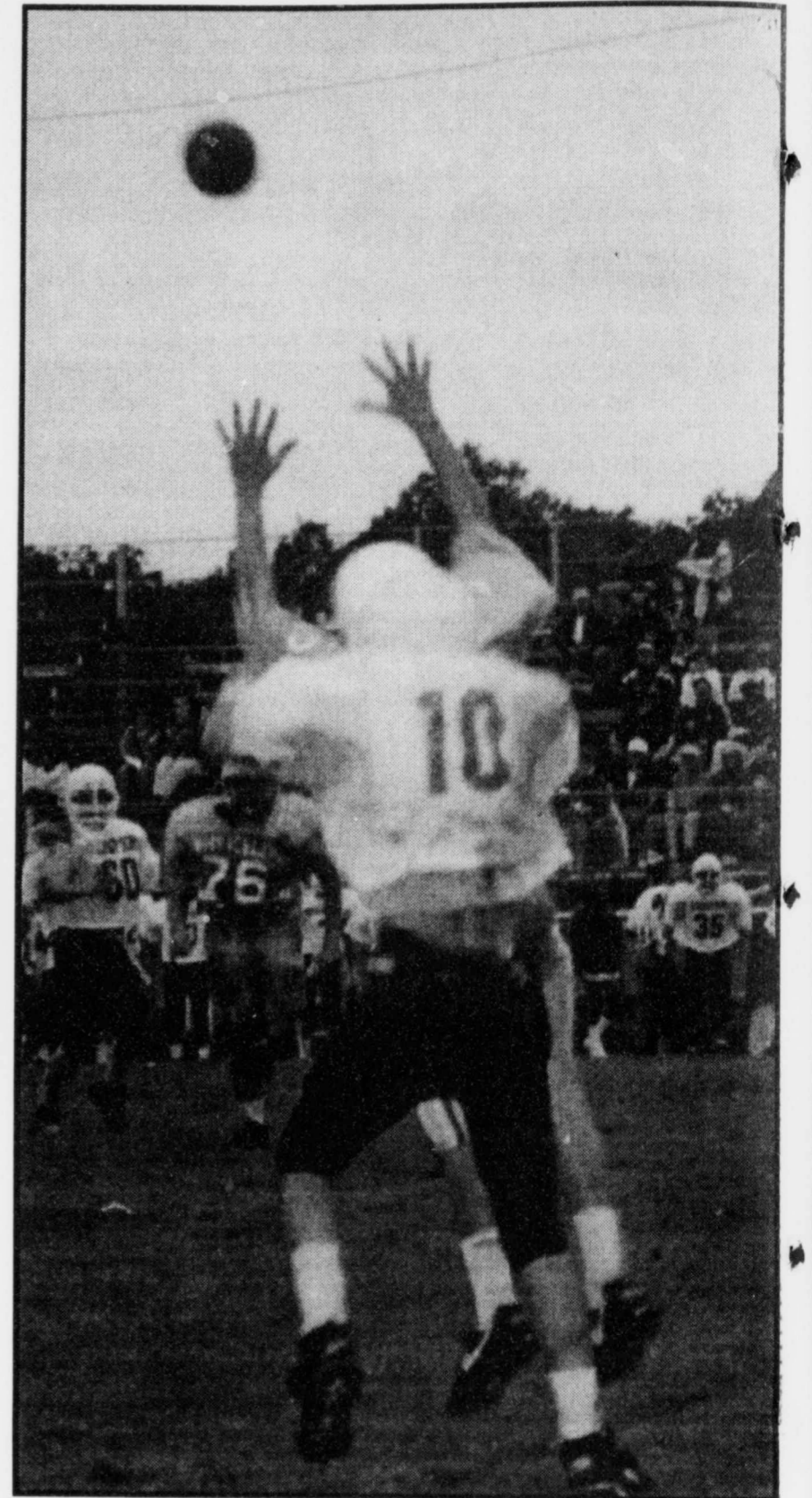
In the final quarter, quarterback Jody Nolen returned gunning the passes the Rebel receivers. Michael Deming and Jody Gray broke the line

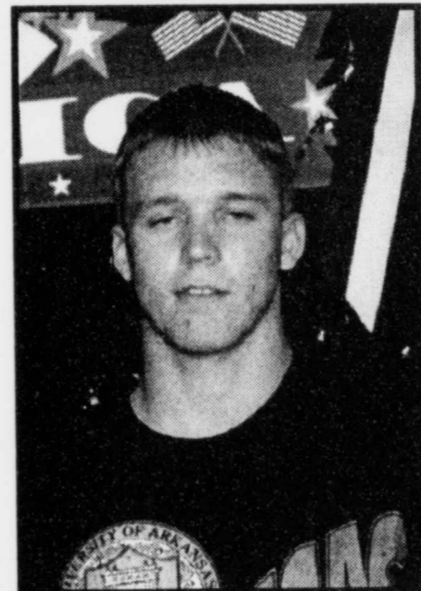
The Rebel recovery was made too late in the game and the Bulldogs took a 54-27 win. Rebel Clint Gage was injured during the game, dislo-

## NUTS & BOLTS

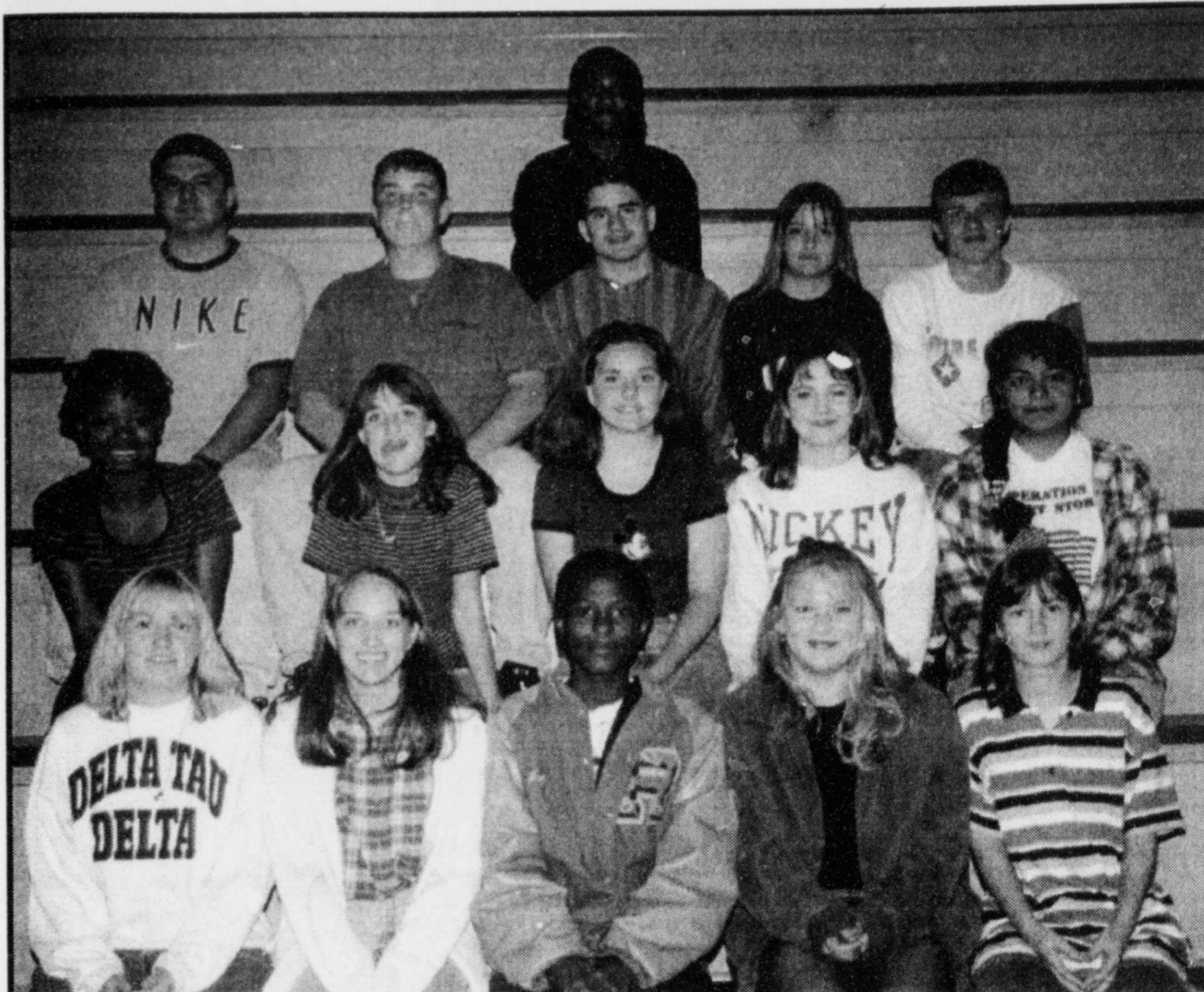
When we awake in the middle of the night at our house our eyes are treated to an assortment of bright little twinkling lights looking at us from every part of the room. There is the little green light on the intercom. Then there is the bright red light on the cordless phone and the face of the electric alarm clock which is illuminated is yellowish. These are all on the table on my side of the bed. The intercom is a wonderful instrument and saves us lots of steps and lots of yelling up and down the stairs. The illuminated dial electric alarm clock has always been wonderful so you don't have to turn on the lamp to see what time it is. I could look at my watch which has see-in-the-dark hands, but I can never be sure that I am looking at it the right way so I cannot be sure what time it is. The cordless phone which has the big red light is nice if you need to get up and walk around while you talk on the phone or hand it to someone who is sitting in the other part of the room, but forget it for dialing in the dark because the dial is not illuminated. Most people probably know by touch the numbers on a phone so you don't usually need the dial to be lit, but this little phone has so many buttons that I can't remember which row is numbered buttons and which rows are instructions such as redial, mute, memo, etc. The best phones for dialing in the dark are the ones with the lit up dials which are not located on my side of the bed but rather on the other side of the bed and in the bathroom.

There was a time when we would leave a small light on for the children at night or when we would buy the little night lights which you can plug into a wall outlet so you will not run into the furniture as you walk through the house in the dark, but now it is possible to follow the lights from the time display on the microwave and the time display on the VCR. Heaven help us though if the electricity flickers off and the VCR goes off for a few seconds, because not only will you have a lighted display of the time, you will have a very irritating blinking time display which will continue to blink until someone who knows how to reset it arrives. I have never mastered the art of setting VCR's.

As you go on through the house, you see the little red light on the cordless electric shaver which is sometimes plugged into the outlet over the dressing table in the bathroom to be recharged. Of course it is never plugged in if you need it. Someone is always coming along and unplugging it, and then when you get ready to use it it makes a sad little whirring sound letting you know that it is not its fault that it can't do the job.

The smoke detector in the hall has a tiny little pencil thin light twinkling from its "innards". But the Carbon Monoxide detector has a large red light letting you know just how big and important it is. The plugs at various outlets throughout the house which have the expanders on them so that you may plug two cords into an outlet which was meant for one cord all have one red and one green light on them. The various other phones, answering machines and computer type equipment which are spread throughout the house along with the scanners and other rechargeable cordless appliances which are being recharged at various times all sport their own little twinkles. They are all red, green or yellow lights.

All the many lights which twinkle at you as you walk through the house at night are kind of nice to follow so that you don't have to switch on a lamp, but don't depend on them if you have children in the house because they won't keep you from stepping on a forgotten set of jacks or rolling across the floor on a skate. Actually nothing can protect the unsuspecting adult from kid's toys even in broad daylight. At least the little lights will make you aware of which of your appliances are working and which need to be repaired, have new batteries installed or just need to be plugged in again.
