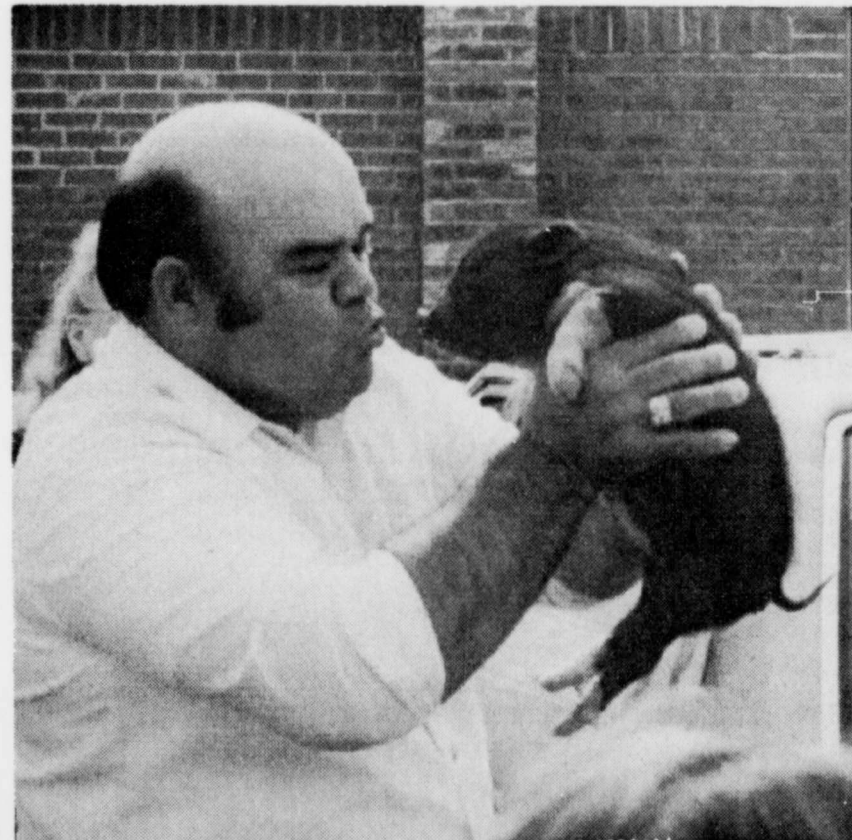

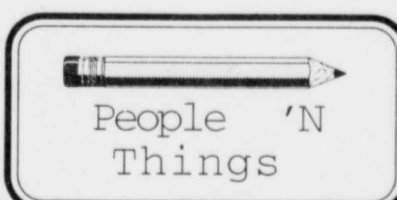

The bazaar area opens at 9:00 a.m.

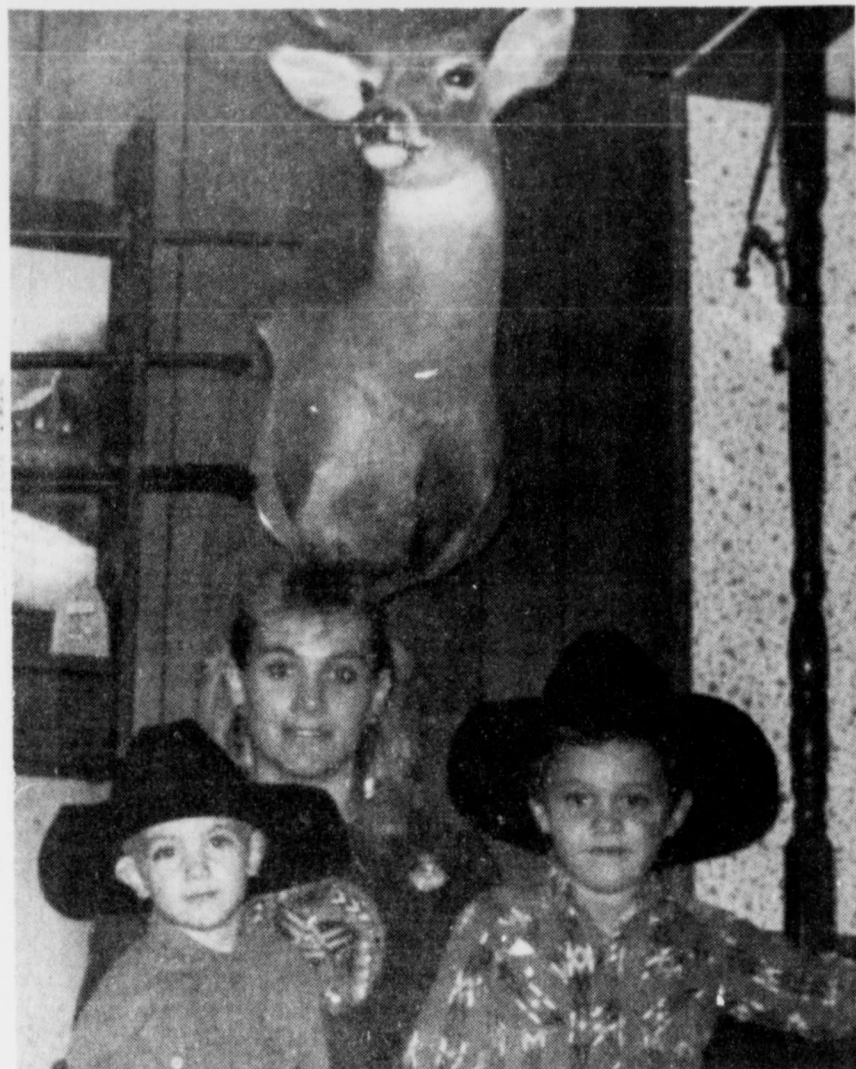

**Country Cooking**

Tina Gentry is our country cook this week. The Gentrys (Tina and Donnie) live between Jolntown and Bogata. They have 3 children, Dustin, 23 months, D.J. 4, and Joshua 13. They also have Smokey, Patience, Rusty, Cindy, and Snowball. The last 5 names belong to Australian Shepherd dogs, which the Gentrys raise. If Patience was one of the dogs in the pen by the front door, she is inappropriately named. There is nothing patient about them. The Gentrys have cows and a horse, so Patience could have been one of them.

Donnie is a self employed welder. Tina is a housewife, mother, cook, Tupperware salesperson, and a working partner in the animal raising business.

Tina is from Avery. The family attends the First Baptist Church, in Bogata. She says the preacher, Brother George Thomas and his family are the best. Tina and Donnie are also members of Australian Shepherd Clubs of America, and National Rifle Association. Their hobbies are Hunting, fishing, motorcycling, horses, dogs, kids, and cooking. Tina wants to sky dive some day. She and the boys climbed up on back of the sofa so I could take their picture with the mounted deer she had killed.

The energetic young homemaker seems to be a bit mischievous, also. She likes to cook deer meat so people who say they don't like deer can't tell the difference. Her recipes sound wonderful even if they are mostly

made from wild game. You could probably substitute beef or chicken if you are not adventurous enough to use venison or quail. Tina says the Country fried quail with gravy is good anywhere, anytime, but it is especially good with homemade biscuits for breakfast. The name - Macaroni and Cheese, Cheese, Cheese really is probably all the description you need for that dish. The sloppy Joes and Chili sound warm and spicy for the weather we are having. Preceding the Can't Believe It's Deer recipe Tina wrote- I wrote this recipe because my mom hates deer meat, can't stand the thought of it. Unless she doesn't know it. Ha Ha Try it.

With deer season coming up, these recipes should be a great help to all who don't know what to do with deer meat when someone gives them a package. Now you won't have to just say "thank you" and leave it in the freezer a while before you throw it away. You can cook it before you throw it out. I'm only kidding. Eating game meat is just a matter of getting Bambi off your mind and digging in to some good food. I love squirrel dumplings and squirrel stew, and I get lots of good out of any deer meat that comes my way. Of course, I always cook something else for Donald, because he also doesn't eat deer meat.

**Country Fried Quail with Gravy**  
 by Tina Gentry  
 Quail, Cooking Oil, Salt, Pepper, Flour, and Minced Onions.  
 Heat one inch of oil in frying pan. Salt and pepper quail to taste. Roll or shake in flour, and fry over medium heat until brown. Remove quail, pour off most of the oil, and saute onions for a few minutes. Add water, and bring to a quick boil. Reduce heat. Sprinkle with a little flour and stir. Place quail back in frying pan. Cover and reduce heat. Simmer for 20 to 30 minutes. Can also be served over toast.

**Venison Sloppy Joes**  
 1 1/2 pound ground venison  
 2 Tablespoons margarine  
 1 medium onion, diced  
 1 garlic clove, minced  
 1 can whole tomatoes (16 oz.)  
 1 can tomato sauce ( 15 oz)  
 2 Tablespoons parsley flakes  
 1/2 tsp pepper  
 1/2 tsp chili powder  
 1 tsp salt  
 Put margarine in a skillet and brown onion and garlic. Add ground meat and brown. Add canned tomatoes and tomato sauce. Stir in seasoning and simmer. Serve on buns.

**Venison Chili**  
 1 1/2 pounds ground venison,  
 2 Tbsp cooking oil  
 1 pint canned tomatoes,  
 1 can cream of tomato soup  
 2 Tbsp Chili powder  
 1 can pinto beans (optional)

1/2 cup diced onions,  
 1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese  
 In a lg. skillet, brown meat in oil. Add tomatoes, soup, chili powder, and beans. Salt to taste. Bring to a quick boil, then reduce and simmer for 1 1/2 hours. Spoon chili into bowls and sprinkle to top with onions and cheese.

**Macaroni and Cheese, Cheese, Cheese**  
 18 oz package macaroni  
 3 cups milk  
 4 Tbsp flour  
 butter  
 1 tsp salt  
 1 tsp grated onion  
 1 cup mozzarella cheese  
 1/2 cup cheddar cheese,  
 1/2 cup Parmesan Cheese  
 Pepper to taste  
 Cook and drain macaroni. Make white sauce with milk, butter, flour, and salt. Add onion, cheese and pepper. Stir until cheese is melted. Mix with macaroni. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

**Can't Believe It's Deer**  
 3 lbs venison stew meat  
 4 oz dried apples  
 salt  
 pepper  
 1 Tbsp brown sugar  
 1 cup water  
 Dump everything into a crockpot and cook it on low heat for 8 or 9 hours. The dried apples will cook away, almost, leaving a thick gravy of very nice flavor that goes with venison. Will serve 6 or 7.

**Comments From Your County Attorney**

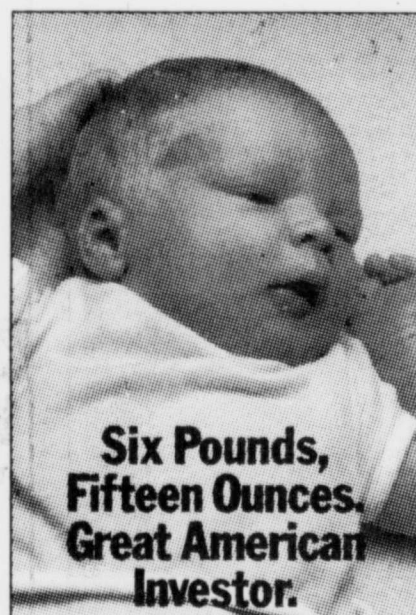
After a recent misunderstanding regarding whosets the punishment during a jury trial, it should be a god topic to review. In Texas we have a bifurcated jury trial system. This means a 2-part trial. During the first phase of the trial, the jury hears the evidence and is given the law by the judge. The jury decides if a defendant is guilty or innocent based only on that evidence and the law. If found innocent, that is the end of the case.

However, if the jury returns a guilty verdict, then the second part of the trial begins. Additional evidence may be introduced at this time. Evidence of a prior criminal record or the lack of that record is often presented at this time. The jury then sets the punishment outlined in the range that is set by law. A 3rd degree felony has a range of from 2 to 10 years. A 2nd degree felony has a range of from 2 to 20 years. A 1st degree felony has a range of from 5 to 99 years or life. A capitol murder felony has a punishment of either life or death. A capitol murder life sentence is a minimum of 40 calendar years before parole can be considered.

In a 1st, 2nd or 3rd degree felony, a defendant may receive probation from a jury if the defendant has never before been convicted of a felony offense. The jury can assess up to 10 years probation.

## For Fall Foliage, Who Are You Going To Call?

Wondering where and when the best fall color areas of the state will be this fall? Call 1-800-452-9292 to the Texas Travel Information Centers, operated by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), for the latest color updates and events around the state. The phone center is open from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m.

The foliage report is compiled and updated weekly from spotters around the state and distributed to callers by counselors at the 11 information centers and the phone center in Austin.

TxDOT spotters tell us there is color in several areas. While some leaves are turning with the first flush of brilliant hues of orange and red,

the peak color season will arrive in mid-November.

Atlanta, Tyler, San Augustine, Martin Creek and Dangerfield State Parks report the leaves are changing. Lost Maples State Natural Area near Vanderpool is expecting its color in mid-November.

For hiking and birding enthusiasts, trail maps are available from the Texas Forestry Association Museum in Lufkin. The Big Thicket Association also provides guided and self-guided tours, hikes, and canoe trips during the fall. Maps and directions are available at the visitor station seven miles north of Kountze at F.M. 420 and US 69.

Information on the cost of these services can be obtained at local post offices, or by calling local postal answer lines. The number for the Bogata Post Office is 632-4121.

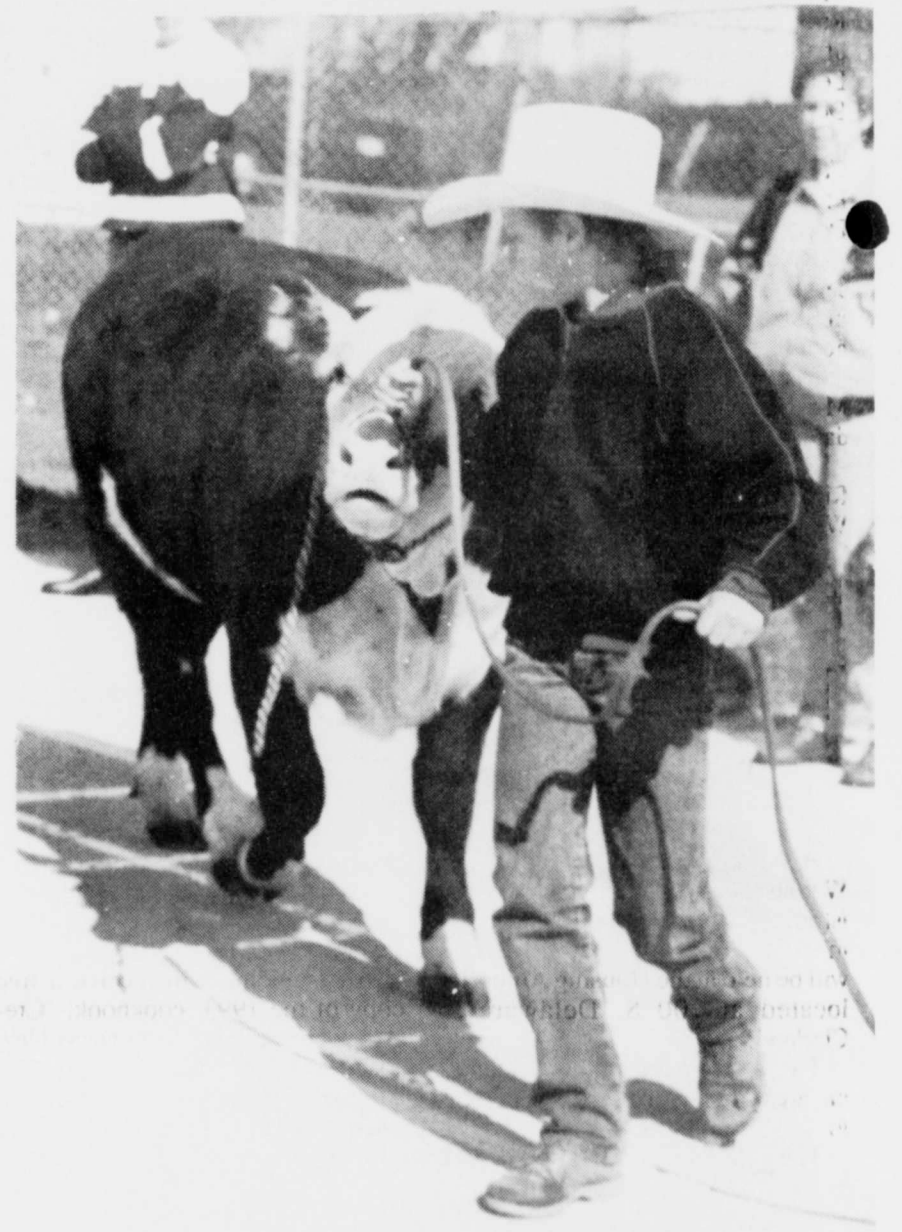

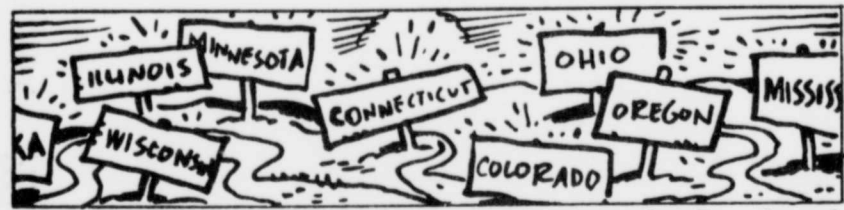

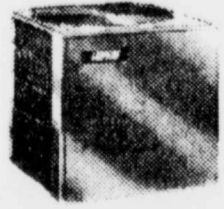

#### Chunky Peanut Butter Cookies

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 cup margarine, softened
- 1/2 cup chunky peanut butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/4 tsp. Sweet 'N Low granulated sugar substitute
- 1 egg
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 2 tbsp. chopped, unsalted peanuts

In small bowl, mix flour and baking powder. In large bowl, with mixer at medium speed, beat margarine, peanut butter, sugar and Sweet 'N Low until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. **Infant Vaccine Program  
Is Available Locally**

The Texas Department of Health in October launched a new program, "Shots Across Texas," to increase the levels of infant and child vaccinations by the turn of the century. The goal is to immunize fully 90% of the state's 2-year-olds by the year 2000. The Texas legislature passed a law this year requiring all Texans under age 18 to be vaccinated against infectious diseases such as diphtheria, tetanus, polio, mumps, measles and rubella.

This goal is a long way from reality at present. The Dallas Morning News of October 22, 1993, contained some sobering statistics on infant vaccination in Texas. According to the story, the national rate for immunization of 2-year-olds is 60%. In Texas, it's 40%. Yet immunizations pay for themselves many times over, according to officials. In Dallas in 1989-90, 238 measles cases were hospitalized at a cost of \$3.5 million. The vaccine for these 238 people would have cost only \$3600. In South Texas in 1991-92, 592 measles cases were hospitalized at a cost of \$2.4 million, while vaccine would have cost \$9100. Twenty-six deaths were associated with measles between 1988 and 1992 statewide.

The new immunization program is available locally. Vaccine from the Texas Department of Health has made it possible for Northeast Texas Rural Health Clinic in Winfield to offer vaccines for infants and children for only \$10 per visit. If the patient is Medicaid-certified, there is no charge to the parents, but all children, regardless of family economics, are eligible to have shots at the clinic.

"Because our clinic is Medicare and Medicaid certified, the public may have the impression that we only serve special populations, but in fact anyone can use our services at any time," stated Larkin Tom, manager at the facility. "The health department has made unlimited supplies of immunization vaccine available to our clinic and we would like to give these shots as a public service. I know parents can spend a lot of time and money on what is basically every child's right, and we're trying to make the process easier."

Maude Harper, LVN at the clinic, is responsible for giving the shot and completing the record-keeping that is a part of the process. "The state of Texas supplies us with immunization record cards that parents can show to schools and doctors, and then we keep records here at the clinic of every child's vaccinations. There's not that much paperwork involved, and so far people have not had to wait. I try to get them in and out as soon as possible."

Northeast Texas Rural Health Clinic opened July 1, and on October 1 became an outpatient department of Titus County Memorial Hospital. The clinic is located in a new facility in Winfield, between Mt. Pleasant and Mt. Vernon, on the north side of I-30. The hours are from 8:30 to 12 and from 1 to 5 Monday through Friday.

"Now that we're owned by a public hospital, we hope to do even more in the area of preventative care and health education," stated Tom. "Infant vaccines are a necessity, not a luxury."
