Three Candidates File For Talco-Bogata CISD Trustee Positions

Three candidates have filed for the two positions up for election in the upcoming Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustee election to be held Saturday, May 2.

Kip Stansell will run unopposed for Position #2, a position he now holds. This position is for a three year term.

Rue Anna Bell, who is filling Position #5's unexpired term of Tommie Corbell, has filed her candidacy for election to that position, as well as Frank Stubblefield.

Bell filed her candidacy with the following statement, "I was appointed to the Board when Tommie Corbell resigned his position. They felt I would be a good member because I had the incentive to run in the 1991 election, had children in school, have always taken an active part in my children's education and believe that I can help teachers give the children the education they deserve.

My husband, Regan, and I moved back to Bogata 14 years ago. Regan was from Rosalie and wanted his children to go to school in Bogata where he attended grade school. We now live in Fulbright and have three children, LaTonya, a junior; Crystal, eighth grader; and Brandon, fourth grader.

I am active in community services, PTO and Acteens and am a

leader at FBC in Bogata."

Frank Stubblefield, a lifelong resident of Bogata, announced his candidacy with the following statement:

I am a graduate of Bogata High School, attended Paris Junio College and received a BS degree in mathematics and physical education from East Texas State University. I hold a masters degree in education as well as administrative certificates from ETSU. In addition, I have participated in a wide range of workshops and conferences concerning education and have served on a Texas Education Agency accreditation team.

I am a United States Air Force combat veteran, serving as a gunner on a B-29 bomber during the Korean War.

I have 29 years of experience in education, having taught mathematics and physical education at both junior high and high school levels. I coached the 1980 state championship Rebellete basketball team and served 15 years as principal of Bogata Elementary-Junior High School, from 1962-74 and again from 1985-88 when I retired.

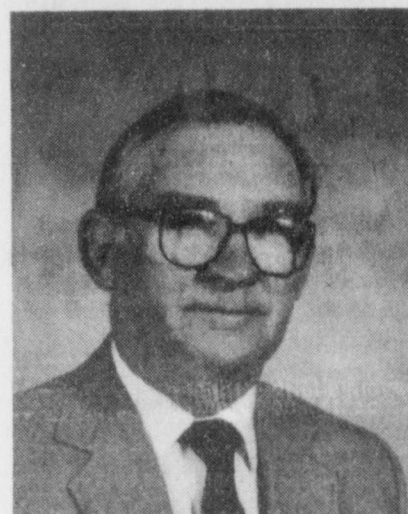
I was postmaster in Bogata from 1957-61. I am a member of the First United Methodist Church in Bogata and chairman of the Bogata City Park Board. My wife, Anita, taught home

economics at Talco High School, Bogata High School and Rivercrest High School. She retired in 1986. We have three daughters who are graduates of Rivercrest High School.

I feel that Talco-Bogata CISD is a good school system. I have always been very proud of the schools and would like to be of service in any way possible."

Kip Stansell, Talco, will run unopposed for Position #2. He is the owner-operator along with his father, Jerry Stansell of Buck's Welding and Machine Shop in Talco. He and his wife, Kelly, have two children, Kyle, a third grader and Kendall, a second grader at Talco. He has served the past three years on the Board and has been instrumental in many of the program changes and improvements. Concluding his statement of candidacy, Stansell stated "Your support will be appreciated."

Polling places for the election are Talco Elementary School and the Bogata Cafeteria. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on that day. Absentee voting will be conducted each weekday at Rivercrest High School between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. beginning April 13 and ending April 28, with the exceptions of April 17 and April 20. Deadline for ballot by mail is April 24.

Agricultural Briefs

By Paul D. Payne
CEA-AG, Lamar County

Based on the latest information, area wheat fields could be in line for a severe leaf rust problem. There is a very heavy leaf rust infestation in areas west of here and the likelihood of it spreading this direction is great.

The decision to apply a fungicide or not to apply is an individual one. All of the conditions are right for an outbreak, but there are many variables that should be considered. There is not much time to ponder the situation as once the head is out there are very few options. Most area wheat will be booted in the next few days if it has not already booted.

There are other fungicides that can be used on wheat and in particular after the plants have reached the boot stage. Bayleton is the other systemic fungicide and it has a pretty good effective record. Some wheat producers are applying a mixture of Bayleton and either Dithane or Manzate. The other two are contact fungicides.

Lamar County Pecan Field Day will be Saturday morning at Logee's Jubal Pecan Orchard. A full morning of demonstration will be conducted by members of the County Fruit and Nut Committee beginning at 9 a.m. Everyone interested in pecan management is invited to participate.

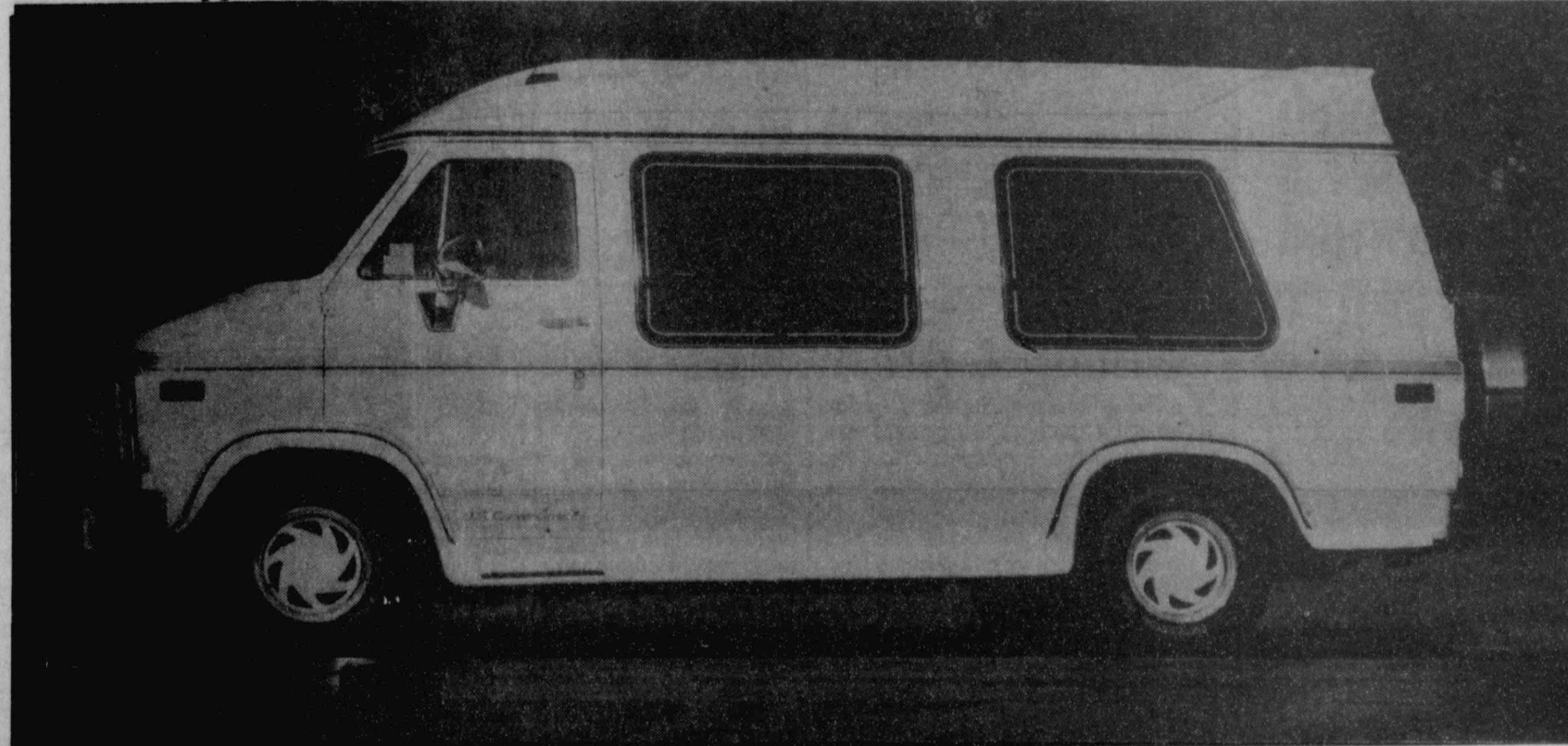

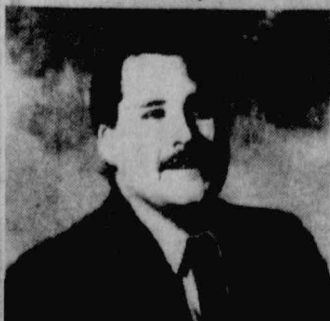

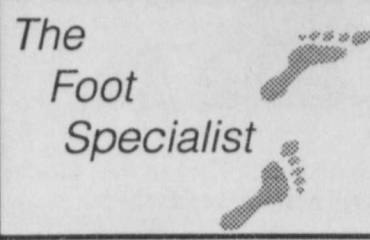

VERY REAL 'PHANTOM PAIN'

Can you feel pain in a foot or toe that has been amputated? Ask anyone who has lost an appendage due to accident or surgery and the answer will likely be an anguished "Absolutely!" Although phantom pain is still something of a mystery, we know that remaining nerves continue to process pain messages in ways that register in the brain identically to the way they did when the messages were sent by the once-present tissue. In years past, there wasn't much that could be done for the excruciating sensations of pain that resulted. Today, several techniques are effective. Whirlpool baths and motion exercises are surprisingly successful. Injection of local anesthetic into the area of the amputation can also help.

P.S. If other methods fail, surgical removal of scar tissue or the regional nerve supply may be in order to stop "phantom pain."

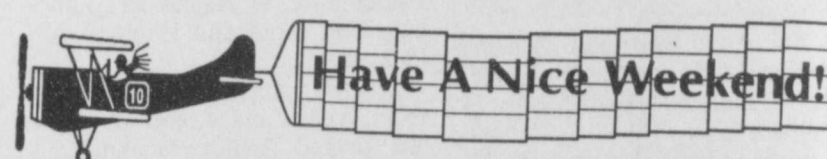

Texas Cities Receive \$100 Million In Rebates

State Comptroller John Sharp sent sales tax payments totaling \$89.4 million to 974 Texas cities, an 8.8% increase over the \$82.1 million received by cities last April. Checks to 106 Texas counties totaled another \$9.9 million, up 8.1% over last April's rebate of \$9.2 million.

"Overall payments to Texas cities and counties have increased each month this year, indicating slow economic improvement and a gradual increase in consumer confidence," Sharp said.

"Over the past year, Houston and the surrounding area have lead growth in the state," Sharp said. "A gain of 4,300 jobs in the trade sector over the past year has helped boost increased retail sales that have hiked Houston's tax allocations by more than three percent. While growth is slower than in recent months, Houston's economy remains positive."

Ft. Worth, where the economy has been devastated by defense-related manufacturing cutbacks and the national recession, received \$2.6 million, a 2.4% decline over the \$2.7 million rebate in 1991.

"Still, the rate of decline is slower than in past months. The drop in construction activity appears to be bottoming out, with employment dropping by only 100 jobs since March," Sharp said. "On the up side, Ft. Worth's transportation industry continues to benefit from airport expansion, and strong growth has also been experienced in government and service employment."

Bogata received \$1,715.26 for a 2.04% decrease while Clarksville received \$14,969.84 for a 5.60% increase.

Blossom received \$1,450.50 for a .82% decrease and Deport received \$672.48 for a 6.54% increase over 1991. Paris received \$169,387.875 for a 6.54% decrease.



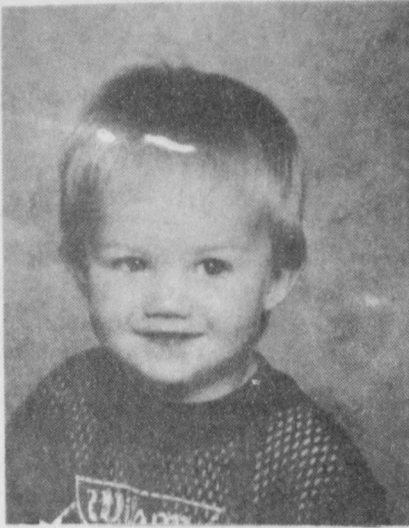

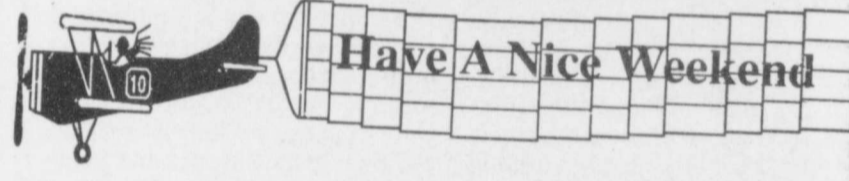

COUNTY OF TITUS
ORDINANCE NO. 1-911-92
Ordinance/Rules Establishing Property Addressing Standards to include naming streets, numbering property notification, and enforcement.
Section 1: There is hereby established the following addressing standards for numbering property and naming public streets/roads within the incorporated areas of the City of Talco (and any other area by joint agreement of municipalities). Structures within this area are subject to addressing in accordance with this order.
Section 2: Street naming and property numbering procedures shall be established in conjunction with the platting and subdivision requirements of the City of Talco.
a. A survey and inventory of all public street names within the City boundaries shall be prepared by the City within three (3) months for use with addressing procedures. Property needing street naming or number assignment on public roads will be identified. Duplicate names or similar-sounding names will be repealed and renamed on the recommendation of staff and the approval by the commissioner's court.
b. Street Name Criteria: Non-duplicative of existing names, limited to thirty (30) characters, no similar-sounding names. Directionals are spelled out (North). Dead-ending roads may not be designated streets but cul-de-sacs, cove or court. Other road types may be classified (boulevard must include median or be a minimum of 150 feet in width) as appropriate by the City.
Name changes are considered for historical or clarification purposes and are limited to reconsideration three (3) years hence. Name changes must meet same criteria established for new street names. Petition for change must be presented with signatures from 3/4 of property owners and traffic volume may be considered as additional criteria.
c. Property Numbering Criteria: Number assignment is based upon a grid system: center point within the community, with axis forming base line, north-south line being 6th, and east-west line being Broad. Block assignments will be consist of 300 feet per block where possible. Number assignment progresses from the center point outward each direction, with the interval distance of 50 feet allowed for each number. Traveling from the center point, odd numbers assigned to the left and even numbers to the right street side.
d. Final approval of new street names and name change requests resides with City of Talco (examples-

Social Security Notes

Social Security pays survivors benefits to approximately 245,000 widowed mothers and fathers with at least one child under the age of 16. For a widowed parent with two children in this age group, the average monthly benefit last year was just over \$1,200, or about \$14,500 for the year. But for a number of families receiving survivors benefits, the amounts were considerably less. When their earned income also is low, these families may benefit from a special tax provision—the Earned

Income Credit. The credit is based on earned income and is available to low-income families who have at least one child living at home. While all tax credits are applied directly against any tax owed, the EIC is the only one under federal tax law that is "refundable". That means if income levels

are so low that no taxes are owed, taxpayers could still qualify for a refund of up to \$2,020.

Most working families with earnings between \$6,000 and \$13,000 qualify for a credit of at least \$1,000

per family. The maximum basic credit is \$1,235 for a family with two or more children. A new supplement provides up to \$357 more for a child born in 1991, and up to a maximum of \$428 to help buy health insurance that covers a qualifying child or children.

The credit decreases as income rises above \$11,249. It is eliminated when income exceeds \$21,250.
