Bogata police grant application goes to Washington

The city of Bogata came a step closer to a grant of \$412,500 for 24-hour law enforcement when the Ark-Tex Council of Governments gave unanimous approval to the application August 27 at a meeting in Mt. Pleasant. The grant application has been sent on to the Department of Justice in Washington D.C. where it will be approved or not.

The grant would come from the Community Oriented Police universal hiring program and is strictly a grant, no matching funds or repayment would be necessary.

The grant was for 5 full-time and one part time police officer. This would provide the city of Bogata with twenty-four hour, seven day a week police patrol.

Mayor Mike Garretson said "five officers seems like a lot at first, but this is the number it takes working 3 eight hour shifts per weekday and allowing people two days a week off and providing 24 hour coverage and protection on weekends. These officers will NOT be in addition to the officers we have currently. The total will be five full time and one part time."

The grant would pay for this police protection for three years. When asked what would happen in three years the Mayor said "there are lots of different possibilities. There is the possibility of an extension on the grant, the pos-

sibility of new grants, the possibility that the citizens of Bogata would see the effect the police department had and would be willing to pay for it from then on, or even the possibility of ceasing the 24-hour department at that time".

Garretson cited that Mt. Vernon and Honey Grove had both received similar grants in the past, and that at Honey Grove the citizens were pleased enough to vote to keep the department after the grant ended. Mt. Vernon's grant expired this year, and they, too, have retained all officers hired under the grant.

"It is going to be up to the citizens of this town to decide what will happen in three years" Garretson said "in the meantime the money is there to apply for to help cities like ours".

There are opponents of the grant application. They state that "there are no free lunches" and worry about what will happen in three years when the grant expires. They also have concerns and fears about speed traps or unnecessary tickets being handed out. They do not feel that a town the size of Bogata needs full-time police protection.

When the final approval on the law enforcement grant will come is not known at this time.

Mayor Garretson also stressed that "whether we get this grant or not we will have a police department. We

have approximately \$60,000 budgeted for police protection right now. Also, if we get the grant it will pay for our police department. If we don't, the citizens will pay for the police department. If the grant comes through, that's \$180,000 over a three year period that we could use for other services or that money could go toward the police department after all grant monies are exhausted."

The citizens of Bogata elected a new mayor and 3 new council members the last election. We told the citizens of Bogata if we were elected our goals and promises were to clean up the town of overgrown lots, buildings, cars and take control of the stray animals and have a police department with enough men and equipment for 24 hour protection, to the best of our ability with limited funds. These funds are now possible to obtain from the government. "Garretson said.

"We are working very hard to accomplish this. Please don't be misled by the few who oppose our city having a police department" he continued.

Garretson says that "Since we have had existing law enforcement we have not had the juvenile problems in our parks, cemeteries, nor graffiti problems that we had before. We are truly making efforts to do more and this grant will enable us to accomplish our goals".

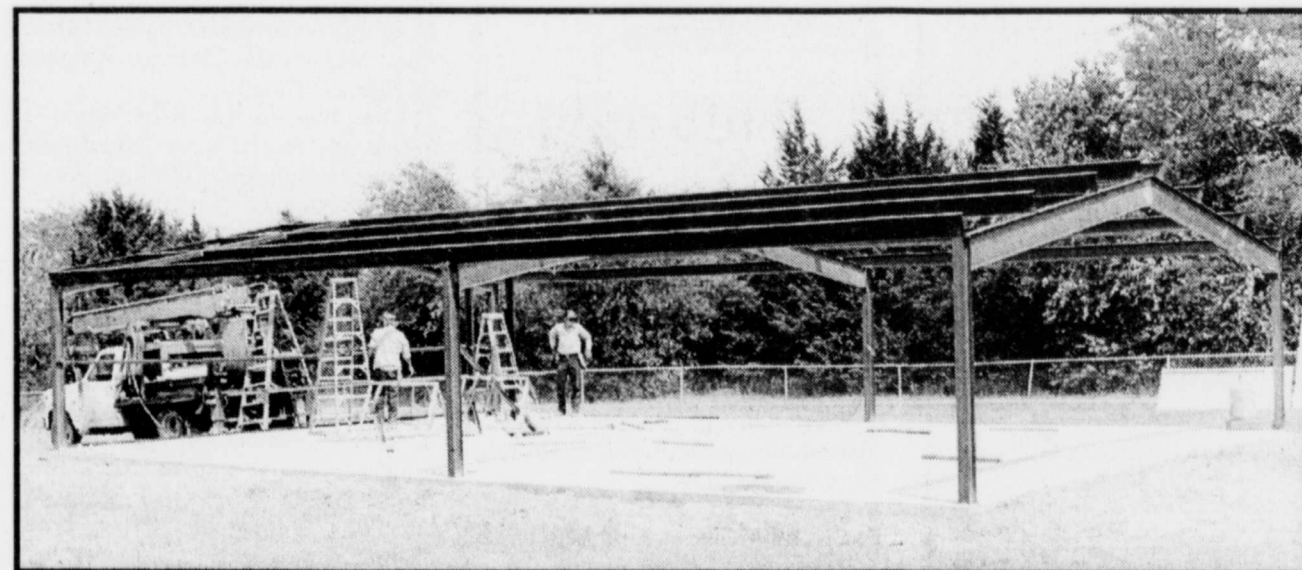
Opposition letters to grant application being sent to Washington

Tracie Osborne is one of the organizers of opposition to the grant application for 24-hour law enforcement in Bogata. She states that "at present I have mailed over 100 of these letters to Robert A. Phillips, Assistant Director for Grants Administration in Washington, D.C. They bear the signatures of Bogata citizens. I also have over 200 more to mail".

The letter reads:
Dear Mr. Phillips:
The Justice Department is being asked to approve a request for \$412,500.00 dollars by the City of Bogata, a small northeast Texas community of 1421 citizens. This grant

will pay for five full-time police officers and two part-time officers to patrol its streets. At present we have one full-time officer and two part-time officers and have only had them in place for a couple of months. Bogata's crime rate is below the average in this area of Texas. It is our opinion that sooner or later this will be a burden that our community cannot bear after the grant money is gone. We believe more harm than benefit will come to this city if this grant is passed. We have recently elected a young and inexperienced mayor and city council. While we do need a deputy and night watchman which would be manageable over-

head for this community of approximately 550-880 households, we do not need or want anything larger. Also we are well represented by Red River County Sheriff Department Law Enforcers as one detective and one county deputy reside in Bogata at present time. We also have frequent presence of patrolling Texas Department of Public Safety in and around the Bogata area which is located at the intersection of State Highway 27 and 271. As grants are always appreciated and needed in most cases we ask by hearing from so many Bogata citizens that you not approve the grant that the City of Bogata has applied for.

Contributions to help with pavilion construction at Bethel Cemetery

Work on the pavilion at Bethel Cemetery is almost done. The pavilion is 30 x 45 feet, and is located at the north east portion of the cemetery. It will have a 30 x 40 open space and an enclosed area of 30 by 5 ft. for rest rooms and storage. This building will be used for graveside services, interment services during bad weather, a place where families can meet, and many more uses. It is an all steel building on a concrete slab and should last for many generations. Loren Hackler, a retired metal builder, has supervised the erection. He is working with the contractor that sup-

plies the metal, cut, fitted and ready to assemble.

The cost of the facility is \$8,500. The cemetery association now has about \$6,963.81 in the maintenance fund. They are hoping for memorial gifts, contributions or estate settlements to help them pay for the project.

They hope to send all who can contribute a picture, an invitation to a Bethel Homecoming Program and a covered dish luncheon in October when weather will be cooler.

Cynthia Ann McDowra dies August 28

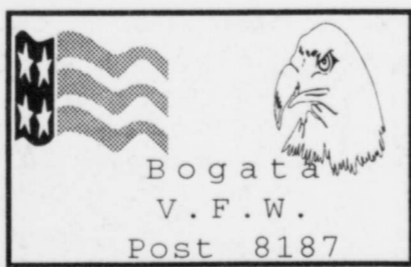

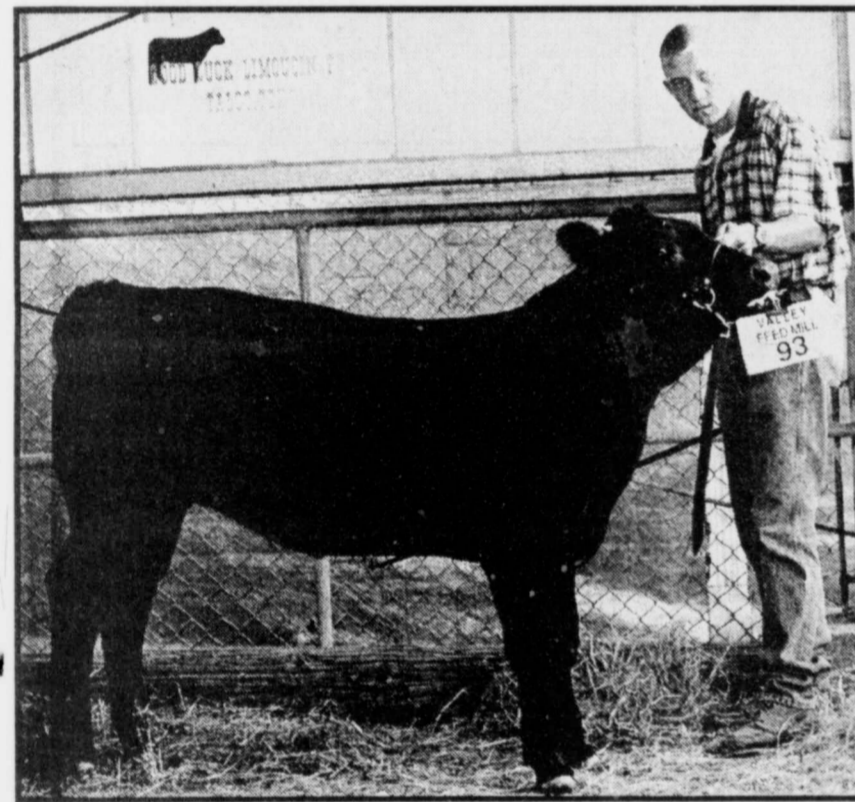

Census Bureau prepares for Census 2000

Although the Census 2000 is still two years away, government officials are already working to make sure that the nation's population count is complete and accurate.

Census statistics are governments primary source of information. This information collected (population, age, ethnicity, housing, etc.) is extremely important for state and local jurisdictions, which use this data to plan for such things as roads, schools and hospitals.

Census data also influences decision making for private industry on where to locate.

The Census essentially performs two direct functions for the people. The first, is based on the population in a given area, it determines the appointments of representation in Congress as well as the state legislature. The second, based on population statistics, determines the amount of federal aid.

In 1990, the state of Texas lost approximately 41 billion in federal aid money (averages to roughly \$100 million a year). The Census 2000

forms will be shorter, with 5 out of every 6 households receiving the short version which consists of 7 questions.

To accurately conduct Census 2000, the bureau must first determine the correct address and location of

every household. The address listing operation concentrates on rural and suburban areas.

Everyone is encouraged to help those working with the census in their area by filling the forms out correctly which in turn adds federal aid dollars to the area.

37 die in Labor Day traffic accidents

Preliminary reports (and these could increase if additional reports are received, and they almost always are) indicate that at least 37 persons died in 32 traffic crashes during the 78 hour reporting period that comprised the Labor Day Holiday. Thirty-four had been predicted.

Twenty-nine of the thirty-two involved single fatalities, one collision took three lives and three of the deaths involved were in Northeast Texas. One death each occurred in Hunt County, Van Zandt County and Morris County.

There were two auto-pedestrian deaths, one fatality involved a pickup and a train and another involved a pickup and a cow.

There were three motorcycle fatalities, none of which were wearing helmets. Fifty-four percent of those killed were not wearing seat belts. This included one twelve year old boy.

Finally, at least four deaths were DWI related. It is predicted that this number will definitely increase as the investigations continue.

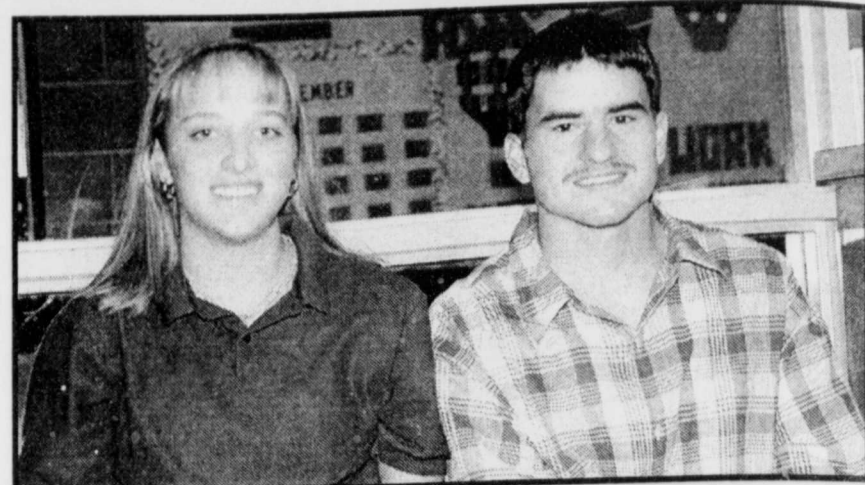

U.S. Census Bureau hiring in Red River County

The U.S. Census Bureau is gearing up now for Census 2000 by updating its maps and address lists in counties and communities throughout the state. Applicants for the field worker and clerk jobs must pass a 30 minute exam of basic work skills. For details about the exam dates, next testing day and time, locations or to get more information call the Census Bureau's Recruiting Department toll-free in Dallas at 1-888-325-7733.

Applicants should be assured that the U.S. Census Bureau is an Equal Employment Opportunity employer and all qualified applicants will be considered regardless of age, race, color, sex, creed, national origin or other non-merit factors.

The Census Bureau will be conducting testing at the Clarksville Chamber of Commerce in Red River County, Clarksville, Texas on Thursday, September 17, 1998 at 10:00 a.m.

A look at how schools operate and are financed

Recently our boss and chief editor, Nanalee Nichols, at Thunder Prairie Publishing told the entire staff she would like to have more feature stories from each town represented under Thunder Prairie Publishing which are Deport, Talco, Bogata, Blossom and Detroit. As I mulled over the many interesting people in the Talco area I could feature I decided that perhaps it would interest readers to learn something about how our school system works and is financed. In spite of the controversy going on right now, our schools must still function, and how they do so is interesting.

I sat down and did an interview with Superintendent Gary VanDeaver.

Dr. VanDeaver's duties at Rivercrest include overseeing the budget preparation and implementation, fulfilling state requirements and supervising the daily running of the school. This year he will also take on half of the principal's duties which includes evaluating teachers and will put him back in a hands-on situation with the student body at Rivercrest High School. Sharing the principal's duties with him will be Kay Kennedy, who is also the counselor at Rivercrest High School. Between the two the year will be a very busy one.

Dr. VanDeaver explained the workings of the school for me to share with the public. When asked, "Where does the school's money come from?" He stated, 1. from the State Foundation Program which is based on a formula of the number of students and the number of square miles of the district, 2. from local taxes which is the major income paid by property owners on an evaluation of their property done by the Chief Appraiser at Red River County which the school hires to make these appraisals and 3. Federal Funding which

funds programs such as Agriculture and Homemaking according to the number of students.

20 years ago the value of the Talco-Bogata CISD was \$235 million dollars. 6 years ago and after a drop in oil production at Talco the value dropped to \$178 million dollars and today the value is \$79 million dollars. This is a tremendous drop and the school has gone from a very rich one to a low income one.

The State requires teachers be paid a minimum salary and our district pays their teachers \$1,400 over the state required amount. Some larger districts pay their teachers more and some less. In order to have good educators a district must pay a reasonable salary to keep them. This is the major expense of the district.

The utilities (electric, gas and water) expenses for all three schools per month is near or over \$10,000 per month. Near or over \$6000 of the bill is electricity.

Three years before Mr. VanDeaver became Superintendent at Rivercrest the school had some money in the bank but were forced to borrow \$200,000 over what they were taking in for expenses. The oil tax drop is the major cause for this. An example would be if a person has an oil well valued at \$200,000 per year, a person who is taxed on 100 acres of land at agricultural value would not come near to paying the tax charged on that one oil well. Last year the budget was balanced at the school for the first time in several years but cuts were made in order to do so. \$10,000 was cut from the athletic program and no new buses were purchased. Dr. VanDeaver feels the budget will again be balanced this year but it will do so by not making expensive repairs. The State runs 2 or 3 years behind so when the tax value went down the State did not recognize it

right away and did not give the school more money. The extra money from the state began last year but it is still not completely accurate. Finances are close.

Agriculture classes have been an issue and Dr. VanDeaver was asked to explain that department. He stated, "Our Ag. Department is currently one of the best for a school our size and larger. We have 3 teachers where most schools have only one. We have state of the art machinery such as a pipe bender which allows our students to make trailers and gates and much more. We have a state of the art green house, meat lab and have a hydraulic shearing machine. None of the schools in our district have as much as we do. We have students who now make their living as butchers and welders and they learned at Rivercrest High School".

Dr. VanDeaver said, "We would like to offer more occupational classes some, without state funding, are out of our reach but others are not. Adding cosmetology and health services and carpentry are a possibility some day. Although we'd like to add plumbing and electrical these are basically out of reach for now". This year Rivercrest and Bogata School received Exemplary on the TAAS test and Talco received Acceptable, missing Recognized by only 1.2%. Rivercrest has held this high rating for 3 years.

Dr. VanDeaver is looking forward to a successful year for the Talco, Bogata and Rivercrest Schools because he feels we have some of the best teachers and students anywhere and he is proud to be associated with our schools.

I would like to thank him for his time and patience with me and to wish him, his staff and students a very good year.
