Armyworms have been a serious problem in East Texas pastures last month following recent rains in that area. Experience in East Texas suggests September rains in Northeast Texas may also be followed by armyworm outbreaks in pastures, hayfields and later in small grains. Vigorous, dense pastures and hay are often especially attractive to armyworms.


The key to effective control is to detect and control infestations before they have caused economic damage. Armyworms are very small when they first hatch from eggs and during the first ten days of feeding, do not consume very much foliage. However, once they reach an inch or more in length, they eat up to 80% of their total food intake during their last 5-7 days of development. As a result,

pastures and hayfields can be consumed almost overnight. Also, smaller worms are easier to control with insecticides, again making early detection important.

The adult stage of the armyworm is a moth which migrates north from south Texas each summer. The moths are only active at night when they deposit masses of eggs on grass blades. During drought, many of the eggs and young armyworms apparently die. However, rain and higher humidity favor egg hatch and survival of young larvae. Also, armyworm moths may concentrate their leg laying in fields which have recently received rains, thus ensuring a succulent food source for their offspring.



Colder milk being provided at RHS

Department has been working with Dairy MAX Inc. to provide colder milk to students. The federal school lunch program is now more than 50 years old, and today's students are sometimes encountering the same problem as those who first ate meals at school; that is, milk is less than refreshing because of its temperature. Schools battle the equivalent of what could be expected at home if you left your refrigerator door open for several minutes. The cold air escapes, and the milk and other items become warmer. In schools, however, the doors might be left open for two hours during the serving periods for lunch.

Dairy MAX, Inc., the regional dairy promotion and nutrition education organization, has a goal of eliminating by the year 2000, the problem of warm milk at all the schools in the six state area it serves. Becke Anderson, Marketing Consultant for Dairy MAX in East Texas, visited each campus cafeteria recently, and help determine how to provide colder milk for the students. It is more than just a matter of what tastes better, colder temperatures assure the safety of milk. The United States Department of Agriculture is recommending that

Talco-Bogata ISD Food Service epartment has been working with airy MAX Inc. to provide colder ilk to students. The federal school

Talco-Bogata ISD was provided with \$930 worth of free equipment by Dairy MAX to help meet this goal of colder milk for the students. Included in this are plastic cooler curtains for milk boxes and "cow coolers" or black and white spotted milk barrels for serving milk on line.

Even though they are refrigerated, the "cold wall" cooler boxes begin to ward by 10 degrees or more over a two hour period, after the doors are left open for serving. The curtain panels provide a see-through barrier for the students to reach between to get the cold milk cartons. The milk barrels are portable containers with side pockets for interlocking freezer panels, that surround cases of the half-pint cartons. Recent tests have shown that the equipment provided will maintain milk that is several degrees colder than the 41 degrees recommended.

This kind of innovation shows that the school child nutrition program is concerned about the quality of food and is constantly striving to improve how it is served.

For beasties and ghoulies and things that go bump in the night: Wear proper fiendish attire

Halloween is the kids' night to howl, so let them do it in style and safety. Children's Halloween costumes should give children maximum mobility and visibility for the nocturnal neighborhood treks on October 31.

"Parents should consider these guidelines before the little gremlins get dressed for their trick or treating,," said Michael C. Smith, M.D. Pediatrician at Scott & White Clinic, Waco..

So how can parents make sure their little cowboys, ballerinas and space aliens are stylish and safe.? Dr. Smith advises the following:

** Make sure the costume allows for easy movement and doesn't drag on the ground. This could cause the child to trip and fall. The child should wear

shoes that fit well and feel comfortable. High heels, clown feet or heavy boots could cause the child to stumble.

* Since most trick or treating is done at sundown or at night, costumes should allow the child to see and be seen by motorists. Make sure the costume is made of white or bright material so that the child can be seen at night. Use black only for trim or decorative touches. * Elaborate headdresses and rubber masks can block a child's vision. A good substitute for masks and headdresses is face painting. Just make sure the paint is non-toxic and designed for use on the fact. Use paint labeled specifically for cosmetic purposes and safe for the skin. If you have doubts about using a paint, call the Texas Poison Center Network's




