# PC III ready at Reese

The second base in Air Training Command to implement Personnel Concept III, Reese began connecting Monday.

PC III, a personnel computer system designed to interlink personnel data system support into units, will improve personnelservice to all wing members. "Virtually all information a commander needs on military or civilian personnel will be available when he or she needs it," said SSgt. Scott Stephenson, PC III project noncommissioned officer.

Security access codes will be used to identify individuals based on their status, such as unit commander, branch supervisor and so forth, and determine what the person has access to — therefore preventing unauthorized access of personnel records. "The availablity of equipment within the unit and the unit commander will determine who can access PC III through their orderly room and who will have to access it through CBPO or the consolidated civilian personnel

Reese recently received six mini-computers units, 62 terminals and 60 printers, costing about \$500,000. The overall Air Force system includes a network of more than 20,000 terminals and 14,000 printers and has a life-cycle cost of \$555 million. However, PC III is expected to produce more than \$1 billion in manpower savings and productivity gains throughout the system's life span.

Manpower studies have verified that PC III will save more than 1,500 active-duty slots in the consolidated base personnel office, according to Air Force Military Personnel Center representatives. Man-hours will also be saved with the system. "For instance, at Reese it is estimated that each member will save approximately seven and one-half hours per year that would normally be spent visiting CBPO," said Sergeant Stephenson. Additionally, the automated forms will help reduce paper use and eliminate duplication of effort.

Following installation, system

office," said Mary Jane Fitzpatrick, representatives from Reese and ATC will kick off initial basewide training. Six wing members will be trained in-depth to act as system points of contact for the units until each area of operation is fully trained. During the initial training period, briefings covering the purpose and capabilities of PC III will also be provided to all Reese members in the Simler Theater (times to be announced).

> Some of the areas that PC III will assist military members include: filling out Air Force Form 392, "Assignment Preference Sheets"; sending messages to other on- and off-base units; preparing temporary-duty-assignment orders; and updating personnel records.

"Civilian personnel actions will range from registering in the central skills bank by individuals; to supervisors being able to submit Standard Forms 52, "Request for Personnel Action. All of which could only be done through CCPO," said Mrs. Fitzpatrick.

Under the old system, a member would go to CBPO to file their locator card and once a month cus-

listed grades, more first-term re-enlistment restrictions, reduced enlisted and officer accessions, and the scheduling of another Selective Early Retirement Board for certain colonels and lieutenant colonels have been announced by Air Force officials.

Meeting the budget realities of the 1990s while minimizing actions adversely impacting Air Force people prompted the Air Force to make such substantial changes in its policy governing the manpower strength of its enlisted and officer forces.

Close to 5.500 NCOs could retire early over the next two fiscal years under a plan lowering the high year of tenure for technical, master and senior master sergeants.

The Air Force will also be limiting the time E-4s can stay in the service to 10 years.

Staff sergeants will still be allowed to complete 20 years of service and retire since that grade was not affected by the changes.

The following breakdown shows the numbers of people affected by the changes over the next two fiscal years:

Fiscal 1991 Fiscal 1992 E-6 800 - 1,000 1,400 - 1,900 E-7 500 - 700 1,000 - 1,200 200 - 300 300 - 500

The initial phase is scheduled to begin Feb. 1, 1991, with the E-8 tenure being lowered from 28 years to 27, E-7 from 26 to 25, and E-6 from 23 to 22.


Except for E-6s who will have an interim phase on May 1, 1991 (to lower their tenure from 22 to 21 years), the final phase to step •down tenure for E-6s, E-7s, and E-8s, to 20, 24 and 26 years, respectively, begins Oct. 1,

- Reese NCOs currently within the new tenured years will be notified by the Reese Military Personnel Office later this month. Those affected by the changes will still be afforded the opportunity to serve a full career to 20 years and beyond depending on their

The change for the E-4 high year of tenure is scheduled to begin Aug. 1, 1991, and people affected will also be notified later this month, said Capt. Roscoe Kahumoku, chief of the Reese Military Personnel Office.

While some people may feel they are being slighted by the Air Force in that they are not allowed to serve out their full enlistment, Air Force Chief of Staff Larry D. Welch said career people are in fact being taken to retirement.

"What we contracted for is (to allow)



career people who perform to serve a full career. The definition of a full career is in the eye of the beholder, but the fact is that we have no plans that wouldn't take our people who progress to at least E-5 to retirement," he

General Welch added that while the reduced accessions from the current 54,000 to slightly more than 36,000 will trim the force on the lower end of the enlisted scale, reduced high year of tenure will prevent promotion and job opportunity stagnation in the upper

Another manpower cutting option planned will place more restrictions on the number of people allowed to stay in the Air Force after their initial enlistment. In the past, the Air Force was able to grant virtually all requests for first-term re-enlistments for those people considered eligible by their commanders.

Under the new program, first-termers will still be considered under the Selective Reenlistment Program with the recommenda-

# Commander's perspective

Everyone here at Reese knows the primary mission of the 64th Flying Training Wing—training Air Force pilots. Many of you may not realize we also dedicate significant resources to a secondary flying mission, supporting three Accelerated Copilot Enrichment detachments, better known as "ACE dets," up in Strategic Air Command's



"Northern Tier." Earlier this week, I dropped in on our T-38 detachments at Ellsworth AFB, S.D., and Minot and Grand Forks AFBs, N.D., for one of my periodic visits. Accompanying me was Lt. Col. John DiPiero, 41st Flying Training Squadron commander, under whose command the detachments fall.

The purpose of the ACE program is to provide additional flying and decision-making experience for SAC's bomber and tanker copilots as they build hours for upgrade to aircraft commander. ACE provides a relatively inexpensive method to "season" a young pilot and provide experience he or she would not receive in the right seat of a SAC "heavy." The program is run by ATC instructor pilots using T-38 and T-37 aircraft. Reese provides the IPs, aircraft and maintenance support for our three dets, which are all T-38 outfits. You can recognize those IPs assigned to ACE when they visit Reese by the distinctive "Talons over the North" patch on their flight suits.

Each of our dets consists of a major or captain detachment commander, two or three additional IPs and six to eight Lockheed maintenance personnel. Our ACE people must be extremely professional performers who are able to function independently, because they conduct a busy flying training program far removed from the rest of the wing under some challenging flying conditions. Winter on the northern tier makes for a pretty interesting flying and working environment for our IPs and maintainers—and lots of difficult decisions for everyone involved.

As always during my visits, I was impressed with the poise and confidence of our det commanders, Maj. Mike Modelle at Ellsworth, Capt. Wade Wheeler at Minot and Capt. Mark Killian at Grand Forks. They are well supported by some pretty special IPs, all of whom were handpicked to represent our wing at these three SAC bases. They are all real pros.

Like the wing as a whole, our ACE dets have made the transition to contract maintenance by Lockheed. This is a real challenge up north where maintenance must function with limited resources, faraway logistical support and under trying winter weather conditions. Our Lockheed personnel are motivated to provide quality support and are striving to maintain the high standards required to maintain the 3-4 jets at each det in topnotch condition.

No column about ACE could be complete without mentioning our "CINC-ACE," Maj. Bill Rice, the 41st FTS ACE branch chief. He runs the best ACE program in the command with steady, firm leadership. Also, thanks should go to the flight examiners in the Standardization/ Evaluation Section, our flight safety officers, and the Functional Check Flight Section pilots who make their frequent trips north to ensure we're giving proper support to this important mission. My compliments to everyone involved in our ACE program. It's a real credit to the 64th FTW

# New units

### 33rd, 52nd FTS commanders discuss histories

Editor's note: Among the scarves and patches on Reese, those of the 33rd and 52nd Flying Training Squadrons are now evident. The commanders of these new units took time recently to talk about their squadrons' histories.

As the commander of the 33rd Flying Training Squadron, I'm especially proud to be a part of such an historical event as the reactivation of a flying squadron.

It's been just over 27 years since the last "Dragon" commander, Lt. Col. Gayle Miller, retired the then-designated 33rd Bombardment Squadron - Medium. The patch worn then —the Dragon — is proudly being worn again by the instructor pilots in the 33rd here at Reese.

The Dragon—typically a fierce and aggressive creature—is an appropriate symbol for this historically combative squadron. During World War II and the Korean conflict, flying primarily the B-24, B-25 and the B-47, the 33rd amassed 16 campaign streamers and four decorations. Against this backdrop of success, the new 33rd "takes to the air" to continue this tradition of excellence.

As with any successful unit, the most important resource is its people. Three flights of instructor pilots — "Aggressors, Bulls, and Crusaders," formerly in the 35th FTS — and three classes of students reassigned from the 41st FTS, comprise what is now the 33rd FTS.

This reorganization is typical of what's happening at all five undergraduate pilot training wings in Air Training Command and serves us very well in reducing span of control for squadron commanders while allowing more direct supervision of students being trained by the squadron.

Future changes in the way the Air Force trains pilots — namely the transition to specialized undergraduate pilot training — will clearly impact the 33rd.

No longer will we train pilots under a "generalized" concept. The 33rd will be the first squadron in ATC to train students in the fighter/bomber track of SUPT.

However, no matter what the task, the 33rd is happy to be flying again and contributing to the mission of the 64th FTW and the Air Force.

I consider it a privilege and honor to command the 52nd Flying Training Squadron, which is Reese's new T-38 squadron.

The alligator on our patch is carried over from the prestigious history of the 52nd, which was activated as a bombard-ment squadron prior to World War II. The early part of the war saw the 52nd flying B-17s for anti-submarine patrol from MacDill Field, Fla., and it was there that the original squadron emblem was designed. That's why we have brought an alligator to West Texas.

The squadron served as an operational and replacement training unit in various aircraft and locations during the war, finishing with the B-29 at Guam. From there, the 52nd conducted numerous strategic and incendiary bombing raids against Japan.

Although deactivated shortly after the war, the 52nd was reactivated as a T-38 squadron in Air Training Command for five years (1972 - 1977) at Craig AFB, Ala. During that time, the squadron received two Air Force Outstanding Unit Awards. It is this proud tradition of excellence that we new members, in the 52nd FTS of the 90s at Reese, seek to continue.

Our "new look" under the five-squadron reorganization plan in ATC means we have only four flights of T-38 instructors. The "Apollos, Buzzards, Cobras, and Dragons" made the switch from the 54th FTS. Although the scope of the flying operation has been reduced for each squadron, the total responsibility for student management comes to the flying squadron flights and their commanders. Our student pilots belong to the flying squadron that trains them, and they are important members of the team.

In the future, some exciting challenges await the 52nd. Ours will be the first squadron in ATC to train students in the tanker/transport track of specialized undergraduate pilot training, flying the T-1 Jayhawk. The Jayhawk will be another new look for the 52nd and for Reese in 1992.

For now, the 52nd is proud to join the rest of the outstanding units of the 64th Flying Training Wing team in our critical task—that of producing the world's best military pilots.



"In so many accidents, the culprit isn't bad luck, an unforeseen event or an 'act of God' - it's the individual's attitude," said Paul Compton, Ground Safety manager. "There are virtually no mishaps where a lack of safety awareness doesn't play at least a small

Safety officials said that this is a critical time of year. Known as the "101 Critical Days of Summer," this period gets underway today with the onset of the Memorial Day weekend and continues through Labor Day. Again, the key to going through this period safely is awareness.

"People have to take the time to think safety," said Safety's TSgt. Charles Wagner. "Whether it's planning

a family vacation or just preparing a barbecue, people need to make a concious effort to foresee possible hazards."

Safety officials offered the following for wing members to keep in mind:

☐ Drinking and boating is no safer than drinking and driving. Anyone operating power equipment should refrain from alcohol.

People planning to drive long distances should be careful against overextending themselves. Never drive more than eight hours a day, and be sure to get plenty of sleep before driving a full day. Remeber to take a break about every hour. Stop the car, get out and, if nothing else, walk around.

☐ When barbecuing, use only materials meant for this

purpose. Gasoline, kerosene and the like may seem "close enough," but they're not.

☐ Like boating, swimming and drink-

ing can be a lethal combination.

☐ Whether on or off base, always observe the rules at recreational facilities like pools, beaches, parks and so on. They may seem inconvenient at times, but they could save you a lot of grief in the long run.

"Of course, two rules that apply during any season are avoid drinking and driving and wear seatbelts," said Sergeant Wagner.

"One thing that I sometimes hear from people is that they're tired of hearing about accidents and safety statistics," Mr. Compton said. "Sad as it may be, some people won't care about those sort of things until something happens to them or someone they care for.



## and children can be a fatal attraction

Modern man lives and works daily in a heat-oriented society. We depend upon heat in all facets of our daily lives.

Hard to believe? Then try doing without heat-producing items for one day. We normally associate heat-producing items with ones that make a lot of heat. Furnaces, stoves, and water heaters are our first thought. But most of our daily-use appliances are, or can, heat producers. Light bulbs, hair dryers, toys, vacuum cleaners, electric toothbrushes, television sets, automobiles and air conditioners are just a small example of heat producers.

As a controlled item, heat is one of the greatest of all tools. But let the heat become the master and tragedy results.

Fire doesn't know, nor does it care, who or what it devours. The lives of over 12,000 people of all ages are claimed each year in the United States.

Fire doesn't always kill though — it maims well over 300,000 persons each year. The tragedy and scars remain with them for the rest of their lives.

Most of these victims are innocents. Who are these innocents that bear the brunt of the fire's wrath? They are, unfortunately, children.

They are also one of fire's unwitting helpers. Children are at the top of the list in this category. Very few children understand the hazards or consequences of fires.

During 1981 through 1986, over 6 percent of all fires were set by children. That adds up to about 460,000 fires.

Can children be blamed for these actions? Is there anything adults can do to prevent these types of fires? These are questions that every parent should consider.

All children are fascinated by fire, and given the chance, they may very well start fires. There are some steps, however, that you as a parent can take to instruct your children in the proper use of fire.

When children are below the accepted age of reasoning (7 or 8), each family should have a "strike zone." A strike zone is from the shoulder down to the floor. This is normally the area children in this age group are capable of getting into.

Above the age of seven or eight, parents should, in steps, teach children exactly what fire is and what could happen if the child experiments on their own. Older children can be very helpful to parents in this area if they know what to look for and have been properly educated.

# Virus

## COMM offers tips against computer villain

Computer viruses have received a lot of media attention in the past few years. National television, newspapers and other publications have detailed the vulnerabilities of computer systems to attacks. Recently, Reese suffered its first known ailment involving a computer system.

A program, downloaded from an electronic bulletin board, "infected" a stand-alone computer Ironically, the program was a virus scanner, supposedly designed to alert the user of any possible virus in their system. The virus hit the system with no warning; it was evidently so well developed that it went undetected through the system of

checks and balances in this particular virus scanner program.

All users of computer systems must be aware of the dangers of electronic bulletin boards. Air Force Regulation 205-16, "Computer Security Policy," states, in part, "Personnel must not use public domain software or software obtained from bulletin boards unless tested and certified by a competent authority and explicitly approved by designated approval authority."

Some basic precautions to help prevent your system from being crippled by a virus are:

Make routine and frequent back-ups of critical hard disk/cartridge data files.

Ensure original program disks are not used for

processing and are available, if needed, for reloading.

Do not use or load public domain or shareware



tomer service would update that information into the system and it would appear on the personnel alpha roster. Depending on when everything is accomplished, it could take up to a month before a person's address was correctly reflected on base rosters, pointed out Sergeant Stephenson.

With PC III, all wing members can go to their orderly room, signon and update the necessary information. "Although the rosters will continue to be produced monthly, a commander or other authorized member can access the system for the updated information at any time," added the sergeant.

"These are just a few of PC III's capabilities — the system offers multiple use in word processing (such as preparing officer evaluation reports, enlisted performance reports of civilian evaluations) spread sheets and data-base management. Once members are rained, the list could be endless," concluded Sergeant Stephenson.

## Data automation working under contract

The 1958th Communications Squadron Operations Branch, including the Data Automation Center has recently gone contract with Data Monitor Systems.

The Base Communications Center, switchboard operations and frequency management center had previously gone contract, and following the transition of the Customer Service Center June 1, all communications systems will be contracted, said Capt. Gerry Brown, COMM commander.

"This transition to contract was a result of the A-76 study, which began in 1988 to consolidate base communications center and data operations," the commander added. When the contractor was decided, COMM's quality assurance evaluators, Pat Pennington and Ron Randall, met frequently with the DMS contractors to discuss the areas of concern and ensure that the contractor would be able to provide the services Reese was

"As a result of these discussions, a good working relationship was also established between COMM and DMS," said Captain Brown. "So far, the transition has been a smooth one, and other than the different faces, the overall operations and support has not changed."


One of the four bases in Air Training Command to contract these areas, Reese is the third to transition — preceded by Vance AFB, Okla. and Columbus AFB, Miss. Laughlin AFB, Texas, (the

fourth base) has remained in-house, with civil service providing communications operations. As a military-ran unit, all of communications operations was performed by 30-35 members. Under the contractor, support will be provided by about 18 people. "Many of them are military or civilians who are familiar with Reese or military communications operations," said Captain Brown. "In addition, DMS's project manager Bill Barr recently retired as Reese's processing center

manager Tyree Marshall served as the data operations chief during the same time frame."

In addition to the transition, a \$200,000 construction project has begun that will combine all communications operations in the data automation center. "This will enable communications personnel to be multi-trained - instead of one person working incoming messages and another working data, the same person will be knowledgeable and suitably located to perform both," added the commander.



# Ferrand

COMM first sergeant closes out career

Twenty-three years of service commitment ended for the 1958th Communications Squadron first sergeant in a retirement ceremony May 18 in the Reese Enlisted Open Mess.

MSgt. Manny Ferrand has been the squadron's first sergeant since his arrival to Reese in November 1987. "During this time he has been the main "go-getter" behind the squadron's fund raisers and morale-booster programs," said Capt. Jerry Brown, COMM commander.

For two consecutive years, COMM has taken first place in the annual Sweetheart Ball fund-raiser, and raised more than \$1,200 this year alone. "I'm commonly known as ruthless when it comes to raising money for the squadron," said Sergeant Ferrand, recalling an incident where he had convinced another squadron to sell candy bars that were in turn being used for

COMM's sweetheart fund.

He explained another fund-raising tactic, this one involving car washes. "As people would pull into the Reese Commissary parking lot to do their shopping, I was normally there directing them into parking spots. When they got out of their cars, I would explain that we were having a fund-raiser and asked if they would like their cars washed. I then went on to explain that we would wash their car and have it waiting in the same spot for them when they came out of the commissary.

"Curb-to-curb service is what we called it, and it normally worked," he added.

Of course, the job of a first sergeant involves more than just fund raisers. Sergeant Ferrand was also responsible for advising and assisting the squadron commander with the functioning of COMM. He was involved in all people-oriented ac-

tivities, such as scheduling members for professional military education, preparing award packages, disciplining troops when necessary, upholding appearance standards and maintaining the dorms.

"Being a first sergeant is a tough job. You deal with people issues, ranging from good things such as giving an award to the not-so-good like dealing with LORs (letters of reprimand) and UIFs (unfavorable information files). I'm also often approached by the troops about personal problems at home as well as on the job," pointed out Sergeant Ferrand.

"They past few years have been very good years in the squadron—we led the base in fund-raisers for two years; last year, 25 members were submitted for awards beyond base-level and 13 of them were approved; and the squadron was able to get together and have fun through activities such as Christ-

tions of their commander. They will also still have to apply for a career job reservation to re-enlist in their current skill as was done in the

What will change is the number of CJRs and retraining applications that can be approved with the new, reduced force. Each skill will have a target, meaning a limit on the number of first-term re-enlistments that can be accepted.

Consistent with changing missions throughout the Air Force, some skills requirements will decrease while others may increase. As a result, significant levels of retraining will be necessary at the first-term re-enlistment point and among more senior people as well.

CJR in their skill may apply for retraining into another field where there are openings. The selective re-enlistment bonus program will also be modified to reflect these changes.

General Welch said there are no restrictions planned for career reenlistments, meaning that once an individual makes his or her firstterm re-enlistment, they are considered career airmen, assuming they want to continue with an Air Force career and progress to E-5 by the time they reach 10 years in the Air

The Air Force will also be offering early, voluntary separations to younger officers in much the same way as they are offered to first-term

While no reductions in force for officers are planned, the Air Force is convening another Selective Early Retirement Board for certain colonels and lieutenant colonels in Individuals unable to secure a December, officials said. Although previous plans did not include a SERB, officials said changes in the budget forecast made it necessary to balance senior officer manning.

> As of the SERB convening date. lieutenant colonels with two or

more non-selections to colonel, and colonels with four or more years time in grade are eligible for selective early retirement.

The secretary of the Air Force may approve early retirement for up to 30 percent of eligible officers. Based upon current figures in those grades, there will be approximately 800 to 1,000 lieutenant colonels and 1,300 to 1,500 colonels eligible for consideration by the next board.

Those selected would be notified by February 1991 and retirements would take place no later than seven months after approval by the secretary.

The last SERB was conducted in fiscal 1989. Officers who were eligible and not selected at that board are not eligible for consideration during the December board, officials said.





> "MSS was a real challenge and we had a good time playing them,"said Knehans after the championship win. "MSS beat us the first time, now was our chance to even the score."




