Titus County Runoff Elections Are Tuesday

Titus County Runoff primary elections resulted in two runoffs which will affect Talco area voters.

The Precinct 3 Commissioner's race, which started with five people in the field, will be decided April 14,

Tuesday, with voters making their choice between Incumbent J.W. Terrell, Jr. and Johnny Mack Brown.

Terrell originally received 621 votes and Brown 296. Gene Smith received 259. F. H. Smith received 75

votes and Mickey Holt received 145 in the primary.

A runoff between Rex A. Mars and incumbent Chris Durant for the Precinct 1, 3 and 4 positions will also be on the ballot.

Secretary-treasurer Judy Sloan read the minutes of the previous meeting, which were approved.

Mrs. Sloan reported \$2997.29 in the group account. Bro. Bud Mowrey and Dick Dixon reported \$500.00 down payment on the land was made to Christelle Cato. They reported no fence lines are to be moved nor is the sheet metal building on the property to be removed until the land is paid for. Earl Hale reported speaking with Talco Bank president Rusty Jones about service charges on the group account. There will be none charged. Morris Brown turned in his tickets sold for the Cow Patty Splat and reported a \$100.00 donation from the Troy Brown family. Patty Kuhl reported the calf used for the event will be furnished by Bryan Ottinger. She also asked the group about changing the time of the event and serving a Poor Man's Supper, plus coinciding with the VFD fishing tournament weigh-in. Motion was made and carried to have the supper and change the time of the Cow Patty Splat to 5:30 on April 11 from 12:30. The Poor Man's Supper will be beans or stew and cornbread, condiments, and tea. Adults will be \$2.50 and children \$1.50. Members of the community will be asked to donate for the event. The Texas Chicken Ole' recipe came from the Basinger family recipes about 10 years ago.

Caramel-filled Chocolate Cookies
By Connie Basinger

2 1/2 cups flour
3/4 cup cocoa
1 tsp. baking soda
1 cup sugar
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup butter, softened
2 tsp. vanilla
2 eggs
12 cup chopped pecans
48 rolo chocolate candies

1 lbs. sugar
Preheat oven to 375. Combine flour, cocoa and baking soda, set aside. Beat sugars and butter, add vanilla and eggs. Add to flour mixture, stir in 1/2 of pecans. For each cookie, shape 1 lb. dough around 1 rolo candy, covering completely. Dip one side of each cookie in remaining pecans and sugar. Place nut side up, on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 7-10 minutes.

Cranberry Salad
1 pkg. fresh cranberries, 1 lb.
1 pkg. large marshmallows, 1 lb.
1 cup sugar
1-15 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained
1 pt. whipping cream
3/4 cup walnuts, chopped

Grind alternately cranberries and marshmallows, an old fashioned meat grinder works well. Cover, refrigerate one hour. Whip cream and sugar until stiff. Cool Whip can be used instead of whipping cream. Stir in cranberry and marshmallow mixture. Add pineapple and nuts, mix well, refrigerate overnight.

Mini-Cheesecakes
1 1/2 cups Graham cracker crumbs
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup butter, melted
3-8 oz. cream cheese, softened
1-14 oz. Eagle Brand milk
3 eggs
2 tsp. vanilla
1 can pie filling (we like strawberry)

Preheat oven to 300. Mix crumbs, sugar, butter. Press equal portions into bottom of 24 paper cup lined muffin cups. Beat cream cheese, add Eagle Brand, then eggs and vanilla. Spoon equal amounts into prepared cups. Bake 20 minutes at 300. Cool, chill, then top with filling.

Chocolate Chip Pound Cake
Mix 3 eggs, 3/4 cup Wesson oil, 3/4 cup water.
Add 1 cup sour cream, beat 1 minute.
Add 1 Duncan Hines yellow cake mix and 1 small box chocolate instant pudding mix. Beat 4 minutes.
Stir in 1-6 oz. Hershey's Milk Chocolate chips and 1 cup chopped nuts.
Grease and flour bundt pan. Bake 45-55 minutes at 350. Let set in pan for a few minutes to cool.

Hominy Casserole
2 cans hominy, drained
2-3 small green onions, chopped
1-8 oz. cheese whiz (jalapeno or plain)
1 can Cream of Mushroom soup
crushed fritos

Mix and melt cheese and mushroom soup. Pour over hominy and onions in baking dish. Sprinkle crushed fritos on top. Bake at 350 until bubbly.

Texas Chicken Ole'
1 can Cream of Mushroom soup
1 can Cream of Chicken soup
1/4 cup water
1 large can Pet milk
1 small chicken, stewed, boned, skinned and chopped
2 jalapeno peppers, chopped
1 medium onion, chopped
1 pkg. taco shells (or Doritos)
6 oz. grated cheddar cheese

Combine soups, water, milk, pepper and onion. Place layer of chips in 9x13 pan. Pour 1/2 of soup mixture. Add chicken and cheese. Pour remaining soup and top with chips and cheese. Bake at 350 until hot and bubbly.

Final judging of the contestants is to be based on knowledge of their subject, speaking ability, poise, personality and appearance.

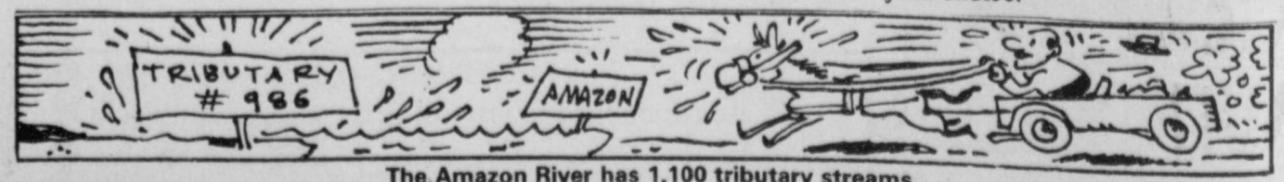
Cooper Rodeo Seeking Queen and Princess

H.I.V. Testing & Confidentiality Procedures Released By SRBC

Many questions have been raised recently regarding HIV testing and its confidentiality. Stewart Regional Blood Center President and C.E.O. Bill Grimes says that the blood center would like to clarify misconceptions on the subject.

SRBC has never collected an HIV-positive on a high school student, according to Grimes. This means that the center has never drawn a unit of blood that has tested positive for the Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV), the virus that causes Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), from a student at a high school blood drive. It is quite possible that a high school-aged individual could test positive for HIV if they are participating in high risk behavior such as IV drug use or sexual activity with multiple partners. It is stressed to potential donors that one should never donate blood to get an AIDS test. Local testing center information is readily available to those who are interested in getting such testing.

Once a unit of blood is drawn, the following steps occur in HIV testing and notification. The unit is tested singly. Units nonreactive for all tests are released into inventory. The reactive unit is repeated in duplicate. If two or three of the three tests are reactive, the unit is rejected and the donor is placed on the permanent deferral list. A sample is sent to have the Western Blot performed, which is the confirmatory test for HIV. The three possible Western Blot results are negative, indeterminate, or positive. The Western Blot results determine how a donor is notified. If the Western Blot is negative, according to FDA protocol, the donor is eligible for re-entry and the donor is not notified. If the test is indeterminate, the donor is sent a certified letter which states that their blood showed reactivity to our screening test for HIV,

but that it could not be confirmed by the Western Blot. The donor is not eligible to donate. If the Western Blot is positive, the donor is sent a letter which states that their blood showed reactivity to certain blood-borne diseases. They are recommended to contact Patti Calcote, director of technical services for the center, or their personal physician immediately. A Consent to Release of Donor Information must be completed and signed prior to results being released to anybody other than the donor. The donor is not ever eligible to donate.

Grimes also stated that "you cannot contract HIV or any other disease from donating blood." Sterile needles are used for each donor. The needles are used only once and then discarded according to FDA procedures.

The only test reportable to the state by the blood center is the RPR (syphilis) test. State law requires that blood center reports these positive results to the state health department. These donors are deferred from donating blood for one year, and must prove that treatment was completed prior to being eligible to donate again. The donor is deferred for a year because the individuals may have participated in activities that put them at risk for HIV. These donors also receive a certified letter.

Donating blood is a safe, simple procedure. No diseases can be contracted through the donation of blood. Donor confidentiality is of the utmost importance to Stewart Regional Blood Center. The demand for blood increases at the rate of 10% per year, yet only 5% of the eligible donor population donates, according to Grimes. With this increase in demand, it is essential to attract new blood donors. For this reason the public needs to be aware of "truth" about donating blood and donor confidentiality.

Miss McWhorter challenged all the men and women at the meeting to do the Lord's work; whatever it may be. She told everyone she needed help at the mission and challenged everyone to take a part. Following Miss McWhorter's speech, a covered dish dinner was served.

The certificates states "It is people like you who are a credit to the officiating profession and who are willing to give up their time to make high school athletics a better activity for our young people."

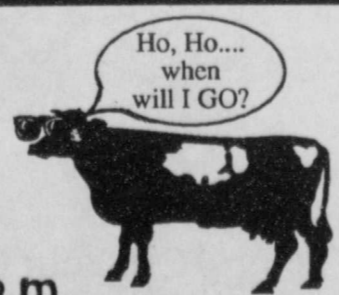

3,079 Highway Traffic Deaths Reported In 1991

Fewer people died in Texas traffic accidents during 1991 than any year since 1974, figures compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety show.

Last year, 3,079 traffic deaths were reported on the state's streets and highways, compared with 3,243 deaths in 1990. That amounts to a 5.1% decrease.

"This is the sixth time in the past seven years that Texas has seen a drop in the number of traffic fatalities," said DPS Director Col. James R. Wilson. "We're very pleased at this, but we aren't losing sight of the fact that more than 3,000 people died on our roadways last year. We're going to continue doing everything we can to see that traffic deaths stay on the decline in this state."

The death rate on Texas roadways also decreased, Wilson said.

"For every 100 million miles traveled in Texas last year, only 1.9 deaths

occurred," the Director said. "By way of comparison, in 1981, when a record 4,701 persons died in Texas traffic accidents, the death rate was 3.9. This means our roadways have become significantly safer in recent years."

In 1991, alcohol or drug-related accidents continued to be a leading cause of traffic fatalities. Of the 3,079 deaths, 1,249 fatalities, 40.6%, were alcohol or drug-related, DPS statistics showed.

An analysis of last year's traffic statistics also showed nearly two thirds of those killed in the front seats of passenger cars and light trucks had not been wearing seat belts.

Other factors contributing to lower traffic deaths in Texas are the decline in the social acceptability of drinking and driving, tougher prosecution of DWI offenders, safety belts, air bags and driver education efforts.

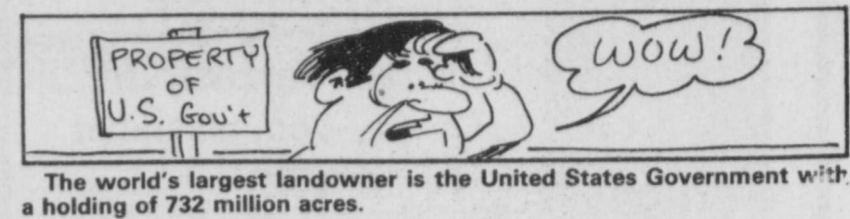

Mammography Cancer Exams Being Offered

Mammography breast cancer examinations are being offered to eligible women through a screening program provided by the Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7.

If you are forty years of age or older and interested in obtaining a mammogram, contact the Public Health Region 7 field office clinic nearest to you for an eligibility determination.

Mammography screening, an x-ray procedure, has become vital in early detection and diagnosis of breast cancer, which is "currently the number two killer of American women", according to The American Cancer Society. "In the United States, one out of every nine women will develop breast cancer at some time during her life."

The mammography project, which is funded by the Texas Cancer Council and the Centers for Disease Control, is aimed at detection of breast cancer at the earliest possible stage. It can detect extremely small breast cancers too small to be felt by breast self-exam techniques.

Mammography also shows other changes in breast tissue that could represent a sign of very early cancer. A baseline mammogram is of value because it can be referred to for later comparison.

Medical authorities emphasize that the earlier breast cancer is discovered--and the smaller it is at the time of discovery--the better the chance for cure.

Crackdown On Illegal Signs Is Eminent By TxDOT

The Texas Department of Transportation is cracking down on illegal signs along major highways in the state. Threatened with the loss of \$105 million in Federal-aid highway funds, the department has stepped up its efforts to remove any illegal signs along highway rights-of-way.

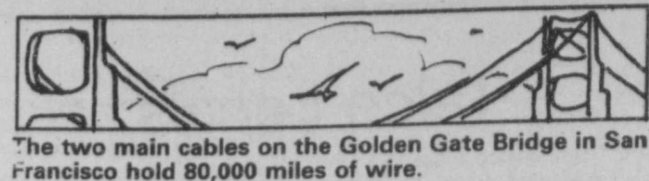
The Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 which was signed by President George Bush in 1991, mandates that states enforce federal laws concerning illegal signs or face a 10% cut in Federal-aid highway funds.

Signs can be posted on private property if they are licensed and permitted under current billboard

guidelines. Any signs that are erected along Interstate or other highways that receive Federal highway funding and are not licensed are to be removed.

The department will soon begin notifying owners of illegal signs that they have 90 days from the notice to remove the signs. If the owners do not remove the signs, TxDOT personnel will, leaving the owner subject to the cost of removal and possible fine.

Questions regarding placement and licensing of signs can be answered by contacting local highway district or maintenance offices.
