Postmaster Receives Award For Honorable Service

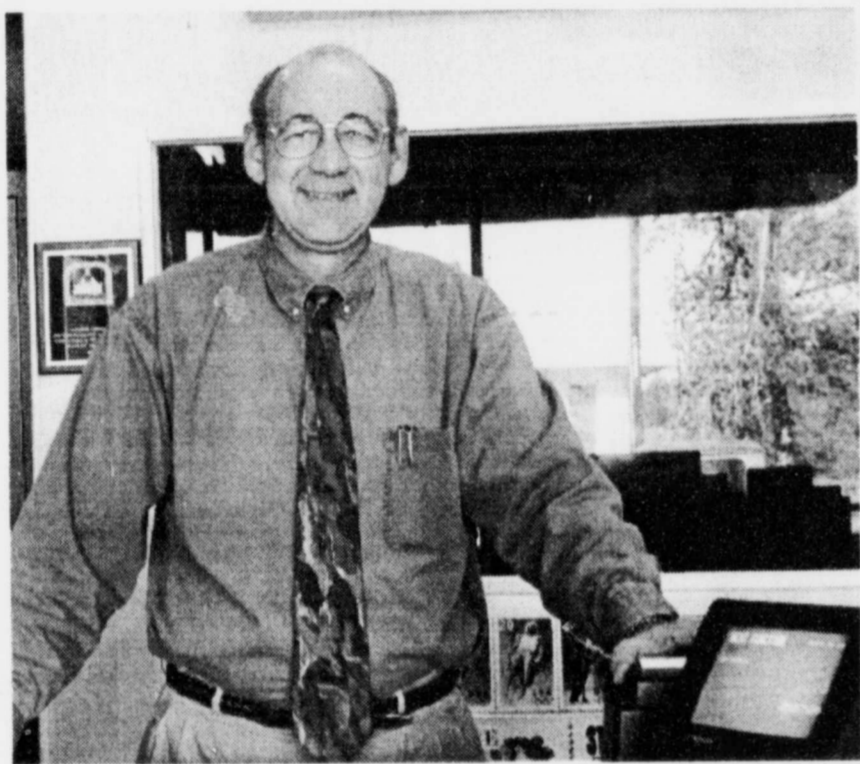
Talco Postmaster Ronny Sansom was awarded a silver pin for 25 years of honorable service to the U.S. Postal Service.

Investment Scams Abound, Seniors Are Favorite Targets

Washington-Older Americans are increasingly the favorite targets of scammers using the U.S. Mail and interstate telephone lines to pitch crooked investment schemes, warn Postal inspectors. One convicted con man referred to his senior victims as "WOOPIES" (well off older people).

Inspectors cite numerous cases worked from coast to coast that repeat a familiar pattern. Investors/victims bankroll the scammers' high rolling lifestyle rather than earning the promised high returns on their investments.

A northeast "financial planner" filched over \$5 million from 40 victims, including elderly members of his own family. He was arrested for mail fraud after causing his clients to obtain second mortgages or refinance existing mortgages to invest their cash in "muni-unit trusts," an investment vehicle unknown to legitimate brokers. Victims who now cannot meet mortgage payments are receiving foreclosure notices. Inspectors tracked down this crook in Venezuela and had him returned to the United States to face charges.

A midwestern savings club operator was indicted in Chicago for defrauding over 623 individuals of more

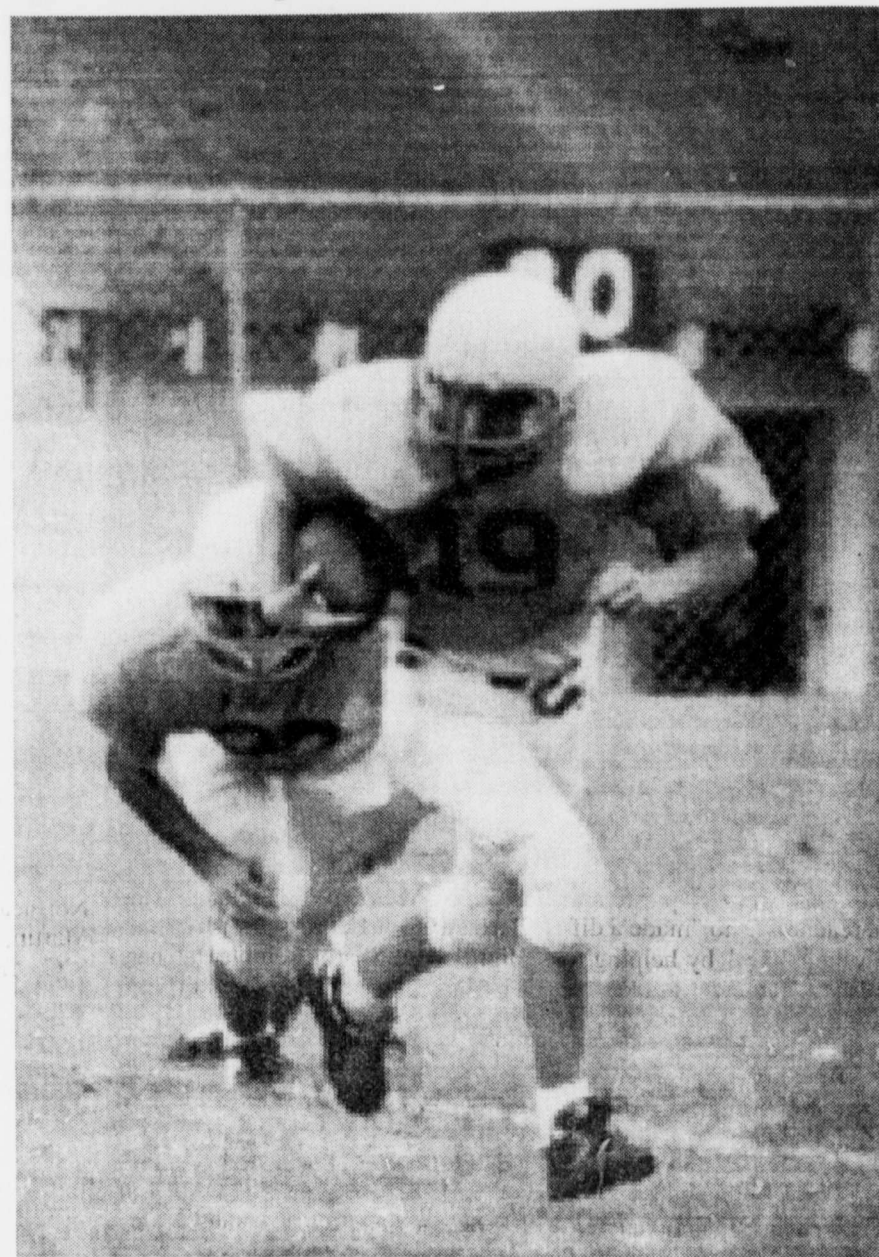

A select group of America's teachers are being honored by their toughest critics, their former students, in the third edition of Who's Who Among America's Teachers, 1994.

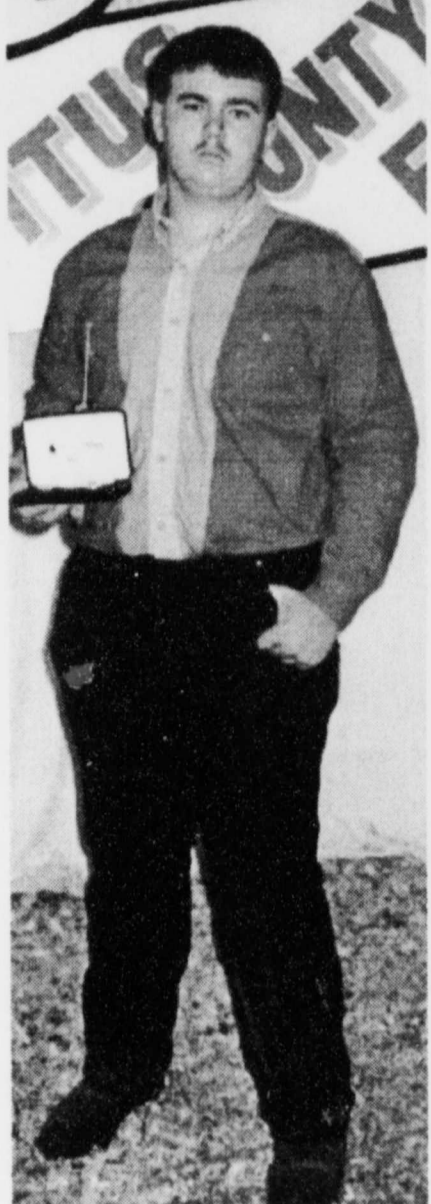

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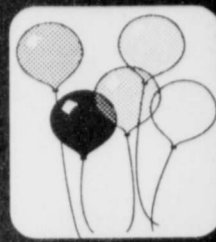
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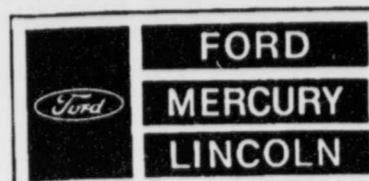
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Elderly Urged To Take Flu Shots

Elderly Urged To Get Flu Shots, Medicare Pays.... With the approach of autumn, it's time for older Americans to take precautions against the pneumonia and flu epidemics that are on the horizon. The cost of both pneumonia vaccinations and flu shots is covered by Medicare Part B (Medical Insurance) for those age 65 or older.

The National Institute on Aging (NIA), American Lung Association, and the Department of Veterans Affairs have launched a coordinated campaign to encourage elderly people to be vaccinated this fall. Statistics show they are twice as likely as younger persons to get pneumonia. Only about twenty percent of those over age 65 have taken advantage of the availability of the pneumonia vaccine in the past, according to the NIA.

The Public Health Service recommends an annual flu shot for people over age 65, even if they are generally healthy. Typically, shots are given in the fall or winter. Medicare beneficiaries do not need a doctor's prescriptions or supervision to have this vaccination covered by Medicare Part B. And, beneficiaries do not pay a deductible or coinsurance amount.

Medicare Part B pays the reasonable approved amount for either shot. If the cost exceeds the approved amount, the beneficiary is responsible for the difference.

Generally, the cost will be paid if the vaccine is provided at the doctor's office or by a hospital, skilled nursing facility, home health agency, rural health clinic, federally qualified health center, outpatient physical therapy provider, a comprehensive outpatient rehabilitation facility or health maintenance organization (HMO).

However, when Medicare beneficiaries get either vaccination at a community clinic that normally provides the shots free of charge to the public, the beneficiaries should not be charged just because they have Medicare coverage. Medicare Part B will not pay for these shots or for shots administered under a plan where an employer arranges to have free shots for all employees.

Medicare Part B pays for pneumonia and hepatitis B vaccinations when the beneficiary is in the hospital, even though the hospital stay is covered under Part A (Hospital Insurance). Flu shots now are paid for in the same way.

Citizens Group Mounts Drive To Keep RRAD Off Base Closure List

A community-wide campaign has been mounted to keep Red River Army Depot off the base closure list in 1995. Swede Lee, President, Texarkana Chamber of Commerce, is chairman of the RRAD Defense Committee which is spearheading an effort to assure that members of Congress and Department of Defense officials fully understand the military value of the depot. At the present time, 25 citizens representing 16 local communities comprise the RRAD Defense Committee.

Red River is at risk to be among the depots recommended for closure under the Base Realignment and Closure Commission initiatives to be announced in early 1995. There are currently five Army depots and two of these will possibly be earmarked for closing, Lee said.

What is at risk? In dollars, a loss of \$330 million a year. In jobs, 4,200 jobs at the depot and at least another 4,200 outside the depot. "What we're talking about is 4,200 jobs and \$330 million a year economic loss," Lee stressed in a recent meeting. Closure would have a "devastating" effect on the entire community--businesses, hospitals, churches, schools and the general quality of life would be hit hard.

Saving Red River will require hard work, smart planning and money. The Red River Defense Committee has established a budget of \$320,000. While this is a lot of money, it represents only one-tenth of one percent of RRAD's annual input into the area economy. The money will be used for printing, postage, telephone, travel, lobbyists, and economic analysis experts. Having enough money does not guarantee

success, but lack of funds virtually assures failure.

The next twelve months will be critical as we face the possibility of Red River Army Depot being closed during the 1995 Base Realignment and Closure Commission (BRAC) process.

The BRAC time table is as follows:

1. By January 1, 1995, the Department of the Army will submit a list of installations to be closed or realigned to the Department of Defense.

2. March 1, 1995, the Department of Defense submits list of installations to be closed to the BRAC Commission.

3. July 15, 1995, the BRAC Commission submits list to the President.

4. September 1, 1995, the President submits BRAC list to Congress. Congress must accept or reject the list; they cannot amend the list.

The community must work together as a team if we stand a chance of saving Red River from the closure list, Lee emphasized.

Donations are being solicited from private citizens, local businesses, employees of RRAD, and from civic, service and professional organizations. Everyone is urged to contribute to the RRAD Defense Fund.

Red River has built a reputation of responsive and efficient service to the nation during a 53-year period. "We must all work to assure that it remains a viable part of the national defense structure," Lee added.

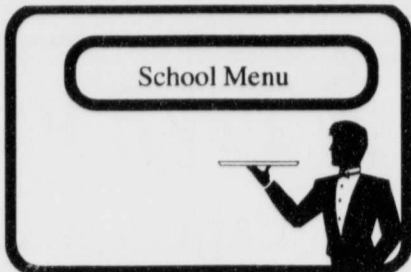
