





Mild temperatures bringing spring growth

to winter pastures

This year we have experienced warmer than normal temperatures through much of January and into February. As a result, winter pastures with ryegrass have begun spring growth somewhat earlier than normal and many pastures have a chlorotic look, probably due to nitrogen deficiency.

nowi is a good time to fertilize **Every Sunday** winter pastures composed of ryegrass, wheat and other small grains. An application of approximately 60 pounds actual nitrogen per acre now will help correct nitrogen deficiency in these type pastures and maintain growth for a longer time this spring. Sixty pounds of nitrogen per acre would require and application of approximately 200 pounds 32-0-0 or 110 pounds 44-0-0 per acres. At the present time, we have sufficient moisture for the plants to utilize the added nitrogen.



3/4 cup soy sauce /4 cup water 3 tablespoons packed brown sugar -1/2 tablespoons sesame oil or vegetable oil-divided tablespoon grated fresh ginger tablespoon minced garlic -1/2 to 1-3/4 pounds boneless beef siroin steak cut 1-1/2 inches thick 3/4 pound cooked snow peas tablespoon sesame seeds

hot cooked rice

Combine soy sauce, brown sugar, 1 ablespoon sesame oil, ginger and garlic in a shallow baking dish. Reserve I/4 cup marinade for Oriental Beef Salad. Cover reserved marinade with plastic wrap and refrigerate. Add steak to baking dish, turning to coat with marinade. It is not recommended to apply nitrogen to fescue pastures at this time, or at any time in the spring. This could lead to increased endophyte problems. Although the fescue endophyte is found throughout the plant, concentrations of the endophyte increase with increased carbohydrate production in the plant. Nitrogen applications will promote growth and encourage seedhead production which increases availability of the endophyte toxin to livestock. Heavily grazing fescue pastures, as temperatures warm up, will also help reduce seedhead production. If a cutting of hay is desired on fescue pasture, cattle should probably be pulled off by May

Now is also a good time to begin planning management of warm season pastures.
