



### Quitting for good

### Tips help members break the smoking habit

(Editor's note: This is the third set in a series of "stay quit" tips for wing members who have chosen to quit smoking. The tips have been provided by the American Cancer Society. Members can also call the Reese Health Promotions Clinic at 3554 or Mental Health Clinic at 3739 for more information or to sign up for smoking cessation classes.)

· Sunday — day 11:

Arts and crafts: You've always wanted to master the kazoo, right? Many new ex-smokers take up hobbies to keep their minds and hands off cigarettes. For the holidays, you might want to make some gifts yourself; string popcorn, or try new, inventive ways to wrap gifts.

Monday — day 12:

Eat three meals. This maintains constant blood sugar levels, thus preventing urges to smoke. Avoid sugar-laden foods and spicy items that can trigger a desire for cigarettes.

Tuesday — day 13:

Work out; exercise, such as swimming, running and racket sports, helps relieve tension and your urge to smoke. Also, you'll enjoy holiday feasts without having to worry about dieting later.

Nov. 28 — day 14:

Change your habits connected with smoking. Leave the dinner table soon after eating to avoid the desire to light up. When answering the phone, reach for gum rather than a cigarette.

Nov. 29 — day 15:

Cleanse your body of nicotine. Drink liquids — lots of them. Water (6-8 glasses daily), herbal teas, fruit juices and caffeinefree soft drinks all fit the bill. Pass up coffee, caffeinated soft drinks and alcohol, as they can increase your urge to smoke.

Nov. 30 — day 16:

Reward yourself with oral substitutes in the same way you may have used cigarettes. Good examples: sugarless gum, lemon drops, pumpkin or sunflower seeds, apple slices, carrot sticks, unbuttered popcorn.

Dec. 1 — day 17:

Treat your body and soul with kindness. Indulge in a bath, massage, nap. Listen to your favorite music. Enjoying these activities in the absence of smoking will help you realize that you don't need a cigarette to have a good time.

Dec. 2 — day 18:

Keep your hands — and mind — busy. Work on a crossword puzzle, knit a sweater, balance your checkbook, fix something around the house, shampoo the dog.

Dec. 3 — day 19:

Exercise to help relieve tension. Climb stairs rather than take the elevator, park the car a block or two from your destination and walk the rest of the way. At home, practice touching your toes, jog in place, do jumping jacks.

# Foul turkey can foil holiday fun

Family and friends are just sitting down to the holiday dinner, and everything, from the turkey to the dessert, has to be just right.

By following a few simple guidelines, the turkey placed on the table will be nicely browned and succulent, instead of underdone or overdone, say U.S. Department of Agriculture

Also, common sense and a little extra care will ensure a happy holiday season, the department's experts said. Otherwise, overlooking basic health precautions when preparing a turkey and its accompanying dishes could cause food poison-

As such, you should wash anything that touches raw poultry with soapy water before it's used again to prevent the spread of any bacteria. This includes hands, utensils, kitchen counters and sink.

Picking out a turkey for the meal is not as simple as it used to be. Now the decision is whether to buy a fresh, frozen, frozen and stuffed, or precooked bird. Each type has specific time requirements for thawing and cooking.

The department's tips include temperatures to store the birds at and how long to allow for thawing and cooking.

Buy a fresh turkey and refrigerate it at 40 degrees Fahrenheit or colder for no more than one to two days before cooking. A frozen bird should stay in the freezer at 0 degrees or colder until it's time to thaw it. Cook it as soon as it is thawed, officials say. Don't keep it in the refrigerator after

Thawing a frozen turkey in the refrigerator can take from one to five days, while thawing it in cold water may take anywhere from four to 12 hours. The length of time and the power level for thawing the bird in a microwave oven should be provided with its instruction manual.

After thawing the bird, remove the neck and giblet package from inside it, and wash the bird inside and outside with cold water. Allow it to drain well.

Stuff the turkey loosely just before cooking, allowing about three-quarters of a cup of stuffing per pound of bird. The dressing's dry ingredients may be mixed ahead of time, with the perishable ones added just before stuffing the bird. As soon as the turkey is done, remove the dressing.

The turkey's inside temperature should reach at least 180 degrees Fahrenheit, which will cook the dressing. Directions for cooking times and temperatures are available in basic cookbooks or on the bird's wrapper.

Times for roasting a turkey vary, depending on the bird's size and if it's stuffed. A stuffed bird takes longer to cook. For example, at 325 degrees Fahrenheit, an unstuffed, 16-pound turkey takes from 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 hours to cook, while a stuffed bird the same size needs 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 hours in the oven.

Refrigerate leftover turkey within two hours after cooking, Department of Agriculture experts say. The best way to store turkey is to divide leftovers into small portions and store in several small containers. Turkey stored in the refrigerator will keep for three or four days, but leftover dressing should be eaten within two days. Eat frozen leftover poultry or dressing within a month.

The Department of Agriculture has a toll-free, year-round meat and poultry hotline that can provide information on how to buy, cook, carve and use leftover turkey. For ideas or answers, call 1-800-535-4555.

The hotline is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 22, the lines will be answered from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. (American Forces Information Service)

### Knowledge of fire prevention is 'kid stuff'

One of the worst mistakes a person can make is to assume everyone has an elementary knowledge of fire prevention. If that were the case, fire losses each year would be greatly

In 1988 over two million acres of forest land burned; 790 homes were destroyed; 21 firefighters were killed; and 2,500 people sustained serious burn injuries.

Fire prevention is a sales job. You're selling a product. Whether it is a home escape plan, use of smoke detectors or total safety awareness, you have to market the product, put it in the right package and provide an attractive format. Then you have to know to whom you are selling: kitchen staff, third graders or a facility manager.

Fire prevention is a marketable product that's positive and free. But if it has all these positive qualities, why is it so hard to get the public to heed it?

Communication is the secret to increasing public awareness of fire prevention techniques that save lives and property. If you cannot get your message, no matter how important it is or how many resources you have, you're wasting your time!

In the fire department's programs for children, there is a little rule for communication with children: whatever we talk about—and how we relate it—must be compatible. with their world and their experience. For example, a booster tank doesn't mean much to them, but a big bathrub of water on a truck does.

With younger age groups, we must rely on showmanship, be entertaining, to keep their attention and make them realize that we are doing it for their safety. When you see the subject the way our young audiences do, teaching fire safety is really kid's stuff. Communicating through a "child's-eye view" has definitely helped the fire prevention personnel help children. The Fire Safety House project will provide a valuable tool so that children and adults can benefit and learn vital information on fire safety.

pointed out Major Hemmitt.





### Mideast rotation update

The Department of Defense has no immediate plans to rotate units in Operation Desert Shield, and deploying new troops to the Persian Gulf is to add to those forces already in place, the Pentagon said.

While there's been no plan announced to rotate forces, DOD officials said a rotation policy is being considered and they are still studying the issue.

Originally, Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said they were looking at approximately a six-month rotation. A unit would be in Saudi Arabia for about six months and then replaced by another unit.

After announcing the increase in size of U.S. forces in the Persian Gulf Nov. 8, Secretary Cheney said those troops now in Saudi Arabia will be staying for the time

"After Saddam Hussein invaded Kuwait, we said our deployment would continue as long as necessary." Secretary Chency said. "As these new U.S. forces come into place, they will clearly gives us additional offensive capability, should it be needed." He added that he would not put a cap or ceiling on the current deployment, and would not rule out any additional reinforcements.

President George Bush said U.S. troops will be brought home as soon as possible.

The United States already has sent more than 230,000 troops to the Middle East since Iraq's Aug, 2 invasion and occupation of Kuwait. (Air Force News Service)

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

### New pilots finish one challenge, ready for next

(Editor's note: This is the sixth and last installment in a series about what it's like to go through undergraduate pilot training at Reese.)

Twenty student pilots stand ready for the moment they've waited a year for — getting their wings.

They arrived on Reese and began training Oct. 19, 1989. Many of them new to the Air Force; all of them new to military flying. And now, one year later on Oct. 26, the members of Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 91-01 are ready to put their trainer jets and instructors aside and take to the sky on their own—as Air Force pilots.

### The final six weeks

After assignment night on Sept. 14, they knew where they were going. Now it was just

a matter of passing their formation and navigational check rides before they graduate.

"Once we got past assignment night, the tension seemed to let up and we could relax some," said 2nd Lt. Jeff Miller, a member of class 91-01 who has been assigned to fly C-141s at Travis AFB, Calif.

"We were no longer under the pressure of doing our best in hopes to get the aircraft assignment we wanted. We knew where we were going and now it was just a matter of keeping up our flying skills so we could pass the final check," Lieutenant Miller added.

"Being a member of the Ohio Air National Guard, I knew before I even got here what my assignment was going to be, but that didn't make things any easier throughout the year," said 2nd Lt. Doug Cligrow, another member of 91-01 who will be returning to Ohio to fly A-7s. "I'll agree though, once we got past assignment night, it was a relief knowing the

a matter of passing their formation and navi- end, and my wings, were clearly in sight."

From assignment night until graduation, students went on cross-country flights, flew more "out-and-backs" and continued work on perfecting their instrument, navigational and formation flying skills.

Students receiving fighter or instructor assignments spent some of the time until graduation learning four-ship formation flying. Those selected for transport, tanker or bomber aircraft practiced low-level navigation flying, map reading and instrument work in the T-38's rear cockpit.

Concentration was the key to making it through the last weeks. "The days leading up to our final checks were filled with anticipation and pressure," said Lieutenant Miller.

Lieutenant Cligrow completed his check on Oct. 17 in a flight to Vance AFB, Okla. Two days later, Lieutenant Miller's flight took him to Laughlin AFB, Texas. Both were a success, as were check flights of the other class members.'

### **Graduation day arrives**

Wrapping things up and still having about 10 days until gradaution, students spent time closing out grade books, inspection-proofing uniforms, getting their new assignment patches sewn on, outprocessing and making arrival arrangements for their next base.

Then, the day finally arrives.

Students from 91-01 gather upon the stage in the Simler Theater. As the first graduation of the fiscal year, the ceremony also marks the beginning of a new chain of graduation events. At 10 a.m. the moment arrives and students stand ready to receive recognition for their year of hard work.

Today, twenty new pilots are borne to the sky in defense of the nation and all it stands for — life, liberty and justice for all.














### HOSP member joins military's elite athletes

Everyone knows Bo. Everyone knows Jordan. And before long, everyone will know Frank Parker, a 6'6" slammin' jammin' forward for the Reese Rattlers.

Parker, assigned to the 64th Flying Training Wing Hospital Physiological Training Unit, is in an elite class of athletes in the military.

Highly recruited out of high school, Parker elected to stay close to home, which he calls New Orleans, and play ball for Southern University in New Orleans.

During his junior year, he was recruited by the Cleveland Cavaliers and the Atlanta Hawks. He went to training camp in the Southern California Pro-Am League, where many American and European teams showcase future talents.

After playing only four games with a free-agent Texas team, Parker was picked by the Detroit Spirits, a team in the Continental Basketball Association. Parker played with the Spirits for one year, and then played for the Toronto Tornados, a team in the northern conference of the CBA.

In 1985, after chances failed in being picked up by a European team, Parker enlisted in the Air Force and was eventually assigned to Kadena AB, Japan.

During the next five years, he excelled to the elite rank of Air Force athletes, being selected for the Pacific Air Forces team five years in a row, the Air Force team once, and just this past September, the Armed Forces team.

Parker, who was assigned to Reese in February, was selected to go to the Armed Forces training camp. Out of about 20 people se-

After playing only four games lected for camp, 10 made the team. the a free-agent Texas team, Parker was one of them.

The team played in the Conseil International du Sport Militaire, a European tournament held in Dijon, France. The Armed Forces team went 6-2 in the tournament, with only three points in two losses separating them from the championship.

The 30-year-old sergeant is currently working on the transition from playing to coaching, and is nine hours from his bachelors degree in management.

He hopes to earn a commission and work in the medical field. Parker is one of the major talents on the Reese Rattlers varsity squad, which is undefeated in the Lubbock downtown league.
