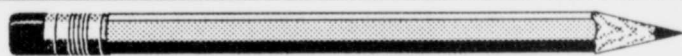

Jone is the cook I asked if I could feature this week, but when I asked her what she enjoyed cooking most, she said, "I don't like to cook." She quickly reassured me by telling me that she cooks all the time, and for many people. There are just other things she enjoys doing much more than cooking. I think I appreciated her honesty.

Jone is the Talco City Secretary and has been for about 15 years. Jerry is retired from TU Electric.

The Clemmons have two sons. Craig works at Kimberly Clark in Paris, and his wife Kristi is a teacher in Bogata. They have two daughters, Kayla, who is 4, and Keylee is 14 months old. Kyle Clemmons graduated from ETSU and works at Talco State Bank. His wife, Robin, is a dental assistant in Mt. Pleasant.

When I drove up, I noticed these odd looking chain link fences being finished in the front yard. I asked Jone what they were for. She laughed and said, "Come on in and I'll tell you." It seems that they, Jone and Jerry, are about to start raising Ostriches. They have been to seminars and studied for months so that they will know exactly what they are doing when they purchase these exotic birds. I plan to follow up on this at a later date.

After I learned that Jone doesn't

like to cook, I asked her what she does enjoy. About that time, a puppy fell in the swimming pool. Jone said that besides playing with her grandchildren, she enjoys working in the yard more than anything. Jone kept on talking while she got a towel for the puppy, and told me that she had had the same experience the puppy had only at the time she was on a riding lawn mower. She wasn't injured. She is also sharing that with us.

I really enjoyed my visit with Jone, and plan to go back when they get the ostrich business going.

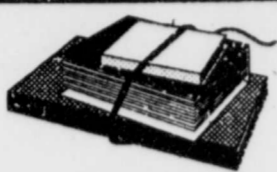

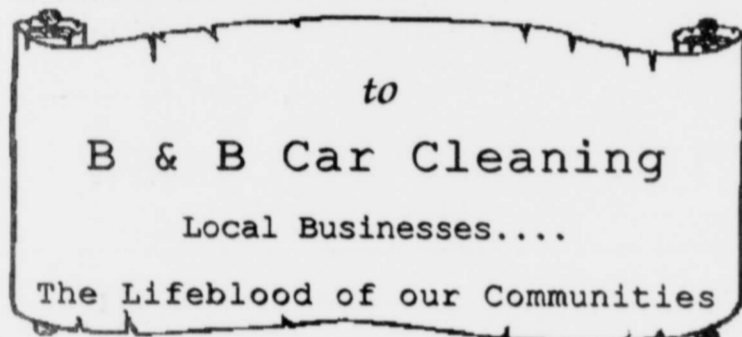

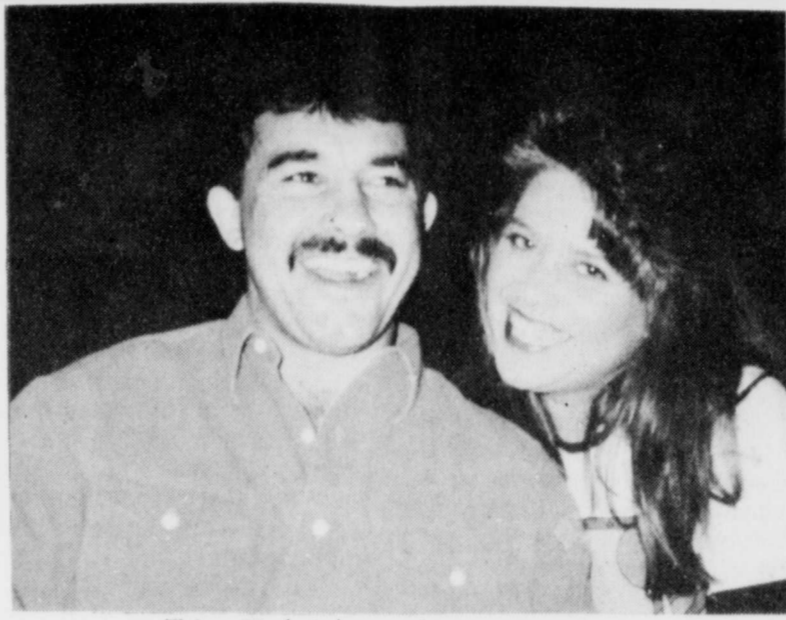

Postmaster Advises Public To Avoid Last Minute Rush

Bogata Postmaster Ronald Thurman encourages the public to mail their Federal Internal Revenue Service tax returns before the Thursday, April 15 deadline and avoid the last minute rush to the post office. Thurman reminds postal customers to use adequate postage (29 cents for the first ounce and 23 cents for each additional ounce up to 11 ounces) and have a legible return address when mailing tax returns. "The Internal Revenue Service will

not accept postage due mail, and this mail will be returned to sender. Because local postal authorities are prohibited from opening First-Class mail, all local postage due mail without a return address must be sent to the U.S. Postal Service's regional Dead Letter Office in Atlanta, Georgia to be opened. Mail sent to the

Dead Letter Office may take several weeks to be processed and returned to the sender," the postmaster advised.

On the April 15 deadline, Thurman says that many larger post offices throughout the country will provide midnight collections for the many thousands of tax filers who wait until the last minute to mail their returns.

Locally, the Bogata Post Office, located at 141 North Main Street, will cancel all IRS mail dropped into both collection boxes on the 15th with a 15th postmark.

"If you have any questions about the amount of postage required for your tax returns, call or try to get to your local post office early and we will assist you in getting those tax forms in on time," Thurman said.

CLEAN-UP ORDINANCE #92-05 THE STATE OF TEXAS

City of Bogata
County of Red River

An ordinance establishing regulations covering the cleaning up of all property, declaring certain building conditions a health hazard and unhealthful, declaring same to be unlawful, providing for notice and abatement and the fixing of penalties, making it unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to permit weeds, brush or any objectionable or unsightly matter to grow on their property; prohibiting the growth of cultivated crops within the right-of-way of any public street or easement; making it the duty of any person, firm or corporation to cut and remove all such weeds, et cetera; providing that the cutting and removing of the weeds, et cetera, every thirty (30) days constitutes compliance with this ordinance; providing for notices to owners or other persons violating the terms of this ordinance; authorizing the city to cut such weeds, et cetera, and charge the owners of the property for the cost of cutting such weeds, et cetera, and if charges are not paid the city may file a lien against the property by filing a statement with the County Clerk; providing a savings clause, making and providing for a penalty not to exceed two hundred (\$200.00) dollars for each offense, repealing all conflicting ordinances and containing a severability clause.

WHEREAS, the City Council and the Mayor of the City of Bogata, Texas, have the responsibility to the health, safety and well being of the citizens of the City of Bogata, Texas; and

WHEREAS, the fact that there are both business and residential properties within the city limits of the City of Bogata, Texas, that pose safety, fire and health hazards because the properties are never cleaned;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOGATA, TEXAS:

This ordinance requires that any person who owns property within the city limits of Bogata, Texas, will be responsible for seeing that their property owned by them is kept cleaned and mowed; also, that any "substandard buildings" shall be kept in repair.

Fly Control On Cattle

Spring time is a refreshing time for all. It is always invigorating to see the young grass put out new shoots, to smell the new flowers and to see the newborn calves frolicking in the pasture. However, to the livestock producer it means that the arrival of the horn fly cannot be far off.

There are many products on the market today labeled for control of the horn fly. They come in a variety of formulations - sprays, dusts, dips, injectables, pour-ons, feeds, and fly tags. There is no best method of controlling them. In fact, a combination of these may be most effective.

The insecticide impregnated ear tags have been the major method used to combat the fly in recent years. However, some resistance to the insecticides used in the ear tags has occurred.

Insecticides that are generally used on livestock can be broken down into classes. These are (1) carbamates (sevin); (2) organo-phosphate (diazinon, fenthion, etc.); and (3) syn-

thetic pyrethroids (permethrin, fenvalerate, etc.). Varying the class of insecticides used can slow down the development of resistance.

To reduce the chance of resistance, producers should alternate classes of insecticides that are used each year, according to Dr. James Robinson, Extension Entomologist. Dr. Robinson suggests that a different class of insecticide be used as a spray to knock down the existing flies at the time of tagging.

The following are steps suggested for managing horn flies: alternate the use of pyrethroids and organo-phosphate insecticides each year; apply tags (if they are used) only when adult fly populations on cattle have reached 200-400 flies per animal; and remove the tags when they no longer are doing the job. Never leave the tags in over winter.

Medicare Limits On Physician Charges...If you're on Medicare, here's a story that could happen to you. You're visiting your son in another State and become ill. You call your son's doctor and discover that she doesn't accept assignment on Medicare claims. What does this mean and what can you do? Should you search for a doctor who accepts assignment on Medicare claims? Not necessarily.

When physicians accept assignment on all or some of their Medicare claims, they agree to charge no more than the amount Medicare approves for each service they offer. Since Medicare will pay 80% of the approved charge, this means you will be responsible for paying only 20% of the approved charge.

Physicians who don't accept assignment can charge more than the Medicare-approved amount, but because of a new law, they are limited in the extra amount they can charge you. This year, the most they can charge for Medicare-covered services is 115% of the Medicare-approved amount.

For example, if the Medicare fee schedule amount for treatment by physicians who don't accept assignment in the local area is \$100, the physician who treats you cannot charge more than \$115. When you get your Medicare statement, it gives the Medicare-approved amount for each service.

If you live in Connecticut, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, or New York, your state has laws that could further reduce your costs. In certain cases, such as for participants in the Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) program, physicians must accept assignment for covered services provided to beneficiaries who qualify for QMB.

If you have a physician who doesn't accept assignment on Medicare claims and he or she has exceeded the charge limit for services you've received since January 1, 1991, contact the doctor and ask for a reduction in the charge or a refund. If you cannot resolve the issue with the doctor, contact your local Medicare carrier to ask for help.
