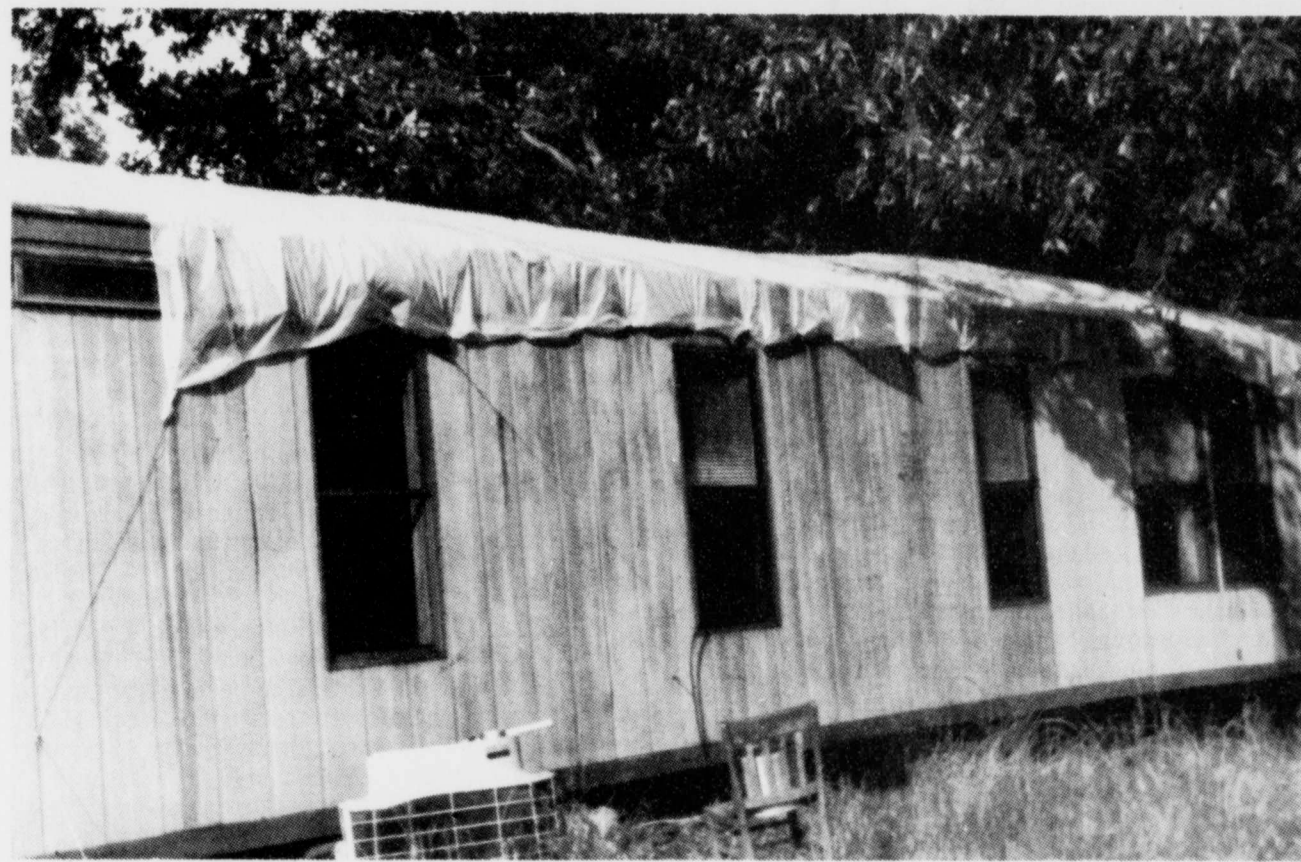

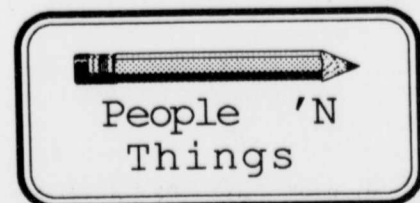
They encourage any women who

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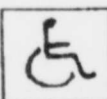
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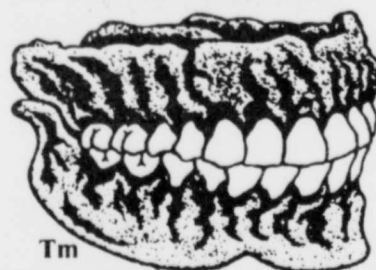
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Scouts Hold Open House At Camp Gambill

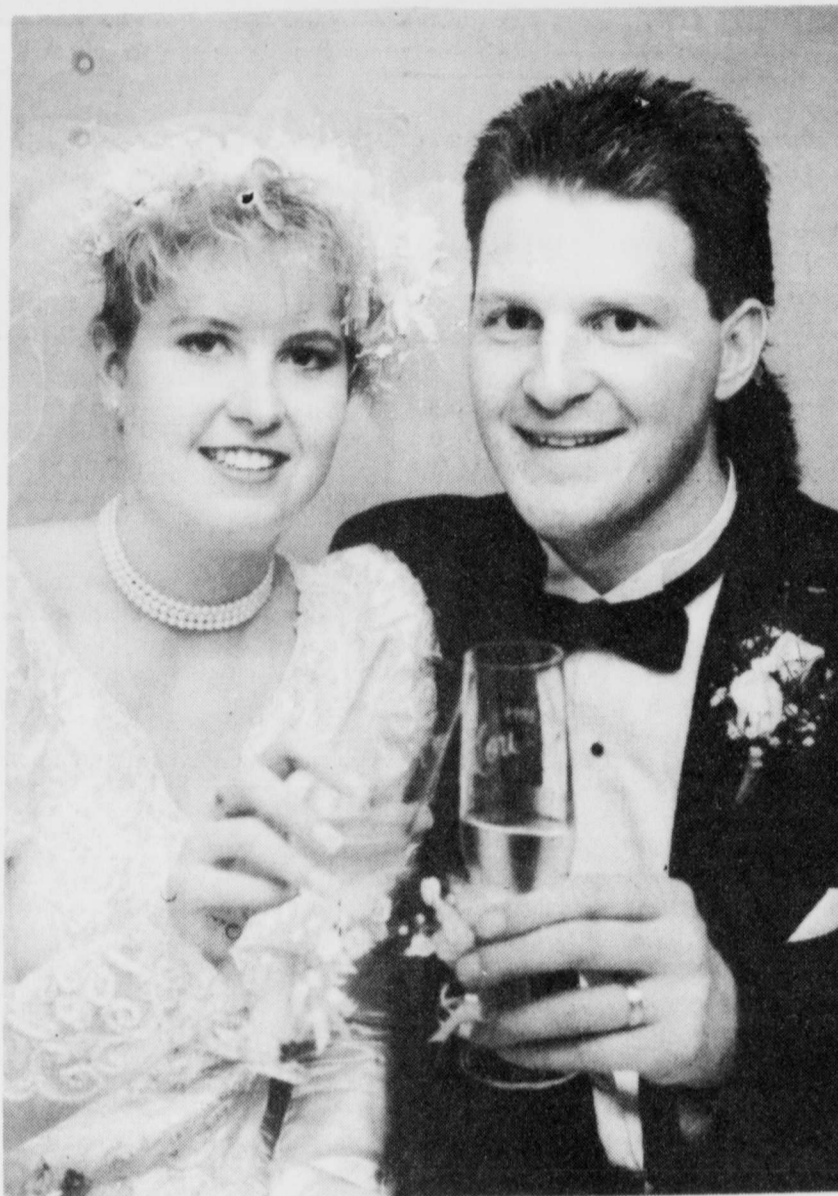
The bride wore a satin gown with sequin and pearl applique. The headpiece was a fingertip headpiece with white satin roses. The groom and his

Detroit Head Start To Have Pre-Enrollment Day

Pre-Enrollment Day will be held on Thursday, April 29, for Detroit Head Start. The day will begin at 9:00 a.m. and conclude after lunch is served. Detroit Head Start serves the entire Red River County.

Students who will be three or four years of age on or before September 1st may register.

All students enrolling must have a birth certificate, Social Security card and an immunization record. Income verification, such as a check stub or

1992 federal tax return, will be needed. Please bring these with you.

Head Start offers social services, dental checks, parent involvement, health services, speech, hearing, and vision test, meals and snack, and special services for the disabled. Transportation will be provided for students who live 2 or more miles from the center.

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of the on-going immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The next clinic will be held May 20.

The clinic will be conducted from 9-11:30 and 1-2:30 at 1300 Highway 37 North, Clarksville, Texas.

Future clinic dates will be held on the first, second and third Thursday of each month. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903)572-9877, or arrive on a walk-in basis.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children beginning at two months of age.

Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

Social Security Notes

May is Older American Month. This year, during May, Older Americans Month will once again salute the contributions of older persons and signal a commitment to renewed efforts to enhance the quality of life for the nation's senior citizens.

Today, the elderly account for an increasing percentage of the world's population. In the United States, the population aged 65 and older grew at a rate more than twice that of the population as a whole during the 1980's and the trend will accelerate as the Baby Boom generation begins to reach retirement age in the early part of the 21st century.

One of the most important links that older Americans have to their government is Social Security. In the Paris service area (including Lamar, Titus, Camp, Delta, Morris, Franklin

and Red River Counties) senior citizens receive \$8,763,1000 each month in Social Security benefits. The other services that we provide to older Americans are important as well. For example, out two offices in Paris and Mr. Pleasant process about 150 new retirement and survivors claims every month, and answer hundreds of questions about Social Security and many general questions about Medicare, help people sign-up for direct deposit, and keep our beneficiaries' records up-to-date by processing changes of address and other reports. 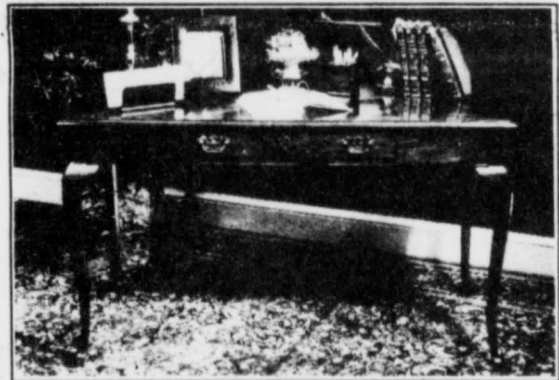

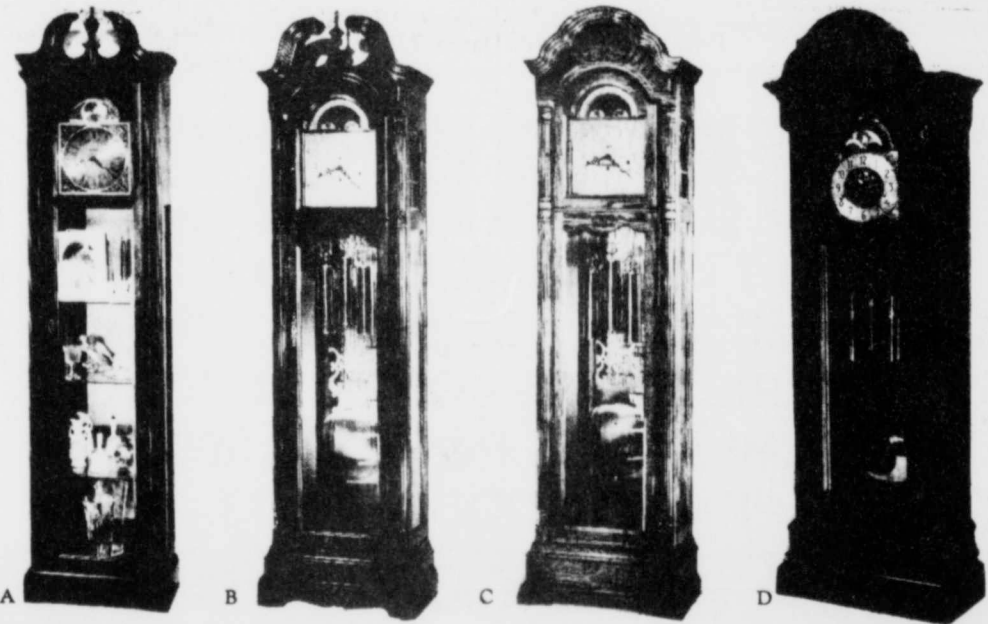

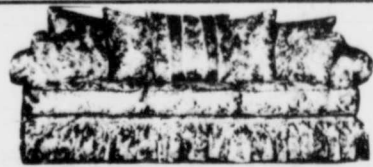

FmHA Has Loan Funds Available For Some

The Farmers Home Administration has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Lamar County, Joan M. Salisbury, said today.

Under this program enacted by congress, socially disadvantaged populations are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA

farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market, Salisbury said.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans,

and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

Persons who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office in their area.

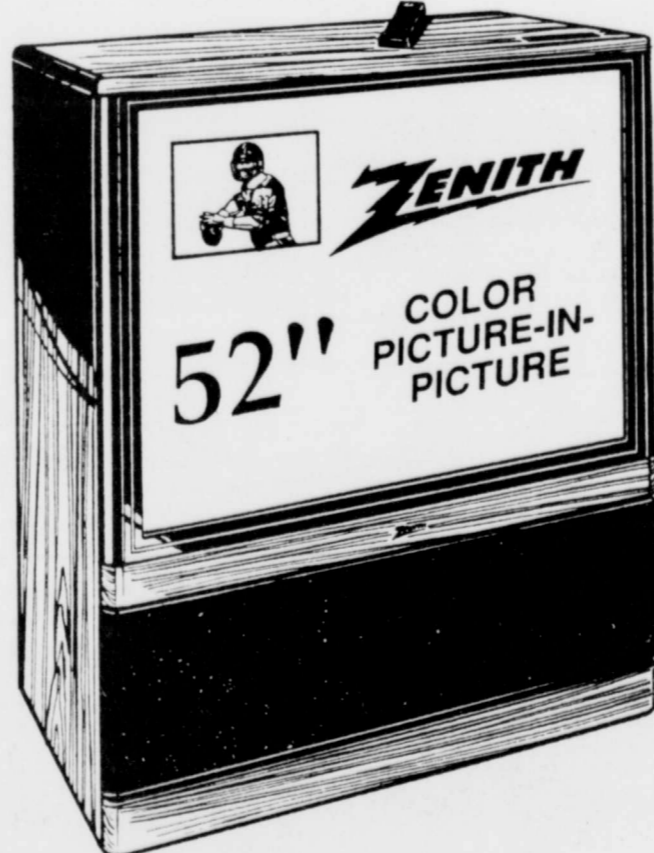

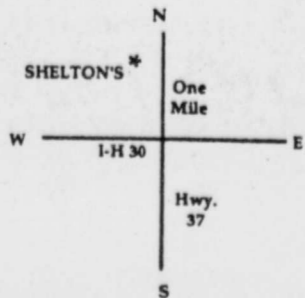

Congressman Jim Chapman Speaker For Field Day

A field day scheduled for Wednesday, June 2, 1993, at the East Texas Plant Materials Center near Nacogdoche, features guided tours of the Center. Continuous tours start at 9:00 a.m. and resume after lunch at 3:00 p.m. Congressman Jim Chapman, the featured speaker, will discuss current agricultural issues at the noon lunch break.

The Center serves almost 50 million acres of eastern Texas and Western Louisiana. Native and introduced plants are collected for testing. After selecting the best strains, cultural techniques are developed to provide and promote their use to address soil and water conservation problems. The tour will show several plant species under evaluation at the East Texas Plant Materials Center.

The USDA-Soil Conservation Service operates or assists with the operation of 26 Plant Materials Cen-

ters nationwide. About 300 plants have been released through centers since 1939 and about 200 are still commercially available today.

Livestock producers, timer managers, mining and utility company representatives, conservation district directors, seed dealers, seed/plant growers, extension agents, wildlife enthusiasts, and others interested in the search for and release of better plants for soil and water conservation needs are invited to attend.

Rebates Offered To Customers Who Buy Heat Pumps

Texas-New Mexico Power Company recently announced changes in the rebates it offers to customers who purchase high efficiency heat pumps for central heating and cooling.

Under the new rebate structure, heat pumps must have a minimum Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio (SEER) of 12.0 to qualify for a rebate. If the unit is equipped with a two-speed or variable speed compressor, the minimum SEER is 11.0.

The new rebates are \$200 per qualifying heat pump. A company spokesperson said the changes were implemented to simplify the rebate program and to raise the standards above the federally mandated standards placed on heating and air conditioning manufacturers.

Rebates of \$200 are also being offered for high efficiency central air conditioning systems. Central air conditioning systems also must have an SEER of at least 12.0. Customers can contact their nearest TNP office for more information about rebates for heat pumps or central air conditioning systems.

A heat pump supplies heating in the winter and air conditioning in the summer. The reason it is so energy-efficient for heating is that it uses electricity to transfer heat, not to create it.

In the summer, a heat pump absorbs heat from indoor air and "pumps" or transfers it outdoors. In the winter, the reverse happens. Heat is absorbed from the cold outdoor air and transferred indoors. This is possible because even at 0 °F, the outdoor air still contains almost 80% of the heat it has at 100°F. When the outdoor temperature approaches freezing, some types of heat pumps rely on a supplemental back-up heating system to help keep a house warmer.

High efficiency heat pumps can offer significant savings to customers who are needing to replace older resistant heating systems or air conditioning equipment, according to research done by the Texas Energy Extension Agency. For instance, by using a high efficiency heat pump to replace an electric furnace and cooling system with an SEER of about 5, a customer can reduce the amount of energy it uses for heating and cooling by about half.

This makes a noticeable difference in overall energy use since heating and cooling are generally the single biggest energy users in a home. Recent advances in heat pump technology have also helped reduce the amount of energy needed for heating and cooling.

One of these advances is the variable speed compressor and fan. Heat pumps using variable speed compressors and indoor fans keep temperatures within 1 degree of the desired thermostat setting. They do so by cycling on and off at a rate and speed dictated by the temperature difference between the house and the thermostat. A regular compressor has to turn on and off at full speed to correct even a minor sway in the temperature settings.

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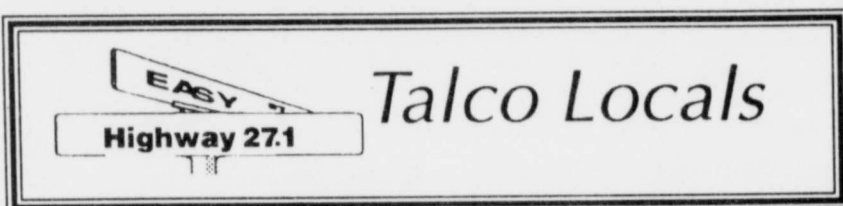

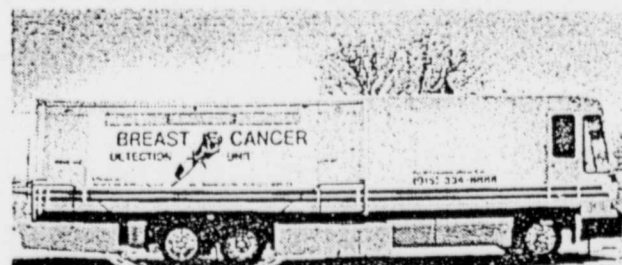
Mr Brower will be available to deliver quick and accurate information on all tax questions, assist with filing tax returns, collect on delinquent taxes and provide other valuable information.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of nine women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

Texas-New Mexico Offers Bank Drafting To Customers

Texas-New Mexico Power Company is now offering an automated bank drafting service to qualifying customers who would like their checking accounts drafted each month for the amount of their electric bill.

To qualify for the service, customers need to have good credit, no more than one insufficient fund check during the past 12 months, and to use a financial institution within the continental United States that accepts the automated payment method.

"There is no extra cost to the customer, and they won't have to worry about mailing the bill or making a special trip to pay the bill in person."

Customers must authorize TNP to start the drafts. Forms are available in TNP offices and will request information such as the customer's bank name, address and account number. Customers will also need to provide a voided check to verify bank information.

Once the application is complete, TNP will require at least 30 days to verify bank information. The customer will continue to receive a regular electric bill during this period and will need to pay the bill as usual. The customer will be notified when the drafting process is ready to begin.
