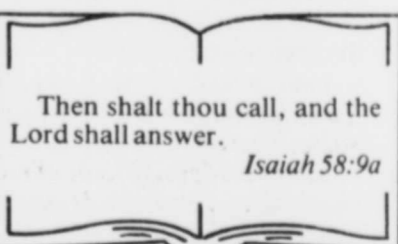

Pudding Cake

1 pkg. (2 layer size) cake mix; 1 pkg. (4 serving size) Jello Instant Pudding; 1 cup water; 4 eggs; 1/4 cup vegetable oil

Combine all ingredients in large mixing bowl. Blend; beat 2 minutes. Pour into greased and floured 10" bundt or tube pan. Bake at 350 for 50 minutes or until center springs back when lightly touched. Cool 15 minutes; remove from pan and finish cooling. A 13x9" pan may be used; bake 45 minutes. Try these flavor combinations.

Pudding	Cake Mix
1. Chocolate	Chocolate,
2. Vanilla	Devils Food
3. French Vanilla	Yellow,
4. Lemon	White, Banana
	Yellow, white,
	lemon

Add desired frosting.

No Crust Pumpkin Pie

1 cup sugar
1/2 cup baking mix or self-rising flour
1 can evaporated milk
2 eggs
1-16 oz. can pumpkin
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 teaspoons vanilla

Spray pie pan with Pam. Blend all ingredients until smooth. Pour into pie pan. Bake 50-55 minutes at 350.

Non-roll Out Pie Crust

1 1/2 cups flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup vegetable oil
1/4 cup milk

Mix ingredients thoroughly and pat into pie pan. Add desired filling and cook.

Peanut Butter Bars

(Reese's Cup)

2 sticks melted butter (1 cup)
1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
2 1/3 cups powdered sugar
1 cup peanut butter
1-12 oz. pkg. chocolate chips

Mix butter, crumbs, sugar and peanut butter together. Press into 9x13 pan.

Melt chips in separate bowl and stir until smooth. Spread over peanut butter mixture.

Cool in refrigerator. Cut into squares after it has cooled a few minutes (before the chocolate hardens too much.) Return to refrigerator.

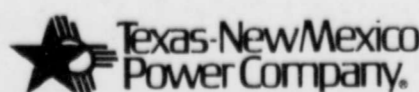

SWEET POTATO FLANS

Makes 10 servings
Preparation: 20 to 25 minutes
Cooking: About 1 hour

- 1 1/4 pounds sweet potatoes
- 3 eggs
- 3 egg yolks
- 1 to 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 cup hot (170 degrees) melted unsalted butter
- Salt and ground white pepper
- Nutmeg
- Hot red pepper sauce
- 3 tablespoons softened unsalted butter

1. Put potatoes in 4-quart soup kettle; cover with cold water. Cover and boil until potatoes are soft, about 35 to 40 minutes. Drain, cool, peel, and cut potatoes into 1 1/2-inch chunks; set aside.

2. Put eggs, egg yolks, and 1 tablespoon lemon juice in a food processor fitted with the metal blade. Process, adding hot melted butter. Pulse in 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, a pinch of nutmeg, and several dashes hot pepper sauce. Adjust seasoning to taste.

3. Add half the potatoes and process until minced. Add remaining potatoes and process to a fine, silky puree. Adjust seasoning, adding lemon juice, salt, pepper, nutmeg, and hot red pepper sauce to taste.

4. Adjust oven rack to lowest position. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Use softened butter to generously coat ten 1/2-cup porcelain ramekins or heatproof custard cups. Spoon puree into the molds. Cover each mold with a buttered wax-paper square, buttered side down.

5. Put filled molds in a baking dish lined with a thin tea towel. Add enough hot tap water to reach halfway up the sides of the molds (do not allow dishes to float). Bake 30 to 35 minutes. (Can turn off oven, leave door ajar, cover with foil, and keep warm for 30 minutes.)

6. To serve, remove wax paper, and loosen each flan from its mold by carefully passing a thin knife around the inside edge. Carefully invert the molds on warm plates. Serve immediately.

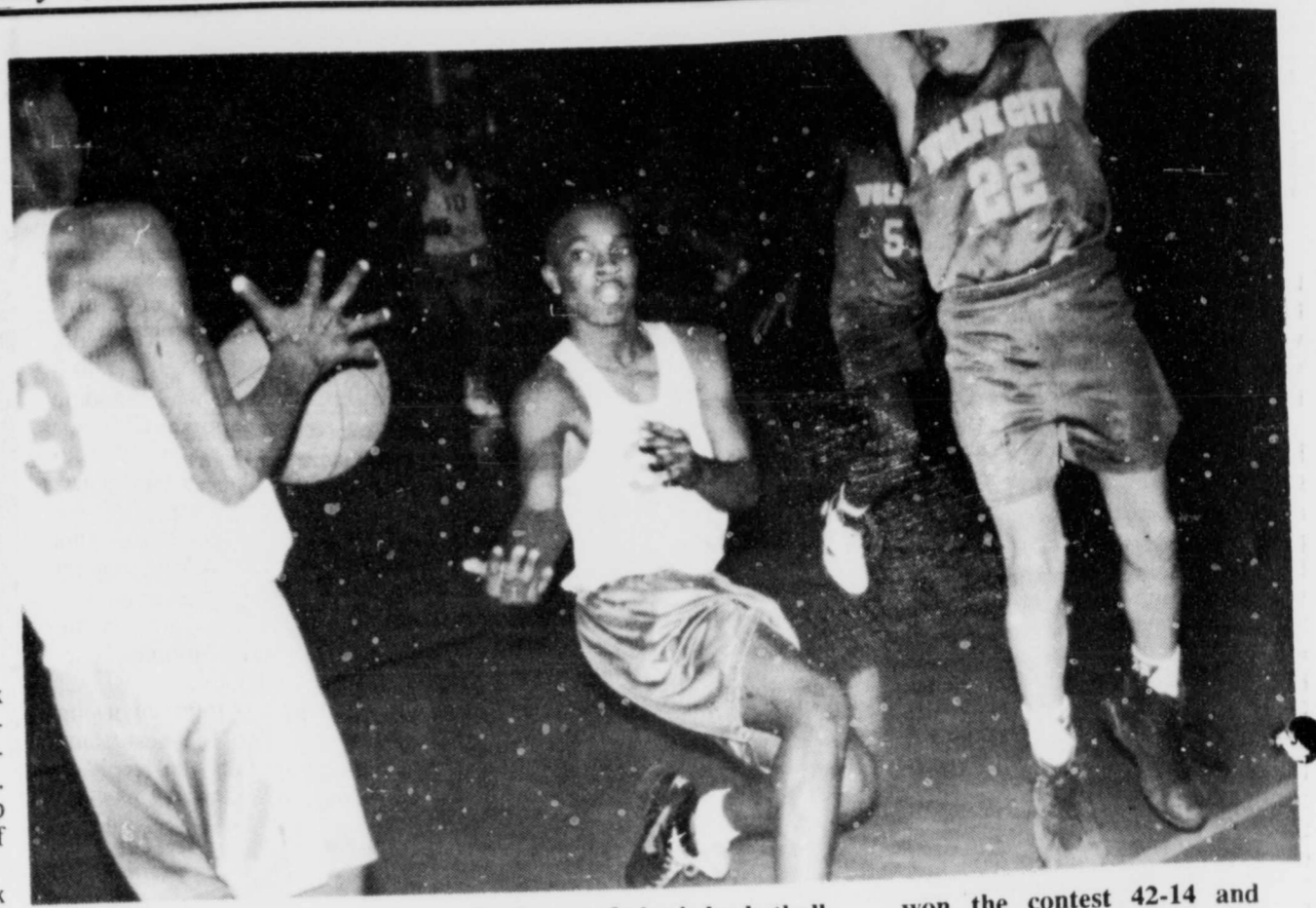

The other Rebels seeing lots of

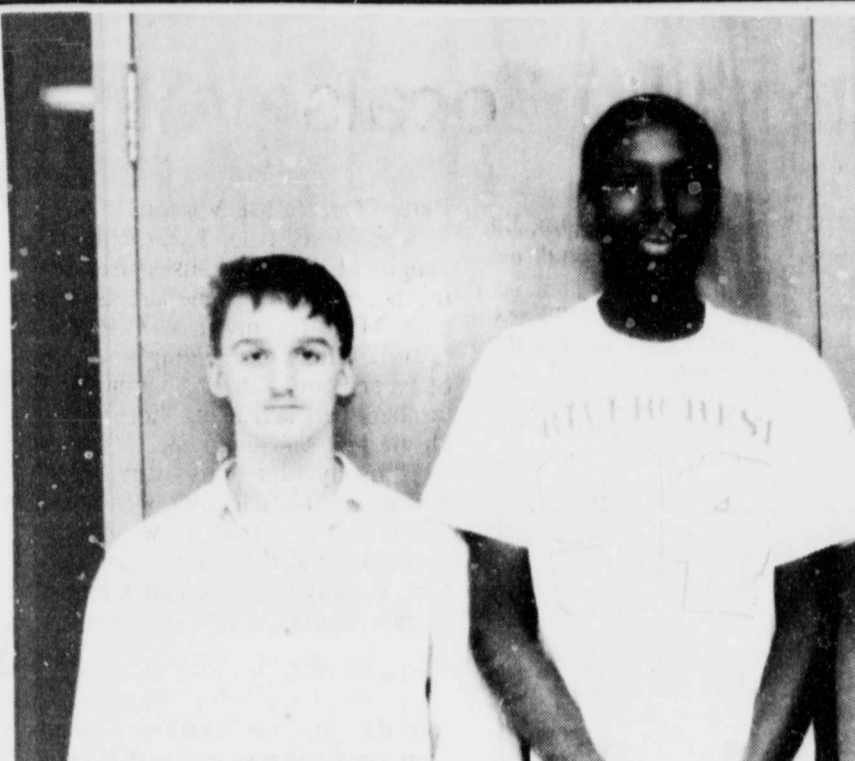

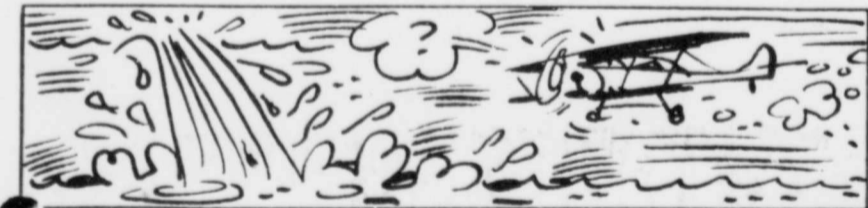

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guide-

lines, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. 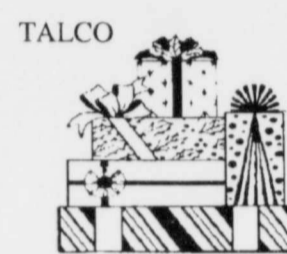



