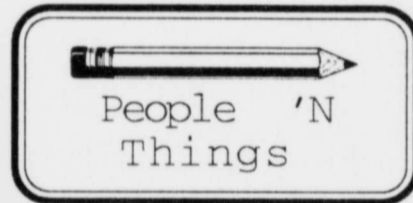

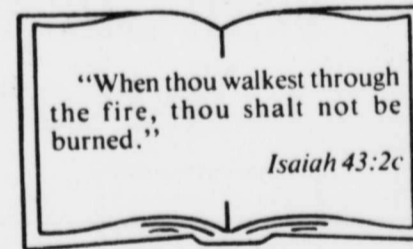

Gieger House Held Talco History

Tuesday night's controlled burning of the Gieger house literally took Talco history up in smoke. The old house at Fifth and Lawrence was originally 34 foot square, and of "box" construction with a tin roof. It was built by Abraham Martin Gieger just after the turn of the century from sweet gum which was cut on Gieger lands and hauled by wagon to the saw mill. The lumber was then rough cut, i.e., 1 inch by 12 inch, full measure, and not planed.

A.M. and his wife, Sarah, came to Texas around 1872, stopping in Shelby County, and at Jefferson, before settling in Titus County, prior to mid-1876. They brought Abe's three younger siblings, and their own two young daughters to what was then Goolesboro. This was the second Gieger house and originally stood about 100 yards west near the present site of the Talco School. (The first was located west and south of present U.S. Highway 271, and just north of the A.M. Gieger Estate Gas Well No. 1, near the old P&MP right of way). Son of a Baptist preacher, Abe was an honest man who set out to make a good home for the children whom God had entrusted into his care. He was an organizer and charter member of First Baptist Church, served as a trustee of the old Goolesboro Common School District, and was election official at several local elections, including the one which changed the

school district name from Goolesboro to Talco.

The house, which was moved to its present location around 1936 when the oil boom hit Talco, was occupied for many years by Abe and Sarah's spinster daughters, Miss Blanche Gieger and Miss Vashti Gieger. Vashti died January 1, 1940 and Miss Blanche as many called her, continued to live in the old house until the early nineteen sixties. Because the house was of "box" construction, that is, boards were stood upright and nailed at the top and bottom with the siding being nailed horizontally at 90 degree angles, there were many gaps between the boards. To keep out the cold, Miss Blanche stuffed folded newspapers between the boards to fill the cracks, then wallpapered over them. This preserved many "old" newspapers, which held historical facts about Talco. Unfortunately none were salvaged, because they were discovered only a few minutes before the burning when Gerald A. Gieger and his wife, Frances, removed some exterior siding to preserve for posterity.

In 1972, Miss Blanche's nephew, James O. Gieger, Sr., who was a Talco native, added 680 square feet on the north end and changed the roof line. He had retired to Talco after 42 years service in a Ft. Worth bank. James and his wife, Fannie, lived in

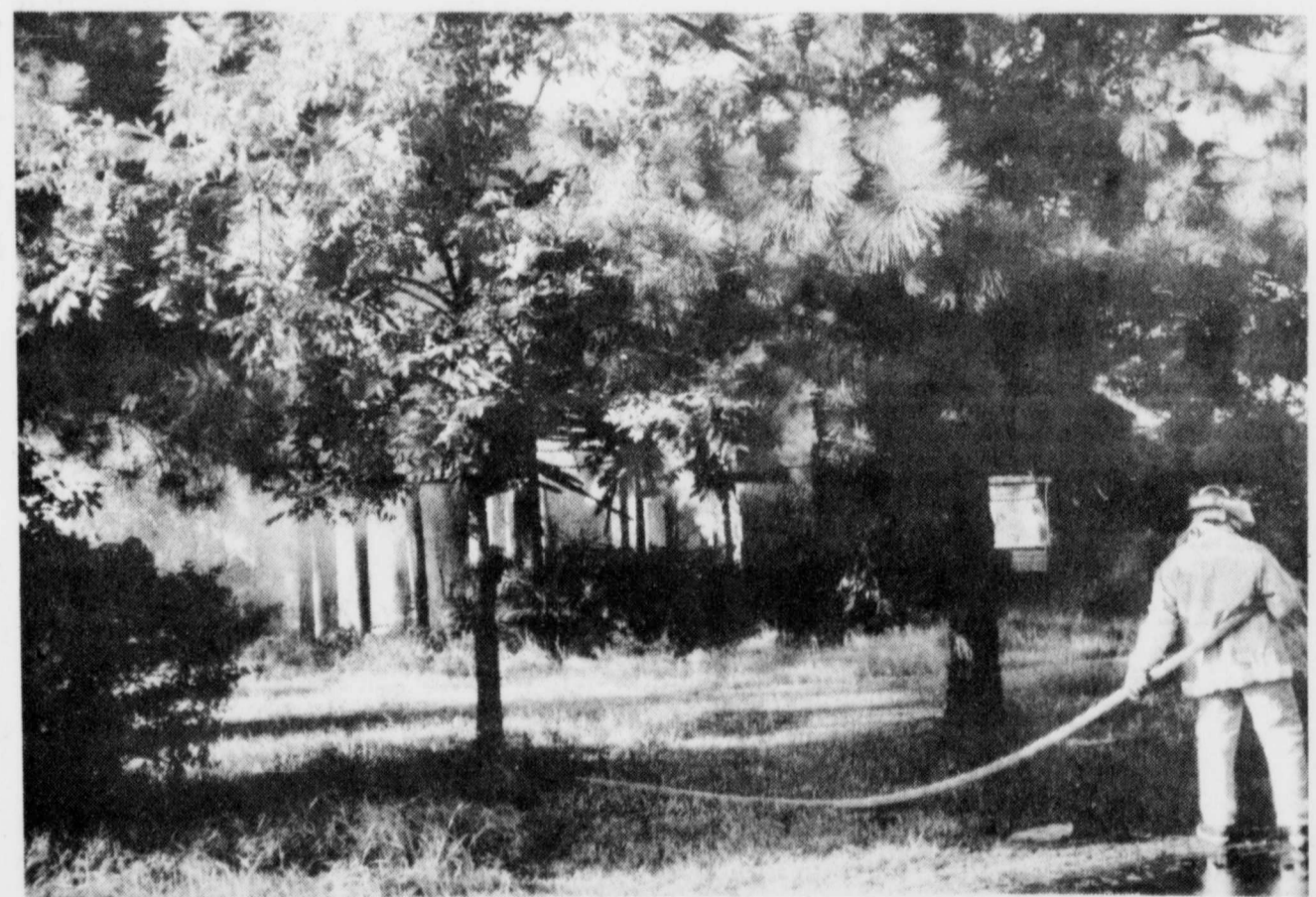
the modernized house until he died from cancer on August 17, 1984. The house was partially burned from fire of mysterious origin on December 15, 1988 and most of the antiques which represented Gieger heritage were destroyed. Fannie grieved over James' labor on the house and finally on December 27, 1989, she died during surgery to repair a hip which had been broken in a fall on Christmas Day.

Several years ago, the B.L. Gieger house burned. The A.J. Gieger house, which was also moved circa 1936, but to the west of the school, was torn down many years ago. Mary Frances (Gieger) Stevens, lives in now the oldest Gieger house, that of her grandmother, Ellen (Gieger) White; however, it is of a much later construction.

Along with a few others, the Gieger family has been synonymous with Talco. For more than 117 years, they have lived on this land. Since it's beginning in 1912, many have come and gone, but Giegers have been in Talco all the time.

This last of the "old" Gieger houses was truly filled with Talco history. Although its unsightly appearance is now gone, it will live on in the hearts of those who so lived it and its occupants.

Makes It's Own Crust Custard

Spray Pam
Corn Meal
2 eggs or 1/2 cup eggbeaters
3/4 cup sugar
1 1/4 cup milk or canned skim milk
1 teaspoon salt
1 tsp. flavoring (vanilla or lemon) or you can use
1 tsp. lemon juice
2 Tablespoons flour
Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Spray pie pan with Pam or other spray. Be sure to coat well. Put in about a heaping tablespoon of cornmeal, and shake it around the way you do flour in a cake pan. Discard loose meal. In a mixing bowl, beat eggs or substitute and sugar until fluffy. Gradually mix in flour and salt. Add milk and flavoring. Beat until well mixed. Pour mixture into pie plate, and cook until set and light brown. It should be firm. Cook approximately 30 minutes. Note-If you use the eggbeaters and canned skim milk, the pie will be practically fat free.

Tostados

1 1/2 lb. hamburger
3 cans refried beans
2 small cans taco sauce
Tortillas
Non fat sour cream
Lettuce
Tomatoes
Onions
Cheese
Brown meat, drain. Add salt and pepper to taste. Add beans and sauce; let simmer for 15 min. Serve on warm tortillas with lettuce tomatoes, onions, and sour cream. Good with picante sauce.

Fruity Pizza

1 roll of vanilla cookie dough
1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1/3 cup sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
Slice cookie dough and press into a pizza pan. Bake according to directions on package. Beat cream cheese, sugar and vanilla until fluffy and spread over baked, cooled cookie crust. Arrange fresh strawberries, banana slices, orange sections and pineapple chunks in circles on dough. You may want to use Fruit Fresh to keep bananas from turning. Canned pie fillings could also be used for expediency.

The Fulbright Community Club met Monday night, July 13 at the Community Center. The building was cleaned and plans were made for the annual ice cream supper at the center on August 9.

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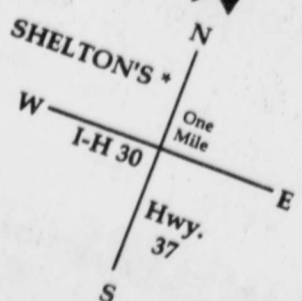

The two year old dog is a native of Germany and trained in Germany. He responds to commands given to him in German. Jenkins has had to learn eight commands in the German lan-

guage before beginning work with the dog.

Jenkins reports that the dog will be worth every cent of the \$7,500 cost if one lost child or senior citizen can be tracked and found.

Jenkins says that Jasper can be used as an attack dog, for crowd control or to recover a discarded weapon (for example one which was used in a crime).

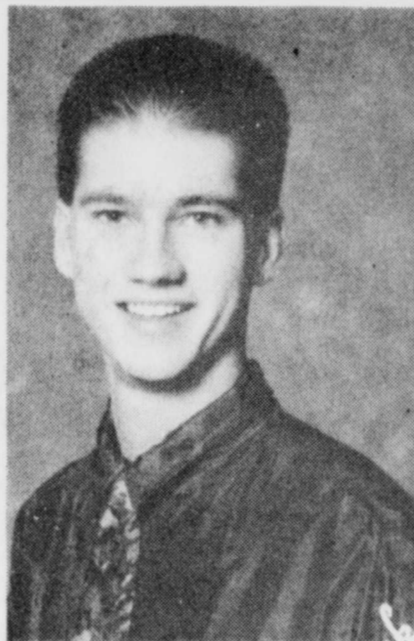
He can also be used to track fugitives. As an example if a "bad guy" commits a crime, or escapes from jail and hides in the woods or a building

Mark Allums, Signed To Play At Southwestern

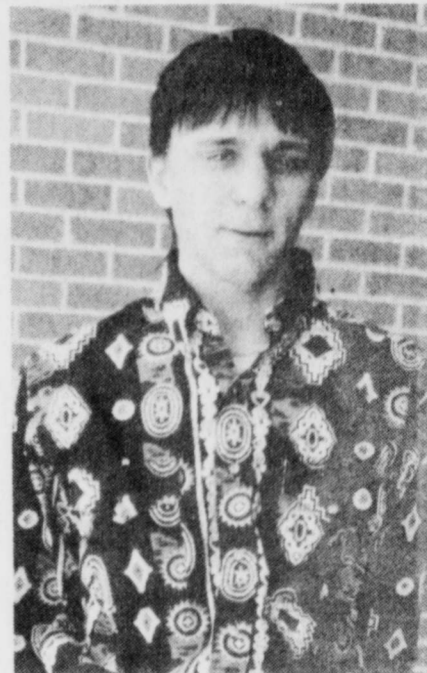
Allums To Play For Southwestern U

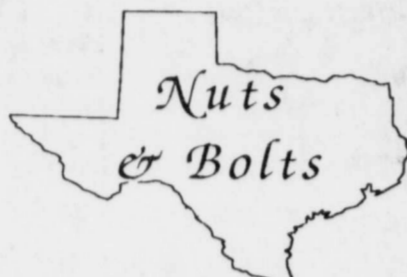

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1014 N. Jefferson, Mt. Pleasant.

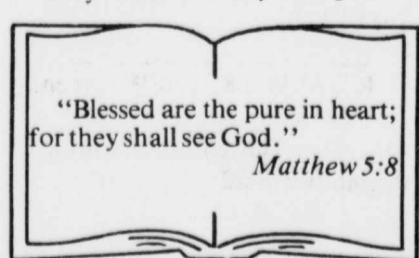

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Comments From Your County Attorney

Jack Herrington

The down side of State Jail Felonies. Previous articles explained what State Jail Felonies are and what some of the crimes are that fall in the State Jail category. What is the down side of State Jail Felony convictions? Upon conviction of a state jail felony, the judge MUST suspend imposition of sentence and place the defendant on community suspension (Probation) for a period of 2 to 5 years. In addition, a judge may sentence a defendant to jail for 30 days as part of his probation; Also a judge may require 60 days in a State Jail at the beginning of his probation, or 6 months in a state jail if he has a prior felony, or 1 year in a State Jail if he has 2 or more felonies. Any of the normal terms and conditions of probation may be placed on a State Jail defendant who is placed on probation. The bottom line is that State Jail felonies will be automatically placed on probation after conviction. The intent of the legislative is passing the State Jail felony laws is to reduce prison overcrowding. We at the county level will have a greater burden—we will have more probationers to deal with. Only time will tell if these new laws will be beneficial to the justice system.

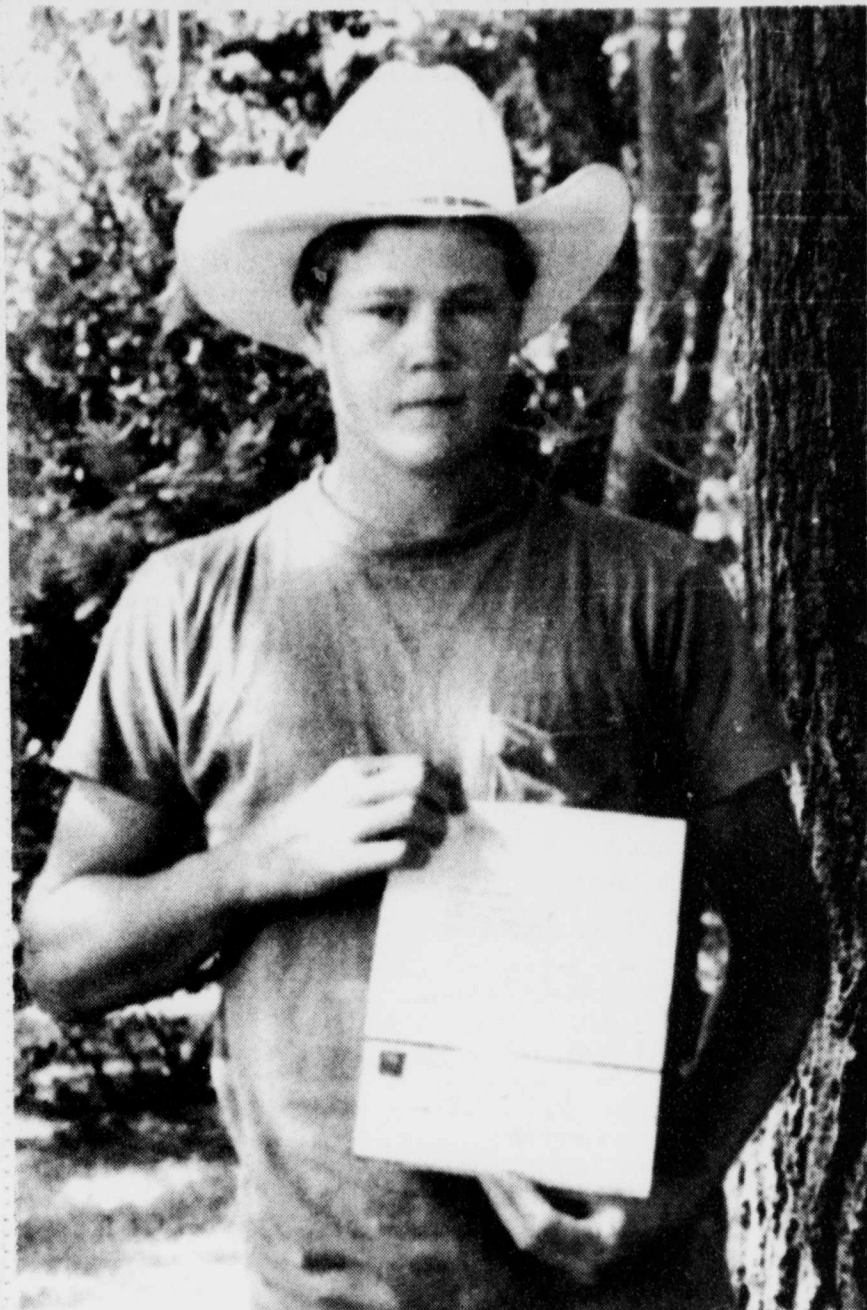
