TODAY 33rd, 52nd FTSs join wing units

The 33rd and 52nd Flying Training Squadrons will become part of the 64th Flying Training Wing during ceremonies at 10:30 a.m. today in the Simler Theater.

The activation is a precursor to the start of specialized undergraduate pilot training at Reese, according to Operations officials.

"Of course, SUPT won't get underway until we receive the new trainer (the T-1 Jayhawk)," said Col. Jerry Deakin, deputy commander for Operations. "Meanwhile, students will do T-37 training in the 33rd and 35th, and fly T-38s in the 52nd and 54th."

The colonel added that SUPT will start in April 1992 with Class 93-07. Once implemented, students selected to fly tankers and transports will go through the 35th and 52nd FTSs; fighter/bomber selectees will be trained in the 33rd and 54th FTSs.

The 52nd FTS will fly the T-1.

Col. John Block, assistant deputy commander for Operations, noted that the fivesquadron concept will enhance training even before SUPT takes hold at Reese.

"The amount of daylight available for flying is greater now that the longer summer days are upon us," he said. "Add that to nighttime flying, and you have almost a 24hour flying day. However, under the fivesquadron concept, flying times can be staggered so that some units will fly the morning hours and others will fly in the afternoons. "This will give instructor pilots and other operations people more reasonable duty days," he added.

Another benefit of the move is increased span of control for commanders.

"Current 35th and 54th FTSs members will form the new units, leaving four squadrons with about half the number of instructor pilots of today's flightline squadrons," Colonel Block said prior to the activations. "This will make it easier for squadron and training officers to supervise their people.

"Also, students will now report to a single commander, who will be with them on the flightline. This differs from the old system, where all the students fell under a large administrative unit," he added. "This will ensure that commanders and their people have direct access to one another."

The 33rd FTS will be commanded by Lt. Col. Billy Hill, while the 52nd FTS will be commanded by Lt. Col. Stanley Osborne.

Commander's perspective

Today marks another milestone in our wing's history as we activate two new flying squadrons here at Reese. This is the first step of many that will eventually lead to the implementation of Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training, or SUPT.



The "five-squadron

concept" will enable a natural separation into two distinct pilot training tracks, which is the idea behind SUPT. Additionally, the concept gives the flying squadron commanders complete control over all the people and resources required to accomplish their unique portion of the mission. This is accomplished by placing the student pilots directly under the flying squadrons where they're being trained.

Previously, our student pilots were assigned to the 64th Student Squadron, which converted into the 41st Flying Training Squadron in January. This meant that two commanders were always involved with each student, one responsible for training and one having student command responsibilities. A primary benefit foreseen for our new organization is a tighter span of control and less complicated chain of command within the flying squadrons.

Now the 41st FTS, with the activation of the new squadrons today, relinquishes all student pilot command responsibilities and becomes the fifth flying squadron. It has already assumed the Accelerated Copilot Enrichment and Pre-instructor Qualification programs as its flying mission. It also retains responsibility for academic instruction, international programs and all the enlisted members in the **Operations** Complex.

It is always a significant event when a wing forms new operational squadrons. The 33rd FTS (T-37s) and the 52nd FTS (T-38s) inherit a bountiful tradition built on a proud history. Both served as bombardment squadrons during World War II.

The 33rd FTS also saw service in the Korean Conflict before reverting to inactive status.

The 52nd FTS has previously seen service in Air Training Command from July 1972 through September 1977, when it was the T-38 flying training squadron at Craig AFB, Ala.

The 33rd FTS is to be commanded by Lt. Col. Billy Hill, former operations officer of the 35th FTS. His OPS officer will be Maj. Roger Cude.

The 52nd FTS commander is Lt. Col. Stan

formed superbly. They ensured everyone received proper entitlement counseling and timely moves. The quality control section of TMO ensures you receive a high-quality move from the commercial carrier industry through thorough inspections. In fact, during the maintenance conversion, they exceeded the 50 percent inspection standard by more than 25 percent.

The passenger section, in cooperation with the Scheduled Airline Ticket Office, ensures you receive timely airline reservations and tickets at the lowest cost to the government.

It was a pleasure for me to preside at the ribbon-cutting ceremony last month for SATO. They are now conveniently located in Bldg. 920, first floor.

Not as noticeable, but definitely as important, are the folks in Packing and Crating and the Freight Warehouse. Packing and Crating prepared over 13,000 items for shipment last year - many of those required the construction of specialized crates.


Housing inspections set

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

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

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
