Drugs and alcohol

Education is key to combatting problems

There has been a growing concern about alcohol and drug abuse worldwide. No longer is the problem confined to large cities — it has infiltrated the suburbs and small towns where our families live, affecting all our lives.

Education is a powerful weapon against alcohol and drug abuse. It is time for the American public to challenge the intolerable use of alcohol and drugs. The time has come for everyone to band together and show our youth that we care about their future.

It is important to set examples for our young people to help them learn to battle the drug problem...to say "No." As adults we should set the example by not using illegal drugs.

Do not keep illegal drugs in your home and do not allow them to be used there by anyone. Let family and friends know that illegal drugs are not acceptable and will not be tolerated at parties you or your family attend.

If alcohol is used, it should be by someone who is of legal age and then only in moderation. Any use of alcohol by a child is abuse and is against the law.

Some ways to help children say "No" to drugs are:

□ Talk to your children about alcohol and other drugs. Children are more likely to communicate when they have cues that parents or other adults are listening and interested in what they have to say.

□ Help your children deal with peer pressure and make policies that help them say "no." Many young people start using drugs because of peer pressure.

Help your children to develop a healthy self-image and strong system of values.

□ Encourage your children to join and take an active part in anti-drug clubs or programs, such as drug abuse resistance education.

□ Encourage healthy, creative activities that may help prevent children from using alcohol and other drugs. There have been studies that show once involvement with drugs begins, it often is followed by a predictable sequence leading to drug abuse.


Don't use terror tactics — your children are not stupid. They know from friends and older siblings what the effects of most drugs are, so telling things like, "Smoking one marijuana cigarette will cause insanity," will not stop them. It will only weaken your credibility.

□ Teach your children responsibility. Allow your child to make mistakes, but let him understand the consequences. For example, if your 16-year-old son gets a driving-while-intoxicated ticket, make him pay the fine and then take his driving privileges away (if the court doesn't do it first).

□ Know your children's friends. It's incredible, but sometimes a mother will study the label or a soup can to buy what is best for her children, but never know anything about who her 15-year-old is dating or where her child is going Saturday night. Asking to meet your children's friends is not "prying" — it's letting your children know that you care about them. Active parental guidance is a must.

□ Learn the signs of drug abuse. Visit the Reese Family Support Center and learn about the effects of drugs on young people, and what types of drugs are available in your area. Learn what drug paraphernalia looks like and don't turn a blind eye if you find rolling papers or a "roach clip" in your child's room. Confront the child with it and demand an explanation.

It's up to you to set the example.

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Thirteen SPs deploy for Desert Shield

men deployed early Wednesday morning in support of Operation Desert Shield.

The SPS deployment brings the number of wing members supporting the Mideast operation to 23. Reese people already supporting Desert Shield came from the 64th Services Squadron, 64th Supply Squadron, Transportation Division and Disaster Preparedness Branch, as well as the 64th Security Police Squadron.

Wednesday's departure saw an SPS squad fly out of Reese on a C-130 Hercules. Although it didn't come as a surprise when the squad

got the call to action, there was still a good deal of preparation involved in the deployment.

"We got the call Monday evening - we had been expecting it for a while," said Capt. Danny Thomas, SPS commander. "Once we got the word, we had to make sure that the squad was prepared to go."

Agencies throughout the wing worked the deployment, helping ensure the team was ready to depart. Participating organizations included Transportation, the Accounting and Finance Office, Family Support Center, Legal Office and 64th Flying Training Wing Hospital. The efforts were largely geared at ensuring that family separations were as painless as possible.

"The most important thing (before deploying) is to ease the squad members' minds about family members they're leaving behind," Captain Thomas said. "That way, they'll be in the right frame of mind to do the job required of them."

The separations were on the minds of all involved Tuesday, as the squad prepared to go.

"I had just come into the (Lubbock) airport Tuesday when we found out," said Sandy Franks, wife of TSgt. James Franks, the squad's leader. "I knew it was going to come sometime, but I didn't expect it this soon."

Mrs. Franks and her three children were braced to handle the separation, however. "I work full time and the children are in school, and we'll adjust as best as we can,"

Like other squad members, Amn. David Nuessle faced a family separation, but from a different perspective than the Franks.

"It (the deployment) is a little bit exciting, but I'm also leaving behind my newlywed — that's kind of scary," said Airman Nuessle. He and his wife, Tammy, moved up their April wedding plans after deployment notification and were married Tuesday afternoon in the SPS squadron area.

"I wanted to make sure Tammy

was taken care of before I left," he explained. Unlike Air-

man Nuessle, who was deploying for the first time, other team members have "been there before."

"I was at 'Urgent Fury' in Grenada back in '83 the deployment isn't really anything new for me," said SSgt.

Alvaro Soto Jr. "Back then though, I wasn't married. Now, there's more things to think about than just the job. There's the wife, the kids -basically, a lot more responsibil-

been great, though. Base agencies and people really took care of us --all we've got to do now is get on the plane," Sergeant Soto said.

The 13-man deployment could last six months, according to Captain Thomas.

With such a large part of their manning gone over a potentially long period, the unit plans to pick up the slack, in part, by using a limited number of augmentees from other Reese units and by going to 12-hour shifts in some cases.



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

CES command changes hands

Command of the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron changed hands Tuesday during a ceremony held at Bldg. 555.

Maj. Per Korslund, CES operations chief, assumed command from Lt. Col. Pete Kloeber, who will be the commander of the 3380th CES at Keesler AFB, Miss.

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Major Korshund graduated from basic training in January 1971, then went on to Mather AFB, Calif., where he spent four years as a management analysis specialist. After college, he received his commission from Officer Training School. He then was assigned as a pavements design engineer and contract inspector at Davis Monthan AFB, Ariz.

In 1978, he moved to Eielson AFB, Alaska, where he worked as the community planner, civil design engineer and finally as the engineering, construction and environmental planning branch chief.

Four years later, the major received an assignment to Randolph AFB, Texas, as a community planner. In 1983, he became a member of the Air Training Command Inspector General Team and spent the next two years inspecting engineering and housing branches, as well as general base appearances.

Major Korslund left ATC in 1985 and took over as the staff civil engineer at Pirinclik AB, Turkey. Here he was responsible for the quality control of the base maintenance contract, which covered civil engineering, food service, supply and transportation. During his year in Turkey, he also served as the base budget officer, mortuary officer and IG.

Upon his arrival to Reese in 1986, Major Korslund took over as the chief of CES operations, where he was responsible for the in-house maintenance and repair efforts of Reese property and facilites.





Housing residents share in clean up Change will begin Monday

Beginning Monday, Reese Village occupants will be responsible for cleaning their homes prior-to moving out.

Congress recently mandated the cancellation of the Military Family Housing Cleaning Program at all stateside bases — a program that reduced the amount of cleaning residents were responsible for by allowing base housing offices to contract a cleaning company.

Housing residents will now be responsible for maintaining a

moving or disassembling appliances to clean around or cleaning excessive residue on windows or inaccessible areas," she added.

Once ready for their final inspection, residents will notify the housing office and an inspector will come out.

At that point, the inspector will ensure everything on the checklist has been done and the home looks 'clean to the eye' — much like the inspections done at downtown apartment complexes. 5

"clean-to-the-eye" appearance in their homes when moving out.

"Homes will be inspected when the member moves 'out; however,the 'white-glove' inspection of years past will not be performed," said Mitzie Hallgarth, Reese Housing manager.

Instead, about 30-40 days before a member moves out, a housing representative will perform a preinspection and provide a checklist showing everything required to be done before the final inspection, said Mrs. Hallgarth. The list will include such things as removing any black marks, grease and food particles from the floors and walls, and cleaning appliance surfaces. "The list is not so extensive that residents will need to hire a cleaning agency just to pass their final inspection," said the housing manager.


"Residents will not be responsible for waxing and buffing floors, the housing office at 3913.

"If an area has been missed or needs a bit more attention, an onthe-spot correction can be made or another inspection time can be set up," said Mrs. Hallgarth. "Members who follow the checklists should have no problem passing the final inspection."

Residents' yards will also be inspected during the final inspection. "Residents are responsible for cutting their lawn, weeding out the sidewalk cracks and along the curbs, and removing all trash from their yards and gutters," said Mrs. Hallgarth.

Mrs. Hallgarth pointed out that whether they are preparing to move out or are just doing yard work, residents are responsible for the curb, gutter and up to the center of the street in front of their home.
