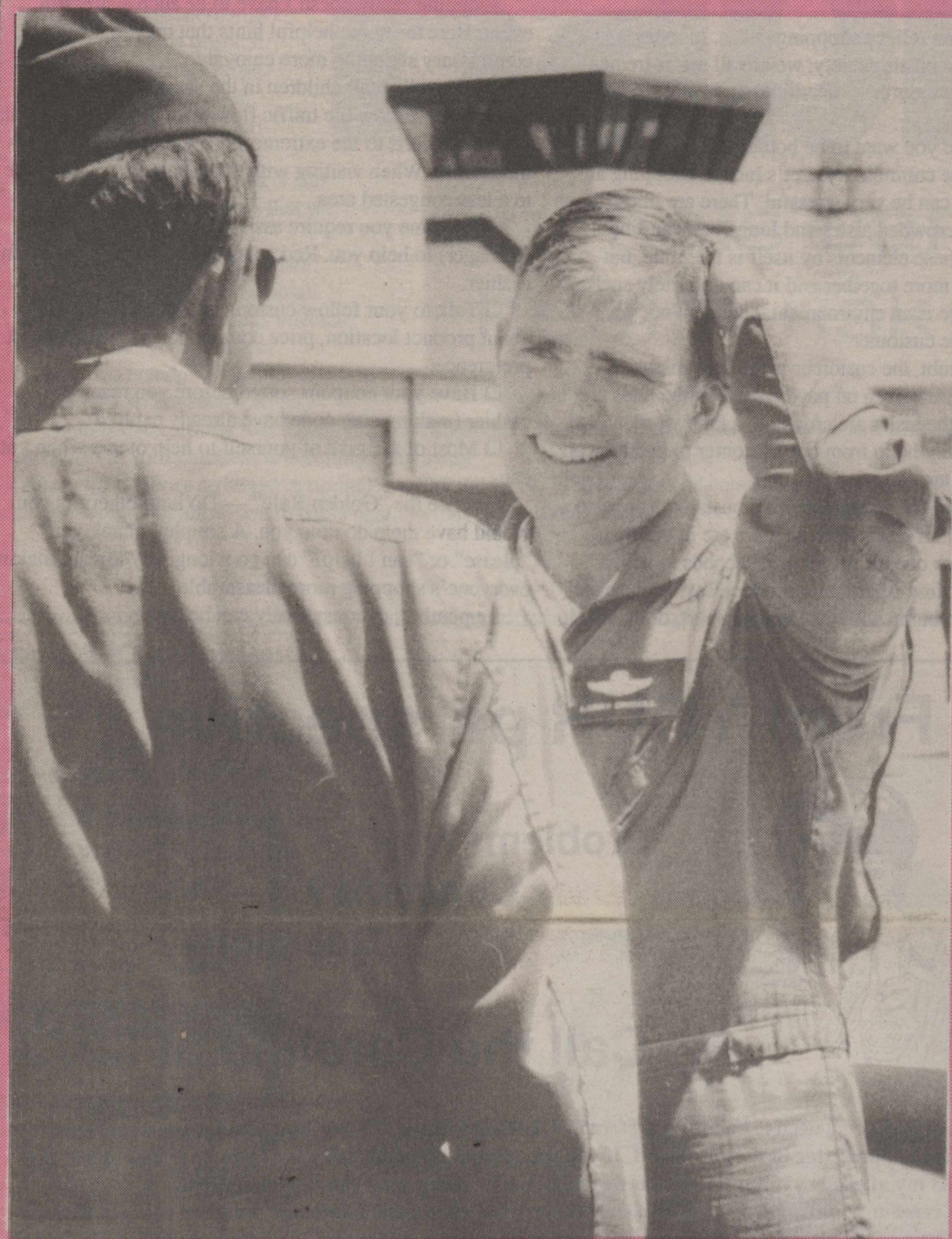

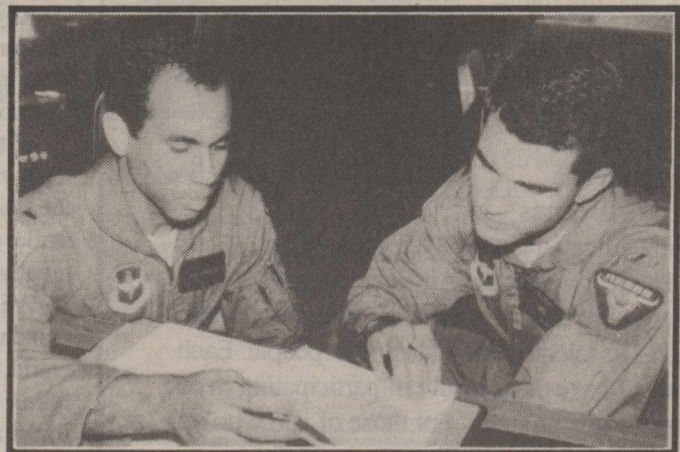

Colonel Driskill hits 5,000-hour mark

Col. Larry Driskill (right) is greeted by Col. Bob Negley, 64th Operations Group commander, after reaching the 5,000-hour flying mark Aug. 9. Colonel Driskill, the deputy commander for the group, accumulated that total over 16 years while flying 2,566 sorties in 11 different aircraft. A command pilot with 932 combat hours, the colonel's totals include: T-37, 1,433 hours; T-38, 918 hours; O-2, 953 hours; U-2, 1,530 hours. He has flown 1,776 hours as an instructor pilot.

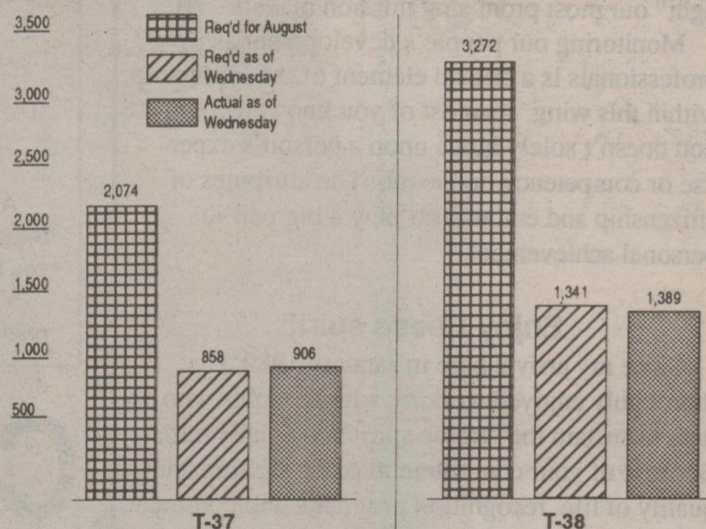

Air Force aims to retrain 2,900 NCOs

Twenty-two wing members could be directly affected

Twenty-two wing members could be affected as the Air Force hopes to retrain about 2,900 career noncommissioned officers in fiscal 1992.

The Fiscal 1992 Noncommissioned Officer Retraining Program is driven primarily by the drawdown in forces as well as the retirement of certain weapons systems from the Air Force inventory. The three-phase program began July 25, and phase two kicks off today.

According to SSgt. John Slusser of the local military personnel flight, 22 Reese NCOs in the 645X1 and 304X2 career fields are affected at Reese. Those fields are materiel and storage specialist and meteorological/navigational aids systems repair specialist, respectively.

The alternative to retraining is to separate people from the Air Force, and is an "unac-

ceptable practice," officials said. Rather, the service hopes to be able to retrain people into related skills whenever possible.

Under the retraining program, the Air Force is looking for volunteers to retrain from overage skills into shortage skills.

In phase two, voluntary retraining will continue but people who are at risk of being involuntarily retrained will be notified. Per-

sonal notices will be sent advising that they can volunteer for retraining into a skill of their choice if they meet qualifications.

If enough volunteers are not found, people may be identified to retrain into a specific shortage skill needed by the Air Force. Phase two is scheduled today through Sept. 16.

Finally, if necessary to meet program goals, NCOs will be retrained out of skills where there are still significant overages. Overage NCOs holding a second or third Air Force specialty code

will be identified with a present and forecasted shortage, directing the return to that career field.

If overages still exist after that, the Air Force will select from the population at risk and direct retraining.

By offering incentives for voluntary retraining, the Air Force hopes to avoid any involuntary retraining, officials said.

People in overage skills who want to retrain have the chance to do so. Likewise, those in overages who want to get into a specific skill can make that move if that skill has shortages and the applicant qualifies.

NCOs may volunteer for retraining as they learn that in various skills, the surplus of NCOs will lead to some NCOs performing duties normally assigned to lower grade air-

Carelessness causes cooking catastrophes

Outdoor cooking is one of the most common summertime activities enjoyed by family and friends. With a little thought, outdoor eating and cooking can be safe and enjoyable for all concerned, but wing safety officials warn that when someone is careless in the preparation, storage or cooking of food, accidents will happen.

Outdoor cooking of meat requires caution to prevent the meat from spoiling in warm temperatures or direct sunlight. Both chicken and pork will spoil very quickly when exposed. Both of these types of meat must be thoroughly cooked to prevent food poisoning.

Each year, hundreds of people eat undercooked meat and within a few hours have reactions. The same problem of food spoiling occurs with salads, spreads and packaged meats allowed to sit around in warm air or direct sunlight.

The simplest way to be sure food does not spoil is to

keep it in the refrigerator or cooler until it is ready to be cooked or eaten.

The outdoor grill, fired with either charcoal or gas, is a common appliance in most American homes. The outside shell of a fired-up grill will always be hot to the touch.

Small children (and adults) can be burned with the slightest touch on the side of a grill.

Grills must have a steady base to prevent them from tipping over when in use, and outdoor cooking should be located away from other picnic activities.

After the grill has been used, it should be allowed to cool down before it is emptied or cleaned. Never put hot coals into a trash can or dumpster until the coals are completely cool or thoroughly soaked with water.

Outdoor eating and cooking is a great way to enjoy the summer. Don't spoil it with food poisoning or burns.

Lubbock is not a high-risk area for rabies, but neither is it a rabies-free area. Without treatment any person who gets it will almost certainly die. Therefore, the hospital maintains a vigorous rabies control program based on the premise that no risk of rabies is acceptable.

There are a few basic facts and common sense precautions that we should all remember.

Rabies is a disease which can affect any warm-blooded animal. The reservoir of infection is infected wildlife. The primary risk of exposure to humans is the bite of a wild animal or unvaccinated pet.

There is one cardinal rule which you must observe and teach to your children. It is simple: **stay away from wild or stray animals!** A normal, healthy wild animal would not allow you to come near. So the mere

fact that you are able to get close to a wild animal suggests that it may be sick.

Stray dogs and cats are particularly tempting to children, but you must remember that they are probably not

vaccinated and could easily have been bitten and infected.

It is very important that we not tolerate stray animals in our community. Rabies is only one of the disease problems they cause. Please report any stray animals you see to the security police at 3332. And remember, even if you are bitten by a rabid animal, the disease can be prevented by prompt medical care.

The first thing to do if you are bitten or scratched by any animal is to wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water. Then proceed immediately to the emergency room for medical care and to ensure the incident is properly followed up.

Pets — vaccinated pets, that is — are wonderful and wildlife is a beautiful and important part of our planet. It's also

wonderful to watch — not pet. And rabies? Don't worry about it, but definitely don't forget it.

Her advice to commanders regarding military justice can result in Article 15 actions or administrative discharges.

"I enjoy working in the legal office because of the variety of jobs I do," she said. She noted that she has a large number of responsibilities for someone so early on in their career.

"The people I work with create a family-type atmosphere," she added.

Starting Oct. 1, Captain Jackson will become the area defense counsel.

"I'm really looking forward to playing the role of the defender instead of the prosecutor," she said. "It will be strange working on the other side of the courtroom, but with time I'll adjust."

During her off-duty time, she enjoys playing racquetball and running with her husband, Scott.

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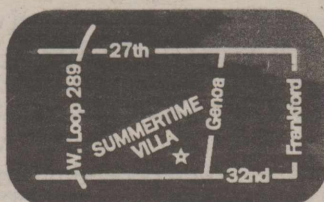
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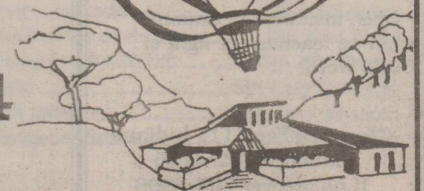
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All officer assignments now advertised

Support officers included in new computer initiative

The Air Force is now advertising assignment openings for all officers through local personnel offices and directly to units with computer modem capabilities, the Air Force Military Personnel Center said.

Reese personnel officials said the system should become available here Sept. 10, once the software and modem arrive.

The new officer assignment system began servicewide in April with advertisement of rated officer openings and quickly expanded to include nonrated operations officers as well. The Air Force began providing similar service for mission support officers Aug. 1.

Capt. Roscoe Kahumoku, chief of the military personnel flight here, said the new assignment system is designed to provide officers with more say in the assignment process. The process now provides greater individual choice and responds to officers' career goals.

The electronic bulletin board for mission support officers is in five sections: combat support, logistics, research and development, acquisition, technical and special duty assignments.

The bulletin board provides the latest career field information and available assignment openings for mission support officers. Currently, some 900 openings are advertised on the mission support officer electronic bulletin board, and AFMPC officials anticipate

that number to increase as they begin to work more of the summer 1992 jobs.

Information for each listing includes job title, Air Force specialty code, a short job description, necessary qualifications, authorized grades, duty location, report date, appli-

cation deadlines and an AFMPC point of contact and phone number. Each listing also has a tracking number that people should refer to when calling AFMPC. More information is available by calling 1st Lt. Kate Russel, 3714. (Air Force News Service)

Civil Reserve Air Fleet role should expand, says airline

One of the nation's top airline executives believes an expanded Civil Reserve Air Fleet role could benefit the nation's airlines and the Air Force.

James R. Bridges, executive vice president of World Airways, recently spoke to a gathering of about 350 people at an Air Force Association briefing in St. Louis.

"We recognize your budgetary constraints and the difficulties you face relative to base closings, less equipment and troop cutbacks — let us help," he urged the group of Air Force and civilian participants.

"For instance, why not let the CRAF carriers operate the KC-10 fleet for SAC? What about the new

C-17 — surely there's a commercial use for that aircraft that can lower your effective costs and allow you to have a larger fleet."

He said a "reverse CRAF," with carriers leasing Air Force aircraft under government subsidy, would substantially benefit civilian carriers.

"Frankly, I think that's a necessity. For instance, Military Airlift Command and the U.S. government clearly can't afford to buy and maintain enough C-17s for you to do everything that you want them to do. So I think it's an absolute necessity that we explore ways of how we can use some of your assets as commercial assets to defray some of the costs; and vice versa, how can we use

some of our assets and convert them into military assets to defray some of our costs.

"I can tell you straight up that we can operate, fly and maintain the KC-10 fleet cheaper than you can by a fair amount of dollars. That's just an example of areas in which we could work together in the future.

"Things we might look at in the future are — How can we do things like this? What can we do that is a joint, risk-sharing venture? Who knows, maybe I can take a C-17 and fly it back and forth to South America three days a week, and give it to your Reserve units to fly on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. I don't know, maybe that'll work. If it will, I think we're

wide open to exploring that.

"I strongly believe that a major change that will occur through necessity is risk-sharing, joint ventures and partnerships. I challenge you to come up with creative ways to strengthen and expand our partnership. We will do the same," he said.

Bridges also spoke of the success of the CRAF program during Operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

Though it was an unqualified success, Bridges said there were a few areas that could have been improved from the carriers' standpoint.

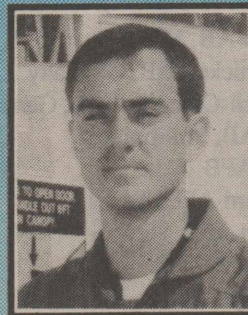
"Early in the game it was apparent that the entire CRAF structure

was stretched and fighting hard to sort out how best to use the available resources," he noted. "Ground delays of eight to 12 hours were commonplace. World Airways alone lost 20 aircraft days because of cargo and passenger loading problems. We could have moved an additional 7,000 troops or 2.8 million pounds of cargo just with the time lost to delays.

"Overall (however), CRAF in its present state is a healthy, workable program that clearly stood up to the rigors of a wartime situation. Problems encountered were for the most part minor considering the magnitude of the operation," he said. (Air Force News Service)

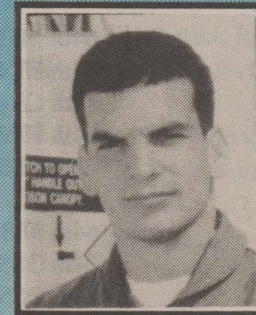

UPT played big role in gulf victory

Desert Storm pilots point to training as key to success

Twelve F-16s from the 69th Tactical Fighter Squadron departed Jan. 18, 1991 from a remote Middle East base to attack a strategic target in the heart of Baghdad.

Success would require each pilot to reach within himself for courage, knowledge and airmanship skills. Each pilot, therefore, reached back to undergraduate pilot training.

"Because of my UPT experience, I felt better able to prioritize tasks in a safe and efficient manner," said Capt. Mark "Rock" Clemons, a graduate of Reese Undergraduate Pilot Training, Class 82-03. "This was extremely helpful during highly complex and demanding portions of this Baghdad mission."

"Pilot training taught me to concentrate on the job at hand, to do it well, and still spend some brain bytes thinking ahead," said Lt. Col. Harry Davis, 69th TFS commander and member of UPT Class 73-01 at Columbus AFB, Miss. Colonel Davis led the "Werewolves" into combat.

Concentrating on the job at hand would be important that day as the Werewolves were to fly as part of a huge aircraft package that included E-3 Sentry Airborne Warning and Control Systems aircraft, F-15 Eagles for air-to-air escort and F-4G Wild

Weasels for suppression of surface-to-air missiles, better known as SAMs.

Each pilot knew he would have to

use every bit of airmanship acquired since day one of UPT in order to be effective and survive. By July 4, some six months after the unit deployed,

every 69th TFS pilot had returned alive to their permanent home at Moody AFB, Ga., after the demanding experience.

Demanding aptly describes what the Werewolves encountered in the skies above Baghdad. With more than 60 jets in the sky, multiple missile launchers and heavy anti-aircraft artillery, each pilot maintained formation.

First Lt. Douglas Champagne, a Sheppard AFB, Texas, UPT Class 89-03 graduate, traces formation discipline to his training days at the Wichita Falls base. "UPT taught me the importance of flying in the prescribed position," he said. "Early exposure to varied tactical environments (at Sheppard) gave me more confidence in my ability to perform the mission."

Such confidence came in handy as performing bombing missions against heavily defended Baghdad targets required steadfast belief in each pilot's own abilities. These abilities not only included mission planning, attacking targets and evading enemy fire, but in doing things some pilots might call "simple."

"UPT taught me to land very well," said Capt. Dave Thorsen, Columbus Class 82-04. "This may sound simple, but after flying grueling back-to-back combat missions at night, you still need to concentrate on landing the airplane. It all comes back to basics and knowing them well made us an effective fighting force," Captain Thorsen explained. (Air Force News Service)

During this summer, several Reese people have been injured during sports or recreational activities.

As of this week, there has been one reportable off-duty mishap at Reese. The mishap involved a person who dove into shallow water and fractured a vertebra in his neck. There are also several persons walking around on crutches or with arms in slings.

The primary cause of the reportable off-duty mishap was the individual's performing an unsafe act after consuming alcohol, according to wing safety officials.

The primary causes of the non-reportable injuries were failure of participants to properly warm up prior to the start of an activity, failure of coaches to enforce the rules of the game, persons overextending their physical limits, and being interested in winning at all costs.

It does not matter whether the game is softball, volleyball or tennis — someone will end up getting injured when the rules of the game are not enforced, be it by the players in a pickup game or by the coaches during a league game.

Sometimes players forget that they're involved in a game, not a life and death issue. We find ourselves many times caught up in the game and feel that we must win at any cost.

As Reese enters the last half of the last month of the "101 Critical Days of Summer," there has been one reportable sport or recreation injury resulting in lost time. To prevent any future injuries, wing safety said, all commanders, supervisors and members must be aware of how games are played. By playing the game a bit slower and safer, a good time can be had by all participants.

men.

In conjunction with the program, the Air Force has created a new assignments incentive for people retraining out of seriously overmanned career fields.

Some retrainees may become eligible for a selective re-enlistment bonus if moving into a skill paying a "Zone B" bonus. There are 15 skills paying this bonus to new retrainees.

To qualify, retrainees must be awarded a 3-skill level in the new specialty and re-enlist before completing 10 years of active service.

Retraining can also have a positive effect on promotions, officials said. Skills experiencing chronic critical shortages of NCOs normally have a higher promotion selection rate.

There are 14 such skills that receive promotions at a rate of 1.2 times higher than other skills. Retraining-in requirements vary by skill and grade.

Reese's classification and training section has complete details on the retraining program, including eligibility criteria. The Air Force is encouraging interested NCOs to check on opportunities as soon as possible while a greater variety of skills are available for volunteers.

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

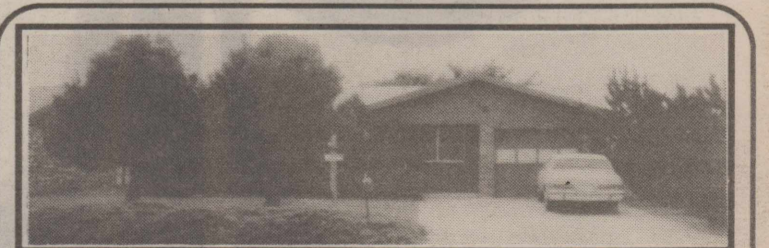
