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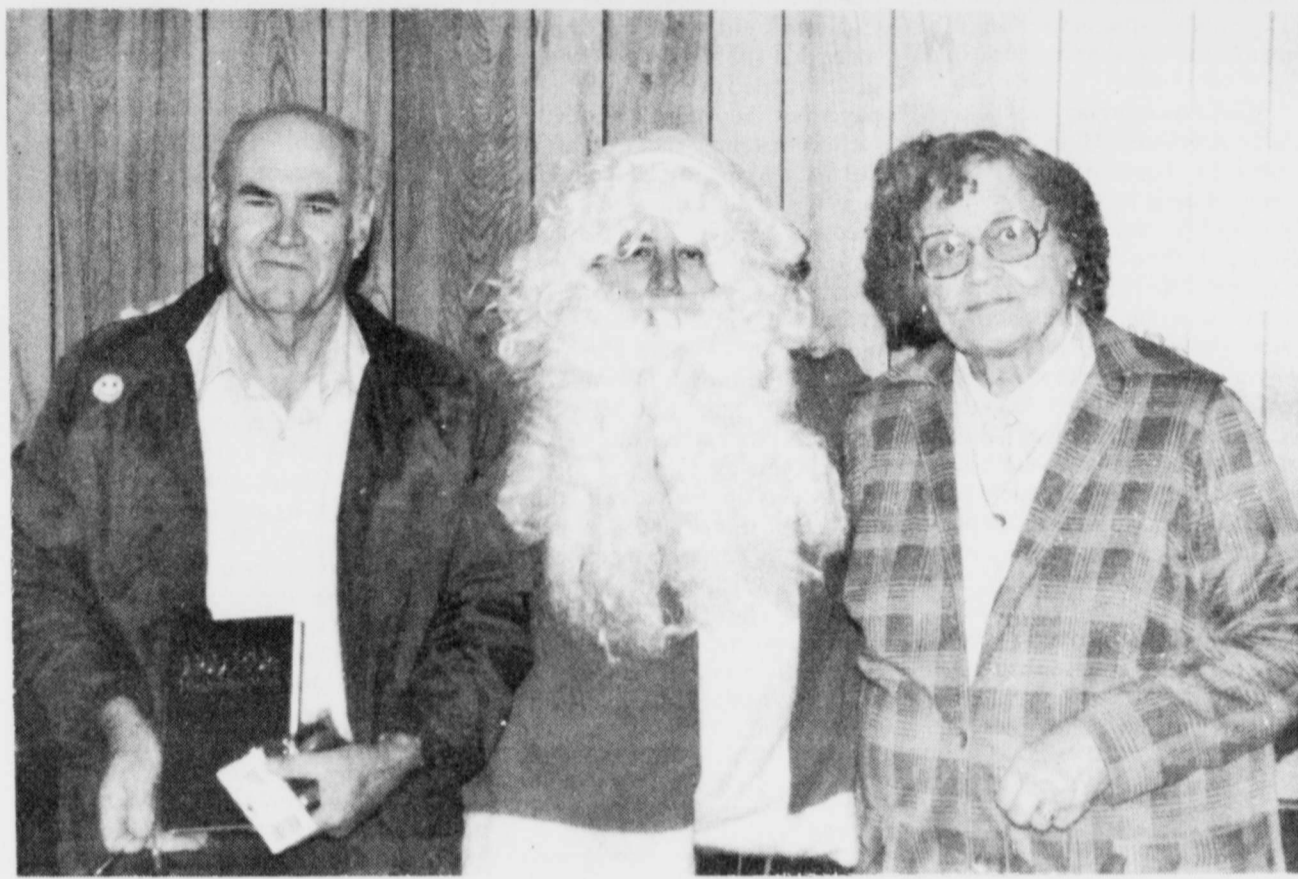

Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. Holds Open Forum

The Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. met in regular session Thursday, December 9 at Rivercrest High School. All members of the board were present. Others present were B.G. and Nancy Bowden, Richard Garrison, John Ragsdill, Michael and Cheryl Stinson, Jimmy Lee, Ray Miller, Johnny Gable, Janice Franks and Freddy Wade.

Board President Jerry Russell gave those present an opportunity to speak in open forum. The Board then approved unanimously the items of consensus agenda.

Guest Richard Garrison spoke for the Rosalie Community Club and requested the board deed the Rosalie School property to the Rosalie Community so the community could build a permanent structure on the property. The Board asked the superintendent to work with the Rosalie Community and pursue the proper course of action to enable the community to assume ownership of the property if such transfer is allowed by law.

The Board went in Executive Session to hear an appeal concerning parental supervision. Following the Executive Sessions, the Board heard reports by the Superintendent on the cost of bus maintenance and the legality of school sponsored raffles.

The Superintendent related to the Board that student organizations are prohibited from conducting raffles according to Attorney General Op. 217-1776 (1990). Parent Teacher groups or other organizations may do so if they have obtained an exemption from federal income tax from the IRS.

The 1993 Tax Roll was adopted by the Board prior to entering into a cost cutting study concerning reduction in force. The trustees selected the following areas for the Superintendent to do a feasibility study on personnel cuts in the areas of Counseling program, coaching staff, support services and elementary grades when total enrollment of a grade level doesn't necessitate a second teacher. The superintendent is also to provide the board a dollar figure on the cost reduction if the seventh and eighth grades were combined at Talco or Rivercrest High School.

The Board accepted the resignation of Cheri Tubb, third grade teacher at Bogata Elementary. Ms. Tubb has accepted a position with the Sulphur Springs ISD.

The Trustees then went into Executive Session for the purpose of evaluating the Superintendent. They returned to the open session and adjourned at 11:35 p.m.

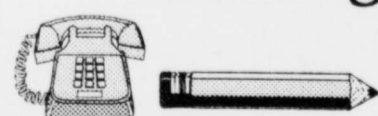

Lillian's Cheese Ball

- 1 lb. box Velveeta Cheese
- 1 large pkg. Philadelphia Cream Cheese
- 1 jar jalapeno Cheese Whiz (small)
- 1/2 t. garlic powder
- 1 T. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 c pecans chopped (reserve 1/2 c. to roll ball in)

Let all cheese set at room temperature for 3 or 4 hours. Mix all ingredients and roll into a ball. Roll in balance of chopped pecans. Serve with crackers or chips.

Magic Pumpkin Pie

- 1 unbaked pie crust
- 1 (16 oz.) can pumpkin
- 1 (14 oz.) can Eagle Brand Milk
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- 1/2 tsp. salt

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In a large bowl combine filling ingredients. Mix well and turn into pie crust. Bake for 30 minutes.

Coconut Pie

- 1 cup sugar
- 3 Tbsp cornstarch
- 3 egg yolks stirred in cup with enough canned milk added to make 1/2 cup
- 1 1/2 cups sweet milk
- 2 Tbsp margarine

Cook in microwave 2 minutes. stir, cook 2 minutes, stir, cook 1 1/2 to 2 minutes until thick. Add 1 Tbsp vanilla and 1 cup coconut. Stir and pour into cooked pie shell. For meringue, beat 3 egg whites until stiff, add dash of cream of tartar, 3 tsp sugar, and 1 tsp vanilla. Brown in 300 degree oven.

Potato Casserole

- 2 lb frozen hashbrowns
- 1/4 to 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup margarine (2 sticks)
- 1/2 pints sour cream (8 Oz)
- 8 oz jar cheese whiz
- 1 can cream of chicken or cream of celery soup
- corn flakes

Mix potatoes and onion and spread in bottom of large casserole dish. Melt one stick of margarine, add salt and pepper, and pour over potatoes. Mix together cheese whiz, sour cream, and undiluted soup and pour over potatoes. (Melt in microwave for smoother consistency) Melt other stick of margarine and mix with enough cornflakes until all margarine is absorbed. Spread over potatoes. Bake 1 hr. at 350 deg

Melt In Your Mouth Fruitcake.

- 1 lb. candied pineapple
- 1 lb. candied cherries
- 1 lb chopped dates
- 1 lb pecans
- 1 lb angel flake coconut
- 1/2 cup flour
- 3 1/2 cans Eagle Brand Milk

Cut fruit in half. Mix with 1/2 cup flour. Add all other ingredients. Mix by hand. Bake at 300 degrees for 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 hrs. in 3 loaf pans sized 7 7/8 inches X 3 7/8 inches.

Wassail

- 4 cups pineapple juice
- 1 1/2 cups apricot nectar
- 4 cups apple cider-1 cup orange juice
- 1/2 cup bottled lemon juice-1/2 cup sugar
- 2 sticks cinnamon-2 Tbsp whole cloves
- 1/2 cup red hots

Put cinnamon, cloves, and red hots in basket. Put other ingredients in 24 cup percolator. Perk Serve hot.

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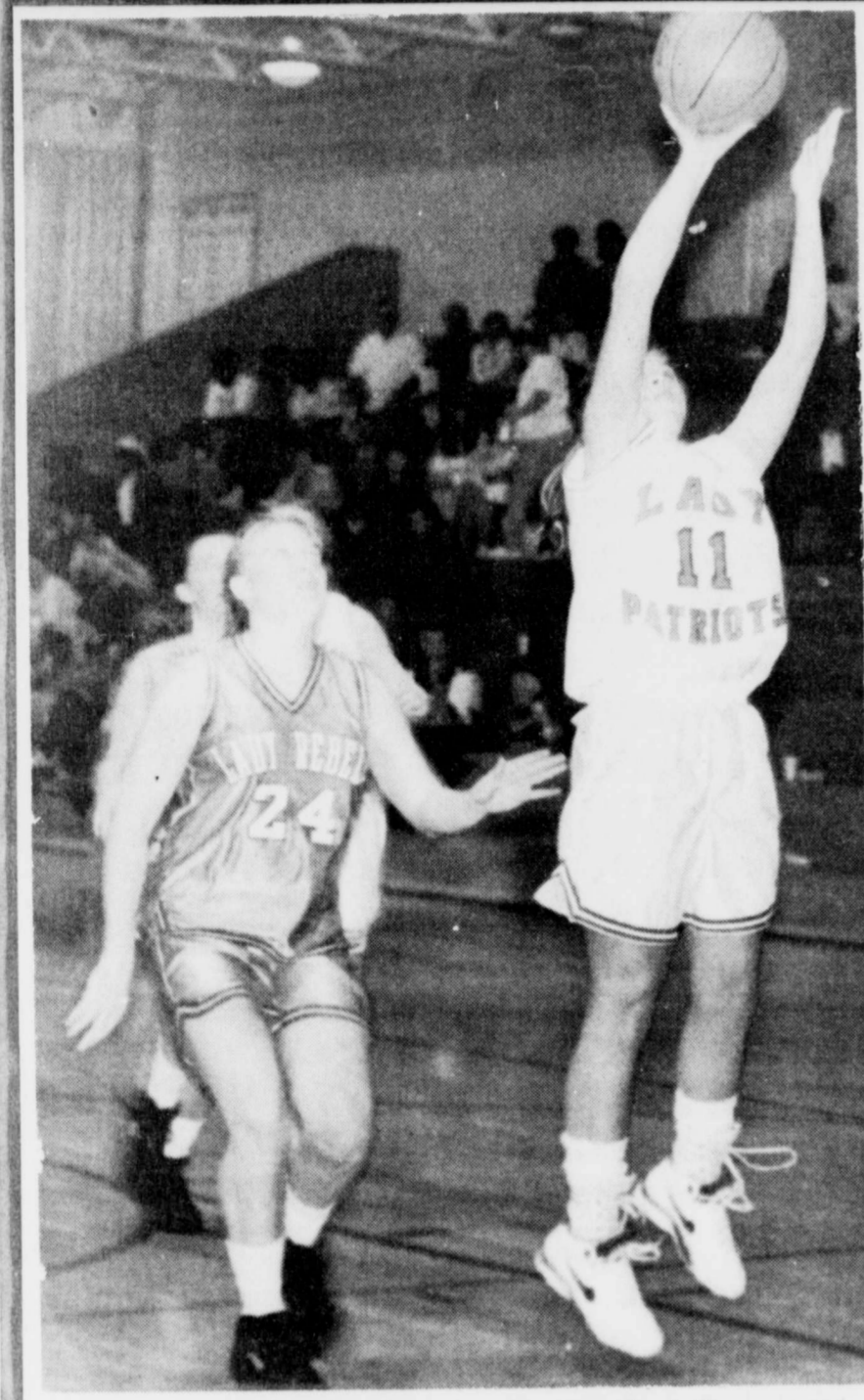

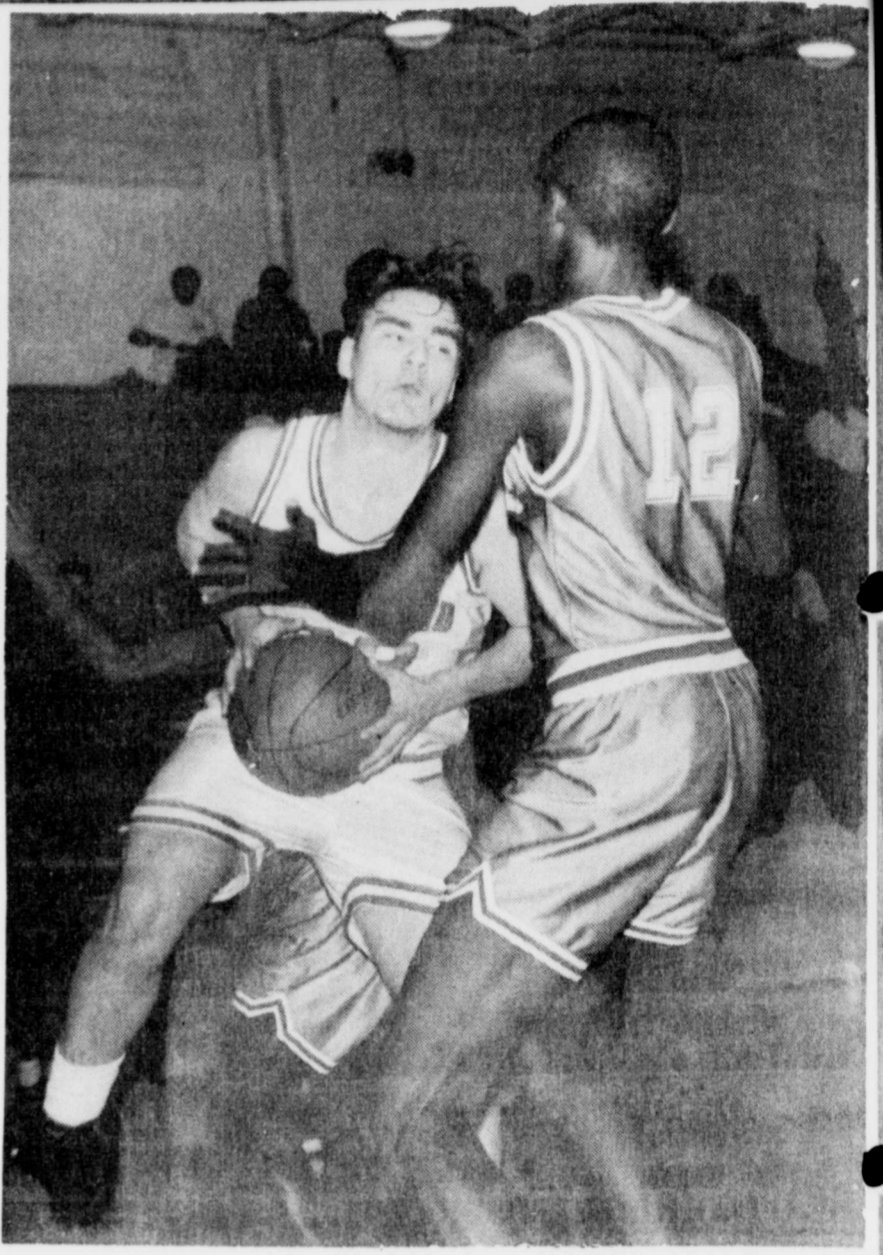

The Value of Money

Alert children to the dangers of borrowing—don't be afraid to charge interest on small loans.

THOUGHT FOR FOOD

Chunky Peanut Butter Cookies

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 cup margarine, softened
- 1/2 cup crunchy peanut butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/4 tsp. Sweet 'N Low granulated sugar substitute
- 1 egg
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 2 tbsps. chopped, unsalted peanuts

In small bowl, mix flour and baking powder. In large bowl, with mixer at medium speed, beat margarine, peanut butter, sugar and Sweet 'N Low until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Stir in flour mixture and peanuts. On waxed paper, shape dough into a roll about 1" x 9 1/2". Dough will be slightly sticky. Wrap in waxed paper; refrigerate until firm, about 4 hours.

Preheat oven to 375 °F. With sharp knife, mark dough at 1/4-inch intervals, then slice; place 1 inch apart on ungreased cookie sheet. If necessary, reshape cookies gently with fingers. Bake 6 to 8 minutes or until lightly browned on bottom. Immediately remove cookies to wire rack; cool. Makes 3 dozen cookies.



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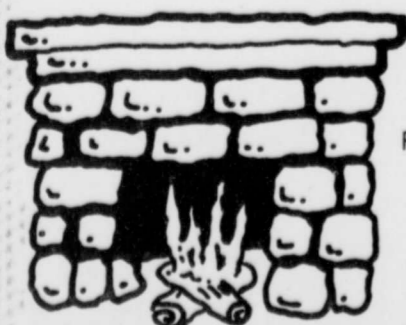
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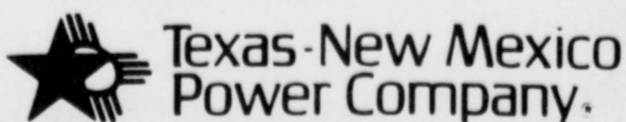
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Beware of Nutrition Claims In Women's Magazines

What types of nutrition messages are the readers of women's magazines receiving?

One recent study showed an overall increase in nutrition claims referring to the absence of specific dietary substances such as fat, sugar or cholesterol from food and beverage products. Many of the nutritional claims reflected topics related to the dietary guidelines recommendations. All advertisements were used to appeal to consumer concerns about taste, convenience and quality. Nutrition claims varied by product type advertised.

Why are these women's magazines so full of nutrition information? Women tend to be especially interested in nutrition information. They read this more from magazines and other forms of print media.

Some of the leading women's magazines have nutritionists, dietitians or home economists respon-

sible for their nutrition articles or food/recipe sections. This increases the reliability when research-based information is used. Beware of some nutrition-related articles not written by dietitians, nutritionists or home economists. These articles may make weight loss claims or claims for use of certain nutrient supplements seem too good to be true. One example is the hype for chromium picolinate touted for weight loss. Chromium picolinate has not been approved for weight loss by the Food and Drug Administration. Consumers need to realize that weight loss comes only by changing lifestyle habits, including exercise and low-fat eating. No "magic bullets" for weight loss exist.

If you have noted some nutritional claim that may be questionable, misleading or inaccurate, contact the local county Extension Office for research-based information related to the particular nutrition claim.

Holiday Entertaining? Keep Food Safety In Mind

Delicious food is often a special part of Thanksgiving, Christmas and other holiday events. Entertaining for family or friends on a small or large scale is fun, but often demanding, and definitely needs to be done with food safety in mind.

When planning a large scale event, keep in mind that preparing and handling large amounts of food will take planning ahead of time for safe preparation, storage and serving. If large quantities of food will be prepared ahead of time, quickly cool and refrigerate them. Divide into portions and store in shallow containers. Deep containers increase the time the center of a pot of food stays warm, encouraging bacterial growth. Consider the amount of refrigerator space available.

If perishable foods are picked up from a deli or purchased from a caterer, transport them quickly, and serve immediately; or if purchased ahead of time, transport them quickly to your refrigerator where they should remain until serving time. If you're purchasing a large quantity of food items such as meat trays or any perishable foods, ask that they be packaged in small portions, or do this when you get home. By doing this, you can replace trays often at the party event and not leave one large

tray out for too long.

If holiday meals are served buffet style, this may mean that the food remains on the table as guests come and go. This is not the safest situation, as foods left at warm room temperatures are susceptible to bacterial growth that causes foodborne illness. Plan serving times so that perishable foods do not remain at room temperature for more than two hours. Use smaller portions on the serving table, and replace them often from the heat source in the kitchen or from the refrigerator.

On the serving table, or in the kitchen, keep hot foods hot. Chafing dishes may or may not keep foods at the necessary temperature of 140 degrees F. or above. Keep cold foods cold on the table by nestling serving containers in beds of ice.

When replenishing foods on the buffet, it's best to replace containers, rather than putting fresh food in a container that contains food that has been sitting out, especially if the food has been at room temperature.

Make your holiday events special and food safe by following safe food handling practices. If it is an event to remember, make it a pleasant one. Protect you and your guests from foodborne illness.

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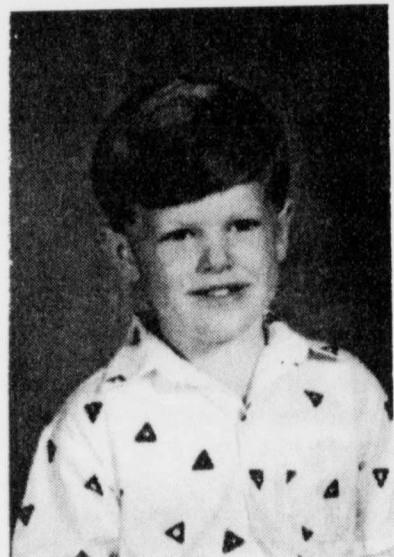
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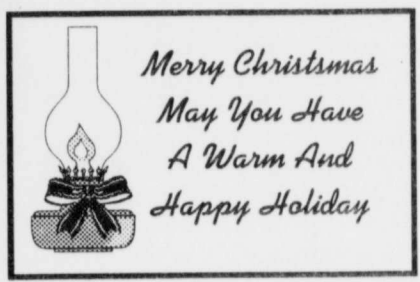

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Traditional centuries-old Christmas delights

Everyone, it seems, loves pudding – and who can resist the special treats that appear during the Christmas season? Plum pudding is one savory dessert most closely associated with a traditional English holiday celebration. Cider was a popular beverage in pre-Revolutionary America, drunk by almost every member of the family at almost every meal. John Adams drank a pitcher of cider at breakfast every morning. When guests arrive, what could be easier than serving a luscious helping of pudding with a wine sauce and a mug of steaming hot cider spiced with cinnamon? Family and friends will be delighted to receive a sampling of your culinary creativity.

The following recipe for "An English Plum Pudding" is reproduced from *The Virginia House-Wife* by Mary Randolph, 1830.

"Beat eggs very light, add to them a pound of flour sifted, and a pound of powdered sugar; when it looks quite light, put in a pound of suet finely shred; a pint of milk, a nutmeg grated, and a gill of brandy; mix with it a pound of currants, washed, picked, and dried, and a pound of raisins stoned and floured – tie it in a thick cloth, and boil it steadily eight hours."

The modern recipes below for "Plum Pudding" and "Mulled Cider" are reproduced from *Yuletide at Winterthur: Tastes and Visions of the Season* (Winterthur Museum):

- PLUM PUDDING**
- 1 cup milk
 - 4 slices stale bread, cubed
 - 6 ounces suet, ground
 - 1 cup brown sugar, packed
 - 2 eggs, beaten
 - ¼ cup brandy
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 2 cups raisins
 - 1 cup currants
 - ½ cup nuts, chopped
 - ½ cup candied orange peel
 - 1 cup flour
 - 1 teaspoon baking soda
 - ½ teaspoon salt
 - 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 - 1 teaspoon mace
 - 1 teaspoon ground cloves

Pour milk over bread and stir. Add suet, sugar, eggs, brandy, and vanilla, and mix completely. In a larger bowl, mix raisins, currants, nuts, and peel. Sift flour, soda, and salt and combine with spices. Add to the fruit and nut

mixture and blend. Add the bread and suet mixture and stir well. Pour pudding into a greased two-quart mold (do not use tube or bundt pans or ring mold). Cover the mold completely with foil using string to secure. Put the mold on a rack within a deep pot or dutch oven. Add boiling water to the pot to about an inch, cover, and steam the pudding for about 3 ½ hours. Be sure water level is maintained in pot. Remove mold and cool for about 15 to 20 minutes. Remove pudding from mold and place on serving plate. Serve with wine sauce or hard sauce of your choice. Makes twelve to sixteen servings.

- MULLED CIDER**
- 2 quarts cider
 - ½ cup orange juice
 - ¼ cup lemon juice
 - 2 tablespoons sugar
 - 3 cinnamon sticks
 - 2 teaspoons whole cloves
 - 1 teaspoon nutmeg

Mix all ingredients and bring just to a boil. Cool and strain. Serve hot and place a cinnamon stick in each cup. Makes about 16 half-cup servings.

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

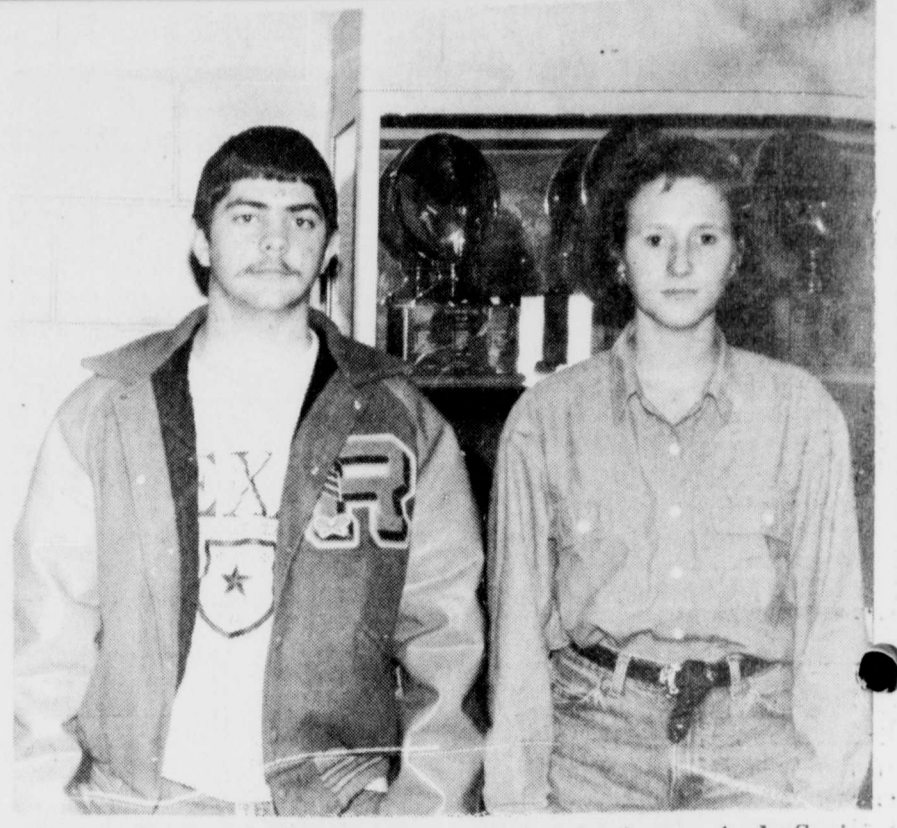
Christmas heralds a time when har-

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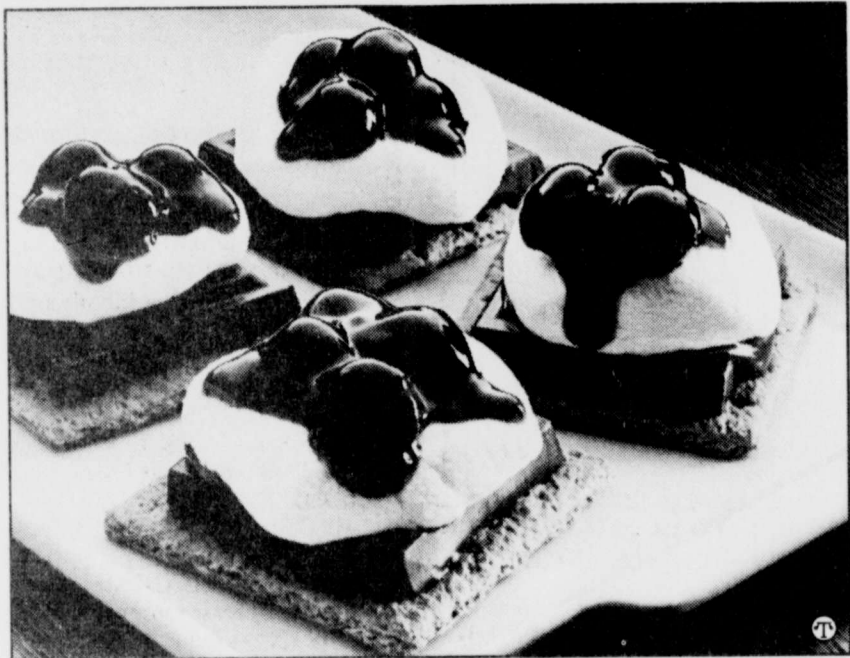

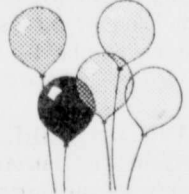
