Somehow it has come to pass that immigrants must be granted food, shelter and medical care without having to work for it.

That I disagree with. I'm not saying they don't need some care when they first arrive, but they don't need to swell our already huge welfare rolls any further. I knew a man from Mexico who came to Texas and worked hard to become an American citizen, raise and educate his children and achieve a good lifestyle. He was disgusted by immigrants who came, took from this nation and did not, to quote him "learn to speak this country's language, become an American citizen and work hard".

If I moved to another, I would expect to have to learn the language, work hard and learn to follow the laws of that nation...why should it be any different here?

We are supposed to PURSUE the American dream...it isn't supposed to be delivered to us! Brand me as old-fashioned, bigoted or un-understanding...but I've had my say and am unsaddling my high horse now.

Jalapeno Jelly
1/4 cup chopped or ground hot peppers
1 1/2 cups bell peppers, ground
6 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/2 cup vinegar
3 oz. Certo
Take out some of the seeds if you don't want it hot. Cook peppers and vinegar for 5 minutes. Add Certo, boil hard like regular jelly; about five minutes. Dash of margarine, red or green food coloring. Pour into jars and seal.

Black Russian Cake
1 box Duncan Hines plain yellow cake mix
4 serving box coco pudding mix
1 cup vegetable oil
1 cup water
4 eggs
1/4 cup Kahlua
Mix well for 4 minutes. Bake in Bundt pan at 350 for 25 minutes.
Glaze:
1/4 cup margarine
2 cups powdered sugar
1/2 cup Kahlua
Mix and drizzle on cake. Freezes well.

Pear Honey
8 lbs. pears, peeled, cored (ground)
6 lbs. sugar
#2 can crushed pineapple

1 cup white Karo syrup
Cook all ingredients together about 2 hours or until thick. Boil slow and stir often. If it isn't thick enough for you, add 2 pkg. Sure Gel. Makes about 9-12 pints.

Pear Relish
12 large pears
12 pods sweet peppers
12 pods red hot peppers
3 cups sugar
3 cups vinegar
4 large onions (pimentos if you want)
Chop or ground pears and pepper, onions. Put enough water to cover. Cook until tender. Seal.

Honey Bun Cake
1 box yellow cake mix (pudding in)
1/2 cup sugar
2/3 cup oil
4 eggs
12 oz. sour cream
In a separate bowl, mix 1/2 cup brown sugar, 2 tsp. cinnamon, 1 cup chopped pecans. Pour 1/2 batter in long loafpan. Sprinkle 1/2 dry brown sugar mix. Add remaining batter, then the rest of brown sugar mix on top. Take a knife, swirl through cake. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes. Glaze if you want with 1 cup powdered sugar, 1/2 milk, vanilla.

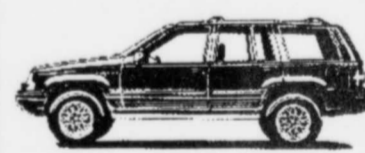

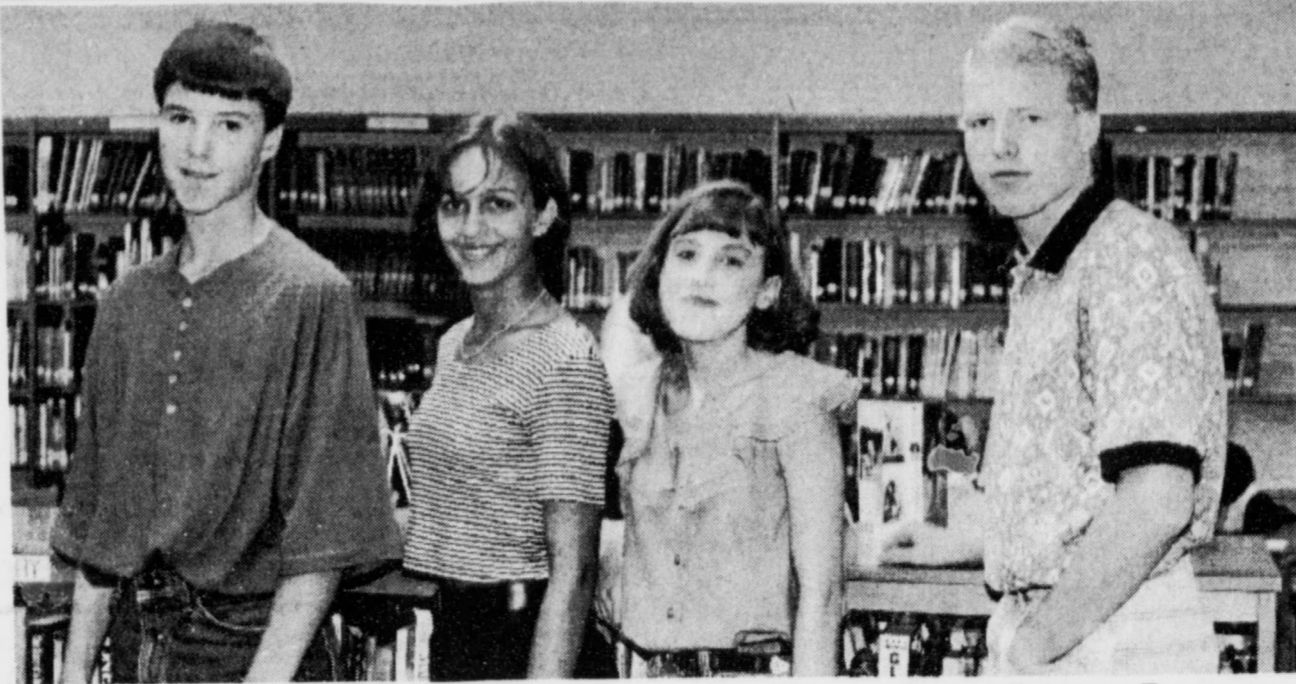

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

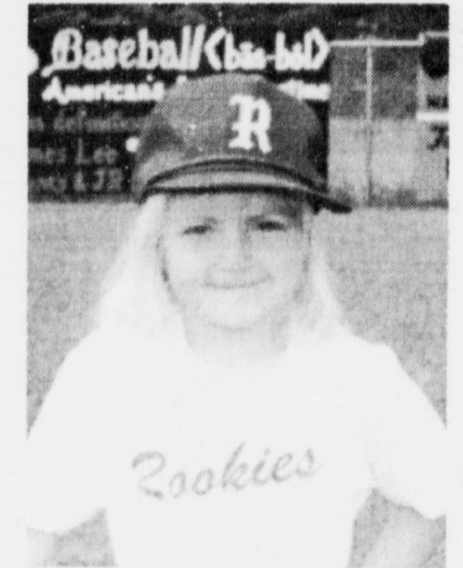
