Only a 60 day window to sign up for farm program for the next seven years!

Glickman has warned that agriculturalists need to remember to sign up for the farm program between May 20 and July 12. This is a narrow window of only sixty days to sign up to receive ag transition payments during the next seven years.

Glickman said it will be especially important for producers who jump in and out of farm programs not to miss the spring sign-up period. Not signing up will effectively lock farmers out of the farm program though 2002!

Glickman says that "farmers don't give up a lot by signing up in the program, and if they don't sign-up, they'll be out of the program with no exceptions, except for CRP con-

In an address to the International Bankers Association of America Spring Leadership Meeting, Glickman told more than 220 community bankers at the conference that more than \$8 billion in government payments will flow to farmers by early next year. He noted that rural

Secretary of Agriculture, Dan banks will need to help small and moderate-size farms to be "exceedingly prudent" in managing and investing the new farm bill's frontloaded payments. The Secretary said he expects significantly greater price volatility to inevitably occur as producers respond to market signals and change crop plantings. He noted that this will pose a greater risk-management challenge for smaller and less capitalized producers and their lend-

> The Secretary outlined the payment schedule as making 50 percent of the 1996 transition payment within 30 days after a producer's contract is approved. If producers sign up by May 20, they should expect to receive a 50 percent payment by mid-June. The remainder of the 1996 transition payment will be made by Sept. 30 and producers will be eligible to receive 50 percent of the 1997 transition payment by either Dec. 15 or Jan. 15, depending on their tax-plan-



Our subject this week is strawberries. Always, about this time of year I begin to think of sweet, juicy strawberries and how good they are. I enjoy mine with a little salt on them to bring out the sweetness. at the crack of dawn, well really before! You would think that there would be no one else around, but at around 4:30 in the morning, cars would be lined up and down FM 410. Just waiting to get enough daylight to start picking berries. People would come from all around the area and have their buckets already placed at the beginning of the rows of berries that they thought would be the best. If there were any left over, you were lucky. If you waited a day or two, too long. . . they were all gone!

Both patches contained some of the sweetest, tastiest berries around as folks from all around this area can testify to. I have no idea how many gallons of berries were picked during a season, but can just imagine that it would be enough to make several pies and cakes, not to mention strawberry prserves.

We are sharing a variety of recipes containing strawberries this week. They include a Fresh Strawberry Pie, Strawberry Pie Alaska, Strawberries, Strawberry Delight, Strawberry-Cranberry Sauce and Strawberry

The 1992 graduate of DeKalb High School of DeKalb, Texas joined the Navy in June of 1992.

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
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

The automated system will also help Texas authorities warn victims of domestic violence and stalking when the abusers post bail or are released.

The TDCJ will seek bids for a state of the art notification system which will make the Texas inmate data base accessible to citizens 24 hours a day through a toll free number. The program will also automatically notify victims of domestic violence or stalking by telephone when the perpetrator is released. Start up costs will be
