The 64th Flying Training wing will end one era and begin another as Col. Bill Henny takes command during a ceremony at 2:30 p.m. today in Hangar 82.

Colonel Henny will replace Col. Monroe S. Sams Jr., who will go to the Pentagon and assume duties with the Air Staff as deputy director of personnel programs.

The ceremony will be presided over by Lt. Gen. (Gen. selectee) Robert Oaks, commander of Air Training Command. General Oaks has been selected as the new Commander in Chief, U.S. Air Forces in Europe.

Reflecting on the change of command, Colonel Henny said he is looking forward to what's ahead.

"I'm excited about continuing to work with the top-notch people here at Reese," he said. "During my tenure as base commander, I've been fortunate enough to work with some extremely enthusiastic, hard-charging, capable people — they've made my job much easier, and I have no doubt that this won't change in the future."

Colonel Sams leaves Reese after 18 months as wing commander. During his tenure the wing successfully completed the first combined Operational Readiness Inspection/Unit Effectiveness Inspection of an ATC flying wing, took second place in the command's Torchlight competition, transitioned from "blue suit" aircraft maintenance to civilian contractor and earned the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award. The award will be presented by General Oaks during Command at Peterson AFB, Colo. today's ceremony.





Fireworks Fourth of July fun can turn to 'fiery' fate

Fireworks are a beautiful sight to behold, but they can create pain and disaster. The use of fireworks on Reese and in Reese Village and within Lubbock is prohibited. Now I suppose to some people that sounds unreasonable. There are two primary reasons why the use of fireworks on Reese and in the housing area are prohibited.

First, a severe fire hazard potential is created due to the dry weeds, grass and bushes surrounding the base. The second reason is the potential for injury to fingers, hands and eyes; loss of hearing; severe burns; and even death!

You may be saying, "Give me a break. I am a responsible person and I know how to be safe."

That's super, but there are many adults and children who will suffer pain and destruction of property caused by improper use and handling of fireworks.

Stop to think back. Did you ever use fireworks of any type without proper supervision or perhaps seriously injure yourself or someone else?

During my life, I can remember several incidents in which fireworks caused injury. At the age of 9, I saw two older cousins accidentally burn down their barn using finger firecrackers.

At 12, I tried to outsmart some leftover firecrackers. Since I had no matches, I used the stove burner to light the fuses. To my great surprise, I forgot that the back door was locked. By the time I reached the back porch, the firecracker had exploded in my right hand.

At first I thought my hand was gone. Instantly, my hand was tingling and my thumb hurt tremendously from second degree burns.

I was extremely lucky! At the same age, I witnessed my next door neighbor get third degree burns on his stomach and chest when his brother accidentally ignited several sparklers that he had tucked into his pants. He didn't know to "stop, drop and roll." Five years later, when I last saw him, he still had serious scars.

Fireworks can be like life - very unpredictable. If you do use fireworks in an area that does not prohibit them, be sure to follow specific safety rules, and use common sense! Fireworks are explosives!

I like to see fireworks displays, but I don't like to see injuries or fires caused by fireworks. Believe me, it can happen to any of us. The fire department wants everyone to have a "no-fire" day on the Fourth of July.

To all Reese people, have a happy Fourth of July and remember that the use of fireworks on Reese and in Reese Village is prohibited.

Drug abusers come in all forms

Drug abuse has many faces. Most of us, when we hear the term "drug abuser," visualize an emaciated, glassy-eyed derelict with hypodermic needle in one hand and a vial of crack cocaine in the other. However, there are some drug abusers and addicts among us who don't meet such common stereotypes.

In fact, some drug abusers look healthy - very healthy, much like Arnold Schwarzenegger or Walter Payton. These drug abusers work out daily, sometimes many times a day, to achieve superior muscle size, strength and definition and would never consider taking a mind-altering drug. And yet these drug abusers continue to risk their physical health and well-being by taking anabolic steroids.

conduct or moral or professional dereliction.

As the scientific and medical evidence of the dangers of steroid abuse continue to increase, many state legislatures have added steroids to their lists of controlled substances. The 71st Texas Legislature added human growth hormone and certain anabolic steroids to the Texas Controlled Substance Act.

As a result of this legislation, the intentional, knowing and unlawful possession of human growth hormone or any of the prohibited anabolic steroids is now a crime in Texas that is punishable by confinement in the county jail for up to 180 days and a fine not to exceed \$1,000.00 (for possession of 200 grams or less); or confinement in prison for not less than five years nor more than 99 years or life and a fine not to exceed \$50,000.00 (for possession of 200 grams or more). Using Article 134 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice and the Federal Assimilated Crimes Act, the Air Force can now adopt Texas law and court-martial or impose nonjudicial punishment on an Air Force member who intentionally or knowingly uses or possesses human growth hormone or any anabolic steroid. To help assist in the detection of steroid abuse, the Air Force has recently started a test urinalysis program which is expected to be introduced to the entire Air Force in the near future.

There are currently a number of scientific and medical studies indicating that steroid abuse can cause severe detrimental effects on an individual's health, including liver damage, heart disease and even death.

This evidence is so convincing that the Air Force now lists steroids as prohibited substances under Air Force Regulation 30-2 and steroid abuse is now a reason for discharge or separation under both AFR 39-10 and AFR 36-2.

Under paragraph 5-50.1 of AFR 39-10, an airman can be discharged for misconduct and issued a discharge under other than honorable conditions or a general discharge for the illegal, wrongful or improper use or possession of anabolic and androgenic steroids.

This fact was recently and forcefully brought to the attention of an enlisted member and local bodybuilder who was discharged from the Air Force with a general discharge for steroid abuse. Similar "steroid abuse" provisions exist under AFR 36-2 for the involuntary separation of officers for mis-

In 1988, Canadian sprinter Ben Johnson was stripped of an Olympic gold medal because of steroid abuse. No one thought of Ben Johnson as a drug abuser, but he was. All Air Force personnel should be aware that abusing steroids can now result in their discharge from the Air Force and their prosecution under both the UCMJ and Texas law.

In the final analysis, steroid abuse is not only dangerous to your health, but it may result in prosecution and jail time. And that's an even higher penalty than Ben Johnson had to pay.

Safeguards can prevent computer 'infection'

A computer virus can spread like a common cold. We can't prevent a cold; however, with some planning, we can prevent a computer virus from spreading.

The following list of precautionary steps can decrease

your chances of contracting a computer virus.

© Stress that Air Force Regulation 205-16, para. 8-7, specifies minimum requirements on software authorized for use in Air Force computers. Software that does not fall within these parameters is not authorized for use in Air Force computers.

□ Make backup copies of all software and backup files on

Write protect all boot diskettes and master diskettes.
 Do not connect to any bulletin board that does not have designated approval authority.

□ A number of commercial "vaccine" programs are available; however, caution must be used when installing these programs — the programs themselves must be tested to ensure they don't contain a virus.

Also listed below are common symptoms of a computer virus:

□ An unexplained increase in the number of files on your disk.

□ An unexplained decrease in the amount of random access memory, or RAM, space in your system.

□ An operating system status command appears which you did not invoke, such as "1 file(s) copied".

□ An increase in the size of an executable program, possibly so much that it will not run.

Any general system slowdown, such as the execution of a program, disk access time, load time and so on.

A disk drive access light is on when you are not reading or writing to the disk.

A hard drive fails to boot (start).

Here are guidelines to take when a virus is suspected or confirmed:

□ Immediately stop work on the system and notify the computer system security officer. Do not turn the machine off.

Document and report incidents through the responsible CSSO to the appropriate major command communicationscomputer systems security manager.

□ If connected to a network, immediately break the connection either physically or logically.





Dental plan improving

Several benefits will be added or improved when the 3year-old Active Duty Dependents Dental Plan's new contract starts Aug. 1.

The new \$140.1 million contract runs for one year, with four additional one-year options. The program will still be operated by Delta Dental Plan of California.

Under the contract, a new, fully paid benefit will be sealants on permanent molars for patients under age 14. These patients will also be covered for space maintainers needed because of premature loss of baby teeth.

New cost-shared benefits are prefabricated resin crowns for baby front teeth, and partial payment for some other crowns.

Joint commissary sales benefit

Military commissary commands have combined their buying power to get deep price cuts for their customers in two joint-service sales.

The Army Troop Support Agency and the Air Force Commissary Service have teamed up first for a month-long sale in July. The Reese Commissary will be taking part in the sale.

The sale, a first in the continental United States, will feature 19.3 percent to 53.6 percent savings on 149 items. These savings are in addition to the 26.4 percent savings already enjoyed by commissary shoppers over commercial supermarkets.

Items featured in the sale include detergents, toothpastes, cereals, canned vegetables, drinks, frozen pizzas, dog foods, candies, cookies and frozen dinners. Thirty-eight sale items offer even greater savings via coupons. The second sale, in January 1991, will be joint Army-Navy-Air Force.

"The January sale will be the first time all three services have participated in a stateside joint sale," said Jim Shelton, an AFCOMS merchandiser. "Items in almost every department will be on sale." (Air Force News Service)





They devote countless hours to the community, yet they receive no pay.

Many of them have vast experience in their fields, but that doesn't necessarily mean they're "employed."

They're volunteers — and Monday through Friday is their week at Reese.

The five-day period has been designated Reese Volunteer Recognition Week. It's purpose, according to the Reese Family Support Center director, is to repay base volunteers for the selflessness they exhibit daily.

"Volunteers play a vital role in any base community, but this is especially true at Reese," said Phil Thierry. "When we underwent the maintenance conversion, the base lost a lot of people filling key positions on Reese — volunteers have done a lot to take up that slack.

"Of course, Reese people volunteering on Reese is only one side of the story," he added. "There are many base people, both military and civilian, who give freely of their time in the Lubbock community with agencies like Big Brothers and Sisters, Meals on Wheels and the like."

Some of the week's activities will include a volunteer appreciation luncheon at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday in the Officers' Open Mess Jack Davis Room, and throughout the week various base facilities will offer discounts to base volunteers (see "The week at a glance," this page). In order to take advantage of these specials, volunteers need to contact family support today to get a letter entitling them to the discounts.

Currently, the "volunteer spirit" is evident at agencies throughout the base. However, there are four agencies which are run exclusively by volunteers — the Family Services Center, the Red Cross Office, the Thrift Shop and the Retiree Activities Office.

> According to Mr. Thierry, family support is working to provide a central point of contact for base volunteer efforts. The center's Volunteer Resource Program manager's position is currently unfilled, but should be occupied soon.

"What we're aiming for is

"All right," you say, "that's all well and fine. But why should *I* volunteer?"

"For one thing, people can gain experience in their chosen field while setting their own hours," said MSgt. Don Mennis of family support. "Although it may not involve any pay, many employers view volunteer experience they same way they view any other work experience.

"In addition, volunteering is a good way for people new to the area to get to know others," added Sergeant Mennis, who himself volunteers some of his free time to Meals on Wheels, which serves elderly and handicapped people in Lubbock. "Even if you've been on Reese for a while, it's still a good way to meet people while helping others."

Mr. Thierry pointed out that when people do volunteer, every effort is made to ensure they'll enjoy the experience.

"One of the keys to keeping volunteers is ensuring they're put in a position where they'll be happy," he said. "We try to match up people to jobs based on their abilities and desires — that way, they're not likely to 'burn out' after a short time.


