

# Dispute causes T-38 part shortage

Air Training Command officials at Randolph AFB, Texas announced Monday that due to the non-availability of certain brake parts for the T-38 Talon, all T-38 missions that do not contribute directly to the production of new pilots has been curtailed.

This action is being taken now to avoid the possibility of grounding the majority of the Air Force T-38 fleet at a later date.

The current shortage of disks was caused by a 16-month delay in awarding a contract for replacements. ATC and Air Force Logis-

tics Command officials are working very closely to accelerate delivery and to rectify the situation.

Until sufficient quantities of brake disks are received, The ATC flying training mission has been reduced by about 15 percent

and all static displays of T-38s at other than their home station have been cancelled, command officials said.

Specific instructions have been issued to ATC units on how to cut down on wear of the existing disks.

## Unit set up on base to test T-1A

Air Training Command recently activated Detachment 2, 3307th Test and Evaluation Squadron at Reese. Det. 2 will play a major role in testing and evaluating the new T-1A Jayhawk and the ground-based training system, or simulators, according to detachment officials.

The detachment is located in the west side of Hangar 82, and has ten people assigned — maintenance members hand-picked for the job prior to the maintenance conversion. In January 1991, the detachment will reach full strength with 28 people assigned, including nine officers, 18 enlisted personnel and one civilian secretary. The cadre includes pilots; maintenance personnel in airframe, engines and systems knowledge; life support; training; and analysis.

Testing is done in several phases. The first phase, conducted by the 4950th Test Wing and ATC personnel, was done at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio. This consisted of the operational demonstration by all TTTX competitors and resulted in the selection of the Beechjet.

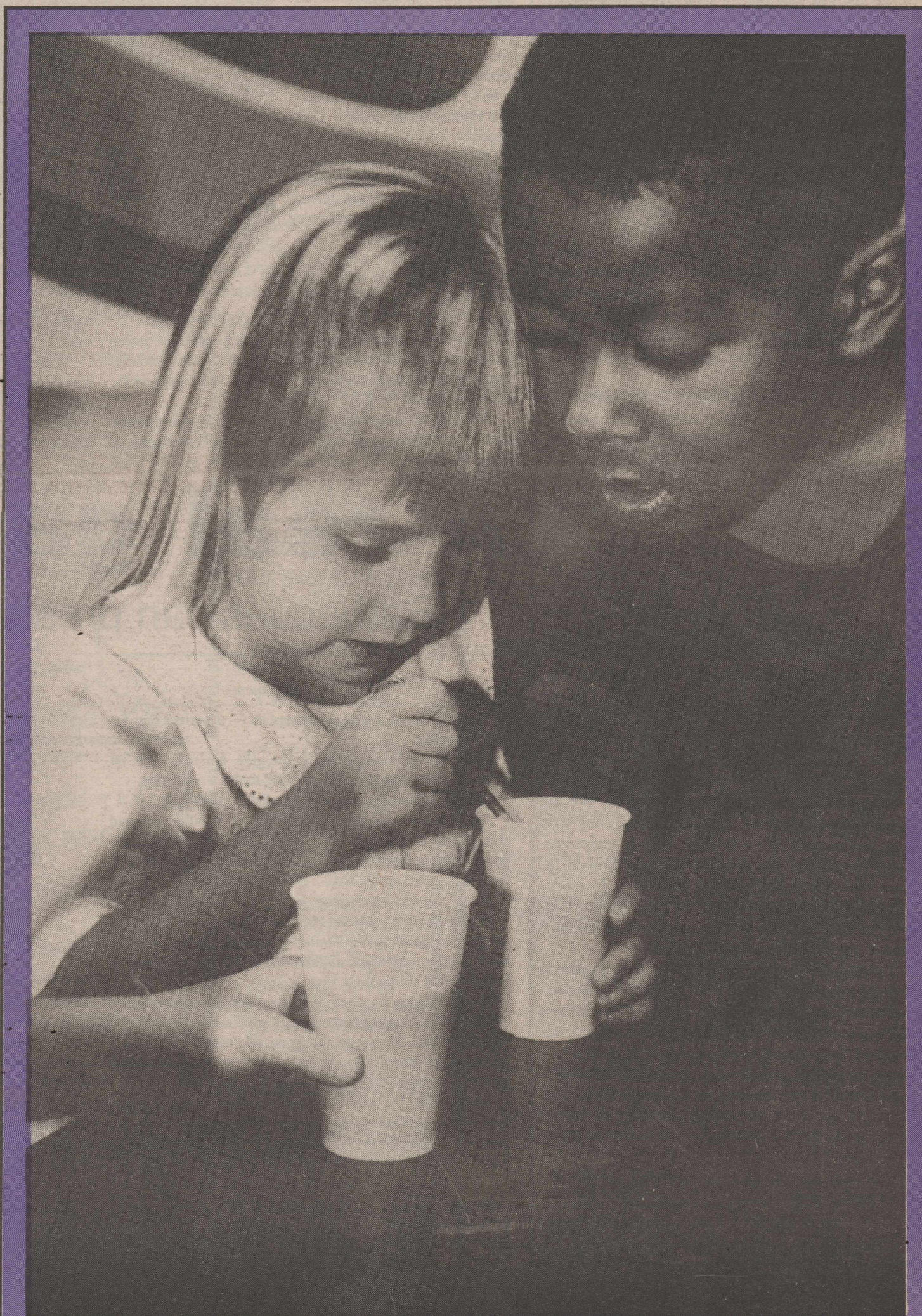
The second phase of testing is called combined qualification test and evaluation/qualification operational test and evaluation. This phase uses a test team at the contractor's facility — prior to acceptance of the first aircraft — to ensure the aircraft meet all FAA certifications and the contract. Flight crews are a mix of contractor and Air Force personnel.

The third phase, dedicated qualification operational test and evaluation, will be conducted at Reese. It is expected the first T-1 aircraft will arrive in late September 1991, so testing can start in October 1991. The aircraft will fly approximately 30 sorties, representative of tanker-transport mission profiles. Detachment personnel will develop a test plan for each profile and then analyze the results.

The purpose of this phase of testing is to take a "production" configured aircraft and determine its ability to perform in the ATC training environment, according to detachment officials.

The fourth phase, follow-on operational test and evaluation, is planned and done by ATC at Reese — to validate the results of the third phase as to the aircraft's effectiveness in the ATC environment. This testing will start in January 1992 and last through fiscal 1994.

In mid-April, detachment officials expect a site visit by the McDonnell Douglas, Beechcraft and Quintron management team as well as representatives from ATC, Air Force Systems Command and Air Force Logistics Command. In May, the wing will develop a specialized undergraduate pilot training implementation master plan.

Thanks, Reese, for making the District 17 Special Olympics so special last Saturday. Specifically, thanks to all you volunteers—more than 170 of you—who set up tents, picked up trash, kept time or scores, presented awards or served as "huggers." Because of you, some wonderful kids and young adults who could not compete in regular events were able to experience the joy of athletic competition.

A special thanks, also, to the Reese Honor Guard and some terrific noncommissioned officers and airmen who made up our 50 State flag team. You set the example by being there to add color and a "touch of class" to the opening ceremonies.

Special Olympics is an international movement—patterned after the Olympic games—that gives people with mental retardation an opportunity to strengthen their character, develop physical skills, display talent and fulfill their human potential. The Special Olympics philosophy conveys that athletic training and competition benefit individuals mentally, physically, socially and spiritually. Most importantly, it unites the community at large.

Started by the Kennedy family in the 1960s, the Special Olympics now involves athletes and volunteers in 20,000 communities nationwide. # JCS chairman gives assurance to troops

"We're going to take care of you" — General Powell

"I say to our young people who are serving with us now — don't worry, we're going to take care of you," said Army Gen. Colin L. Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, during a late-March press conference at Pacific Air Forces headquarters in Hawaii.

"The United States military is still going to be a great place to serve. We may have to get smaller, but we will not sacrifice the quality of our personnel. We will not sacrifice the quality of life for them and their families," said General Powell who was in Hawaii to meet with the senior service leaders in the Pacific Command.

With the changing geopolitical environment, as well as the increasing pressure on the defense budget, military spending is going to be reduced, he said.

"The American people say we've got to do something about the deficit, and they think we can buy our security with less money," General Powell said.

Less money will mean less investment in facilities, fewer programs and over time it means fewer sailors, soldiers, airmen and Marines in uniform. "But it's still a dangerous, uncertain world," he said.

"As we reduce spending, we will eventually reach a base level, a level below which we cannot go and still call ourselves

a superpower. We are a superpower. In fact, we are probably the only superpower in the world with all the elements of national power — military, economic and political."

He said to preserve the United States' interests around the world requires capable armed forces. "We will still need a forward presence here in the Pacific. We are a maritime nation and we have to be able to control the great oceans in the world.

"The threat is always there, it's always lurking. Our history tells us that when you're not prepared for that threat, it will suddenly bite you you-know-where," he said.

He expects to see even more significant changes in the Soviet force structure in the Pacific similar to those in Europe.

"Although there may be force structure changes and although the world may look a lot more peaceful, I don't think you'll see a fundamental change in the role of

the Pacific Command in maintaining a forward presence," he said.

"If there is one clear message that comes across from our friends in the Pacific, it is 'America, stay engaged. American, don't leave.' We don't want to pull back. We don't want to withdraw. We don't want to say we're not interested." (Air Force News Service)

## A real gas?

### Barbecues can present safety hazard

It was a Sunday afternoon last fall — a perfect day for grilling steaks.

The charcoal was placed in the grill, but there was no charcoal starter. So the cook decided to use a substitute.

"Why not start the fire with gasoline?" he thought.

He went to the storage room, found the gasoline can, and discovered it still contained some leftover gasoline. He poured a little gasoline on the charcoal and put a match to it. Only part of it ignited.

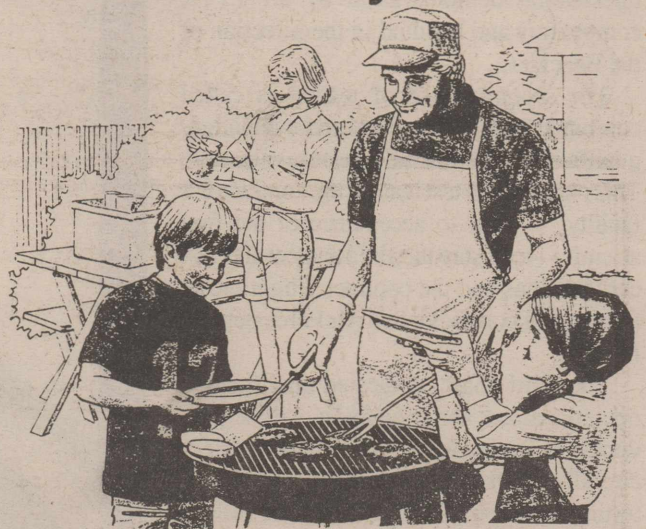
"Why not add a little more gas?" he thought.

Not suspecting what was about to happen, he applied more gasoline to the small fire. Flames spurted up and were sucked back into the can. The can exploded in the man's hand. His long-sleeved shirt caught fire.

The explosion knocked him down and out momentarily. Then he started rolling in the grass. He put some of the flames out, but not all. He got up and frantically turned on a nearby garden hose, threw himself back down, and started rolling toward the end of the hose, dousing his entire body.

Meanwhile, his wife (who had witnessed the explosion) was wildly gathering up blankets. The flames were out, however, when the blankets arrived. The man screamed for his wife to put the blankets in the car and get him to a hospital.

The man must have been in shock, as he remembers only "bits and pieces" of his ordeal. Then the painful reality returned and lasted throughout the 42 days of his hospitalization.



Three months later, the man returned to his home. The bills amounted to over \$20,000.

Fortunately, his hands were not severely damaged, but he has to constantly keep them active to prevent stiffness.

Does this story sound like something out of a book? Unfortunately, it isn't. This is a true story. This same scenario will occur over and over again.

Don't use gasoline or any other flammable liquid that is not specifically intended as a grill starter. In fact, don't use gasoline anywhere except in your automobile or in your lawnmower and other equipment where it is required. And don't refuel unless a lawnmower engine is cool.

# Road work

## Summer biking calls for safety awareness

With warmer weather returning to West Texas, bicycle enthusiasts are taking to the streets. All too often, that can mean danger from fast-moving vehicles whose drivers have never looked at the road from the cyclist's point of view. Even in the best of circumstances, sharing the road can be a harrowing experience for both drivers and

bicyclists. To make that partnership safe, here are several pointers from some avid cyclists:

□ Stay to the right as much as possible. However, since the force of passing cars causes debris such as broken glass, sand and tumbleweeds to accumulate on the shoulder of the road, try to avoid riding directly on the shoulder. This leaves a narrow strip of road not much wider than

the solid white line on the edge of the lane. If you're driving and you see a cyclist shying away from the shoulder, try to give him a little more room.

□ Be especially cautious when approaching a biker from behind. With the wind in their ears, they might not hear you coming. It would help if drivers could beep their horn briefly about 200 feet before passing. Cyclists will know you're coming and will be more conscious about staying in their piece of the road.

□ When passing a cyclist at close range, drive slowly. Not only does this add an extra measure of safety, it also keeps the dust down. The draft following a passing car is often loaded with pebbles and dust that blow in cyclists' eyes, and a strong draft can blow a biker into the shoulder where debris and loose sand can cause a loss of control.

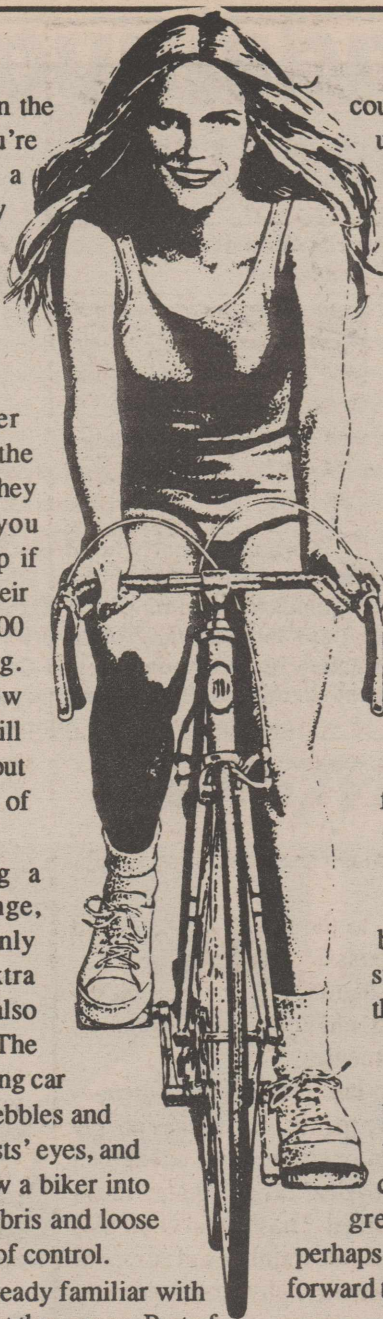
□ If you are not already familiar with hand signals, learn what they mean. Part of

courteous and safe cycling is using hand signals before making turns. This is the only way cyclists can communicate their intentions to drivers.

□ Base housing residents often ride on Perimeter Road because it is paved, has little traffic, is enclosed by the base fence and offers a seven-mile stretch of road with no intersections, stop signs or traffic lights. However, even under ideal circumstances such as these, accidents can occur. Because there is so little traffic, both drivers and cyclists often become lax as far as safety is concerned. Consequently, everyone should beware.

□ Cyclists should wear brightly colored clothing and stay to the right-hand side of the road.

If both drivers and bicyclists learn and practice these safety measures, cyclists will be able to enjoy a great form of exercise and perhaps avoid accidents. Let's look forward to a safe road partnership this summer.

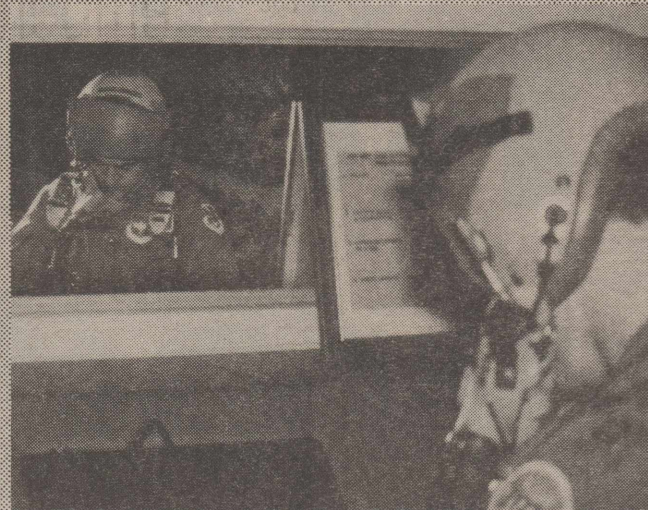

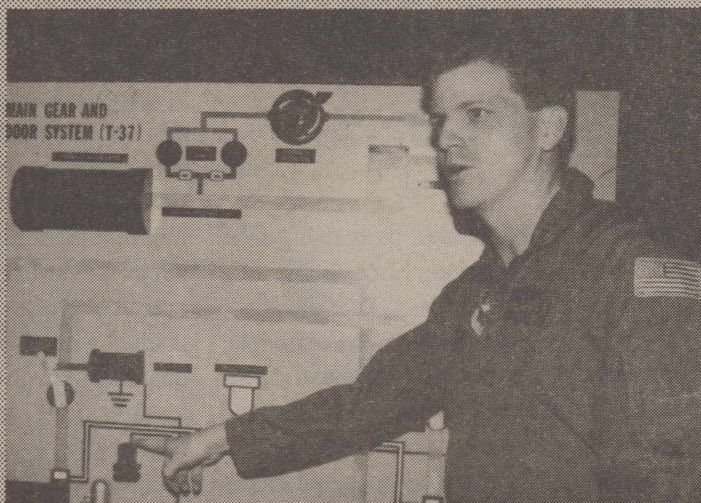

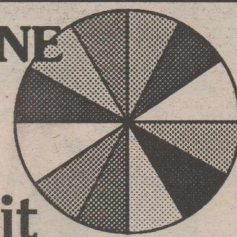

# Thirteen get Article 15 punishments

Thirteen wing members received Article 15 punishments over the last quarter for a variety of offenses under the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

According to officials of the Reese Legal Office, unit commanders imposed punishments based on factors such as the seriousness of the offense and the prior service and disciplinary record of each offender. The offenses were:

□ A captain was reprimanded and ordered to forfeit \$500 pay per month for two months for driving while drunk (Article 111).

□ A technical sergeant was reduced to staff sergeant (suspended) and ordered to forfeit \$300 pay per month for two months for driving while drunk (Article 111).

□ A staff sergeant was reduced to sergeant

## Members cited for UCMJ violations

(suspended), ordered to forfeit \$300 pay for one month (suspended), and ordered to perform 30 days correctional custody for failure to go and dereliction of duty (Articles 86 and 92).

□ A sergeant was reduced to airman first class (suspended), and ordered to forfeit \$100 pay for one month and to perform 45 days extra duty for destruction of government

property and larceny (Articles 109 and 121).

□ A sergeant was reduced to airman first class and ordered to forfeit \$75 pay per month for two months for use of marijuana (Article 112a).

□ A sergeant was reduced to airman first class (suspended) and ordered to forfeit \$50 pay per month for two months for disobeying a lawful order, making a false official statement and larceny (Articles 92, 107 and 121).

□ A sergeant was reduced to airman and ordered to forfeit \$150 pay per month for two months for use of marijuana (Article 112a).

□ A sergeant was reduced to airman first class (suspended) and ordered to forfeit \$50 pay per month for two months for damage to private property (Article 109).

□ A senior airman was reduced to airman

first class for failure to go and for making a false official statement (Articles 86 and 107).

□ A senior airman was reduced to airman and ordered to perform 30 days extra duty for being absent without leave (Article 86).

□ An airman first class was reduced to airman (suspended) and ordered to forfeit \$150 pay per month for two months and to perform 45 days extra duty for operating a vehicle in a reckless manner (Article 111).

□ An airman was reduced to airman basic and ordered to forfeit \$200 pay per month for two months for use of marijuana (Article 112a).

□ An airman was reduced to airman basic and ordered to perform 7 days extra duty for failure to go and making a false official statement (Articles 86 and 107).

## Membership drive begins Monday

The Air Force Association, a national, nonprofit organization that fights for better benefits for Air Force people and supports a strong national defense posture, will conduct its annual membership drive at Reese, beginning Monday.

### UPT commitment rising

The new active-duty service commitment for officers entering undergraduate pilot training on or after Oct. 1, 1991, is 10 years.

The previous commitment was eight years. The new commitment will be served after UPT graduation and concurrently with any other active-duty service commitment.

U.S. Air Force Academy classes of 1990 and 1991, and senior ROTC pilot candidates commissioned during fiscal 1990 will complete UPT with the eight-year commitment. (Air Force News Service)

### CHAMPUS use explained

Who can and cannot use CHAMPUS?

Active-duty service members are not eligible for benefits,

according to the Reese Health Benefits Office, but their spouses and unmarried children within certain age limits are eligible. Also eligible are:

☐ Military retirees, their spouses and unmarried children within certain age limits;

☐ Widows, widowers and children (within age limits) of active or retired service members who have died;

☐ Spouses and unmarried children (within age limits) of reservists who go on active duty for more than 30 consecutive days. They are covered only during the active-duty tour.

☐ Certain family members of active-duty service members who were court-martialed and separated for spouse or child abuse;

☐ Former spouses of active or retired military who served at least 20 years creditable toward retirement. A former spouse must have been married to a service member for at

least 20 years, and must meet other requirements as well. For more details, call the health benefits adviser at 3581.

### Housing survey on the way

The 1990 Variable Housing Allowance Survey is being mailed to all active-duty Air Force and Air National Guard members drawing basic allowance for quarters.

Survey data will be used to readjust VHA rates beginning January 1991. Inaccurate or missing information could take money out of Air Force members' pockets.

The survey is being distributed through mid-April by base personnel offices and should be completed and returned as soon as possible.

# Special insurance can extend coverage

Department of Defense health officials are reminding certain persons to take advantage of a special insurance program so they won't lose medical coverage after they leave the military.

The Uniformed Services Voluntary Insurance Program, or U.S. VIP, offers coverage for several groups who lose military medical coverage. They include persons separating from the military before they can retire, those divorcing a service member after less than 20 years' marriage and dependents turning 21.

Carol Galaty, a DOD health affairs program manager, said DOD had posters printed

and distributed because many military members and dependents are unaware of their need for insurance. The posters say, "Not to ask may be hazardous to your wallet."

"One accident after they lose eligibility for military benefits could plunge them into bankruptcy," she said. She noted that some military members and their families have heard of "COBRA" coverage, a health insur-

ance that civilian employers offer department employees or spouses getting divorced.

"Yet often times, these same people don't know similar coverage is available for them," said Ms. Galaty.

U.S. VIP is offered only to service families by a major commercial insurance provider at discount prices negotiated by DOD. Once enrolled in U.S. VIP, coverage can

continue until Medicare goes into effect at age 65.

Furthermore, persons with pre-existing conditions can purchase the U.S. VIP plan, which will cover their treatment after the policy has been in force for a year.

Others who should examine U.S. VIP coverage include family members getting married, wards and dependent grandchildren.

Personnel offices, family service centers and military medical centers have information about the insurance.

Galaty urged persons who will lose medical coverage to buy some comprehensive insurance plan, even if they decide not to purchase U.S. VIP.

## Quality of recruits up, DOD says

The Armed Services met their first quarter fiscal 1990 recruiting and retention goals and also reported improved enlistee quality, said Christopher Jehn, Department of Defense's top personnel manager.

Mr. Jehn issued his first-quarter report in March, noting some 55,900 men and women enlisted in the services. The Marine Corps surpassed its objective, while the other services met theirs, he said. Objectives were set at 10 percent less than the year before.

"Quality improved slightly from the same quarter in fiscal 1989," said Mr. Jehn, assistant secretary of

defense for force management and personnel. "We expect the services to achieve their goals and maintain the current level of quality despite the shrinking pool of youth, competitive market conditions and lagging military compensation."

About 3,500 recruits had prior service. Some 91 percent of the non-prior-service enlistees — 47,700 — were high school graduates; of that number, 31,100, or 62 percent, scored in the top half of the military aptitude test. The percentages remained the same as the year before. On the other hand, he said, enlistees scoring average or above on the test was 96 percent, up from

93 percent in fiscal 1989.

Nearly 63,000 service members re-enlisted during the first quarter — 7,200 more than last year. The Air Force had the second-highest re-up rate, 70 percent, but was well off its sizzling 91 percent pace of last year. Air Force officials attributed the decline to early-release programs offered during the quarter to cut manpower levels.

The Marine Corps re-enlisted 56 percent of its eligible force, up 11 percent from last year. The Army re-enlisted 69 percent, up 3 points, and the Navy posted a 71 percent rate, up 2. (American Forces Information Service)

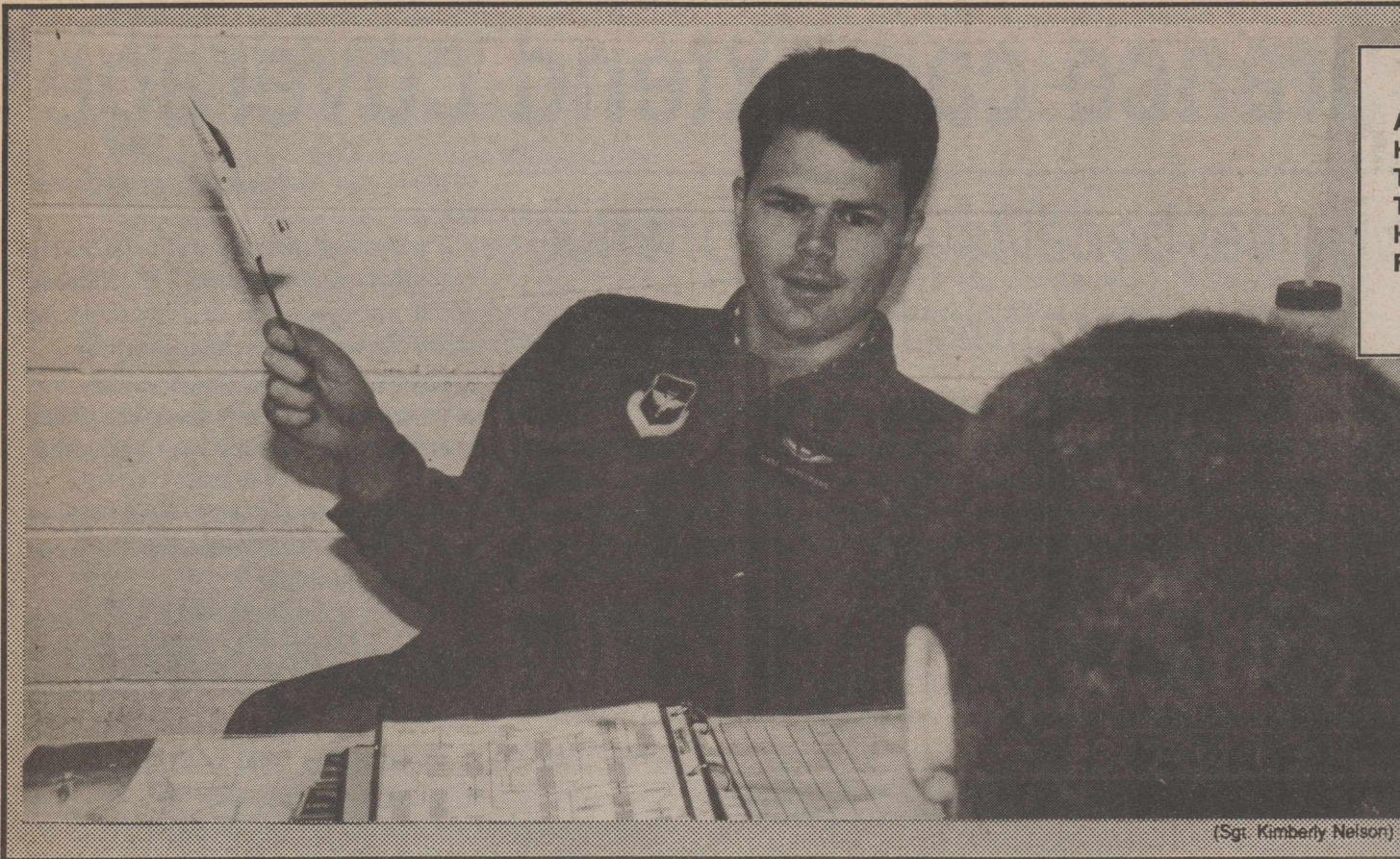

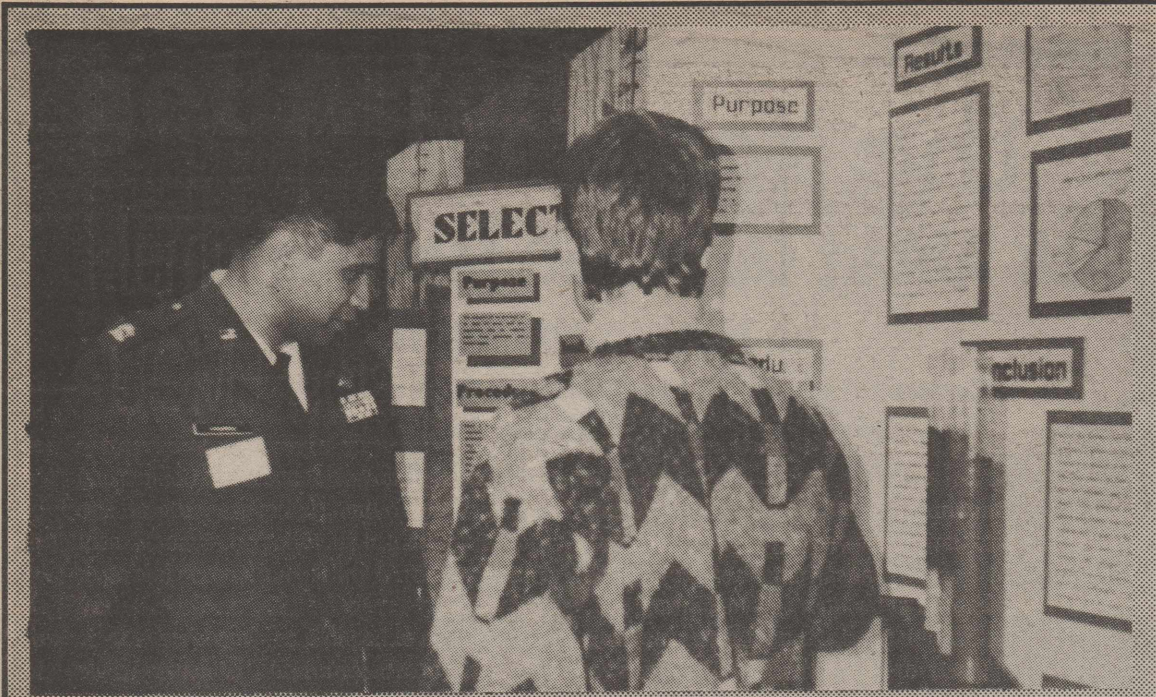

# Program exists for exceptional family members

The Family Advocacy Program, or FAP, is part of Air Force Regulation 160-38, which is a program that has two major components here at Reese.

One program deals with the identification, prevention and treatment of family violence. The second component is the Exceptional Family Member Program. All active-duty members have a responsibility to learn about these programs, whether they have a family, are a supervisor for others (or will be). Everyone needs to know their responsibilities and entitlements in this important area.

The goal of the Exceptional Family Member Program is to help a family when one or more members of it has a special need or handicap. Help can be provided in three major ways.

□ First, by offering counseling services to assist the family in un-

derstanding or accepting a child's or spouse's medical, emotional or educational special needs.

□ Second, by helping families find the necessary resources, such as hospitals or special schools, within the community.

□ And finally, by arranging for the active-duty member to have an identifier code in his or her personnel file that will help the Air Force Military Personnel Center to identify the individual's special needs when it's time for the next permanent-

change-of-station move. If you have a child or spouse with a special need, and resources for this concern aren't available at Reese or in the Lubbock area, you may be eligible for an EFMP reassignment where the needed resources are available.

It's important to make sure your family's needs are being met, and EFMP is designed to make sure that happens.

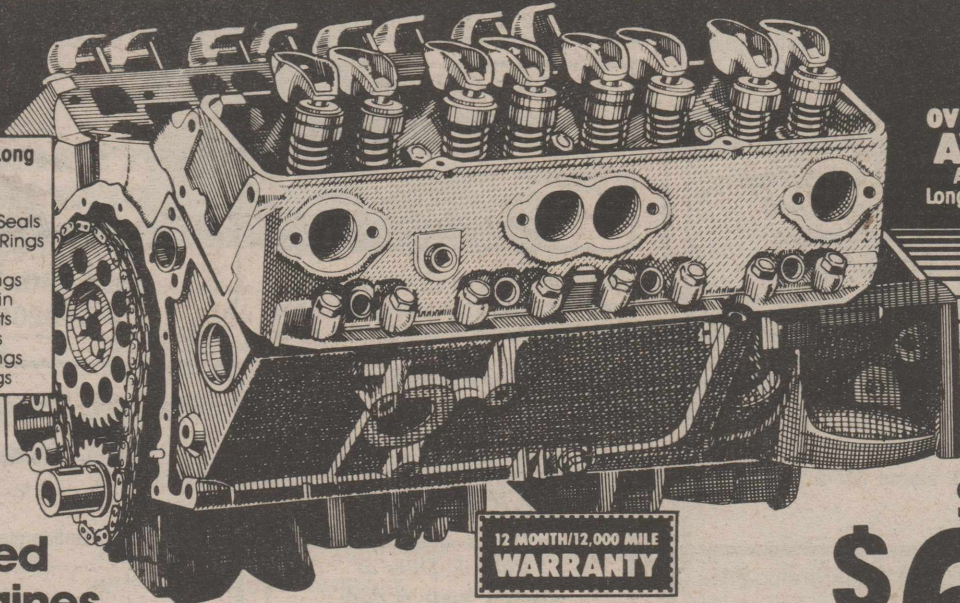
