The 911 emergency system will go into effect soon in Talco, and all citizens are reminded that each house in the city limits should be numbered within 90 days.

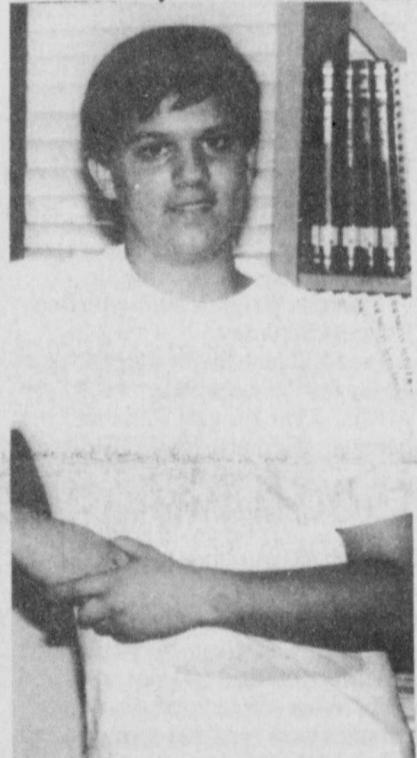
Each house in the city has been assigned a number. Anyone needing to know their house number can find out from City Hall in Talco. These

house numbers are also printed out on water bills sent out to Talco customers each month.

Citizens are responsible for their own numbers. These numbers need to be at least 3 inches tall and be placed on houses in a location that is visible from the road.

These numbers need to be installed as soon as possible. The numbers are to everyone's benefit.

In case of an emergency such as a fire, medical emergency or need for law enforcement the numbers will be crucial in locating the source of the emergency.

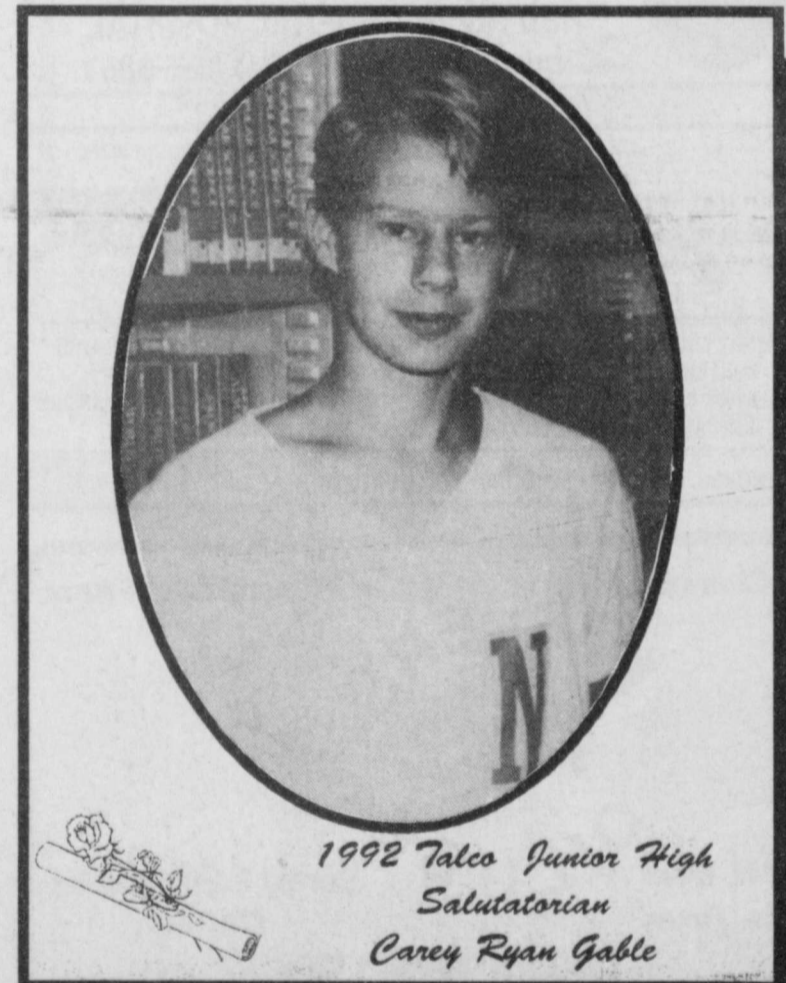
Gospel and country music will be featured by area talent and homemade ice cream will be served at no cost.

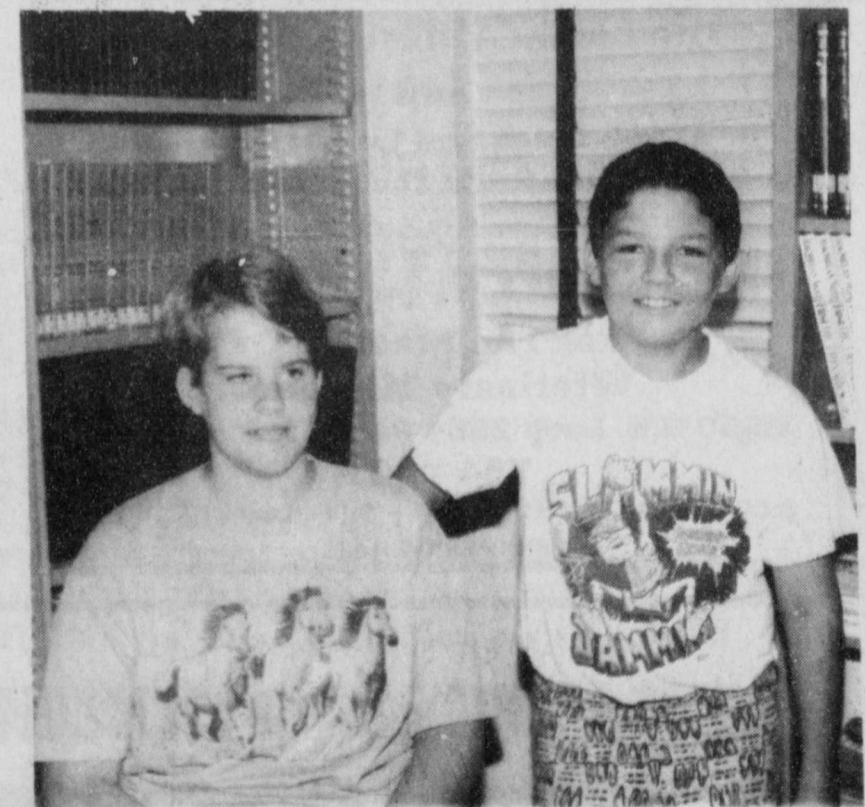

Pinto BEans & Hot Links

- 1 lb. pinto beans
- 4 hot links
- garlic powder to taste
- cayenne pepper to taste
- salt and black pepper to taste
- chili powder to taste

Cook beans until nearly done. Add all other ingredients. Cook until completely done.

Mexican Dinner

- 1 lb. hamburger
- 1 small onion
- 1-10 oz. can Rotel or plain tomatoes
- 1-15 oz. can chili beans
- 1 can Cream of Chicken soup
- 1-99¢ pkg. of cheese flavored Nacho Dorritos

Brown hamburger meat, onion, salt and pepper (drain). In same pan with hamburger, add tomatoes, beans and soup. Heat until it bubbles. Line casserole with cheese flavored Nacho Dorritos. Top with hamburger mixture, cover with grated cheese. Bake until cheese melts. Put tomatoes in blender to avoid large chunks.

Cowboy Coffee Cake

- 2 cans (10-12) refrigerated biscuits
- 1 stick margarine
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 tsp. cinnamon

Overlap biscuits in 8 or 9 inch cake pan in a spiral fashion. Combine melted margarine, brown sugar, cinnamon; spread over biscuits. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes.

Peach Dump Cake

- Spray 9x9 cake pan with Pam. Layer all ingredients in following order:
- 1-16 oz. can sliced peaches in heavy syrup
- 1 medium can crushed pineapple
- 1 yellow cake mix (do not mix)
- Slice 2 sticks margarine and melt. Pour this over the cake mix. Bake for 1 1/2 hours at 250.

Pudding Pecan Pie

- 1 box (3.4 oz.) vanilla or butterscotch instant or reg. pudding and pie filling
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 3/4 cup evaporated milk
- 1 egg slightly beaten
- 1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts
- 1 unbaked 9" pie shell

Preheat oven to 375. Blend pudding mix, corn syrup in a medium sized bowl, using electric mixer on low speed. Gradually add evaporated milk and egg, beating until well blended. Stir in pecans. Pour mixture into pie shell and bake for about 40 minutes or until top is firm and just beginning to crack. Remove from oven and cool at least 3 to 4 hours before serving.

Ginger Crinkle Cookies

- 2/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup molasses
- 2 cups all purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp. ground ginger
- 1/2 cup sugar

Combine oil and 1 cup sugar in a large mixing bowl. Add egg and beat well. Stir in molasses. Combine flour, salt, soda, cinnamon and ginger, add to molasses mixture, stirring well. Roll dough into 1" balls, roll each ball in remaining 1/2 cup sugar. Place balls 2" apart on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 for 6 minutes. Remove to wire rack to cool, yields about 4 dozen.

Fruit Salad

- 1 can cherry pie filling
- 1 can Eagle Brand milk
- 1 can crushed pineapple (do not drain)
- 1 medium Cool Whip

Combine all ingredients. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

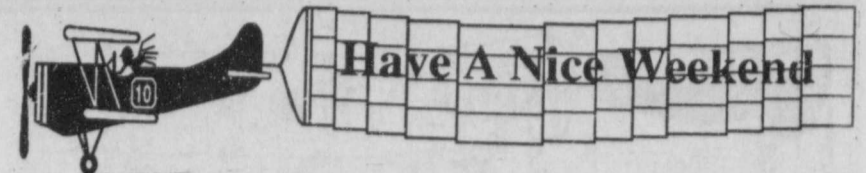

Purple flowers grew in the crannies of the massive stone walls as we emerged into a gray but rainless day.

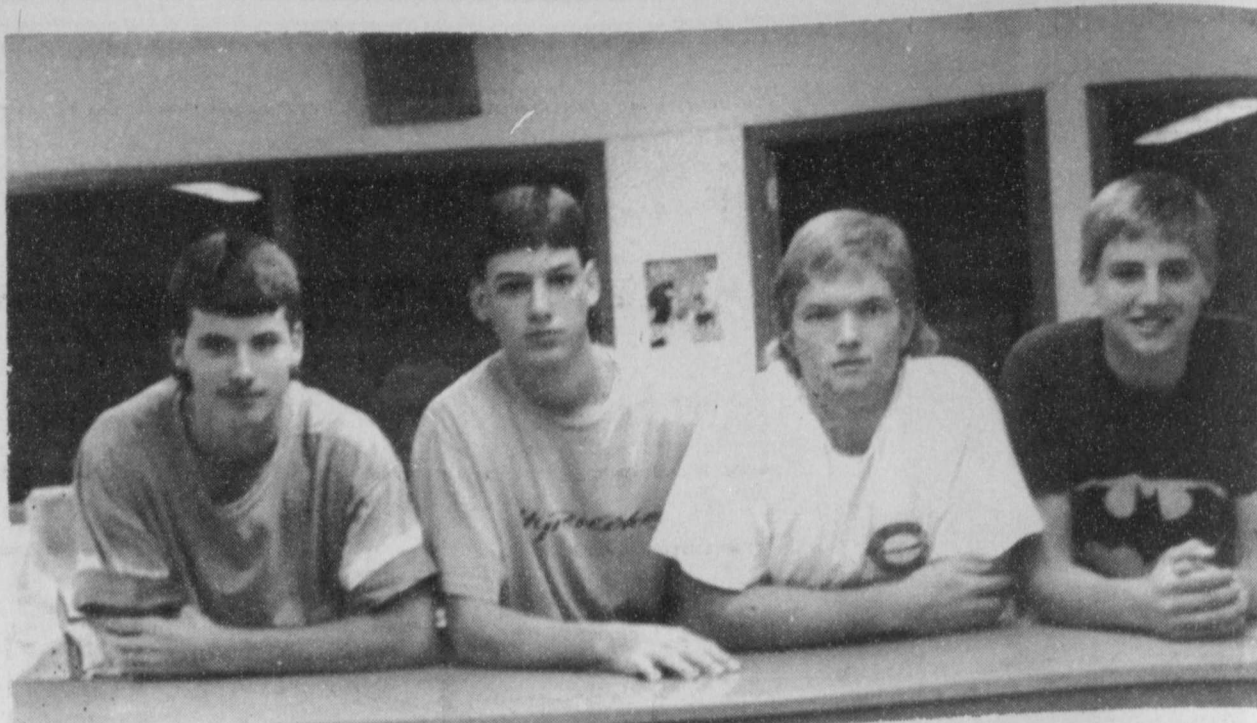

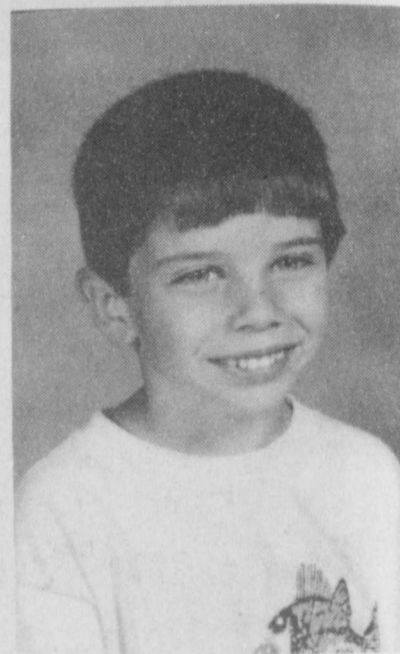
