

The preservation of our precious people and limited resources is obviously very important to me and must be to everyone in the Command — that's what "being safe" is all about.



We can't

do our jobs unless we have the proper equipment, and, of utmost interest, keep our great Air Training Command people healthy and safe. That is why I have established safety as one of our four major Command Goals —

"Enhance Safety Awareness and Minimize Aircraft and Ground Explosives Mishaps."

In my experience, I've learned a few keys to success and I'd like to share them with you:

☐ Balance risk vs. output. In any endeavor, we must think the problem through with a clear objective and balance the training risks with readiness and production rewards. In our business, we will inevitably have mishaps, but through a balanced smart approach, we can minimize them.

☐ Plan for success. Plan on success ahead of time by matching your resources to the tasking. It is a leader's responsibility to ensure that his or her people have the necessary resources to accomplish their assigned task. Extending your people beyond their resources is a plan destined for failure.

☐ Then execute, execute, execute. Mishaps usually are the product of poor execution. You know the risks, you have a plan, and you have properly equipped your people. Now execute smartly and don't forget to review the plan and the risks once in a

☐ Safety. Every leader must constantly strive to instill a safety awareness in all of their people. Be the "chief of safety" — at all levels. Our success is contingent upon that first echelon of leadership's safety awareness.

Teamwork. Work as a team! Help each other whether on-duty or off-duty. It's that simple.

Our Command has a good safety record; but I believe we can do better. That's why we have goals and standards and a plan to measure ourselves regularly. I appreciate your continued support in this vitally important area.

Reese promotes anti-smoking efforts

Cigarette smoking is one of the major causes of health problems in our country, and because of that, the Department of Defense and the Air Force have established Anti-Smoking

The goal of the program is to educate all personnel on the hazards associated with using tobacco products, discourage and deglamorize smoking and to provide help for those who wish to quit smoking. The Air Training Command goal is to reduce the number of people who smoke by 10 percent by the end of fiscal year 1991. At Reese there are about 300 military members who smoke, giving Reese a goal of getting 30 people to quit.

Over the next few months, we will publicize the Air Force, ATC and wing policies regarding smoking. To emphasize the seriousness that ATC is approaching the problem, the following will be implemented command wide:

☐ Each wing will establish a data base to measure progress quarterly to achieve the 10 percent reduction.

☐ Anti-smoking classes will be incorporated into all initial military training courses including basic, ROTC, Officer Training School, and the Air Force Academy.

☐ ATC Professional Military Education Programs will conduct health awareness classes as part of its curriculum.

☐ The term "smoke break" is no longer authorized for use in conjunction with official Air Force activities; nor is tobacco advertising permitted in commissaries or exchanges.

☐ ATC Supplement 1 to Air Force Regulation 30-27, "Smoking in Air Force Facilities," will be used to the limits on smoking in ATC owned facilities.

☐ Base medical facilities will offer smoking cessation classes quarterly to those who want to quit.

We here at Reese support the findings and recommendations of the U.S. Surgeon General regarding the hazards of smoking and are striving to create a healthy work environ-

Break the habit

Tips for members who want to guit

(Editor's note: This is the second set in a series of "stay Tuesday — day six: quit" tips for wing members who have chosen to quit smoking. The tips have been provided by the American Cancer Society. Members can also call the Reese Health Promotions Clinic at 3554 or Mental Health Clinic at 3739 for more information or to sign up for smoking cessation classes.)

Friday — day two:

Stay positive and picture success. When you wake up in the morning, promise yourself that you won't smoke a cigarette all day. Plan ahead and think of how you'll deal with stressful situations without lighting up.

Saturday — day three:

Spread the word. Tell everyone you know that you've quit and are planning to stay off cigarettes for good. Your outward display of pride in yourself will reaffirm your commitment, and the support and encouragement you'll get from family and friends will be welcome. Also, if someone "adopted" you for the Great American Smokeout, keep him or her involved in your progress and include your "adopter" in some of your weekend plans.

Sunday — day four:

Spend your day with friends who don't smoke. Visit places where smoking is prohibited: a library, theater, church or museum. Watch movies from the "no smoking" section; travel in the "no smoking" car of your commuter train. Revisit places where you've illegally smoked in the past (elevators, supermarket) and enjoy not feeing guilty.

Monday — day five:

Eat rather than smoke, but stick to low calorie, high nutritional foods: fresh fruit; crisp, crunchy vegetables. Substitute sugarless gum for a cigarette. Other temporary "pacifiers" to keep on hand: lemon drops, pumpkin or sunflower seeds, apple book or catalog to look through. Enjoy that new cassette on slices, carrot sticks, unbuttered popcorn. Avoid spicy foods your stereo cassette player. that can trigger a desire for cigarettes.

Take a breather. Relaxation exercises help relieve urges to smoke. Take a deep breath, hold it a second, then release it very, very slowly. Remember, urges to smoke are temporary.

Wednesday — day seven:

Scramble up your day and change habits connected with smoking. Drive a different route to work; eat lunch in a new place; leave the "scene of an urge." At home avoid your "smoking chair" after dinner, reach for gum rather than a cigarette when answering the phone.

Thursday — day eight:

It's Thanksgiving, so stretch out your meal; eat slowly and pause between bites. After dinner, instead of reaching for a cigarette, treat yourself to a mint or a cup of orange tea with honey. Or have a refreshing after-dinner glass of club soda. For dessert, grab a tangerine or pear. Or introduce everyone around you to your new pleasure — sucking stick cinnamon. Crack nuts for yourself and other guests — this will certainly keep your hands busy.

Friday — day nine:

Try your best to stay away from alcoholic beverages; stick to club soda, nonalcoholic punch or spicy drinks (for example, apple cider with cinnamon or a Bloody Mary without vodka). This will curb the urge to light up while you're drinking, and will keep extra pounds off.

Saturday — day 10:

Holiday shopping can be maddening for smokers and nonsmokers. Long lines at cashiers' stations, gift wrapping counters, and highway toll booths can test anyone's patience. Just when you're ready to lose control and grab a cigarette, consider alternate strategies: start an upbeat conversation with the person in front of or behind you in line, or bring along a

Understanding before designating can prevent disaster

advised to name the beneficiaries of their Serviceman's Group Life Insurance through use of the "by law" designation.

While appropriate in some instances, use of the designation without a sound understanding of what it means legally can result in disaster.

The case of Lanier vs. Traub, heard this year before the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Florida, is yet another example of the problems associated with a "by law" designation of SGLI. Army Sgt. Daniel Traub had used the out, clearly lists the order of payment when the servicemem-"by law" designation for naming the beneficiaries of his SGLI policy. On the same day, Traub had completed a "Record of Emergency Date," Department of Defense Form 93, designating his mother and stepfather as 50 percent co-beneficiaries of

Many military members at one time or another have been all unpaid pay and allowances and of his death gratuity.

The DD Form 93 also required in several places that Sergeant Traub enter the name of his natural father; however, he instead entered his stepfather's name in those places.

After Sergeant Traub's death, his natural father and his stepfather both made claims for the SGLI proceeds. His natural father argued that Traub's designation of "by law" was clear and unambiguous and not subject to attack.

The SGLI beneficiary form, which the sergeant had filled ber makes the "by law" designation.

The natural father asked the court not to look beyond the form to find evidence of Sergeant Traub's intent and cited the strong public policy against using other evidence to rewrite

contracts. The court, however, refused to ignore the significance of a contrary designation on the DD Form 93.

Even if the court reached the right decision, this case stands as another compelling example against making by-law beneficiary designations.

If the court was correct, a specific designation would have spared the parties the expense and inconvenience associated with litigating the issue.

A more disturbing possible consequence of the by-law designation is that the court incorrectly identified the intended

HOSP evaluates local exercise

At about 1:30 p.m. Nov. 8 a school bus, carrying 27 Hale Center High School seniors, was hit by a passing car while heading eastbound on FM 1914 from Hale Center, Texas.

The icy roads caused the bus driver to lose control after impact, which sent the bus into several rolls before landing upright. The car's driver escaped the collision uninjured and quickly ran to a nearby house to call for help.

In less than three minutes, the sound of emergency vehicles approached the glass and blood covered accident site, while scattered inside the bus lay the pain-shrieking accident victims. One student was pronounced dead on the scene and many others were listed in critical condition, according to Hale Center's Hi Plains Hospital emergency officials.

The paramedics and fire department personnel worked quickly preparing the victims for emergency ambulatory transport to the hospital. Additionally, those who could be were treated at the scene.

The emergency personnel treated injuries ranging from an

amputated finger to multiple cuts and bruises to a broken neck and spinal injuries. At the same time, they were also in combat with the weather elements, such as the excessive cold and wind, to prevent the injured from receiving frostbite or possibly freezing to death.

Through the use of two ambulances and the local fire department's suburban, which rotated back and forth from the scene and hospital, all victims were eventually taken to

This was only an exercise. "If it had have been a real-life crisis, from what we were able to determine through our evaluations, the Hale Center's emergency team does possess the ability to handle the situation successfully," said 2nd Lt. Michael Hunter, 64th Flying Training Wing Hospital medical readiness officer.

"Also, in a real crisis, Hale Center would have had access to about 40 ambulances and a medivac helicopter from the surrounding area," added the lieutenant.

The scene was set up by Reese medical personnel to test Hale Center's ability to respond to a multiple-crisis situation. "We planned everything, from the actual accident to the types

of casualties. The people in Hale Center had no idea what was really going to happen or how extensive it was going to be," said SSgt. Lynne Davenport, HOSP medical readiness noncommissioned officer in charge.

The entire planning took about six weeks. The day of the exercise, 10 HOSP people spent about three hours beforehand "making the scene" by moulaging the students, handing out casualty cards and giving the students a crash course in "pain" acting. Once the exercise began, Reese people were responsible for evaluating the Hale Center people.

"We evaluated everything from the initial time it took for emergency vehicles to arrive on scene, the care provided both in the field and at the hospital, the response from all individuals involved (police, fire department, paramedics and hospital staff) and, most importantly, if it were a real-life situation what the overall results would have been," said Lieutenant Hunter, explaining the exercise went well.

This is just one more way in which Reese people use their field expertise to assist the local communities. The HOSP will be evaluating another exercise the end of this month in Brownfield, Texas.

Proposed furlough is non-existent

based on sequestering funds to meet deficit reduction goals no longer exist now that the fiscal 1991 defense authorization and appropriations bills have been signed into law, Air Force civilian personnel officials said.

"All notices of proposed furloughs issued are canceled, and the Air Force regrets the necessity of having had to issue the notices of proposed furlough. However, the new budget is extremely austere and will require a variety of savings actions to be taken," Air Force offi-

"There are no immediate signs that would drive us for the necessity of civilian furloughs in fiscal 1991," said Bill Lewis of the defense department's Force Management and Civilian Personnel Policy Office.

Mr. Lewis said the issue of "furloughs" first came up because money was not available for the

Civilian furloughs that were federal government to operate above certain levels. Air Force policy is that furlough will be used only as a last resort.

> The on and off threat of furloughs for civilian workers came about after the 101st Congress used five stopgap funding measures to keep the government operating. The proposed furloughs happened in the interim before the Congress managed to clear all 13 regular appropriations bills for fiscal 1991, a Congressional report on deficitreduction for the federal budget

Sequestration for fiscal 1991, which was the basis for the proposed furlough, was also brought about because of the 1985 Gramm-Rudman law which set annual limits for the federal deficit.

Im fiscal 1991, the deficit exceeded the \$74 billion limit and the law required automatic spending cuts, known as a sequester.

"Under Gramm-Rudman, the Service)

president had already made the determination to exempt military pay from a cut, but he could not make that same determination on the civilian side," Mr. Lewis said.

"Therefore, there was a very real dilemma that sequestering would have had a very severe impact on the amount of money avail-

"If you don't have the money to pay people, you can't work them for free.

Mr. Lewis said DOD didn't want to resort to a reduction in force for workers, because that takes them off the rolls permanently. The only alternative, he said, was to furlough, or temporarily layoff workers because the work continues.

Pay is always a very large part of the budget, and although there are appropriated dollars for fiscal 1991, "DOD is going to get smaller and it's still going to be a tough year," he said. (Air Force News

In supporting Desert Shield, space systems are focusing five times the support on the region than was available before the crisis, Mr. McCormick said.

Space systems also have been a "positive agent of change" in the new world, Mr. McCormick said.
