Mr. Jones began his association with Guaranty Bank in 1969 when he was elected as a director and chairman of the board. In 1979, he became vice-chairman and held that post un-

til his retirement.

In addition, Mr. Jones served as chairman of Guaranty Bancshares Inc., a multi-bank holding company whose subsidiaries include Guaranty Bank, Talco State Bank, Guaranty Leasing Company and the Guaranty Co.

Mr. Jones was born April 25, 1926, a son of the late Felix and Ruth Jones. He was also preceded in death by brothers Boyd and F.A. Jones and a daughter, Tracie.

Surviving are his wife, Dorothy Shaddix Jones; two sons and their families, Rusty and Carla Jones and their children Josh and Angela and Barry and Niki Jones and their daughter Taylor.

He also leaves several brothers and sisters, Anna Ruth Brown, Winell Blackard, John P. Jones, Bill G. Jones, Lon Jones, Nelda Kelsoe, Cato Jones and Virgil Jones.

The primary reason for accidental poisonings is carelessness on the part of an adult, Jerry Hudgens, pharmacist at Titus Regional Medical Center says. He continues that "It only takes seconds for a child to reach for a poisonous cleaner, cosmetic or medication, possibly resulting in a lifetime of injury,". "Children under the age of six are particularly at risk for poisoning due to their stage of development. Young children constantly explore the world around them, touching and tasting everything they see".

Improper storage of dangerous products and medicines simply begs for disaster. Not only does improper storage cause incidents, but some 75% of poisonings in children occur when a product is in use or has just been used.

Child resistant packing should be used on all medications, even if young children are not living in the home. One out of every five accidental childhood poisonings involve grandparents and their medication. Seniors often bring medication to the child's home in a purse or suitcase, giving a curious child easy access to it.

Titus County Regional Medical Center will help poison proof your home. Hospital personnel urge parent, grandparent or guardian to poison-proof their home.
