Talco School Begins August 16th

Talco Elementary and Junior High School begin August 16th. Teachers will have a work day on August 15th. Students who will be new to the school district should come by the office and enroll no later than August 12th between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Parents with Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten children must also enroll them at this time if they have not already done so.

The Pre-Kindergarten class on the Talco Campus will begin at 11:40 a.m. and the students will be dismissed at 2:40 p.m. The first 18 children to have their applications completed will be enrolled in this class. There are currently 13 students enrolled in the Pre-Kindergarten

class on the Talco Campus. Requirements are: (a) Child must be 4 years of age on or before September 1, 1994; (b) Financial documentation of the parent to determine qualification for this program.

Breakfast will be served each morning at 7:45 a.m. for those wishing to eat at school. Buses will run a regular schedule starting the 16th of August and will arrive at the school at 7:45 a.m.

Elementary students (K-5) will report to their homeroom classes at 8:00 a.m.

Junior High students (6-8) will report to the Auditorium to pick up their class schedule and locker assignments.

Everyone loves her pickles and she is sharing the Hot Garlic Dill recipe.

Also included is a recipe for Zucchini "Apple" Pie and you are not supposed to be able to tell the difference in the zucchini and the apples. I am going to try this one for sure. See you next week!

Green Enchiladas

- 1 pound of ground beef
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1-1/2 ounce can of evaporated milk
- 1/2 pound of grated processed cheese
- 1 package green onion dip mix
- 1-4 ounce jar chopped green chiles
- 1-4 ounce jar chopped pimentos
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 pound longhorn cheese-grated
- 12 corn tortillas

Brown ground beef with seasonings in skillet, stirring until crumbly and drain. Heat the soup, milk and processed cheese in saucepan, until cheese is melted, stirring constantly. Stir in dip mix, green chiles and pimentos. Mix ground beef, onion and longhorn cheese in bowl.

Soften tortillas in hot oil and spoon ground beef mixture onto each. Roll to enclose filling and place in shallow 8 x 10 baking dish. Pour sauce over top and bake, covered with foil for 30 minutes. Yields 8 servings.

Caramel Pie

Brown 1 cup sugar in iron skillet and slowly add 1 cup milk and let cook until dissolved. Mix 1/2 cup sugar and 1 slightly heaping tablespoon of flour and 1/2 cup of powdered milk and 3/4 cup of water, mix well and add 3 beaten egg yolks. Add to caramel mixture and cook until beginning to thicken. Add 1/2 stick of butter or margarine and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour into an unbaked pie shell and bake for 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Remove from oven and cool before topping with meringue. Pecans may be added to the pie also.

Bar-b-que Brisket

- 5-6 pound brisket
- 1 bottle of soy sauce

1 can beef consomme'

- juice of 1 lemon
 - 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
- Marinate all ingredients over brisket and let set overnight. Pour off liquid (can be frozen for another time). Sprinkle meat with paprika and seal in foil. Bake at 250 degrees for 1 hour per pound until tender. Cool in foil and refrigerate. When cool, slice across grain and add sauce.

Sauce: 1 cup ketchup, 4 tablespoon vinegar, 4 tablespoon brown sugar, 4 table spoon worchestershire sauce. Simmer for 10 minutes and add 2 teaspoon of liquid smoke if desire. Remove from heat and pour over sliced brisket. Seal in foil and bake at 300 degrees for 1 hour or until hot through and through.

Hot Garlic Dill Pickles

Soak cucumbers in cold water for 3-4 hours or overnight. Pack cucumbers in hot, sterilized jars. B

Bring to a boil: 1 quart of apple cider vinegar, 2 quarts of water and 1 cup of salt.

Add a garlic button, dill head, 1 hot pepper and a pinch of alum in each quart jar. Cover with hot vinegar solution. Seal with hot lids and rings.

Zucchini "Apple" Pie

- 4 cups sliced zucchini (cooked)
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- dash of salt

Toss together well. Mix in a bowl: 1-1/4 cup sugar 1-1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1-1/2 teaspoons cream of tartar dash of nutmeg 3 tablespoons flour

Add zucchini and mix well. It will be runny, but that's OK. Dump the filling into a 9-inch crust and dot with butter. Add the top crust and bake at 400 degrees for 40 minutes or until golden brown.

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 4 & 5 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1300 Highway 27 North, Clarksville. The next clinic will be held on August 18, 1994.

Clinic hours will be from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Future clinics will be held on the first, second and third Thursday of each month. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903)595-3585, or arrive on a walk-in basis.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60

months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

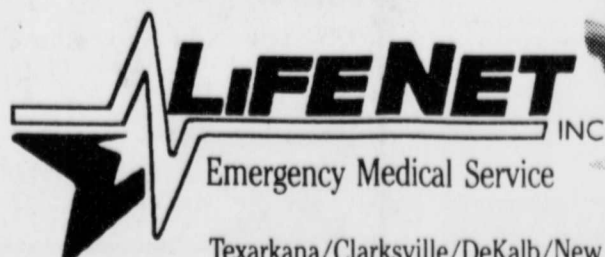
