

Children who qualify under U.S. Dept. of Agriculture guidelines may get meals free or at a reduced-price of \$.40 for lunch and \$.30 for breakfast. All meals served must meet nutrition standards established by the US Department of Agriculture. If a child has a disability, as determined by a doctor, and the disability prevents the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make substitutions prescribed by the doctor. If a substitution is needed there will be no extra charge for the meal. Please note, however, that the school is not required to make a substitution for a food allergy, unless it meets the definition of disability. Please call the school for further information: telephone number 632-5204. (Rivercrest High School lunch \$1.50 and breakfast for \$.55. Reduced are \$.40 and \$.30.) Your child can get free school meals if you get food stamps or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Depending

To get free or reduced-price meals for your child, you must complete an application for Free and Reduced Price Meals form and return it to the school

Households getting food stamps or TANF. You only have to include your child's name and case number, and an adult household member must sign the form.

Households that do not get food stamps or TANF. If you do not have a case number. you must include the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where the income came from. An adult household member must sign the form and include his or her social security number, or indicate that he or she has no social security number. Households with a foster child. You must include the child's name and the amount of

personal use" income the child received last month, and an adult must sign the form. Will the form be verified? Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. We will use the information on

your form to decide if your child should get free or reduced price meals. We may inform officials with other child nutrition, health and education programs of the information on your form to determine benefits for those programs or for funding and/or evaluation Can I apply for free and reduced price meals later? You may apply free and reduced

price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or TANF, complete another form then. You will be notified when your application is approved or denied.






