The Department of Public Safety had estimated that as many as 40 persons could die in traffic accidents in Texas during the 78 hour Labor Day weekend, which continued through midnight Monday, September 2nd.

The final count, as of 3 p.m. on

September 3 was 39, with a good many being alcohol related.

Also, any seriously injured victims who die within thirty days of their injury also will count as Labor Day Holiday fatalities, so the eventual death toll could still go higher, the DPS office says.

Rural Utilities Service offers loans and grants for water and wastewater systems that have suffered an emergency disaster within the last two

years which resulted in a significant decline in quantity or quality of water. Funds can be used to alleviate the problems created by the emergency.

To be eligible for assistance, the applicant must be a public body or a non-profit corporation serving rural areas and towns of up to 10,000 residents.

ered dish lunch will be served and everyone is asked to bring their favorite dish. Plates, cups, silverware and drinks will be furnished.

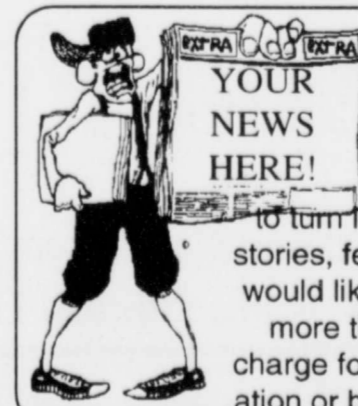
Highways to receive reflective markers

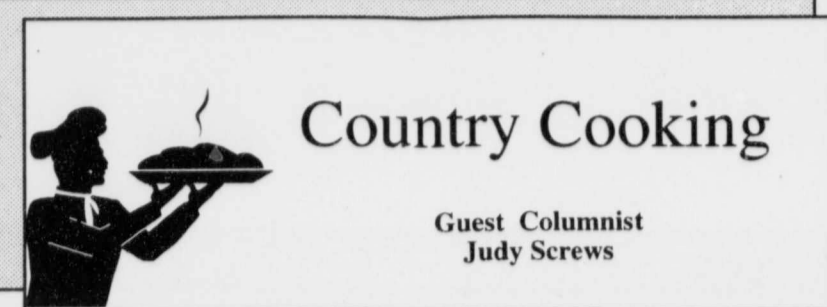

Kentucky Pecan Pie

1 cup white corn syrup
1 cup dark brown sugar
1/3 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup melted butter or margarine
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 whole eggs (slightly beaten)
1 heaping cup shelled whole pecans
Combine syrup, sugar, salt, butter and vanilla. Mix well. Add slightly beaten eggs. Pour into 9 inch unbaked pie shell. Sprinkled pecans all over. Bake in pre heated 350 degree oven for approximately 45 minutes. When cool you may top with whipped cream or ice cream.

Cantaloupe Pie

1 baked pie shell
2 1/2 cups cooked cantaloupe
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 eggs (separated)
1 cup sugar
4 tablespoons flour
1/4 stick margarine

Pare cantaloupe. Cut in cubes. Add about 1/4 cup water; enough to start cooking. Makes its own juice. Cook until tender. Mash with potato masher. Let cool slightly. Mix flour and sugar together. Add to cooked cantaloupe. Add beaten egg yolks to mixture and cook until it thickens. Add vanilla and margarine. Fill cooked pie shell. Top with meringue and brown in 350 degree oven.

Corn Casserole

1 can cream style corn
1 can whole kernel corn
2 cups cracker crumbs
2 eggs
1 cup milk
4 Tablespoons butter
4 Tablespoons sugar
2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon pepper
4 Tablespoons bell pepper
4 Tablespoons onions

Mix all together. Put in casserole pan. Bake in 350 degree oven 30 or 40 minutes until brown.

Picante Sauce

5 gallons tomatoes, peeled and quartered
8 jalapeno peppers chopped
6 teaspoons garlic salt
6 teaspoons salt
1 cup white vinegar
1/2 cup sugar
2-- 8 ounce cans tomato sauce

Mix all ingredients. Bring to a slow boil. Cook 30 to 40 minutes. Add 1/2 corn starch to thicken. Put in jars.

Oven Canned Tomatoes

Wash and scald jars and lids
Peel and core fresh tomatoes
fill jars and tighten lids on them
Use 1/2 teaspoon salt for pints or 1 teaspoon salt for quarts.

Put jars on cookie sheet in cold oven. Turn oven to 350 degrees. Bake 45 minutes. Keep oven door closed. Let jars cool before opening door.



NUTS & BOLTS

Last week as we drove blissfully down Highway 271 we began feeling and hearing the telltale Thumps, Thuds and Clangs which let you know that you have had a blowout. 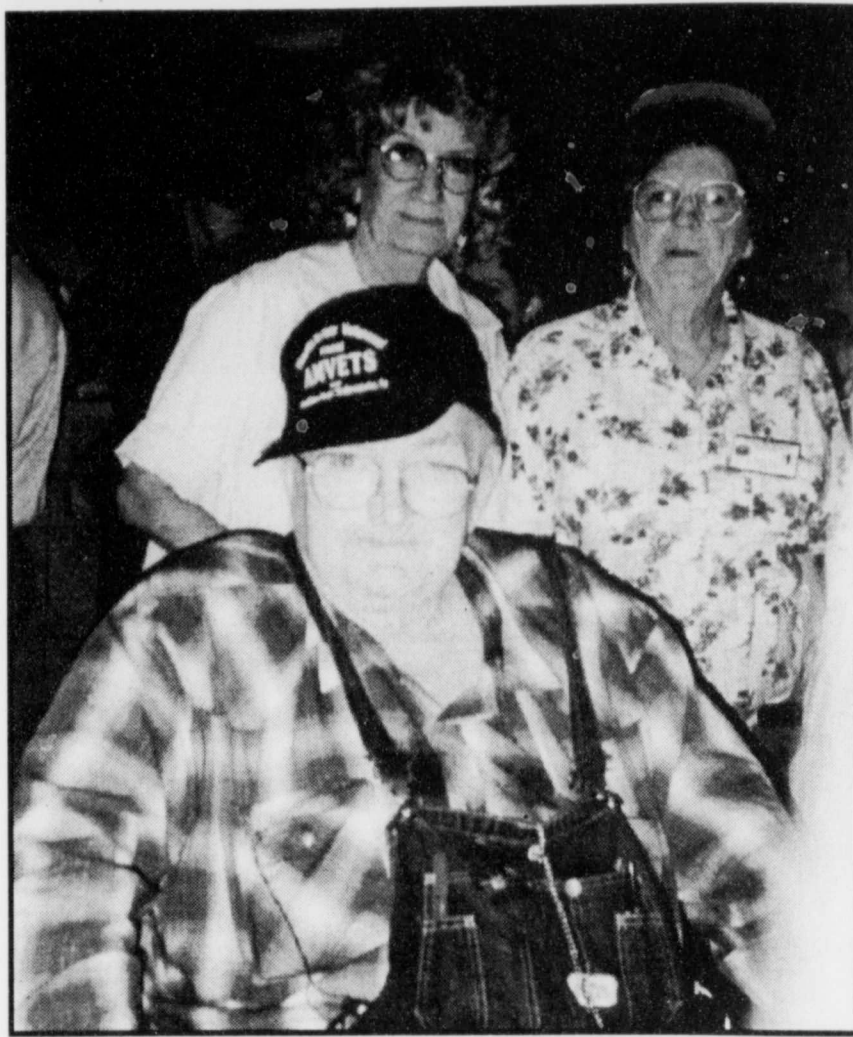
