The 64th Flying Training Wing will get a new commander when Col. William C. Henny takes over for Col. Monroe S. Sams Jr. during a June 25 ceremony.

A command pilot with 3,000 flying hours, Colonel Henny came to Reese In January 1989. Prior to Reese, he was assigned to Pacific Air Forces Headquarters, Hickam AFB, Hawaii, where he was the command's director of assignments.

# Aircraft program cuts will save \$16.8 billion

Four Air Force aircraft programs have either been reduced or delayed following the results of a four-month review on major aircraft-buying programs.

Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney told Congress April 26 that the Pentagon plans on cutting back a total of six major aircraft for a savings of \$16.8 billion in the Department of Defense's five-year budget ending in fiscal 1994. In the fiscal 1991 budget before Congress, the

cuts mean a reduction of \$2.41 bil-tary Cheney said he also took into

Secretary Cheney has proposed buying fewer B-2 bombers and C-17 transports, and delaying buys on the advanced tactical fighter and advanced tactical aircraft.

"Throughout the review, our goal was to ensure that we have the flexibility and the capability to protect vital U.S. interests." Secretary Cheney said.

In reaching his decisions, Secre-

tary Cheney said he also took into consideration defense needs, available technology, acquisition efficiency and tight budgets.

Secretary Cheney proposes buying 75 B-2 stealth bombers instead of the 132 originally programmed. Reducing the number of bombers saves \$14.4 billion over the life of the program, he said. Only two bombers will be bought in fiscal 1991, rather than the five currently proposed.

The C-17 transport program will be reduced from 210 aircraft to 120, saving \$12.6 billion over the life of the program. Instead of the six aircraft planned for production in fiscal 1991, only two will be built.

The transport has twice the capacity of the C-141 Starlifter it is intended to replace, can use shorter runways and can carry any large equipment that can fit into the C-5 Galaxy — the military's largest transport.

The advanced tactical fighter is the Air Force's next air superiority fighter, replacing the F-15 Eagle. It is designed to counter improvements in Soviet aircraft and surface-to-air threats.

The advanced tactical aircraft is the Air Force's version of the Navy's A-12 all-weather, medium attack aircraft. The ATA would be used for the deep attack mission now handled by the F-111 and F-15E. (Air Force News Service)

# Public service recognized

They're everywhere.

They live in our neighborhoods. They sit next to us in church. They're behind us on the grocery check-out line. Their children attend school with ours.

They're some of the hardest-working people in the country, so it's no coincidence who they work for.

They're government employees, and Monday through May 13 belongs to them — it's Public Service Recognition Week.

According to Romeo Garcia, chief of the Reese Civilian Personnel Office, one of the main purposes of the week is to give people outside the government a better understanding of how public employees serve them.

"Public servants are industrious people who work for the betterment of society," Mr. Garcia said. "Unfortunately, some taxpayers don't realize the extent of their efforts.

"One common misconception is that public servants make 'the big bucks,'" he said. "That may have been true several decades ago, but no longer." For example, Mr. Garcia pointed out that federal salaries lag an average of 20-plus percent behind the non-government work force.

Mr. Garcia also pointed to the selflessness shown by many federal employees.

"Some estimates show that government workers lose one million days of leave annually," he said, citing how some employees stay on the job despite the fact that they have "use-it-or-lose-it" leave.

"Federal employees are here to serve the American people—each (federal employee) believes public service is a high and noble calling," said President George Bush. "They work hard, they sacrifice and they deserve to be recognized and appreciated."

This year's recognition, which is sponsored by the Public Employees Roundtable, marks the first time a concerted nationwide effort has been put together for the observance. The roundtable is a politically neutral, non-profit group of organizations, representing more than 950,000 public employees and retirees.

Public celebrations are scheduled in all 50 states and hundreds of cities, with Washington, D.C., serving as the focal point.

# Hospital committed to excellence in care

USAF Hospital Reese is committed to providing the best medical care in the Air Force. We have several programs to help us achieve this goal. Following are summaries of some of these programs:

### Mammography

The hospital acquired a mammography unit last summer, which has allowed us to expand this important service to many more women.

Who should have a mammogram? Any eligible beneficiary with a provider's recommendation. Mammography is an important way to help protect against breast cancer. It is a safe, fast, low-dose x-ray that can find breast cancers too small to be identified by physical examination.

The American Cancer Society has published some guidelines regarding mammographies. If you are female and: \$\square\$ 35-40 years of age—the American Cancer Society recommends that you have a baseline or initial mammogram to serve as a basis for future comparisons. \$\square\$ 40-50 years—have a mammogram every one to two years, depending on findings, risk factors, and what your physician recommends. \$\square\$ Over 50 years—have a mammogram every year.

If you have a personal or family history of breast cancer, you may need more frequent examinations. Call the Obstetrics-Gynecology clinic at 3593 for more details.

### Your medical record

All patients treated at the hospital have a medical record. This record is a comprehensive summary of health care provided at government facilities or at government expense.

It is used by the providers as a reference and record of past treatment. Therefore, it is very valuable. It is important that all

information regarding your care be annotated and included within.

If you have your medical records with you, please return them to the Outpatient Records Section, and we will be happy to make copies for you.


### Health Care Finder Program

The hospital has set agreements with numerous physicians downtown to accept assignment from CHAMPUS, the Civilian Health and Medical Plan of the Uniformed Services, for services they provide. These providers agree to accept the CHAMPUS allowable charge (along with your cost share and deductible, if any) as the full fee for your care. Individual providers participate on a case-by-case basis. Check with Carolyn Johnson at 3581 for more details regarding providers who accept CHAMPUS assignment. Of course, you can save the cost of your CHAMPUS deductible by receiving your health care at the hospital here.

### Dependent Dental Insurance Program

The Reese Dental Clinic wants to help as many patients receive dental care as possible. Abiding by the AF Regulation that requires dependents who are enrolled in the Dependent Dental Insurance Program to have a civilian dentist provide the treatment that is covered by DDIP helps accomplish this objective. Treatment that the dental clinic is currently able to provide that is not covered by the DDIP includes extractions, denture relines and immediate dentures (a waiting list is used).

If you are enrolled in DDIP, you may disenroll if you have been enrolled at least two years; or if you have arrived at Reese within the last 60 days; or no longer have any eligible dependents (for example, recently divorced) by going to customer service at Consolidated Base Personnel Office. If you have any questions, please call the dental clinic at 3321 or the CBPO at 3276.

# Wing family learns importance of fire prevention

On March 8, the Reese Fire Department received an emergency call of a kitchen fire in the Reese Village.

The fire department responded as did the USAF Hospital Reese and the 64th Security Police Squadron. Upon the arrival of the fire department, smoke was showing.

Assistant Fire Chief Lawrence Million immediately directed firefighting and rescue operations. Fortunately, the fire was already extinguished upon arrival, but there was still smoke in the house.

The real aim of this article is to center on the family in the home where the fire occurred — Mrs. Jessie M. Crawford, the mother; Edward Crawford, the young man who took actions to extinguish the fire; Melinda Crawford, who dialed 911 to report the fire; and a younger son, Emsy Crawford Jr.

A grease fire ignited while cooking french fries. In an attempt to extinguish the fire, Edward grabbed the pan, moved it to the sink and put water in it. At this point, the fire reached the exhaust hood, but self-extinguished when the burning grease was removed.

However, Edward now had burn injuries to the right hand, and was in severe pain.

Edward was taken to the hospital. He had to return several times for continued treatment but will fully recover. I visited Edward and his mother on April 26 to see how he was doing and to ask him what his thoughts were about that day and what he would now do differently.

"I've given a lot of thought about what I should have done — simply put a lid on the pan and turned off the heat," he said. "Believe me, if it happens again I will do it right."

Edward has learned a lesson the hard and painful way. Believe me, I know how he feels, having received the same type burns the same way many years ago.

Even though Edward did not follow the right method to extinguish the grease fire, he and his family are my heroes. If he had done nothing, the fire could have quickly spread to the rest of the house and further injury could have occurred. Edward knows how to extinguish a grease fire now.

I personally invite any base residents to call the fire prevention section at 3686/6339 for a one-on-one fire prevention briefing.

Please help us to stop needless, destructive fires. Remember, the real incident you just read about didn't happen at another base. It happened right here to one of our friends and neighbors.

Learn not to burn all through the year. Have a fire safe day.

### conservation go awn watering,

Contrary to popular belief, it is possible to conserve water and take good care of a lawn.

Excessive and improper watering can be the cause of many grass problems. Some examples are:

☐ A common mistake is to water lawns lightly and frequently, rather than waiting until it's really needed and then saturating it. Holding back on water until it's really needed causes the development of deep grass roots, which help grass maintain its appearance better and longer than shallow roots.

☐ The amount of water needed to keep soil moist will vary. During the growing season, two inches of water should be applied in hot, dry weather.

Since most home sprinklers water at a rate of one-half inch

per hour, watering for four hours should be enough during the hottest weather.

However, most soil won't absorb one-half inch of water per hour, so it will probably be necessary to move your sprinkler around. This will allow each area to absorb all the water it gets.

☐ The time of day when water is applied affects how much water is needed to replenish the moisture in the soil. The best time to water is early in the morning, before temperatures begin to rise. This will cut down on water wasted through evaporation.

It will also cut down on foliage disease, since water applied early in the day will evaporate as the day heats up, rather than remaining on the ground to provide a fertile host for disease-causing organisms.

☐ When grass starts turning yellow, people tend to water while keeping water usage down.

it more. In fact, there are many reasons why grass turns yellow. One common reason for this occurrence is a shortage of nutrients in the soil — particularly nitrogen. Well-nurtured grass uses far less moisture than poorly fed grass.

Maintaining the level of nutrients in the soil through fertilizing is a good way to keep lawns looking good without wasting water in the process.

☐ The height of your lawn mower is also important. If you set your mower at one-and-a-half inches in the early spring and slowly raise it so that it reaches one-and-a-half to three inches in midsummer, soil evaporation will be reduced.

With the need to be cost-conscious nowadays, it's imperative that everyone use as little water as possible to maintain



### Chief, vice chief nominated

President Bush has nominated Gen. Michael J. Dugan to succeed Gen. Larry D. Welch as chief of staff of the Air Force, and he has also nominated Lt. Gen. John M. Loh for promotion to general and assignment as the Air Force vice chief of staff.

General Dugan is commander in chief, U.S. Air Forces in Europe, and commander, Allied Air Forces Central Europe, headquartered at Ramstein AB, West Germany. General Loh is commander of Air Force Systems Command's Aeronautical Systems Division. He would replace Gen. Monroe W. Hatch Jr., who retires June 1.

From Albany, N.Y., General Dugan graduated from West Point in 1958, and basic pilot training at Laredo AFB, Texas, in 1959. He has been USAFE's commander in chief since April 1989. Prior to that he was deputy chief of staff for plans and operations, headquarters Air Force, Washington, D.C.

A command pilot with 4,500 flying hours and 300 combat missions, General Dugan's decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star, Legion of Merit with two oak leaf clusters, Distinguished Flying Cross and Purple Heart.

General Loh is a 1960 graduate of the Air Force Academy, and has logged more than 3,500 hours in numerous fighter aircraft. He was assigned to his present duties at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, in July 1988.

General Welch is scheduled to retire at the end of his term, June 30.

General Hatch has served as vice chief of staff since February 1987. He is a 1955 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy. (Air Force News Service)

### **Pillows recalled**

Manufacturers are recalling more than 600,000 infant pillows and cushions that have been linked to the suffocation deaths of 19 infants.

Two retailers, J.C. Penney Co. Inc., and the Army and Air Force Exchange Service — sold one brand of the cushions worldwide at post and base exchanges — have joined in the recall effort.

The Consumer Products Safety Commission, however, said none of the deaths reported involved cushions sold by these retailers.

### Service commitments change

The Air Force is revising active-duty service commitments for aviators who receive combat crew training.

The new commitments go into effect for applicable flying training courses that begin on or after Oct. 1, 1990.

"This change will allow the Air Force to receive an appropriate payback for top-notch training and will ensure that combat units have the necessary experience," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Larry D. Welch.

With the change, air crews who receive initial qualification training will pick up a five-year active-duty service commitment. The previous commitment was three years.

People who receive requalification training will pick up a three-year active-duty service commitment. The previous commitment was two years.

Qualification training, such as instructor pilot, continue to carry a two-year active-duty service commitment.

The active-duty service commitment also has been increased to five years for test pilot school, fighter weapons school and fixed wing qualification for helicopter pilots. (Air Force News Service)

### **Human goals charter signed**

Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney and Deputy Secretary Donald Atwood signed the new Human Goals Charter for the Department of Defense April 18, a document which is the foundation of the military's equal opportunity program.

"During the current hiring freeze within the Department of Defense and the planned restructuring of the military departments and defense agencies, we must make every effort to avoid any disproportionate impact on any group," Secretary Cheney said before the signing.

Reservists play "active"

role in Reese mission

"I-M-A reservist."

An Individualized Mobility Augmentee, or IMA, is an Air Force "Ready Reservist" assigned to a specific active-dutycounterpart's position, which they assume during mobilization. Along with the Air --National Guard, these reserves provide first-line backup for the Air Force in the event of war, national emergency or disaster. Reese currently has 19 enlisted and nine officer IMAs assigned, and 14 enlisted and 16 officers attached.

"The Air Force's mission in peacetime is readiness," stated Bill Orr, Reese Readiness Division deputy chief and Air Reserve Management Officer. "To an IMA, this means that they are prepared to meet their contractual agreement, which is to . . report for duty and be prepared to fight within 24 hours of notification." -

"Therefore, during peacetime, an IMA's primary reserve job is to train — to acquire. new skills, to upgrade their level of qualification and to maintain their readiness for wartime," Mr. Orr said. Augmentees are required to participate in periodic training activities to maintain proficiency and be ready to serve in their Air Force specialty. Training can be accomplished on the job, through correspondence courses and in residence at technical and professional military schools.

Additionally, augmentees are required to ensure their ancillary training — nuclear, biological, chemical warfare, small arms and buddy care — is current. They should also be able to perform special missions within their career field that aren't normally done in a peacetime environment..

Some IMA readiness responsibilities

Planning for mobilization; ensuring that their families are ready to carry on without

them — many times on short notice; and keeping their military supervisor informed on changes in their status.

IMAs are managed and paid through the Air Reserve Personnel Center, and they do not receive pay until the signed activeduty orders are processed through ARPC, often a month after the tour. "If there's a "glitch" in the system, it could take longer," added Mr. Orr.

ARPC notifies IMAs when to take a physical, when promotion boards are due and when to get shots. Since this organizational structure is often missing or located thousands of miles away, this can and often does create problems. Therefore, as an IMA, a person should be resourceful, independent and someone who can take the initiative, Mr. Orr pointed out. "If an augmentee does need help or advice, they can call the Reese Personnel Section or myself."

IMAs have tremendous flexibility and freedom in scheduling their training so they can work around peak demands in civilian jobs or school schedules with relative ease. "On the other hand," he said, "IMAs must be willing to take on greater responsibility in managing themselves.

"IMAs often think that their active-duty supervisors are responsible for initiating all important personnel actions, and claim that 'These actions are out of my hands.' That is not only untrue, it is dangerously wrong," said the ARMO.

Active-duty supervisors are just that active duty. Augmentees might even be their first encounter with IMA management and the Air Force Reserves, Mr. Orr added.

ARPC Pamphlet 45-22, "Guide for USAF Reserve Individual Mobilization Augmentees and Their Supervisors," is a helpful tool dealing with IMA personnel needs. When used by a motivated IMA, it can show the way towards enhanced promotion opportunities, special schools and other interesting information to help an IMA demonstrate his or her own worth to a unit. To make the most of their augmentee, IMA supervisors should:

Remember, an IMA is an individual with wants and needs the same as active-duty members. But unlike an activeduty member, an IMA often has a civilian career and must constantly balance civilian life with military responsibilities.

An example of this is Maj. Claudine Vasilo. A four-year IMA, Major Vasilo augmentees as asssitant chief of nursing services at the USAF Hospital Reese and works as a registered nurse at a Lubbock hospital. "Being on an on-call schedule at a civilian hospital, I often don't know my work schedule until a week or two in advance," said Major Vasilo. "Sometimes the staff will also call me up the day before and ask me to work - but if I'm already scheduled to serve as an IMA, I have to turn down the request."

☐ Be prepared to challenge IMAs when they come to work. IMAs provide their supervisors with another set of hands, so superviors should reasonably fill the IMA's schedule and expect results.

MSgt. Daniel Villegas, a Lubbock Law Enforcement Agency patrolman, spends his reserve time as assistant to the Reese Law Enforcement superintendent.

"While on reserve status, I work with SMSgt. Derrald Johnson, law enforcement superintendent," said Sergeant Villegas, a 25-year IMA. "I assist with overseeing all operations, but in events like the recent mobilization exercise, I also act as a patrolman or work the 'LE Desk'. "If Sergeant Johnson should mobilize, I'd take

his place."

☐ Continually prepare IMAs for military duty. Write notes, call or send material - keep them up-to-date. "Showing initiative is a quality supervisors look for at report card time. An IMA could be recalled to active duty right now and needed to step into a unit as a supervisor. Without knowing ahead of time what's going on, this could become a very trying tour for the augmentee while on station, and for the active-duty member upon his/ her return," Mr. Orr pointed out.

"My active-duty supervisor will occasionally plan to take leave or will be away on a temporary-duty assignment during my reserve time. "Consequently, it heightens the professional challenge,"

added Major Vasilo.

"IMAs are important assets to the armed forces. As the active-duty force continues to dwindle, it only makes sense to make use of every available hand to accomplish the mission," concluded Mr.

# **Light years** Ahead

# Reese Readiness Division on the cutting edge

Light years ahead. That's the state of Reese Readiness Division's computer technology and exercise planning.

There are two areas in the division that computer support is heavily felt. Feeling the shortfall of manning in wing augmentee. disaster preparedness and shelter teams, the readiness division must rely on advanced computer technology to maintain the standards that wing members normally would be responsible

Additionally, the staff's computer expertise enables them to keep the wing commander upto-date on both world-wide and local news at all times.

"With the advancement of computers and the diminishing "blue-suit" community at Reese, within the next three to five years Reese will have to convert readiness into strictly a training division for base personnel," said Maj. Russell Jenney, readiness division chief. "By further developing the concept of readiness into a liaison between the base and the surrounding areas, Reese can continue to look towards the outside for support and vice versa — in the event of an emergency situation." Support will no longer stop at Lubbock, Wolfforth and Levelland, but can

extend to communities further away, such as Ropesville and Shallowater, said Major Jenney.

"By ensuring that local civilian agencies know Reese's capabilities and Reese knows theirs, disaster assistance can become a combined effort, which would result in better efficiency and less cost to all parties involved," the chief added.

The readiness division no

longer operates on a "we versus them" attitude (we being readiness and them being the other organizations on base), asserted the major. The division has designed an annual training calendar focusing on situations unique to a specific time of year. "Specific training exercises are scheduled during the times anticipated for those emergency situations," he added. "These exercises include natural disasters such as tornados or strong winds from March through June, or robbery or hostage situations during April (this reflects the end of income tax time, when those who owe must pay up - occasionally a person will take extreme actions, such as robbery, to ease the burden of paying, the major pointed out). No-fault exercise training is conducted twice monthly and there's a weeklong readiness exercise held quarterly. "Members who feel they need further or updated training do not need to wait until their squadron schedules them — they can attend any of the planned

training sessions on their own," said Bill Orr, readiness division deputy chief.

The division publishes 78 calendars a year for base distribution. On the 15th of each month, the readiness staff updates the calendar with specifics of who will do what (and where and when) and highlights any changes that are reflected over the next two months. "This way, everyone knows when to

be prepared

and for what," said the major. Also included in the calendar is a wing-wide master contingency training program. "This program also designates weeks specifically scheduled for training and a day for readiness awareness," added Mr. Orr. Staff members have developed locally directed contingency training films and incorporated them with Air Force generated films to make it possible for the wing commander to view and compare si-

Reese's readiness division, in conjunction with Air Training Command, is devising a new training plan known as "CONEX" (contingency employment exercise). The CONEX plan

places mobility augmentees in real-to-life training exercises that will focus on chemical mask donning, task qualification training and self/buddy care, stated Mr. Orr.

The number of field training exercises will also increase and expand to allow for more in-depth training of war skills, such as damage-assessment reporting and damage repair, warfare, field survival skills and rapid runway repair. "The concept of CONEX

> is to make it an integrated exercise held annually

at Reese that will entail the deployment of wing members to a designated area for 24 hours or more.

The sole purpose of this plan is to test and better enhance members' skills." Mr. Orr said.

"Although these programs are designed to revolve around exercises, the readiness staff want to ensure wing members are trained well in the event of a real-world situation," added Major Jenney.

"The future of the Reese Readiness Division is to keep the wing on top of today's matters. Through inspector general reports and the interaction with other installations, Reese is already far ahead in the effort to stay ready," Mr. Orr concluded.






