One Teen Dead In Accident

The traditional last-day-of-school joyousness at Prairiland High School was shattered Thursday, May 27 by a tragic accident which claimed the life of one Prairiland Senior and injured three others.

Sunny Salter, age 18, was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Hospital and Health Center. Trooper John Cross of the Texas Department of Public Safety reported.

Jason McQuatters, 19 was admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital and Cortney Morgan, 15 and Kelly Townsend, 17 were hospitalized at McCuistion Medical Center after the accident.

All four of the teenagers were

thrown from the vehicle when it rolled over.

On Tuesday, June 1, McCuistion Hospital reported that both girls had been released, one over the weekend and the other on Monday.

McQuatters was released from St. Joseph's Hospital on Tuesday, June 1st, hospital officials said.

According to Trooper John Cross of the DPS, McQuatters had been driving the pickup all four were in north toward Pattonville when the accident occurred.

Reports indicate that the driver lost control of the truck while cornering

and pulled the truck onto the east side of the road on to the shoulder area, which was unimproved. The trooper reported that it appeared that when control of the vehicle was attempted the truck turned over on its side and rolled through two revolutions before coming to rest facing south. The accident occurred almost in front of the high school.

At graduation ceremonies Friday night at Prairiland Sunny Salter's chair was draped with his cap and gown, along with flowers, and his diploma presented.

A Lesson From the Geese
* As each bird flaps it's wings, it creates an uplift for the bird following. By flying in a V formation, the whole flock adds 71% more flying range than if each bird flew alone. Lesson: People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier when they are traveling on the thrust of one another. *Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to fly alone, and quickly will return to the proper formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front. Lesson: If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those who are headed where we want to go. * When the lead goose becomes tired, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies at the point position. Lesson: It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing leadership interdependent with each other. * The geese in formation honk from behind to en-

formation and follow him down to help and protect him. They stay with him until he's either able to fly again, or dies. Then they launch out on their own to catch up with their flock, or with another formation. Lesson: If we have as much sense as the geese we'll stand by each other like that.

The Key is to build up, not tear down; encourage, not discourage; lift, not pull down, then we can all share in the joy of reaching common goals and embracing our mission. **

This week readers are going to have to take "Potluck" as my mind seems to be blanker than usual. The recipes should be as good as ever, even if my gift of gab has departed...temporarily, I promise!

GINGERBREAD
 Nora Scoggins
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 cups flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 teaspoons ginger
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/4 cup oil
 1/2 cup Maple syrup
 1/2 cup buttermilk mixed with
 1 teaspoon soda
 1/2 cup raisins
 1/2 cup chopped pecans
 Mix quickly in order. Bake in 400 degree oven for 20 minutes.

SLOPPY JOES
 American Heart Assoc.
 1 pound lean ground beef
 1 onion, diced
 1/2 cup ketchup
 2 tablespoons chili sauce
 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
 1 teaspoon cider vinegar
 1 teaspoon sugar
 6 whole wheat hamburger buns
 Brown meat and onions in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Pour off fat.
 Add all other ingredients except buns, mixing well. Reduce heat and simmer 20 to 30 minutes, uncovered. Spoon onto hamburger buns and serve immediately. Makes 6 servings. 270 calories 26 gr. carbohydrate 55 mg. cholesterol 10 g total fat per serving.

TANGY CARROTS
 1 pound young tender carrots, 5 to 6 inches long
 1 large shallot, very thinly sliced
 1 tablespoon margarine with 2 or less grams of saturated fat
 2 teaspoons fresh lime juice
 1 tablespoon coarsely ground mustard
 coarsely ground black pepper
 2 tablespoons minced parsley
 Peel and trim carrots. Cut them lengthwise, then in half. Place carrots and shallot in vegetable steamer. Cover and steam 8 to 10 minutes, or until tender.

In a small skillet over medium heat, melt margarine. Add lime juice, mustard and pepper. Stir until thoroughly heated. Remove from heat and add parsley.
 Pour on sauce, and toss to coat. May serve hot or cover and refrigerate to serve cold.

LEMON MERINGUE PIE
 Mix 1 can Eagle Brand Milk
 2 egg yolks (or 1/2 cup eggbeaters)
 1/2 cup lemon juice and

 Beat 2 egg whites until stiff. Add 1/4 cup sugar and 1/2 tsp vanilla.
 Put pie filling in graham cracker or vanilla wafer crust. Cover with meringue. Bake in 325 degree oven 15 minutes. Chill to serve.

Goose Pimples Do Not Always Mean It's Cold

"Goose pimples" may be associated with winter weather, but they can be an early indicator of heat illness among summer athletes. "They are one of the early signs of severe heat exhaustion--a dangerous problem during the hot months when athletes may not take necessary precautions," warns Dr. Albert C. Hergenroeder, head of adolescent and sports medicine at Baylor College of Medicine.

If athletes experience the aforementioned "goose pimples", headaches, unsteadiness, dizziness, nausea, muscle spasms, cramps or fatigue, and excessive sweating, they should stop, rest and drink water. Taking such actions are crucial. If left unchecked, heat illness can lead to dry skin, rising body temperature, physical exhaustion, and unconsciousness. These are the late signs and at this stage, the athlete is in extreme danger. A doctor should be consulted immediately and emergency measures begun since heat illness can be fatal if not treated.

Hergenroeder advises these preventive measures for people who pursue outdoor physical activity

during hot or humid weather:
 * Stay in the shade as much as possible. If jogging, choose tree-covered trails or streets.
 * Drink a minimum of 1 1/2 cups of fluids every half hour. Water is recommended. Avoid diuretics and caffeine drinks.
 * Drink a minimum of 1 1/2 cups of water about 20 to 30 minutes before physical activity.
 * Cold water is best since it is absorbed faster.
 * Do not take salt tablets.
 * Sports drinks may be nearly 5% glucose, which can reduce their effectiveness in replacing lost fluids. Dilute such drinks to one part per two parts water.
 * Do not exercise or compete in hot weather if you are sick, running a temperature, or feeling overly tired.
 * If possible, exercise in the mornings or evenings, when it is cooler.
 Above all, exercise should not be about torture. It's okay to occasionally forego exercise if the weather is particularly brutal.
