But, as we all know there are all kinds of answering machines, all kinds of prerecorded messages, and all kinds of home recorded mes-

And, as we all know, most of us simply do not feel comfortable being recorded on them! Idon't know why, I just know that is the way it is!



If, like some of us, you've been following controversial local news in recent months, then you're certainly familiar with the heated debate swirling around the proposed Marvin Nichols Reservoir and plans for other Sulphur River reservoirs, for water that would be piped, at great cost, to DFW consumers. The people of Northeast Texas have adequate water supplies and do not need these additional destructive lakes.

On Sept. 16, Governor Rick Perry told The Dallas Morning News, "It appears to me that if Dallas solely relies upon the building of Marvin Nichols, they could miscalculate....I think we need to be looking for other alternatives to Marvin Nichols." The Governor favors the construction of more technologically efficient desalination plants along the Texas Gulf Coast. Marvin Nichols Reservoir might have been an option for water supply 35 years ago, but in today's world Marvin Nichols is a dinosaur of technology. Gov. Perry's opponent Tony Sanchez told the "Dallas Morning News", "I don't want to take local control of water away from people."

On Aug. 2, U.S. Congressman Max Sandlin of Marshall and State Representatives Barry Telford of DeKalb, Mark Homer of Paris, Tom Ramsay of Mt. Vernon and Bob Glaze of Gilmer issued a joint-statement to Region D waterplanners to postpone any further action regarding Marvin Nichols. Sandlin's opponent John Lawrence of Pittsburg, Telford's opponent Dan Teafatiller of DeKalb, and Republican State Senator Bill Ratliff's Democrat opponent B.D. Blount of Paris all have voiced opposition to Marvin Nichols. This is quite logical: 99% of local people oppose these lakes. Where was Bill Ratliff on Aug. 2? Does that sound like a man who is trying to protect and represent his constituents, who have so generously elected him, time and again, in years past? We citizens deserve better than this! Letter to the Editor:

As a rural resident of Lamar County whose safety is supposedly a concern of Judge Superville, I find it ironic that many of the Paris firefighters are openly supporting Superville over Paris Mayor Michag Pfiester who is running for th office of county judge.

The nineteen volunteer fire departments in lamar County get a paltry \$82,000 from the county budget annually to provide fire protection for half the population of Lamar County Seventy-one percent of the Paris firefighters live outside the city of Paris in Lamar County, a City which just budgeted \$3.8 million for the fire department serving the other half of the citizens of Lamar County in Paris. It seems strange to me that Paris firefighters who have made such a "safety" issue about some small budget reductions in the Paris budget can support a county judge candidate who does so little for the safety of 71% of their families who must rely on the volunteer fire departments outside the city of protection.

It seems to me that Paris has been very proactive in building new fire stations, buying new equipment, adding additional firefighters, paying for training and compensating their personnel very well. If the Paris firefighters are so unhappy with their pay and can be paid so much more by leaving, then why aren't they leaving?

I will tell you who is leaving. There is a revolving door in the Lamar County Sheriff's Department. Living in the county I am well aware of this need. We need someone who will address the safety needs of those of us who live outside the city of Paris. Our volunteer fire departments desperately need support as do the men and women of the Lamar County Sheriff's Department.

Code, Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department will conduct a referendum on the proposition of whether or not cotton growers shall establish a boll weevil eradication program in the area designated by rule as the Northern Blacklands Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and pay a maximum annual assessment in the amount of \$13.25 per land acre of cotton each year until costs of the eradication program plus finance charges are paid off, which is anticipated to take up to 10 years, and a nominal maintenance fee thereafter. The initiation of a program at this assessment level is contingent upon obtaining financing and a minimum of 30 percent state and/or federal cost-share funding. If approved, the program and assessment are expected to begin in the zone on a date determined by the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Program Board of The Northern Blacklands Eradication

Zone consist of all of Montague, Cooke, Grayson, Fannin, Lamar, Red River, Bowie, Cass, Morris, Titus, Franklin, Hopkins, Delta, Hunt, Rockwall, Collin, Denton, Wise, Jack, Parker, Tarrant, Dallas, Kaufman, Rains, VanZandt, Henderson, Navarro, Ellis, Johnson, Hood, Somervell, Bosque, Hamilton and Hill counties; and those parts of McLennan and Limestone counties north of State Highway 84. If a zone program and assessment are approved by this referendum, growers in the zone shall vote again on whether or not to continue eradication efforts after four years of active program activities.

Also, as part of the referendum, a representative of the above-referenced zone will be elected to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas.

The referendum and board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed by November 19, 2002. All ballots cast by mail must be post-marked no later than December 9, 2002, in order to be valid. Any cotton grower having cotton production in 2002 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and if he or she resides in the Northern Blacklands Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, to have his or her name placed on the ballot as a can-

didate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton and receives income from the sale of cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from

Any person eligible to vote in the referendum or board member election who resides in the Northern Blacklands boll Weevil Eradication Zone and meets the seven-year experience requirement may place his or her name in nomination for election to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board by written application to the Department at the address provided below. The application shall be on a nomination form provided by the Department and must be signed by the applicant and at least ten other eligible voters. The nomination form must be received in Austin by November 11, 2002, and must provide the legal residence of the applicant. A nomination form may be obtained by contacting the Department office or any county agent located in the voting area.




