Children benefit from week-long outing

With the help of 20 base agencies, 50 counselors and more than \$3,500 in contributions, Camp Blue Yonder was successful again.

This year, a group of 38 girls and 38 boys spent a week each at Reese, enjoying activities such as Texas Water Rampage, Putt-Putt Golf, Joyland Amusement Park and simulator rides just to name a few.

"I was lucky enough to see the camp from start to finish," said 1st Lt. Mitch Sibley-Jett, Camp Blue Yonder project officer. "Seeing the difference that the camp made in these kids' lives is something I wouldn't have missed."

According to Lieutenant Sibley-Jett, for many, this was the first opportunity to enjoy such activities. More important than the activities however, was the chance to experience warm, positive adult interaction. "There was not one of those children present who would turn down a chance to attend Camp Blue Yonder again next year," he said. "Many of the children came from less privileged homes, and some had no parents at all. Our Camp Blue Yonder campers were all allowed to 'just be', without judgement or criticism. They did, and they flourished," he added.

"The look in many of the girls eyes said all that needed to be said," the lieutenant said. "They had the greatest time ever. Many did not want to go home."

Lieutenant Sibley-Jett would like to thank all wing members and organizations who participated in making Camp Blue Yonder a success. "Everyone's attitude and patience were vital in ensuring the camp ran smoothly and the campers had the best possible time," he said. "It was a most wonderful special camp!"



From my perspective

n less than five months the first T-1A "Jayhawk" will arrive at Reese to start a new era of undergraduate pilot training.

The T-1A will be the first new aircraft in Air Force pilot training in 30 years and will lead to the return of specialized undergraduate pilot training, which was used by the Air Force in the 1940s and 1950s.



In fact, the T-1 is "replacing" the TB-25 aircraft, one of which is now displayed on a pedestal next to the main gate. As you might guess, the T-1 is a long step from the TB-25.

The T-1 is a business jet produced by the Beech Aircraft Co. in Wichita, Kan. The jet has been modified to meet military requirements, but is essentially the same aircraft flown in the civilian world.

The first T-1 is currently flying at the factory with both civilian and military pilots on board.

By late fall, we expect to have the aircraft certified by the Federal Aviation Administration and ready to deliver to Reese. Once deliveries have started we can expect two or three aircraft per month for about the next year.

The aircraft, however, is not the only part of the T-1 system.

The T-1 simulator is currently operational and undergoing tests at the Quintron plant in Chantilly,

The new simulator will be a full-up cockpit representation of the T-1 with a visual system, but no motion. You should see the first T-1 simulator activity in September when two of the T-38 simulators will be removed in preparation for the arrival of the new simulators.

Also, part of the T-1 project is the syllabus and courseware which are currently being developed in Denver by McDonnell-Douglas Training Systems. We expect these materials to arrive at Reese next spring.

The final part of the system is the maintenance and supply operation. Very soon, you should see construction begin on the contractor operated and managed base supply (COMBS) warehouse behind the temporary living facility.

This will be the first of three major logistics projects to support the Jayhawk.

Also behind the TLF, a new T-1 hangar will be built and the north ramp will be torn up to modify aircraft parking.

All of these projects will increase congestion and activity in the north part of the base but will result in modern maintenance and supply facilities to support the new trainer.

For the last year and one-half, Reese has been getting ready for the T-1.

Most of the preparations have occurred at civil engineering drawing boards or in various offices in the operations group.

Soon you will see a trickle of tangible activity around base as small construction projects commence. That trickle will quickly change to a raging torrent as more construction starts, aircraft arrive, simulators are installed, local test flying starts and instructors begin training.

We called the first shirt and he said he would help us try to get our money back from MWR. MWR said they can't refund or exchange tickets. If "Texas" officials had been informed of your parties' cancellation, they could have resold your tickets and authorized a refund. If the tour leader had then been informed, she could have picked up the refund at the "Texas" ticket window when she paid for the other tour members. Since no one was informed of your emergency situation, the tickets were not resold and cannot be refunded.

Once again, we apologize for the inconvenience to you and your party, but hope this will help to clear up any misunderstanding.





The day started out calm as usual for Debra Harris and Christi Shaffer, both Reese Child Development Center program assistants. It was the same routine they performed everyday, as they prepared their room for the children they take care of.

That afternoon, Mrs. Harris, Mrs. Shaffer and Sharon Dorsey decided to take their children to play out to the tennis courts.

This afternoon brought unusually hot weather to the base. The tennis courts meant plenty of room for Gerard Emerson to run and play in. The two-year-old would run around just as any other child would do.

All of a sudden, while Gerard was running he fell and didn't get up. Mrs. Harris checked on him. He was unconscious.

"I was so scared when I saw that he wasn't moving. I picked him up and took him to Mrs. Shaffer and Mrs. Dorsey," Mrs. Harris said. "When I gothim to them, Mrs. Shaffer told Mrs. Dorsey to go back to the center and call 9-1-1."

Mrs. Shaffer put Gerard on the ground and started rescue breathing while Mrs. Harris checked for his pulse. "I couldn't find a pulse on him

so Mrs. Shaffer and I decided to switch places," Mrs. Harris said.

"After two to three minutes Gerard starting breathing on his own," Mrs. Shaffer said. "Shortly after the ambulance arrived and took him to the hospital. The doctor said he would be

Mrs. Shaffer has been a program assistant since November 1988 and Mrs. Harris has worked for the center since April.

"This was the first time either of our skills have been tested," Mrs. Harris said. "We learned how to work as a team that afternoon."


