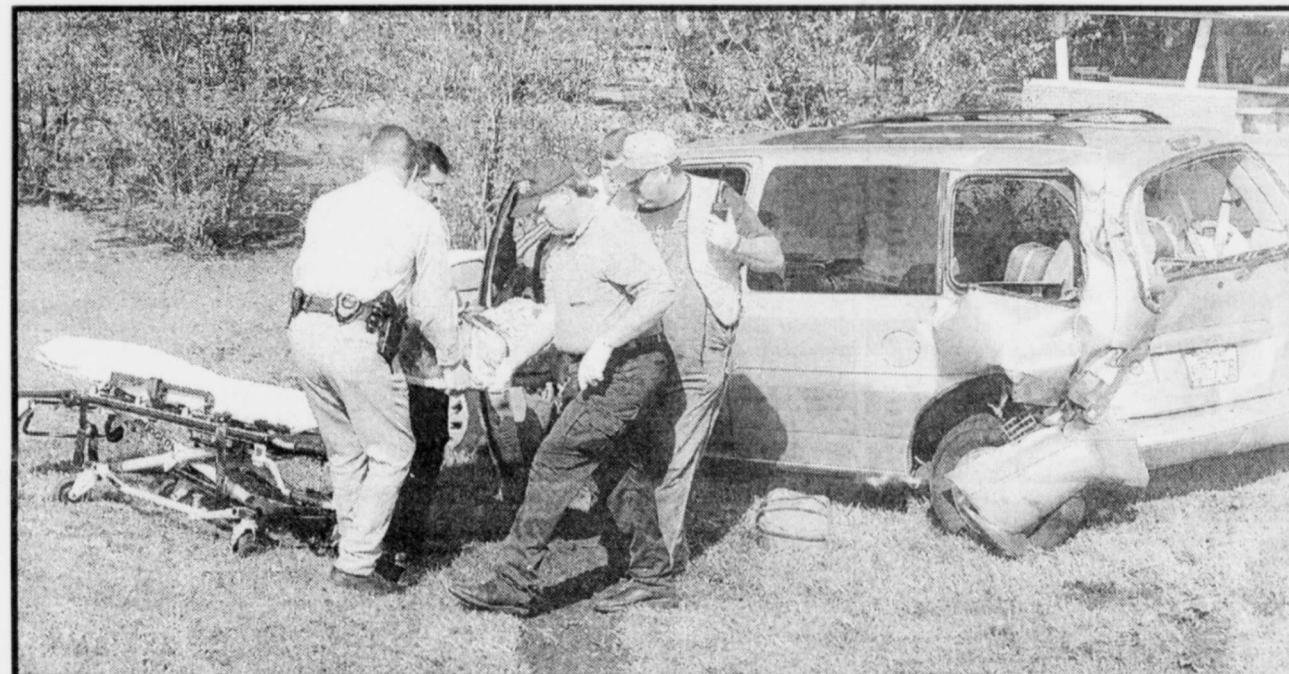

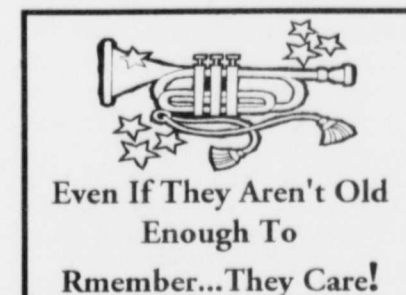
will be allowed. The band will have a concession stand available. Deadline for entry will be Nov. 26, 1998.

**Giblet Gravy**—a must for all turkey and dressing during the holidays.

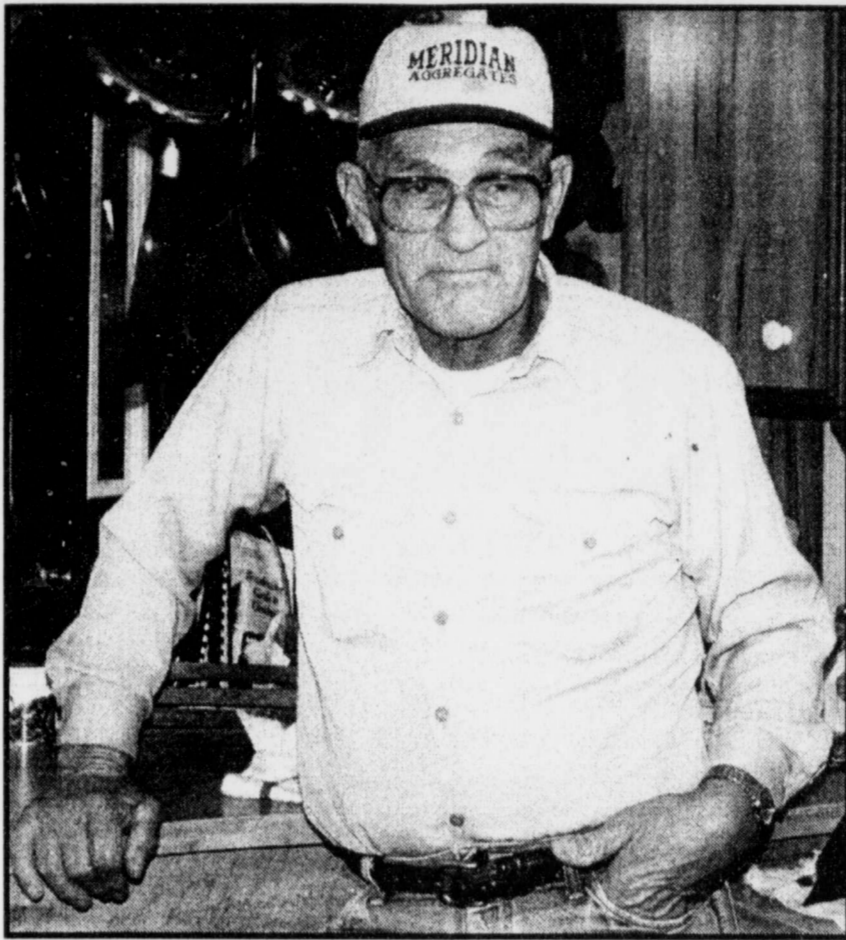
**Applesauce Cake**—Donald enjoys making this cake and it stays moist and delicious for several days.

**Icy Pie (Fruit Salad)**  
3 apples-chopped  
2 oranges-chopped  
1 banana-chopped  
1/2 cup pecans-chopped  
1 can fruit cocktail-drained  
1/2 bag miniature marshmallows  
Sauce:  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup sugar  
3 tablespoons flour  
2-1/2 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Cook to thicken and mix with top ingredients. Keep refrigerated.

**Turkey**  
20 pound turkey  
Completely thaw; wash and place in large, deep roaster. Spread about 1/4 pound of margarine on turkey. Add approximately one pint of water to turkey. Cover with foil and make sure foil is inside of pan. Cook in 275 degree oven overnight. Save all broth for dressing. Meat should pull away from bone. Remove giblets and save for gravy.

**Dressing**  
6 cornbread mixes  
With heaping tablespoon of cornmeal added to each mix. Cook cornbread 5 days before and lay on rack covered with cloth to dry out. Crumble all cornbread in large roaster. Add 4 eggs, 5 slices of bread-crumbed, 4 stalks of finely chopped celery from bunch, 1 large onion-finely chopped and salt and pepper. Pour broth over mixture, saving about 1-1/2 cup of broth. Mix well all ingredients. Add water if needed to spongy stage. Cover and cook one hour at 350 degrees. Uncover and cook until light brown on top. Serves about 35-40. De-bone turkey and serve with dressing.

**Giblet Gravy**  
2 heaping tablespoons of flour mixed in one pint of water  
4 hard boiled eggs  
giblets from turkey-coarsely chopped salt and pepper to taste. Chop eggs and

save. Add giblets, broth and flour mixture in large sauce pan. Bring to boil and add about one pint of milk and about one pint of water and salt and pepper. Continue cooking until mixture is medium to thin consistency. Remove from heat and add chopped eggs.

**Applesauce Cake**  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup shortening  
1-1/2 cups sugar  
2 beaten eggs  
2 cups sifted flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
1/2 teaspoon cloves  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 cup thick, unsweetened applesauce  
1 cup chopped raisins  
1 cup pecans-chopped  
Stir shortening to soften and gradually add sugar and cream together until light and fluffy. Add eggs and mix well. Sift flour, baking powder, cinnamon, soda, salt and cloves together and add to cream mixture alternately with apple sauce. Beat after each mixture until smooth. Fold in raisins. Use 3-9" round cake pans. Cook in 350 degree oven for about 60 minutes.

**Icing**  
2 cups sugar  
3/4 cup water  
1 tablespoon light corn syrup  
dash salt  
2 stiff beaten egg whites  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Cook sugar, water, corn syrup and salt over low heat, stirring until sugar dissolves sugar crystals on side of pan. Uncover; continue cooking to soft-ball stage; gradually add hot syrup to egg whites, beating constantly. Add vanilla and continue heating til frosting is of spreading consistency.

**Oatmeal Pie**  
2 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup oatmeal  
1 cup white corn syrup  
1 cup melted oleo  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Place in 2 unbaked pie crust. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour or until the center is firm.

**Refrigerator Rolls**  
2 packages dry yeast  
1/3 cup sugar  
2 cups warm water  
6-7 cups flour  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 egg  
1/3 cup melted shortening  
Combine yeast and sugar in a large bowl and add warm water; stirring until yeast dissolves. Stir in 3-1/2 cups flour and add salt. Beat with a wooden spoon. Add egg and shortening mixing well. Add just enough remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface and knead about 2 minutes. Place in a well greased bowl; grease top. Place in refrigerator. When ready to use, pinch off needed amount and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake at 400 degrees about 12 minutes. Makes about 2 dozen. Dough will keep in refrigerator for several days.

**Bread Machine Rolls**  
1 cup warm water  
1 teaspoon salt  
8 teaspoons shortening or oil  
1 egg  
3-1/2 cup flour  
8 teaspoons sugar  
1 package yeast  
Place ingredients as listed in pan. Set machine on dough setting. Shape rolls and let rise until doubled. Bake at 400 degrees for a bout 12 minutes. Makes 1 dozen.

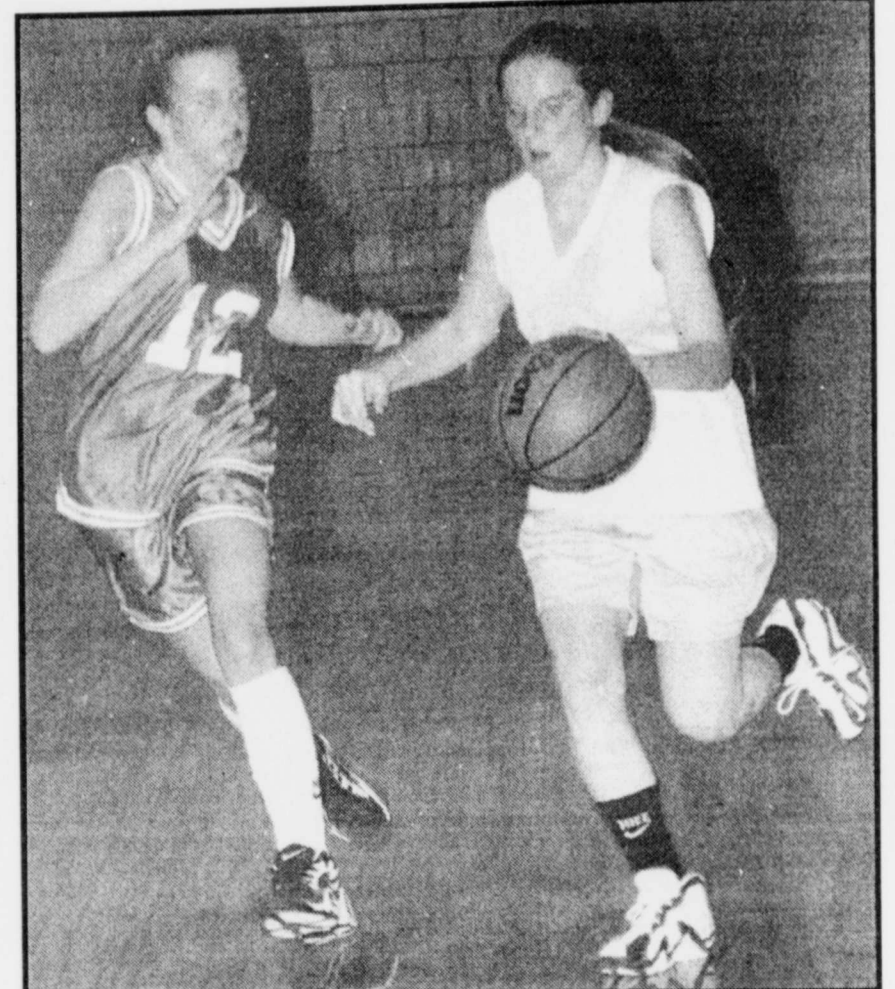

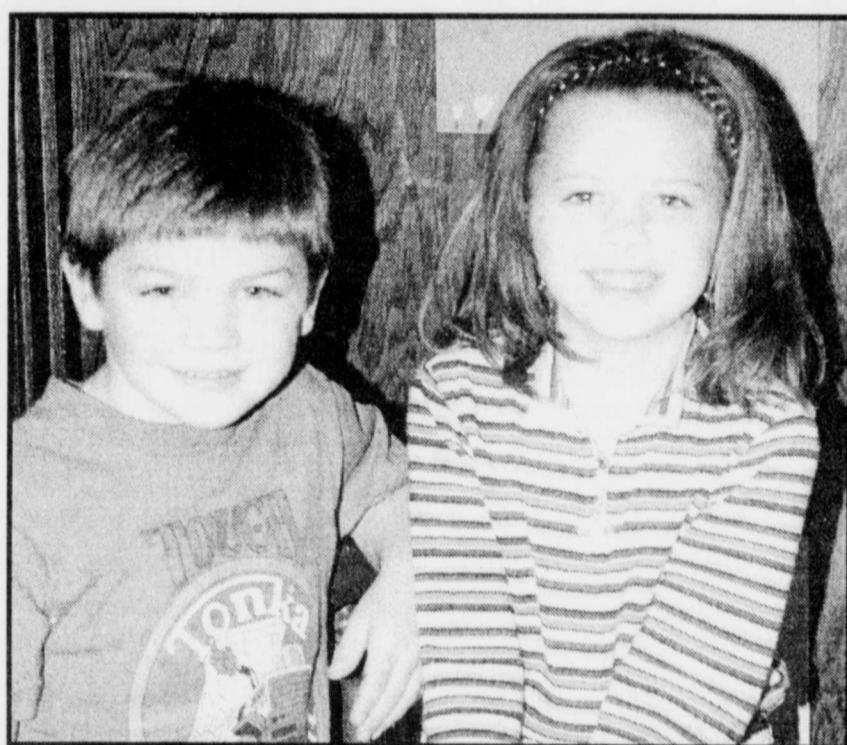

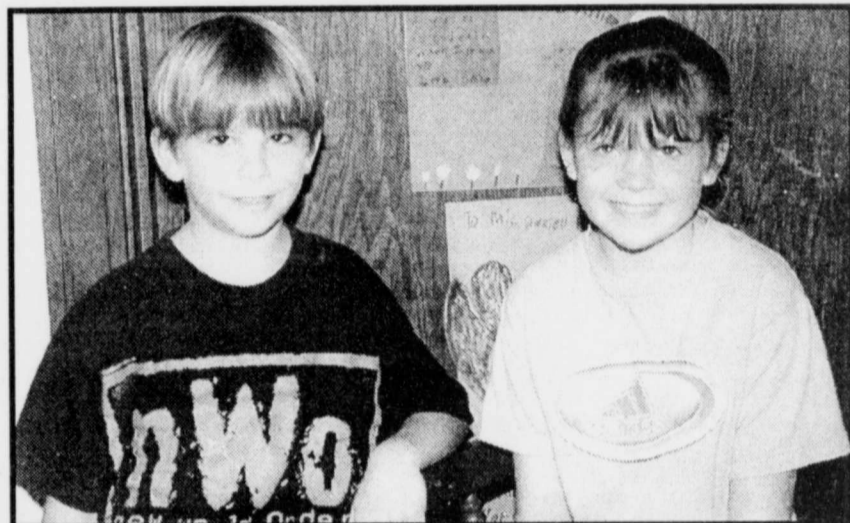

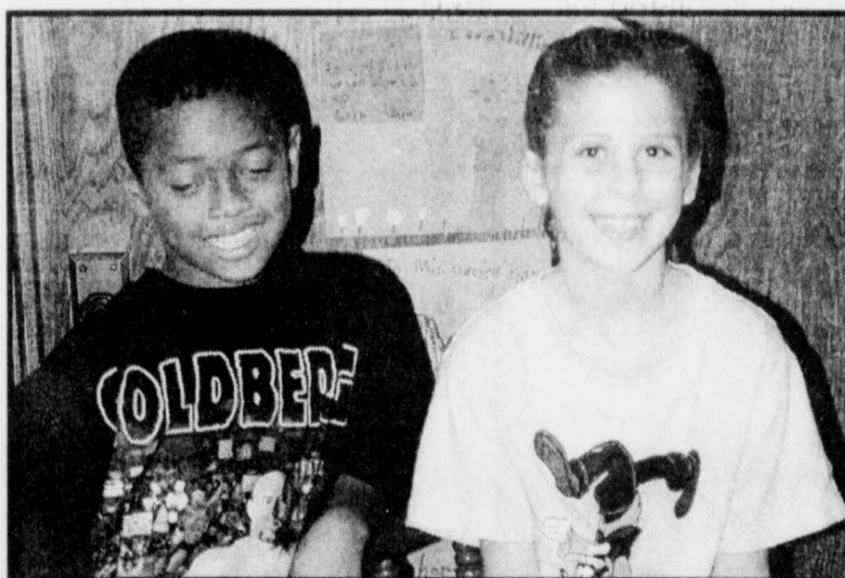

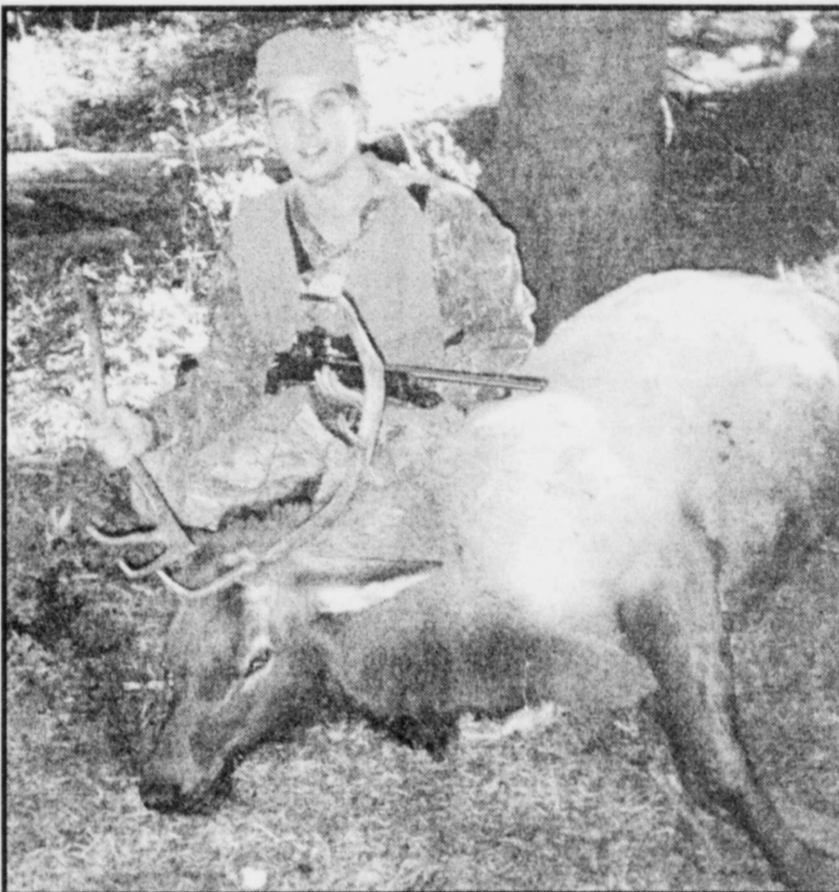

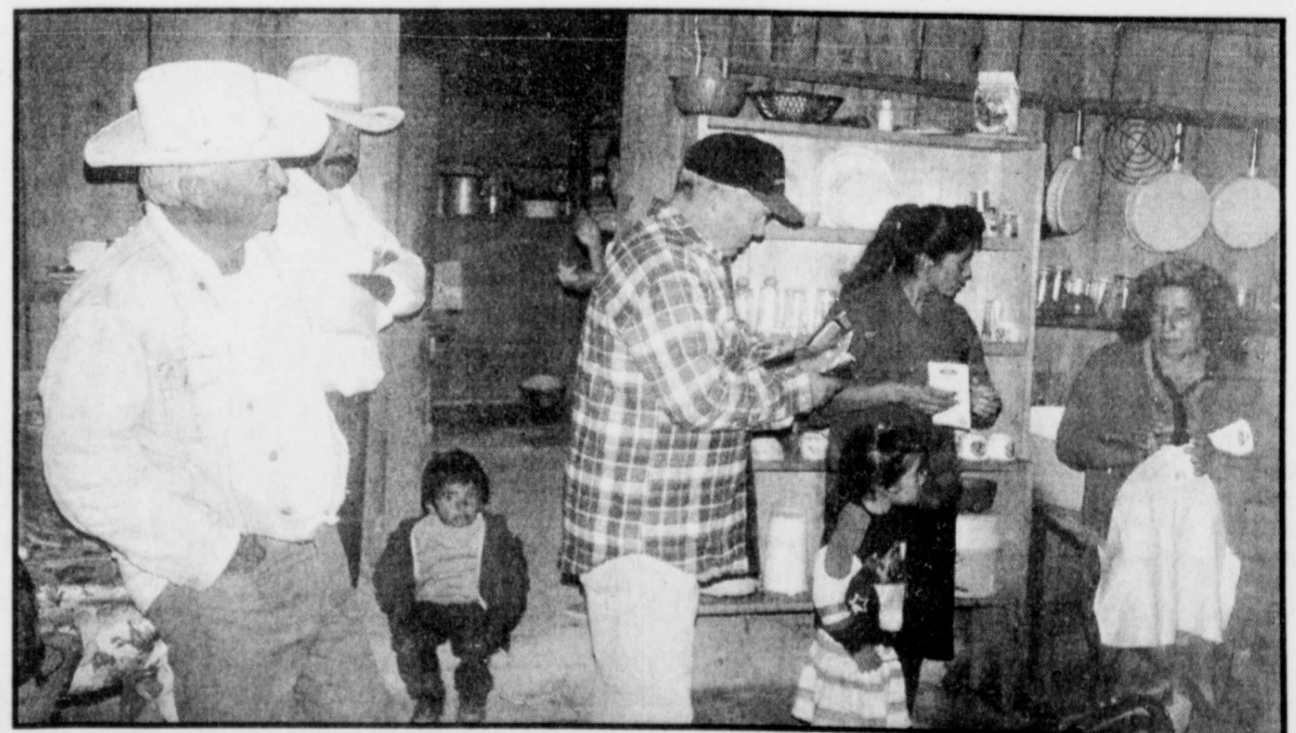

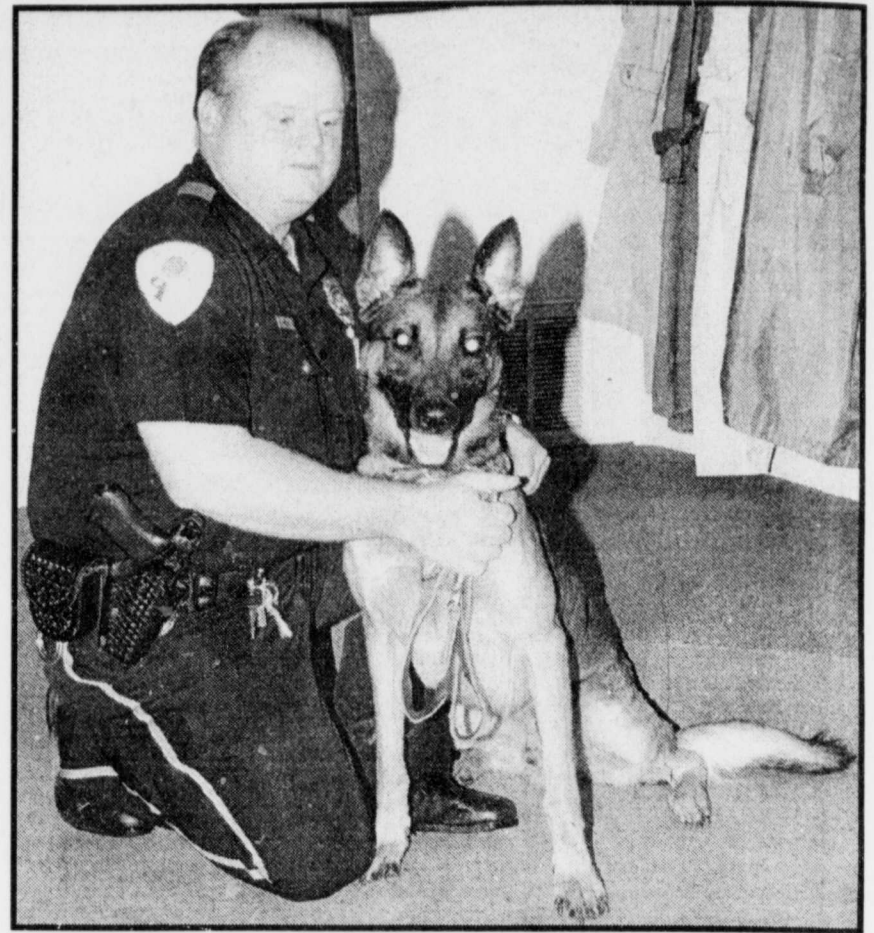
