## Separation pay OKed, incentive pay proposed

Separation pay conditions for those involuntarily discharged have been approved, while an incentive pay program is being proposed for people who volunteer to leave the Air Force, according to Reese officials.

The criteria defining separation pay for those people involuntarily separated on or after Nov. 5 now includes a minimum of six years of active service or five years as a regular officer, an honorable or general discharge, and an agreement in writing to serve in the ready reserve for at least three years.

The type and characterization of a member's discharge determines the payment level — full, half or none — to which the person is entitled. The formula for full payment is 10 percent of 12 times final month basic pay, times years of service. Half payment is one half the full payment rate.

The new criteria also eliminates the \$30,000 payment cap and allows the appropriate formula to determine the payment amount, officials said.

The 1991 Defense Authorization Bill established separation pay for enlisted people and changed the criteria for officers who had previously received separation pay under a different set of guidelines.

The policy outlining the specific payment level criteria was announced by the Defense Department June 20, and specifies that people not meeting all of the new basic conditions are ineligible for any separation pay.

Local personnel offices have been responsible for paying people at their base separated after Aug. 1. Prior to that, the Air Force Military Personnel Center was liable for all matters involving separation pay. AFMPC is responsible for separation pay of those who left the Air Force between Nov. 5 and Aug. 1.

In a separate action, Defense Secretary Dick Cheney has proposed a voluntary separation incentive to assist the services in meeting its fiscal 1992-1995 end strength goals. The proposal

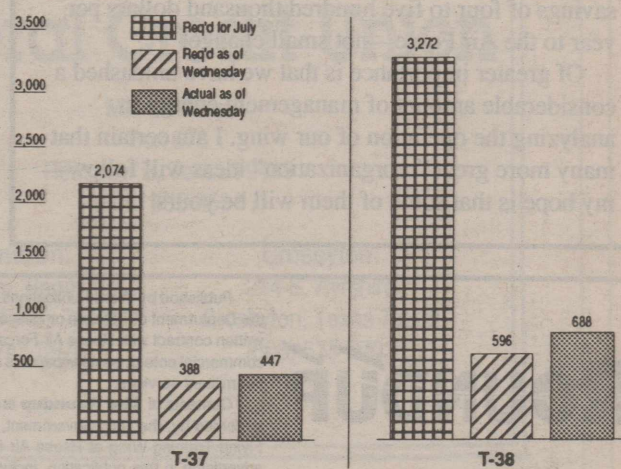

## LES to change in October

The Defense Finance and Accounting Center in Denver recently announced a future change in the monthly leave and earnings statement.

Under the newly revised form, Social Security and Medicare will be shown as separate deductions on the LES.

Eventually, the wording will be changed on the LES from the current "FICA" withholding to two separate entries — "Social Security" and "Medicare."

Social Security, since Jan. 1, 1966, consists of a deduction for old age survivors, disability insurance and hospital insurance for the aged.

The 1991 rates of collection are 6.2 percent for old age survivors and 1.45 percent for hospitalization for the aged (Medicare).

In the past, the amount of wages subject to Social Security and Medicare withholding were the same, and the combined 7.65 percent was withheld from the member's pay

and reported to the Social Security Administration as a single figure, seen on the LES as FICA, or the Federal Insurance Contributions Act.

A new Army/Air Force LES is scheduled to be used beginning in October, therefore the current LES will not be changed. The 1.45 percent Medicare deduction will be reflected as part of the total FICA deduction until the new LES is available. For more information, call the military pay office, 3360.

## From my perspective

**E**xciting — mentally stimulating. After spending three challenging days in a 'think tank' atmosphere with 30 of the wing's and the command's experts, this reorganization initiative is really moving. The group looked hard at the structure and composition of Air Training Command flying training wings to see what efficiencies could be gained — and to the team's credit, after some very intelligent debate, it appears that adjustments can be made.



As you probably recall, the wing's objective in the test is "to flatten and streamline our structure, improve accountability and responsibility, save manpower and place members in a group, squadron or flight where possible." An additional, more specific objective this week was to hammer out the groundwork for a unified command center to replace our current command post.

Tuesday morning we got together to review our guidance and to discuss procedures of a general nature. Then we immediately went to work as subgroups to tackle these areas with the following leaders from the wing:

Command post - Maj. Gary Tucker  
Contingency operations - Capt. Dale Moore  
Orderly room - Maj. Linda Cunningham  
Life support - Lt. Col. Frank Shealy  
Communications - Capt. Jim Williams  
Services/MWR - Capt. Steve Governale  
Logistics - Lt. Col. Claude Branscome

As a result of our work, we:

- Presented a solid initial plan to consolidate fire department, security police and the energy monitoring control system 24-hour response desks into the command post.
- Scaled down our plan for a contingency operations flight — left in it a growth capability.
- Found minor potential savings in our orderly rooms.
- Made no change to our life support arrangement.
- Devised a super plan for the merger of services and MWR.
- Found additional efficiencies in supply and recommended further supply-transportation integration.
- As the 64th Communications Squadron was directed to move into the 64th Operations Group on Aug. 1, we recommended that it be reconstituted with its air traffic function in a stand-alone unit.

All of this great work could not have been done without the superb preparation done by the Reese and ATC Manpower Teams — more specifically, our Capt. Rich Wooley and Ms. Nancy Gregorio.

There is no doubt in my mind that if all of these recommendations are approved by ATC, we will have a more efficient running wing. It is tough to estimate the personnel cost savings, but we have probably identified 15 or so additional positions. That may not sound like much, but those 15 positions represent a savings of four to five hundred thousand dollars per year to the Air Force — not small change!

Of greater importance is that we have unleashed a considerable amount of management energy in analyzing the operation of our wing. I am certain that many more great "reorganization" ideas will follow — my hope is that some of them will be yours!

# Co-dependency help available at Reese

**P**erhaps the most common problems that we see at the mental health clinic are related to co-dependency issues.

Co-dependency is a concept that emerged in the 1970s. Originally, the term co-dependency was limited to describing a person or persons whose lives were affected as a result of being in a relationship with a chemically dependent person. Presently, co-dependency is thought to affect many people who come from dysfunctional families as well as chemically dependent situations.

Some of the typical characteristics of a co-dependent are:

- Assuming responsibility for other's feelings and/or behavior.
- Having difficulty in identifying and expressing feelings — am I angry? lonely? sad? happy? joyful?
- Tending to fear and/or worry how others may respond to one's feelings.
- Having difficulty in forming and/or maintaining close relationships.
- Being afraid of being hurt and/or rejected by others.
- Being a perfectionist and placing too much emphasis on personal expectations.
- Having difficulty making decisions.
- Tending to minimize, alter or even deny the truth about personal feelings.
- Tending to put other people's wants and needs first.
- Valuing others' opinions more than personal ones.

Having difficulty in acknowledging one's own positive attributes.

Personal serenity is determined by how others are feeling and/or behaving.

Not knowing or believing that being vulnerable and asking for help is both ok and normal, as well as knowing that it is ok to talk about problems outside the family.

Being steadfastly loyal - even when the loyalty is unjustified and often even personally harmful.

Having to be "needed" in order to have a relationship with others.

It should be noted that one needn't have all the characteristics mentioned to have problems with co-dependency issues. Some of them are actually good traits to have so long as there is a balance. For example, everybody becomes depressed occasionally. However, if people are depressed for months, it may adversely affect the way they eat, sleep and cope with stress. Consequently, this would become a problem that would need to be addressed.

One encouraging aspect of co-dependency is that recovery is usually more attainable through outside interventions, such as individual and/or group therapy than it may be with other disorders.

The mental health clinic is staffed with full time mental health professionals trained in counseling individuals needing assistance. We can also refer military dependents to therapy off base as needed.

In addition, the clinic is interested in forming an ongoing co-dependency support group and would encourage all interested active duty members and their dependents as well as retirees to notify 1st Lt. Abby Luck, 3739.

## Are you getting your money's worth?

Planning on buying a new car soon?

If you are, proceed with extreme caution! You'll have some decisions to make that will determine how much that dream car is going to cost.

First, you'll have to decide what model and options you want. Be careful, you may have a selection to choose from for each option that may vary in price. You should make the choice based on your taste and price range.

Then you will decide on the method of financing. This is where a miscalculation could cost you a bundle!

When it comes to how much a car is going to cost, most people ask, "How much are the payments?" The salesperson knows this and will work wonders to get the monthly payments to where you think it's affordable. This is the reason that financing has now been stretched to as much as 72 months. What's really important though is the total price tag including interest.

Let's say you want to purchase a car for \$10,000. You ask the question, "How much a month is it going to cost

me?" After a little button pushing on his calculator, the salesperson says, "Only \$234 a month for 72 months."

Many times this is where the deal is sealed; but let's look at what those figures really mean.

First, how much is the interest rate? In the case above, it's 11.5 percent per year. The interest cost of this loan is \$6,900. That means you're actually paying \$16,900 for your new car.

It's also going to take you six years to pay this loan off!

What will this car be worth in six years?

Another option is to pay the loan off in a shorter period of time. Most finance companies will lower the interest rate for quicker payoffs. That same car paid off in 60 months at 10.5 percent would cost you \$15,250. A finance charge of \$5,250. That's a savings of \$1,650! Is it worth saving \$20 a month on payments, or paying an extra \$1,650 for your car?

Be smart when you go car shopping. A little research can save you a lot.

## Reese hosts annual Camp Blue Yonder

Thirty-six girls from the local community spent this week here during Camp Blue Yonder. The boys camp is scheduled for next week as they will do the same things the girls did this week.

According to 1st Lt. Mitch Sibley-Jett, Camp Blue Yonder project officer, the camp benefits less privileged children in the local area. Funds for Blue Yonder come from a variety of sources.

"The United Way handles the downtown fund raising for the camp," the lieutenant explained. "Other funds are donated by base agencies, like the officers' wives club, enlisted wives club, company grade officers council, the Air Force Sergeants Association and the chapel."

"We need people to work as counselors for the boys camp," said the lieutenant. "It's an all-week camp, so we still need a few to

stay with them overnight."

Some of the events scheduled for the camp include trips to the air traffic control tower, base swimming pools and several other morale, welfare and recreation flight facilities.

"The 64th Civil Engineering Squadron provided the tents and other facilities for the campers to stay overnight," he said. "Also, MWR provided the use of their facilities at no cost, and several other units on base going to

take time to help familiarize the campers with the wing's mission."

He cited the 64th Operations Group, the 64th Security Police Squadron and 64th Communications Squadron as examples. The 64th Medical Squadron also took part in the camp by giving campers physicals to ensure they are fit for the planned activities.

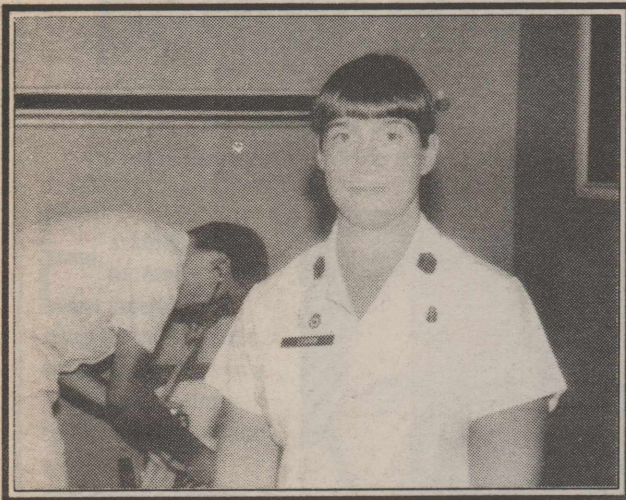

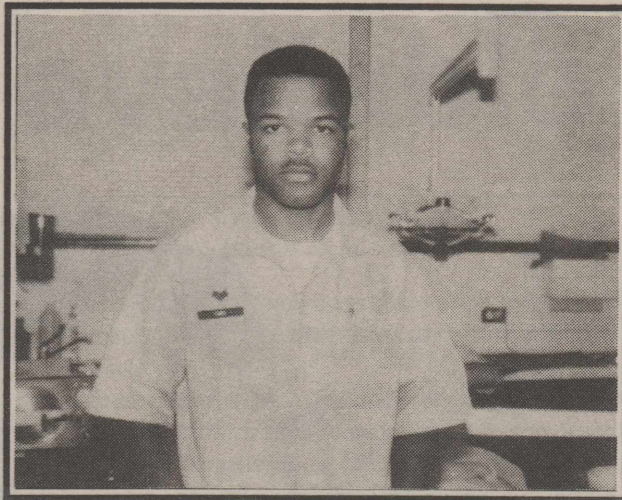

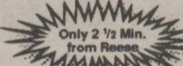

would reduce the number of involuntary separations that will otherwise be required during the next four years to reach personnel targets.

The plan would authorize DOD to offer financial incentives to enlisted and officers with more than six but less than 20 years of military service who volunteer to separate from active duty.

Currently, the Air Force pays no retirement benefits to those who leave the service before 20 years.

For those eligible, the incentive pay would be equal to 2.5 percent of annual base pay multiplied by the member's years of service. Incentive payments would be made in equal annual installments for a period equal to twice the number of years of service of the member.

Involuntary separation pay is based on the full separation pay formula for only those separating under high year of tenure limits or a reduction in force.

For example, those E-4s who must leave the service during August and September under the new high year of tenure rules will receive full separation pay. As of Aug. 1, tenure is limited to 10 years for E-4s.

Half separation pay is also authorized for involuntarily separated people who meet the basic eligibility criteria, sign an agreement to serve at least three years in the Reserves, and are not qualified for retention and are denied reenlistment, officials said.

People affected by this include those who had an expired service obligation, selected changes in ser-

vice obligation for reasons of security, homosexuality, drug or alcohol abuse rehabilitation failure, and convenience of the government.

The Reserve commitment, which is required for all others who receive involuntary separation pay, is three years starting the day after the member completes the remaining service commitment or upon separation, whichever is later.

Numerous other benefits were approved to help people who leave government service. These include post-separation health care, extended exchange and commissary privileges, extended residence in government quarters under certain conditions, and nonappropriated fund position hiring preference.

Over the next four years, the military will shrink from just over 2 million to 1.65 million at the end of fiscal 1995. Defense officials said a large part of the cuts can be accomplished by normal attrition and through reductions in the number of recruits, but some of the reduction will have to be made through involuntary separations.

The incentive pay proposal for those who leave the service voluntarily with less than 20 years in uniform includes no medical, commissary or travel benefits and is not intended to be associated with a full-scale retirement plan.

Secretary Cheney is asking Congress for temporary authority to offer the incentive, which would expire at the end of the drawdown in 1995.

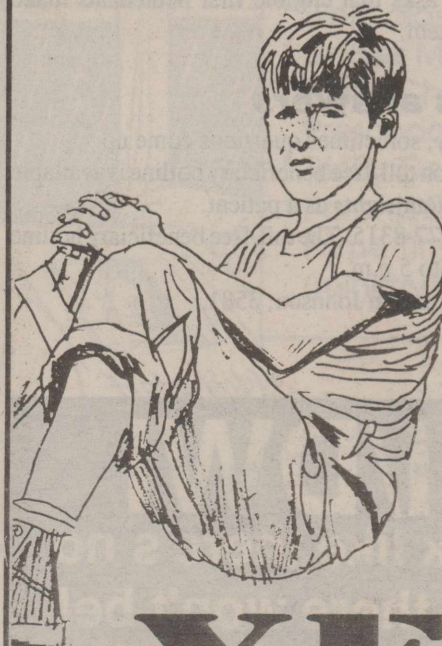

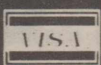

# Stop thief!

## Shoplifting is always a crime

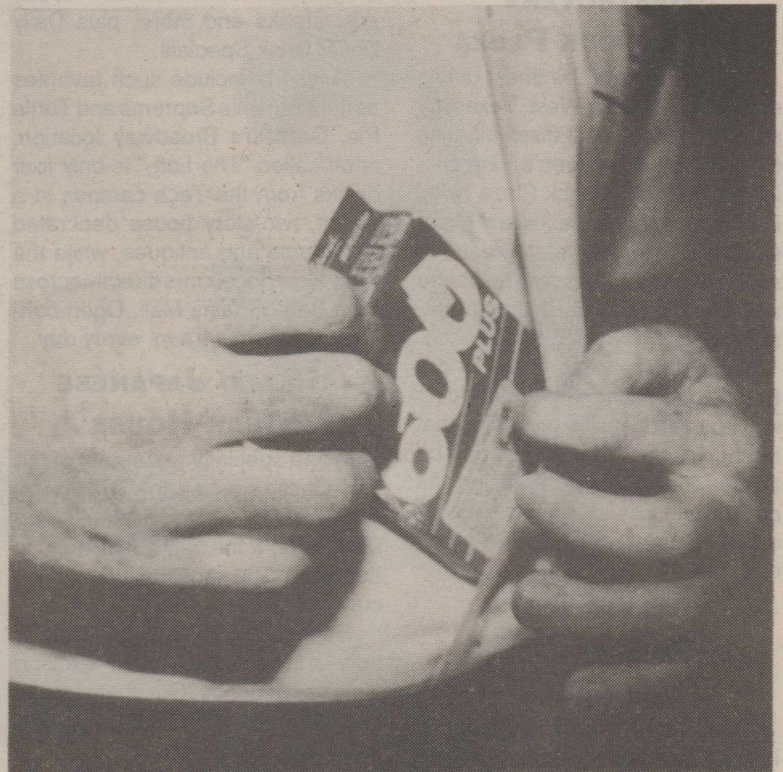

"It was great! I actually fooled them all. I was in the base exchange looking around. The stereos were very nice, but I couldn't take one of those, so instead, I took a blank cassette tape. Then I walked out like nothing happened. I didn't need the tape, but the store won't miss it, they had plenty."

This is not a true story, but in the real world, it happens all the time.

Shoplifting is stealing, and stealing is a criminal act. Too many teenagers are unaware of the serious harm that a police record, even for what might seem to be a petty violation, can do to their lives and futures. Even if the punishment does not include a jail sentence, and the conviction is punished only by a fine and/or probation, the police record remains the same; and it says "thief."

Shoplifters are found all across the country. Many from middle and

upper income families are pilfering merchandise.

Why do young people commit a criminal act that will probably result in arrest and jeopardize their future? The common answers are "I did it for kicks," "It was just a prank," or "I did it on a dare." In other words, they think it's more of a game than a crime.

But the law makes no provision

for games. Shoplifting is stealing and stealing is a criminal act. The shoplifter is a thief, not a prankster.

Never break the law on a dare—it takes more courage to turn down a dare than to accept it, and your friends know this. In the long run, they will respect you for sticking to your beliefs.

Most shoplifters have the money to buy the item they shoplift at the time of the act.

Some people seem to think that stores make a lot of money and won't miss a record, a cassette or even a tape player. But the fact is that the stores are losing more to shoplifters each year.

The items have been bought and paid for by the store, and taking it is stealing. If something that belonged to you were stolen, it would be a great loss...so it is with a store.

Additionally, when a store loses because of shoplifters, the money needed to replace the property comes out of the budget of the customers.

We as customers pay for shoplifters to steal. Store managers have to raise their prices to overcome the loss of shoplifters.

It's our decision on what to do about shoplifters. If you see someone shoplifting, report it to the store. When you notice a shoplifter, he is actually stealing from you too. It is your money that is going to pay for the losses caused by shoplifters.

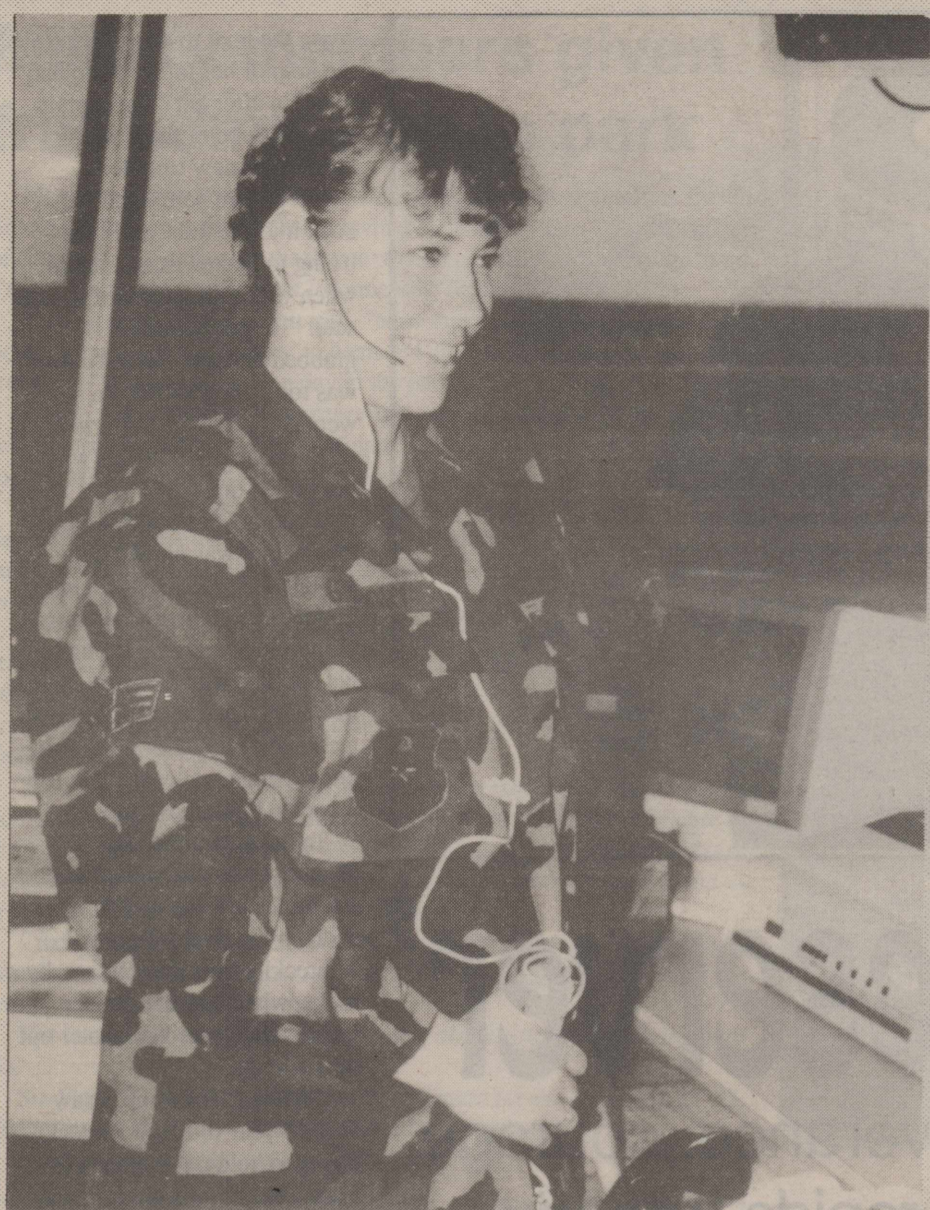

# WIC

## Family program proves very beneficial to Reese people

Women's, Infants, Children is a health program that teaches people about good nutrition and provides nutritious foods to supplement diets. Infants get 31 cans of formula, infant cereal after four months and juice after six months. Women and children get milk, cheese, cereal, eggs, juice and dried beans, and sometimes peanut butter is given.

The value of the food is about \$40-60 per month.

Who is eligible for WIC? Women who are pregnant, post partum or breast feeding. Children under the age of 5 and most infants qualify.

How is eligibility determined? WIC requires written proof of income for everyone living in the household regardless of whether or not they are related to the applicant or provide financial support. Written proof is required showing that the applicant lives in Lubbock County. Proof can be utility bills, phone bills, and so on.

Normally, E-4 and below will qualify. A current leave and earning statement is required. Off-base housing allowance is not counted as income, but everything else is. An example of an eligible family would be a family of four making less than \$23,495 annually. Participation in WIC is free. You do not pay anything.

On the first visit, it will take about one to two hours to process your case. This includes a clerk gathering information about income, household and client's diet, as well as some other paperwork. Then the WIC nurse will

check growth and blood iron. Next, a nutritionist reviews these results and explains them to you.

From then on, you will come every other month to attend a nutrition education class and to receive your food cards. This will take about one hour. Every six months, a longer appointment is necessary to check income, residence, diet and nutritional status to see if you or your child can continue in the WIC program.

Infants stay on WIC until they are 1. WIC doesn't affect food stamp recipients or benefits of any other program. Citizenship is not a requirement for WIC — people from other countries may qualify. Proof of social security numbers for every person over the age of 14 living in the household is required.

If you are interested in participating in the WIC program and would like more information about how to apply, you can go to the Lubbock Children's Health Clinic at 102 Ave. J, 8 - 11 a.m., Monday through Friday. You may also call WIC at 763-5906 and ask to speak to Judy Bradley, who is responsible for the WIC program at Reese. She currently comes to Reese twice a month to administer the program.

WIC is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, administered by the Texas Department of Health, and managed locally by the Lubbock Children's Health Clinic. WIC is an equal opportunity program. # 'Life preserver'

## Captain's perseverance, courage prevent river rapids tragedy

*"Neither the sea nor the sky is inherently dangerous, but both are terribly unforgiving of human error."*

— Paraphrase of an old saying

**A**s a flight commander with the 33rd Flying Training Squadron, Capt. Sandy Miarecki knows the risks that can go with

the nautical side of the above expression.

It happened July 16 on a Manitoba, Canada, river. Captain Miarecki was on the third day of a weeklong fishing vacation with her father, George, when events took an unexpected turn.

The captain and her father decided to check out the rapids on the Gammon River, which extended out of the lake near their lodge. They were accompanied by fellow vacationers Oscar Cain and Gant Redmon of Illinois in one boat and the three-member Butler family from Manitoba in another.

"Gant and Oscar said they had been going there to fish for 20 years, so they would show us where the rapids were," said the captain, who's also a native of Illinois.

The river was swollen from recent heavy rains and was running higher and faster than normal, the captain said. As they hit the first drop-off of the rapids, the Cain-Redmon boat got too close, "slammed" into the rocks there, and was pulled sideways

into the falls. Two falls later and out of sight of their companions, both men were thrown into the water and ended up clinging to their capsized craft.

Meanwhile, the other two boats managed to pull back from the first falls and headed for the left bank. Not knowing if Mr. Cain and Mr. Redmon were all right, they started down the shore on foot.

"There was a portage trail there — a sign that this [section of the river] was not normally something you would go down," the captain said. Portage trails are used to bypass stretches of river too turbulent to take on.

When they reached their two foundered companions, they were between the third fall, which was 15-feet deep, and a set of twin falls split by a small island further downriver. The island kept the two men from going over the right side of the fourth falls.

Captain Miarecki, her father and Colin Butler headed back to the boats and made their way to the opposite bank. Then they proceeded down shore on foot, figuring it would be easier to rescue the men from that side of the river.

By the time they got down by the fourth falls, the endangered duo had been pulled into a

whirlpool between the third and fourth falls, which in turn had pulled them back to the base of fall No. 3.

"Just as I emerged from the woods, I saw Gant disappear into the water — he was pulled in by the undertow," said Captain Miarecki. "I thought he was gone — I thought there was no way he was coming back up."

Luckily, he did surface about 30 feet downriver. Mrs. Butler, still in position by fall No. 4, was then able to pull him into a small

cove of rocks. Though she couldn't get him to shore from there, the cove provided shelter from the current.

At the same time, the captain dove into the river. Despite a strong current, she was able to reach Mr. Cain who was still hanging on the boat.

By this time, Mr. Cain's fatigue was becoming a major factor. Like his boatmate, he was in his mid-70s and the ordeal was taking a harsh toll. Unable to

swim the boat to shore despite the help of her father (who had dived in after her), the captain saw the three of them were headed for new trouble.

"We were getting pulled back into the falls, and I was trying to make Oscar hold on when we hit the worst of it," she said. "He got pulled off. I grabbed his arm, but the current was too strong and down he went. I tried to get my grip back on the boat, but that was when I got pulled down."

Despite her life preserver, the captain was pinned down for a total of 20 seconds. "I hadn't gotten a good breath, so I was pretty much gagging trying to get air. The water was so turbulent that I was flipped over a couple of times, and I didn't know which way was up until I sensed a light above me."

In the meantime, Mr. Miarecki was also pulled under. All three came up at different spots in the river. Captain Miarecki swam to some nearby rocks, where she caught her breath and cleared the water out of her lungs.

"When I looked up, I saw Josh (8-year-old Josh Butler) trying to hold out a branch to Oscar, but he was too far away and he was heading toward the fourth falls again."

Despite the fatigue in her legs, the captain pulled herself up and started making her way down the river by walking on submerged rocks. The slippery surfaces made passage too slow, however, and "without even thinking," the captain dove back into the water.

"I could just see Oscar's eyes — he was going down for the last time. He was just too tired," she said.

The only person in a position to reach Mr. Cain, the captain managed to get to him just as he went down. This time, her rescue effort was a success. She swam with him out of the current and toward shore, where an overhanging tree limb provided an "anchor" to the steep, rocky shore.

Once Mr. Cain was dragged out of the river, everyone headed to the cove where Mrs. Butler and Mr. Redmon were and helped them to shore.

Luckily, no one was seriously injured. The group made their way back to their lodge, where a vacationing doctor lent a hand.

"We're really grateful there were (others) in

the area to see what happened when our boats got away from us," Mr. Cain said.

Following the ordeal, the captain said that she had a renewed regard for the water.

"I've done a lot of swimming, and I was real involved in water sports in high school," she said, "[but] I have a very great respect for falls now. I've always respected water and what it can do, but boy, I have a lot more respect now."

## Military members given free admission to park

Park president Bob Bennett said, "Now that most of the troops are back home, we want to say 'thanks' to them and give them a chance to 'get away from it all' as our guests for a day in the park."

"As an added treat for youngsters in the military families," he said, "we will be bringing in the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles for nightly concerts today through Sunday."

Bennett said the offer of free admission will be good on every operating day during August except Saturdays. "Our Saturdays near the end of the summer season are invariably quite busy and we want all our guests to be able to enjoy the park to the fullest," he said.
