tractors, but many other kinds are where there will be plenty of farmincluded. His room features farming and tractor posters and his reading material includes lots of farm maga-


The teenager is a competitor in showing his livestock projects. He won first place in the Hog division and second place in the Market Lamb division last year at the Red River Valley Fair.




