Highways to be resurfaced

About 238 miles of Northeast Texas highways will receive new surfaces during 1999 with a contract awarded this month by the Texas Department of Transportation.

The Texas Transportation Commission approved a bid of \$4.6 million from Clark Construction Company, Inc. of San Antonio to seal coat highways in nine counties located within the Atlanta District.

In an effort to help keep used tires off Texas landscapes, the district is requiring that about half of the asphalt used to be mixed with crumb rubber made from grinding up old

The following highways are scheduled to be resurfaced during the summer of 1999:

Titus County: Business 271 East from US 67 north to US 271, 3.5 miles; Texas 49, from Mt. Pleasant city limits to FM1735, 2.3 miles; FM 21, from Franklin County line to Camp County line, 3.7 miles; Hill Hole Access Road, from Titus County Road NE35 to White Oak Creek Wildlife Management Area, 1.1 miles; FM1735 from Texas 49 to Texas 11, 8.2 miles; FM1734, from U.S. 67 at Winfield to US 271, 7.3

Incumbents generally returned to offices in election

As expected, Governor George W. Bush was returned to office with no problem against challenger Gary Mauro in Tuesday's election.

Republicans defeated a number of state-wide Democrats, including Rick Perry for Lieutenant Governor over John Sharp; Republican John Cormyn edged out incumbent Jim Mattox and challenger Mike Angwin.

L.P. (Pete) Patterson lost his bid for Commissioner of Agriculture to Republican Susan Combs, the first woman ever elected to the post.

Tony Garza captured the Railroad Commissioner's post with a wide margin over Joe B. Henderson and Jim Spurlock.

Democratic incumbent Tom Ramsey was easily returned to his seat over Republican challenger Debe McGuire.

Mark Homer-Democrat, defeated Sue Fancher.

In a strictly local race in Lamar County incumbent Jackie Wheeler was returned to his seat as County Commissioner, Pct. 4.









The interest expense component increased to \$6.7 million for the nine months ended September 30, 1998, a 12.7% increase from \$6.0 million for the nine months ended September 30, 1997. This increase was due mainly to an increase in interest bearing liabilities, specifically certificates of deposits. Interest bearing liabilities increased to \$182.8 million as of September 30, 1998. Average rates paid on interest bearing liabilities increased eight basis points for the first nine months of 1998 compared to the same time period in 1997. The net interest margin was 4.07% for 1998 compared to 4.19% for the same period in

Non-interest income increased to \$2.2 million as of September 1998, an 82.2% increase from \$1.2 million as of September, 1997. Other operating expenses increased \$303,000 or 16.1%. Some of the increases were in the provision OREO property valuations, losses sustained and insurance

Year to date 1998, on an annualized basis, the Company realized a return on assets of 1.04% and a return on equity of 12.35% versus 1.05% and 14.11% for the first nine months

The efficiency ratio was 69.22% for the first nine months of 1998 compared to 72.67% for the same period in 1997.
