Talco-Bogata Board Discusses Proposed Tax Rate

The Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees met for its regular monthly meeting on Monday, September 20 at 7:30 p.m.

The Board approved items in the consensus agenda which included the minutes of previous meetings, the Financial Report, Cafeteria Report, Tax Report and payment of the bills.

The Annual Tax Report, Campus Attendance Committees, TASB Localized Update 44, Amended 92-93 budget and Substitute Teachers list were all approved unanimously.

There were discussions without

motion on Pre Kindergarten enrollment eligibility, Drug Testing Program, School Picture Policy, Campus reorganization plan and cost cutting plan.

A resolution supporting the public sale of tracts of property was approved by the board. Talco-Bogata CISD would participate with Red River County, the City of Bogata, City of Clarksville to sell repossessed property in order to get the property back on the tax rolls.

The major discussion of the night was concerning a proposed tax rate

for the collection of the 1993 taxes. After a great deal of discussion the board voted 4 to 3 for a proposed tax rate of \$1.00 per \$100 of value. The \$1.00 tax rate is the same rate as used in 1992.

The board met in executive session and went back into regular session at 12:00 without any action and adjourned the meeting at 12:01.

The next regular Board Meeting will be held on the third Monday of October, October 18, 1993 at 7:30 p.m.

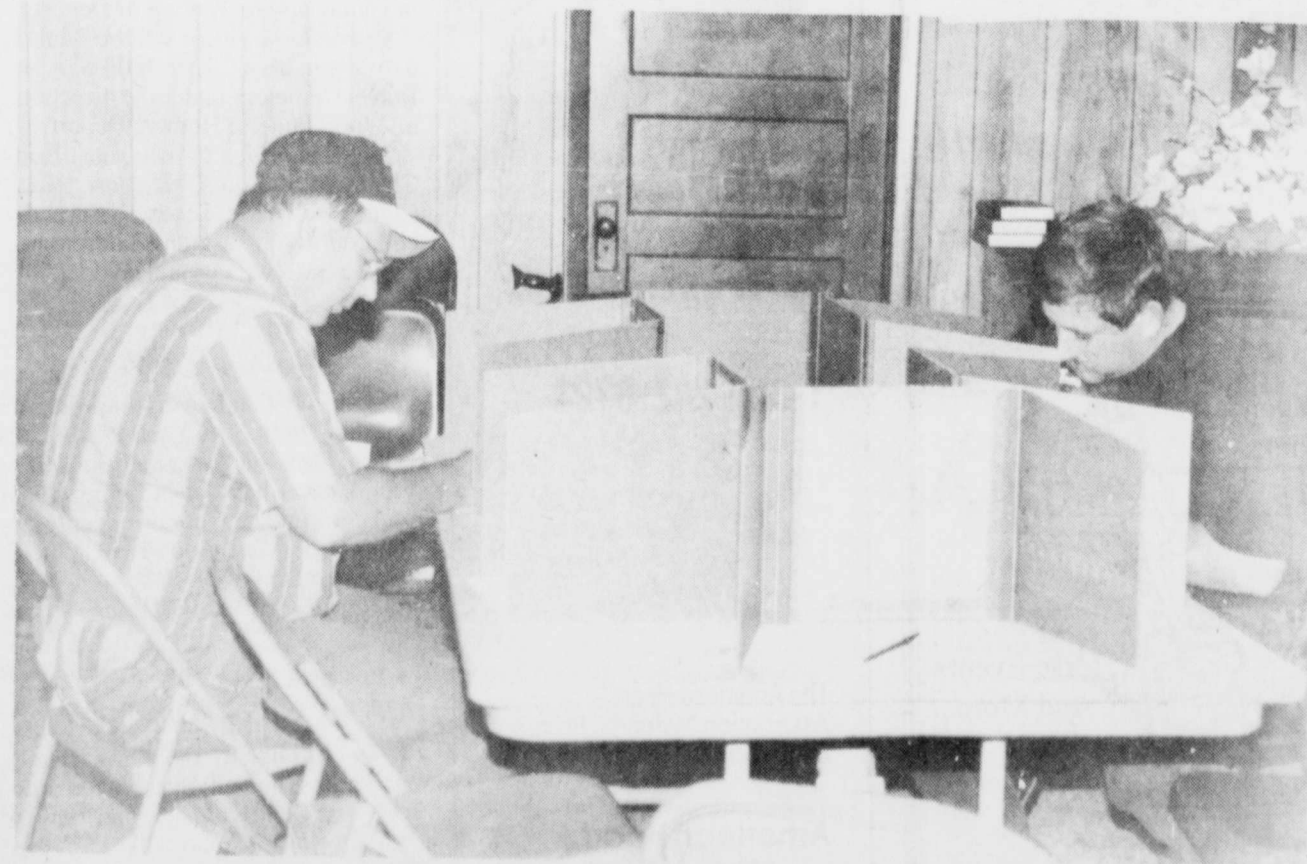

I had the nicest visit today with a very nice lady. Mrs. Leonna Wright lives in V. Thedford Homes, in Bogata. She lost her husband, Frank, in 1987 and her son, Truman Wright in 1981. Mrs. Wright was at one time the V. Thedford Homes Correspondent for The Bogata News. She says that she doesn't get around much anymore, but she is still a lot of fun. Mrs. Wright had found an old cookbook that she hadn't used in a long time. It was titled "Recipes From The Blanton Reunion". From this book, she had recipes for Zesty Biscuit Bean Bake, Melt In Mouth Cookies, Cherry Salad, Just Like Wyatt's Egg Plant Casserole, Cabbage Rolls (the cabbage roll recipe

was given to her several years ago by a Pentecostal Preacher Lady in Mesquite. Mrs. Wright uses it often.) Sandwich Spread, and Prune Cake. Mrs. Wright created the Surprise Cornbread Casserole for herself. I'm guessing that in the eggplant casserole, the Wyatt's is Wyatt's Cafeteria. I really enjoyed meeting Mrs. Wright, and I encourage everyone to send in recipes, even if you don't want to be interviewed and have your picture in the paper. Surprise Cornbread Casserole
By Mrs. Leonna Wright
6 slices crisp bacon crumbled
1 cup hamburger or sausage chopped, or ham, or 6 weiners (choose two meats, fry and drain)
1 Bell Pepper or Jalapena chopped with 1 medium onion in large skillet, salt and cook until tender
1 small can whole kernel corn (drained)
1 cup cheese added last
2 eggs
corn kit
Sweet milk to make corn kit thin
Mix corn kit, eggs, and milk. Pour half in greased baking pan or iron skillet. Add all of meat mixture and cheese. Pour rest of cornbread mixture on top. Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes.

Just Like Wyatt's Eggplant Casserole
1 Eggplant
1 cup celery chopped
1/2 cup onion chopped
2 Tbsp. oleo and 1/2 cup cheese in mixture
1/2 cup bread crumbs
1/4 Tbsp. pepper 1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 Tsp sage - 1 egg - 1/2 cup milk
1 Tbsp. pimento - 1/2 cup cheese on top
Peel eggplant, cut in chunks. Boil until tender. Drain. Sauté celery and onion in oleo. Add other ingredients.

Blend and add eggplant. Pour into large baking dish. Sprinkle cheese on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.
Cherry Salad
1 large cool whip 9-12 oz.
1 can Eagle Brand milk
1 13 oz. can pineapple drained
1 can cherry pie filling
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup angel flake coconut
2 cups small marshmallows
Mix well, refrigerate overnight
Serves 15.

Apple Raisin Coconut Pie
1 1/2 cup sugar - 4 eggs
1 stick oleo - 1 chopped apple
1 cup raisins - 1 cup coconut
Beat oleo and sugar, add eggs. Beat until light and foamy. Add other ingredients. Mix well. Pour into a deep 10 inch or 2 8 inch pie shells. Bake in slow oven for 45 minutes. Pecans may be substituted for coconut.
Melt In Your Mouth Cookies
1/2 cup oleo softened
1 egg
1 tsp. salt
1 cup light brown sugar
1 cup flour
1 cup chopped nuts
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp baking powder
Mix well. Bake on oiled cookie sheet. Drop by spoon. Bake about 5 minutes. Cool 2 minutes. Remove with spatula to waxed paper.

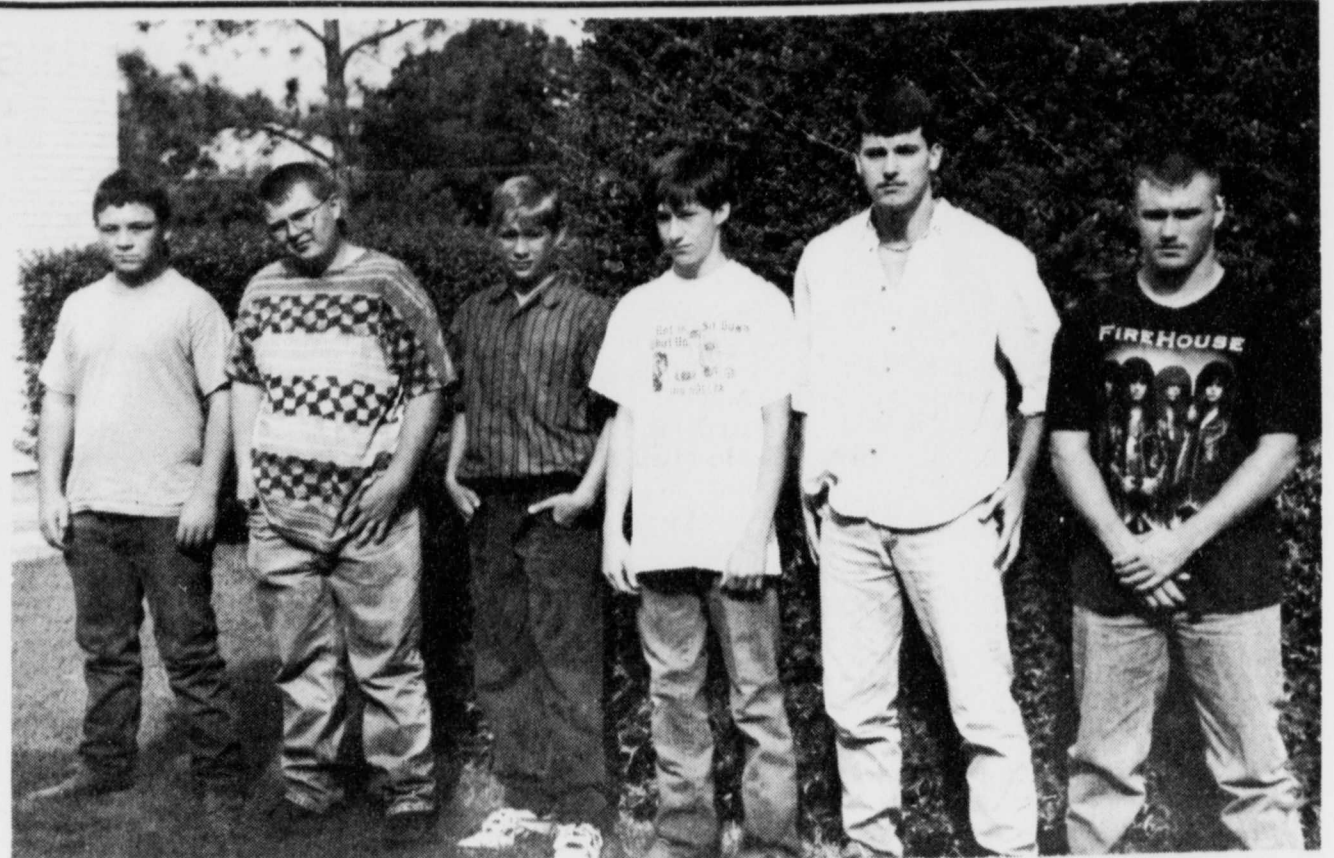

The day will kick off at 8:00 a.m. with a pancake breakfast followed by Arts and Crafts booths open from

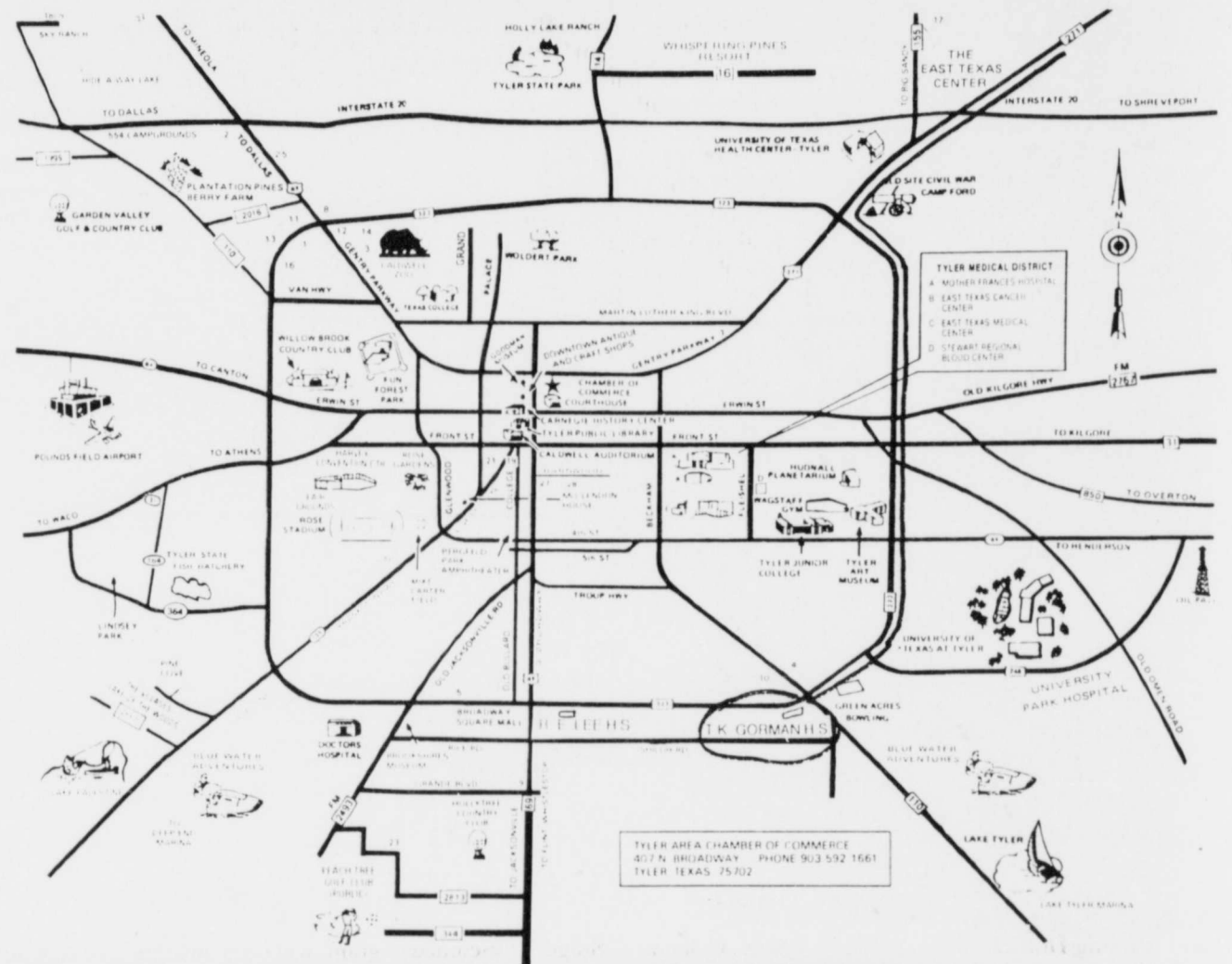
10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. The stew cook-off and judging will follow around 11:00 a.m.

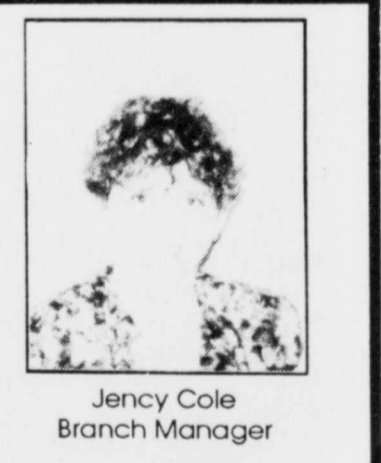

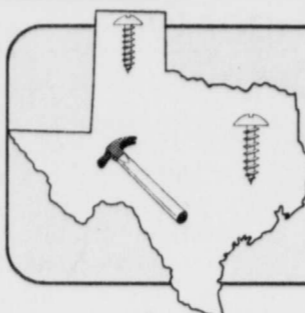

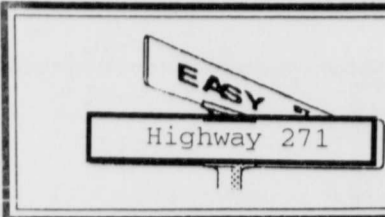
