Cattle can leave state without restrictions in 2003

"These requirements would have cost millions, not only for the ear tags, which would have been provided by the USDA, but also for the industry's labor costs to handle each feeder animal individually. The cattle industry's ability to move feedlot cattle efficiently would have been damaged."

'The Texas cattle industry has been extremely worried for several months, because after finding two infected cattle herds since summer 2001, Texas lost its 'free' status for cattle tuberculosis (TB) eradication," said Dr. Linda Logan, executive director for the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency. "During the spring and summer, a TB working group comprised of representatives from Texas cattle businesses met with USDA representatives repeatedly to seek relief from unnecessary burdensome restrictions on feeder cattle movement.'

Included in the TB working group were leaders of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, Independent Cattlemens Association, Texas Cattle Feeders, Livestock Marketing Association, Texas Veterinary Medical Association and Texas Farm Bureau. Dr. Logan applauded the livestock industry for their teamwork to minimize the federal regulatory impact on the cattle producers.

"Our livestock industry moves about 1.5 million feeder steers, feeder bull calves and feeder heifers out of state each year. Had the movement restrictions been imposed, we would have been required to identify feeder steers with an official ear tag, and not

"According to our cattle TB records, less than one in three million Texas feeder cattle have been found to have TB, so we see these animals as a negligible risk for the ments. Any new federal regulations on this issue, however, likely would not go into effect until at least Fall 2003.

Dr. Logan explained that, due to detection of the two infected herds in Texas, the USDA in June 2002 downgraded the state to the second-highest federal status, known as "modified accredited advanced." She noted that the USDA's action to delay implementation of any additional restrictions will not affect current requirements for Texas breeding cattle.

"Texas breeding cattle still must have a negative TB skin test and be identified with an official ear tag prior to being transported out of Texas. 



cup milk 2 tablespoons vinegar l tablespoon oil l cup clour teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 6 frozen Twinkies 4 cups vegetable oil for frying

Heat oil to 375 degrees. Prepare batter by mixing milk, vinegar and oil. Blend in another bowl flour, baking powder and salt. Whisk dry ingredients into wet ingredients until smooth. Refrigerate while oil heats to proper temperature. Dust Twinkies with flour and dip into batter. Rotate unti batter until Twinkie is covered all over. Place carefully in hot oil. Twinkies will float, so it must be held under until golden brown; about 3-4 minutes. Remove to paper towel and let drain. Can be dusted with powdered sugar

Were You Baptized Biblically?

Many have been baptized, but not in the way the Bible teaches. If we have not been baptized in keeping with God's instruction given in the New Testament, then all we have done is gotten wet. We learn from the word of God that for baptism to be acceptable in the sight of God, there must be:

The right person: One must believe in Christ and repent of sins (Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38). Therefore, according to scripture, infants are not fit subjects for baptism. They are not capable of believing and have no sin of which to repent. Jesus taught that children are innocent and pure (Matt. 18:3; 19:14). There is not a single example of a child being baptized din scripture; the practice is utterly without authority. Therefore, if you were "baptized" as an infant, you were not baptized at all in God's sight.

The right process: The word "baptism" in our English Bibles is translated from the Greek term which means "immersion." To baptize means "to dip, to submerge." It involves going to a place where there is a sufficient amount of water to be immersed (John 3:23). It is a burial (Rom. 6:3-5) which requires going down into an coming up out of the water (Acts 8:38-39). Thus, sprinkling or pouring water on the head is not biblical baptism. If you had water sprinkled on you, then you were not baptized at all in God's sight.

The right purpose: Baptism is "for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38). Paul was told "Arise an be baptized and wash away your sins..." (Acts 22:16). Jesus said, "He that believes and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). It is not done after one is already saved, but in order to enter into Christ (Gal. 3:26-27) to be saved (1 Peter 3:21). Therefore, if you were taught that you were saved before baptism, then you were not baptized "for the remission of sins"; you were not baptized properly in God's sight.

According to Acts 19:1-6, those baptized without being properly taught must be baptized again correctly. If you were not baptized biblically- as a penitent believer for the remission of sinsyou are still in sin and need to be baptized biblically. Contact us that we might help you to be saved.




