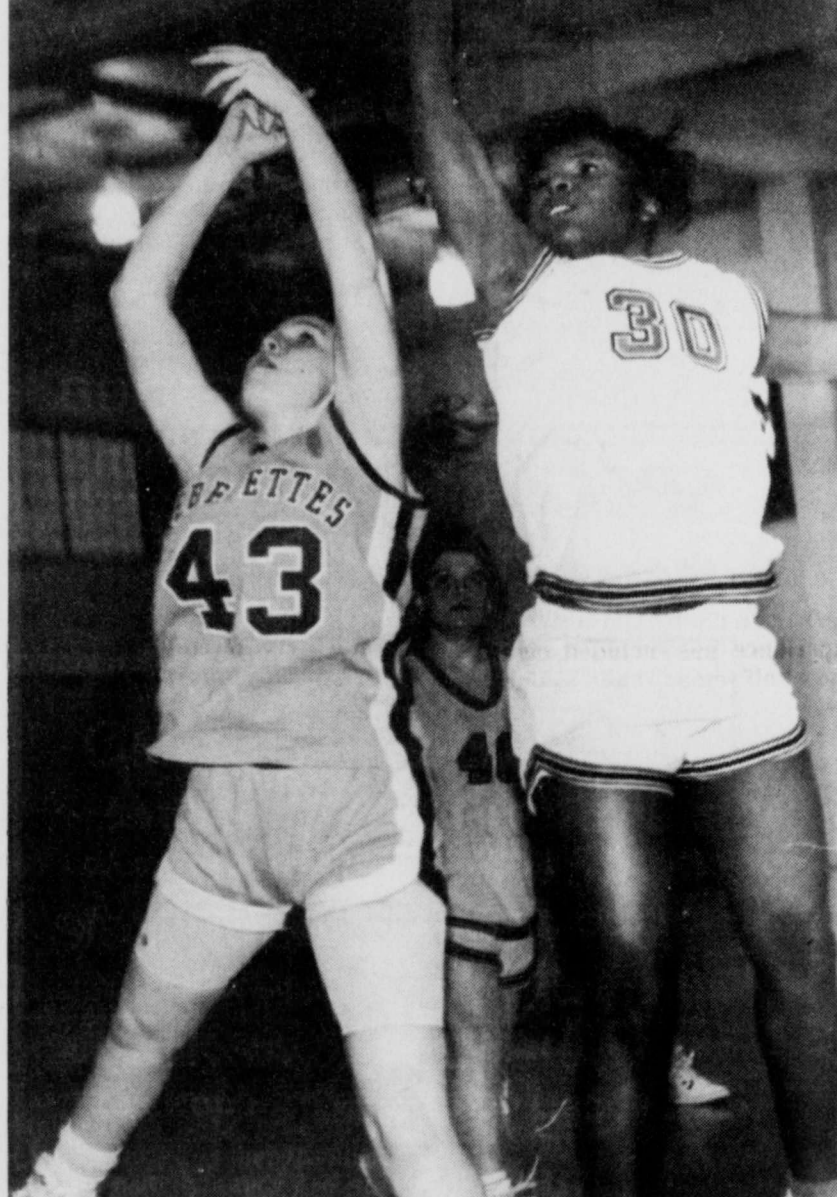

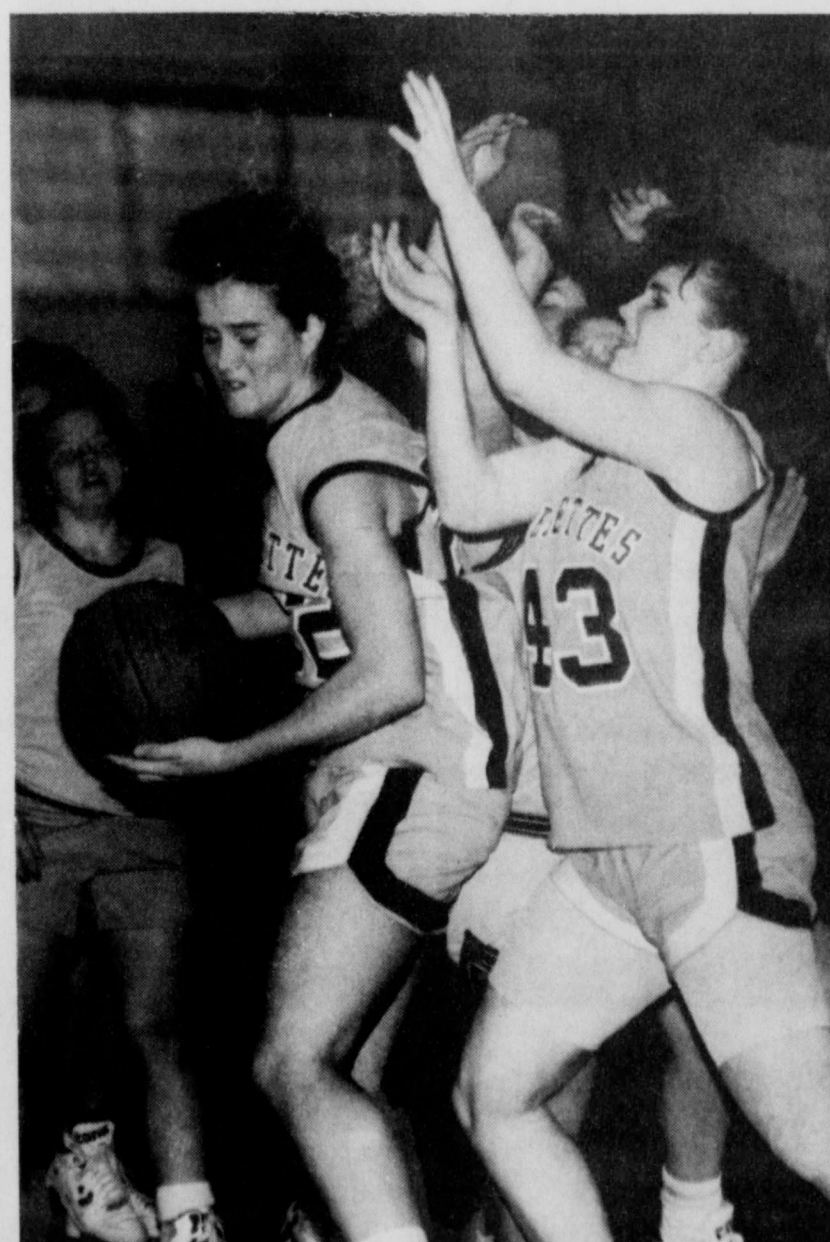

HOW TO PICK THE RIGHT CREDIT CARD

Analyze your payment habits to determine the kind of credit card that's right for you. Then shop around to get the best value for your money.

Costs of using a card include annual fees and interest charges. Some cards give you 5 days to pay off the balance; others zero. If you faithfully pay in full within the grace period, you won't get stuck with interest charges.

Search for a low interest rate if you pay only part of your bill each month. Annual rates are as low as 9% on some cards and as high as 19.8% on others. Since personal interest expense is no longer tax deductible, keep interest expense to a minimum.

Some cards levy a cash advance fee in addition to other charges. If you expect to rely on your card for money, find out exactly what you'll pay for this convenience.

Annual fees range from about \$20 to \$50. A premium card may offer automatic rental car insurance, roadside assistance for your family car, and buyer protection for theft or damage to goods purchased with the card. Don't pay extra for features you won't use. Often, you can get a premium card higher credit limit by asking for it on your standard card.

The cards with the lowest annual fee often have the highest interest charges. If you regularly carry a balance due, choose a card with a low interest rate rather than a low annual fee. A few cards charge no fee, but most of these cards charge interest on all balances; they have no grace period.

Congress recently rejected a proposal to limit credit card interest rates, so it's as important as ever that you analyze rates and services before you select credit cards.

1 tbsp. melted margarine

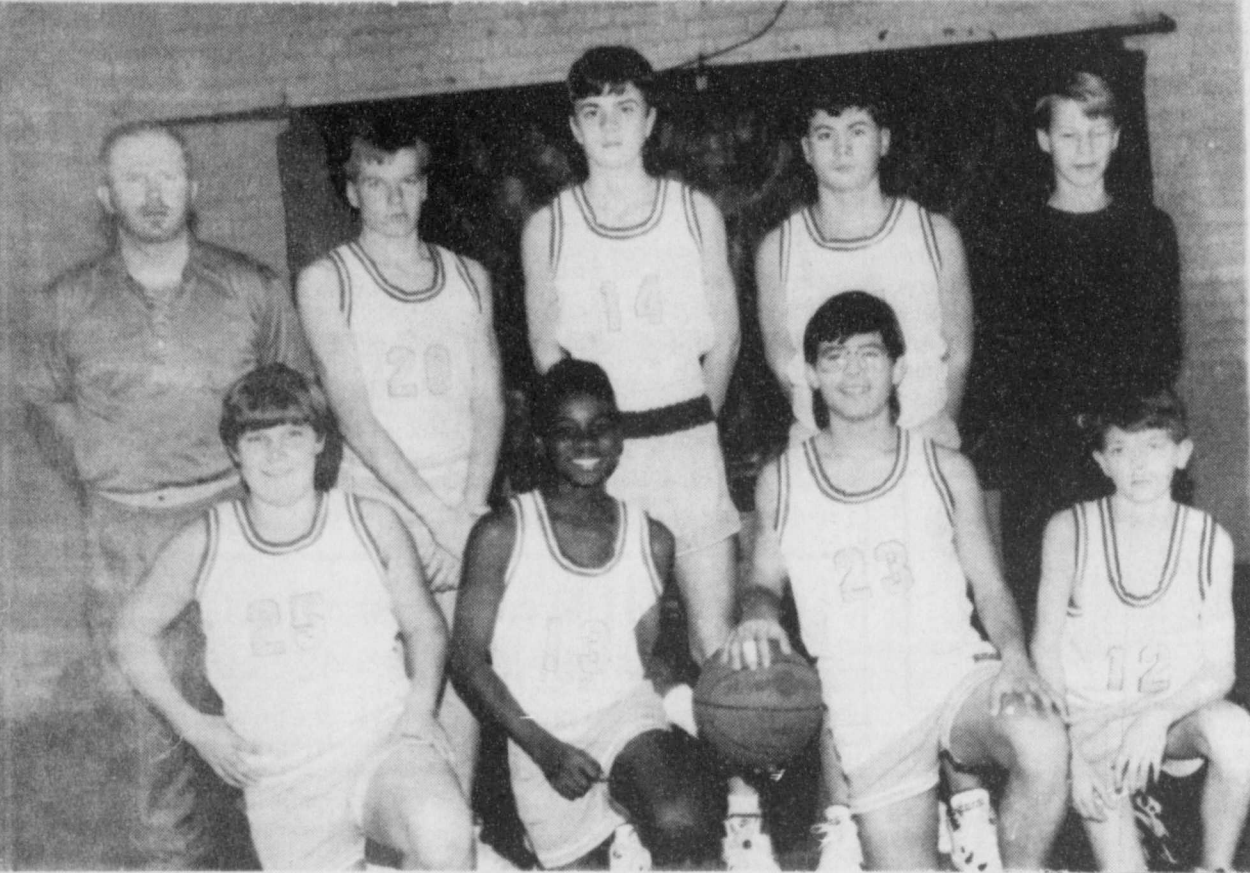

**Paris District Gets
Reprieve From Consolidation**

Texas Department of Transportation
In its monthly meeting recently, the Texas Transportation Commission voted to suspend district reorganization activities. The move gives the Paris District of the Texas Department of Transportation a reprieve from its consolidation with the Tyler District. The Paris office, along with a neighboring office in Atlanta, were scheduled to combine operations with the Tyler office effective September 1, 1992. "The Legislature made its intent clear during the third-called special session and we will comply with that," said Transportation Commissioner Ray Stoker, Jr. Since November, the Texas Department of Transportation had been reorganizing its 24 districts to comply with a legislative mandate to consolidate into no more than 18 districts. The Commission, which is the department's governing body, decided to table reorganization plans after legislators passed a Joint Resolution requiring the department to postpone further district realignment activities until next year. The Commission also directed the department to research and develop ways to enhance the operating efficiency of the department. The Paris District headquarters employs about 115 people. The district also retains another 256 employees in its maintenance and residency offices in Delta, Fannin, Franklin, Grayson, Hopkins, Hunt, Lamar, Rains and Red River Counties.

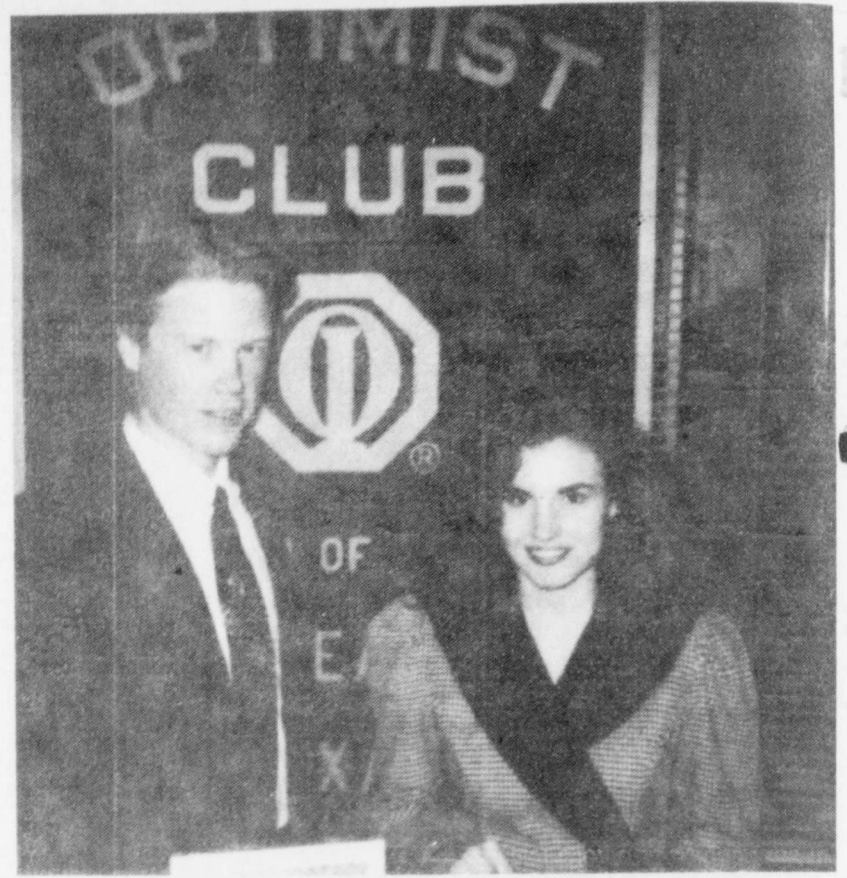
